

Ed Kennedy Is Ordered Back To The United States

Man Who Gave Unconditional Surrender Story Is Rebuked

PARIS, May 16, (AP)—Supreme headquarters discredited Ed-

ward Kennedy of the Associated Press Wednesday on a charge of breach of confidence in leaking prematurely the story of German unconditional surrender and ordered him to leave May 17 for the United States.

Morton P. Gudebrod of the Associated Press also was discredited for taking "an active part in the premature release of a news story" and ordered to return to the United States, but was granted an extension beyond May 17 by Brig. Gen. Frank Allen, Jr., chief of public relations.

Gudebrod is ill with pneumonia and is not expected to be dis-

charged from a hospital for two weeks.

Investigation of the premature release of the story of German unconditional surrender was conducted by the Supreme Headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Force, and the statement of the Supreme Headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Force, was made public in advance that intended to do it. 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The Red Army: How It Differs From American

Russian Strength Is In Infantry Power Not In Equipment

PARIS, May 16, (AP)—The Red Army's strength lies in overwhelming infantry power which trumps light, but American and British armies are better equipped, more mobile and far more mechanized. While much has been heard of the famous Red Army cavalry, nothing has been seen to compare with the flexibility of American massed fire control.

These are some of the conclusions drawn from observation in the Red Army's world's most formidable fighting force?

In recent weeks as the Red Army fought its way to meet the Allied forces, some of the myths about it has been lifted.

Along the Elbe River, American and British military men have gained a pretty fair view of the Red Army in action as Germans fought the Russians right down to the river in clear sight of the Allied forces.

Equipment Is Horse-Drawn. Here are some other impressions: Close Russian air co-operation with the ground forces did not appear to pack the hitting power of American and British efforts.

At great distances the Red Army has been able to cover its movements with the speed that American forces are able to make on the offensive.

A large proportion of Russian tanks and transports are in the hands of this particularly strong infantry divisions.

The Soviet strength in moving units at distances has been in the supply arrangements. The Russian have off the land, and it is as clear as has been seen off the map that the Red Army has far, its supply lines are not a weakness.

One thing in which the Russians are far superior to the Americans is in the use of their own equipment.

The Russians use small arms in place of the anti-tank destroyers which Americans attach to infantry divisions.

A large proportion of Russian tanks are tommy gun equipped.

All Men to the Front. The Red Army's fighting man is a well equipped and other arms and tanks are much more than American or British. The Red Army's communications are much more sketchy.

The Germans have said they were overwhelmed by the Russians because they were overwhelmed by men and tanks at critical points, with the infantry attacking regardless of losses. Russian officers also say they felt that the "spirit" of the army had more to do with defeating the Germans than equipment.

The Russian Army seen thus far in the move looks like a bare, grumpy camp, with soldiers huddled on running boards of captured cars, draped over the fenders and lying on wagons. But it is there.

It is easy to understand how in the heyday of the Luftwaffe German planes were able to tear Russian supply lines to pieces, but when the Red Army got air superiority this year, that just started rolling and never stopped.

The Russians did not use any C-47 planes along the Elbe to direct artillery fire, and it was not as accurate as the American fire. Rely on Ground Observers.

The Russians appeared to depend solely on ground observers to direct their artillery and mortar fire. In the final battle at Tangermunde both were extremely spotty against easy targets.

One thing in which the Russians are far superior to the Americans is in the use of their own equipment.

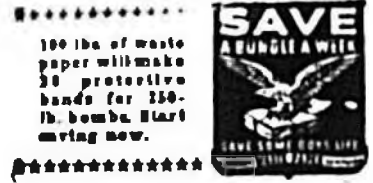

U.S. Zone Of Occupation Given France

Fritz Kuhn, Former German American Bund Leader, Is Ordered Deported

President Truman today told the French Foreign Minister that the United States is willing to relinquish to France part of the American Zone of Occupation in Germany. The President, after a conference with Minister George Bidault, said details of the relinquishment have already conveyed informally to the French government and are now in the process of being formalized.

"He said the U.S. appreciated the part which France 'should play' in settling the questions of world interest."

Former German-American Bund leader Fritz Kuhn, last week deported to Germany as an undesirable alien, the Justice Department announced. The order was issued by the Board of Immigration Appeals. A native of Munich, he was convicted in 1939 of larceny and forgery involving bund funds.

He will be placed on a boat at a time to be determined by American military authorities in Germany, the Justice Department said.

Gen. Walter Krueger, who led