Light Agenda City Facing

City commissioners face a relatively light agenda when they convene tonight at City Hall.

MIAMI (UPI) — Two double-fatality wrecks Sunday night pushed Florida's weekend toll to at least 10, according to the Highway Patrol.

500 Deaths Seen
CHICAGO (UPI) — Nearly 500 Americans might be killed on the nation's streets and highways during the Memorial Day weekend, the National Safety Council said today.

GIs Coming Home
HEIDELBERG, Germany (UPI) — The U.S. army announced today it is withdrawing the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment from its bases along the Iron Curtain and sending it back to the United States.

Koreans Protest
SEOUL, Korea (UPI) — About 6,000 students demonstrated in four South Korean cities today, demanding immediate economic reforms, the elimination of corruption and the immediate release of students arrested in earlier demonstrations.

Dies In Flames
OCALA (UPI) — A 42-year-old John Dixon Thomas, was found dead today after a suspicious fire swept through his home, police said, apparently starting at several spots in the home at the same time.

Goldwater Charge
SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The bitter California primary campaign of Gov. Nelson Rockefeller and Sen. Barry Goldwater moved into the final week today with Goldwater charging he was the target of a "gang up" by supporters of his rivals for the Republican presidential nomination.

High Sends Wire To Mrs. Roberts
MIAMI (UPI) — Robert King High began his last day of gubernatorial runoff campaigning today after expressing sorrow about a race-day accident Sunday which critically injured a Florida driver.

High and his wife Faith sent a telegram to Mrs. Lynn Roberts, expressing their concern over the condition of her husband, Fireball, injured in a flaming three-car wreck at the Charlotte, N. C. world 600 race. Roberts is a Daytona Beach resident.

Time Has Run Out, Prince Edward Told

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court ruled today that Prince Edward County, Va., must reopen its public schools, which have been closed since 1959 to avoid integrated classes.

Justice Hugo L. Black announced the court's opinion, which affirmed a 1961 order by federal district Judge Oren R. Lewis.

Today's opinion sends the case back to the lower federal court for necessary further action.

"The time for more 'deliberate speed' has run out," Black said, "and that phrase can no longer justify denying these Prince Edward County school children their constitutional rights to an education equal to that afforded by the public schools in other parts of Virginia."

Following the closing of the public schools, white children were afforded private schooling in the county.

Black said that the closing of the Prince Edward schools and the raising of contributions to support private segregated white schools denied the Negro students and their parents "the equal protection of the laws" guaranteed in the Constitution.

Lewis in his lower court order, barred the county from paying county tuition grants or giving tax exemptions and from processing applications for state tuition grants to long as the county's public schools remained closed.

"We have no doubt of the power of the court to give this relief to enforce the discontinuance of the county's racially discriminatory practices," his opinion said.

Midway-Canaan Water Unit Set

Formation of the Midway-Canaan Water Association, Inc., was announced today by Earl Williams, acting chairman of a group of Negro citizens who have worked diligently for the past weeks to provide their areas with a fresh water supply.

Williams reported that he had been advised by Ramon D. McGough, Farmers Home Administration representative, that a Government loan has been tentatively approved for construction of a central water system in the community.

Applications for water will be taken from all interested citizens during the next two weeks. Cost to the applicant will be a \$20 deposit which will be returned if for some reason the system is not installed, Williams said.

Application blanks, and assistance in filling them out, will be available in the Dixon Building on Sipes Avenue weekdays from 4 until 7 p.m., except on Wednesdays, and from 8 a.m. until 9 p.m. on Saturdays.

Bryant To Open I-4 On May 29

Gov. Farris Bryant will be on hand for the official opening ceremony of Interstate 4 at 3 p.m. May 29 on the new highway about a mile from Daytona Beach.

The completed part of the new road now extends from Longwood area in Seminole County to Highway 92 in Volusia County.

The governor and representatives from several area communities will be on hand for the occasion.

Absentee Vote Could Decide Seminole Races

A heavy absentee vote in Seminole County may hold the key to victory or defeat for local candidates up for election Tuesday.

Mrs. Camille Bruce, Seminole vote registrar, said a total of 355 ballots have been cast by absentees. This is expected to spark a heavier than normal turnout of voters when the polls open at 7 a.m. They close at 7 p.m.

The same polling places will be used as in the May 6 primary with one exception. Voters in Precinct 12, the Forest City area, will have a new polling place. The previous polling place has been sold and county commissioners have chosen another site about 100 feet away from the original place.

It is located between the Forest City Restaurant and the Forest City Unit Shop on Highway 436.

Republicans will also cast their ballots this time, choosing a man and woman for the GOP national committee and to choose between an unpledged slate and a slate of delegates to the GOP national convention pledged to Sen. Barry Goldwater for the Republican presidential nomination.

Democrats also will choose a state man and woman for their national committee, plus voting on a slate of delegates to the Democratic national convention pledged to President Lyndon B. Johnson.

Seminole Democrats will also choose between gubernatorial candidates Miami Robert King High and Jacksonville Mayor Haydon Burns. The winner will be opposed by Charles R. Holley, St. Petersburg Republican, in the Nov. 3 general election.

County Democrats will choose between Marjorie Shepard and Troy Ivey for county tax collector, between incumbent J. C. Hutchison and Edward Yarbrough for District 1 county commissioner, and between incumbent John Fitzpatrick and Harry Cushing for District 5 county commissioner.

Democrats will also choose between incumbent Linton Cox and Al Davis for peace justice in the Sixth District, between incumbent R. E. Carroll and Charlie Thomas for Fourth District constable, and between incumbent Grady Hall and Charles Fagan for Sixth District constable.

Burns Predicts Sweeping Win

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — Mayor Haydon Burns predicted today he would sweep every county in the state except Dade, where he said bloc voting by Negroes would give the edge to his opponent for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination.

Burns and Miami Mayor Robert King High will battle it out tomorrow at the polls to decide which will meet Republican Rep. Charles Holley of St. Petersburg in the November general election.

In a final news conference, at which he declined to permit questions, Burns said his platform remained as he originally stated it.

Burns pledged as governor he would provide leadership to re-establish Bible reading and prayer in public schools.

Education will be one of his main concerns, Burns said.

Other measures the Jacksonville mayor said he would support were lowering of the voting age to 18, repeal of the intangible tax, repeal of the increase on the auto license tax, and elimination of unnecessary boards and bureaus.

He said he would oppose any extension of legalized gambling.

Driver Charged In Accident

Nikitka Ends Visit With \$227 Million Gift To Nasser

CAIRO (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev wound up his visit to the United Arab Republic today with a new Soviet gift of \$227 million and another warning against attacks on Cuba.

A joint communique issued by Khrushchev and U.A.R. President Gamal Abdel Nas-

ser reaffirmed Soviet support for Arab causes and gave Nasser's backing to the Kremlin's "anti-imperialist" line.

Diplomatic observers agreed that the Soviet leader picked up much personal popularity during his 16-day visit, but considered it far from certain

that he "sold" much communism to the Egyptians.

Khrushchev left by air for Moscow this morning.

It was generally accepted from the start that Khrushchev's visit, his first in Africa, was aimed at rallying Arab and African support for the

Kremlin's aspiration of overcoming both Communist China and the West for world leadership.

Everywhere Khrushchev went in the U.A.R. he was cheered and feted. The highlight of his visit was a ceremony at the billion-dollar As-

wan high dam marking completion of the first stage of the Soviet-financed hydroelectric and irrigation project so dear to Nasser's heart.

Khrushchev announced in the communique Sunday night he was granting the U.A.R. 252 million rubles (\$277.2 million) more in long-term credits, adding to the vast financial aid the Soviet Union already has provided the U.A.R., especially for construction of the Aswan dam.

The communique also indicated that Soviet military aid to Egypt would continue, though no specifics were mentioned.

Khrushchev and Nasser called for non-interference in Cuba's internal affairs and expressed "grave concern over continuing attempts by imperialist forces to interfere in the internal affairs of Cyprus."

Both sides also called for the admission of Communist China to the United Nations.

Balloting Tomorrow To Climax Heated Gubernatorial Race

Burns, High Go Down To Wire

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Two big-city mayors clash at the polls for the final time tomorrow in the Democratic race for governor and the outcome may measure Florida's feelings on the racial issue.

In the runoff campaign Miami's Robert King High, 40, and Jacksonville Mayor Haugdon Burns, 52, have discussed the civil rights bill. Burns has bitterly attacked it and High has said that it is not an issue because neither he nor Burns are in Congress and

therefore cannot vote on it. High has repeatedly said that if the civil rights bill is enacted into law by Congress and signed by President Johnson he, as governor, will uphold it which he is bound to do under the oath of governor, as he would any other law.

High received a heavy Negro vote in the first primary in which he pulled a stunning upset over veteran campaigners to reach the runoff.

State NAACP leaders publicly declared that Negroes bloated for High in the May 5 first primary and will do so again tomorrow. Burns labeled High as the NAACP candidate in the race, but both High and Pearson said that the NAACP did not officially back any candidate. The NAACP is prohibited by law from endorsing any candidates.

A turnout of only 1,035,000 of the 2.2 million registered Democrats in Florida is expected due to the fact that most of the statewide races were settled in the first primary.

But the big one is the Burns-High battle which turned into a verbal free-for-all until Burns put the axe to all face-to-face debates between the two men saying High was "mud slinging."

High charged that as police commissioner as well as mayor of Jacksonville, Burns was responsible for a scandal of policemen allegedly taking bribes to protect gamblers in the city. Not true, Burns said adding that "these things happen everywhere," and cited some instances in the Miami police department.

On other issues, High ran on a plank promising to seek a \$1.25 an hour minimum wage in Florida and Burns accused him of catering to "special groups" such as labor to "get bloc votes."

Burns, who ran unsuccessfully for governor in 1950, will be battling High for the right to face GOP gubernatorial candidate Charles Holley of St. Petersburg in the November general election.

Saigon Curbs Critics

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, (UPI) — The military government of Maj. Gen. Nguyen Khanh cracked down on its critics during the weekend by banning nine newspapers and holding several political opponents for possible trial.

The political activity held the capital's attention today with an apparent lull in the fighting against the Communist guerrillas. No new major clashes were reported.

Khanh banned three Vietnamese newspapers Saturday and six more Sunday. Charges against the publications ranged from libeling govern-

ment officials to printing morally offensive stories. Copies of Tien Progress were seized because it described Khanh's regime as a "so-called Democratic" government.

Three of the daily papers affected Sunday were shut down permanently. The other three were put under a temporary ban.

Khanh's political crackdown was directed at nine men who

demanding the release of two generals he jailed in his coup last January after Diem was deposed and killed. The nine men are from the central city of Hue, center of the Buddhist opposition which led to Diem's overthrow.

The nine, who were arrested last week, were flown from Saigon back to Hue Saturday to see if courts there will try them for political offenses.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (UPI)—Evangelist Billy Graham denounced racial segregation in churches and called for a "moral and spiritual revival" in America.

Graham told 17,000 Baptists, many of them from racially segregated congregations, that the answer to the racial problem and related issues was in Christianity.

"I've never understood how, in the church, you can say, 'this church is for one race only,'" he said. Graham spoke at the conclusion of a three-day Baptist jubilee celebration.

But the racial issue virtually was ignored in a general statement of beliefs adopted by the Baptists from the seven groups which sponsored the celebration.

In its only mention of discrimination referred to segregation as "but one of the many moral and social problems which beset our generation and call for a solution in keeping with the gospel of Christ."

The jubilee celebration, commemorating 150 years of organized Baptist work, marked the end of week-long conventions of the American and Southern Baptists. Some 25,000 delegates attended the two conventions.
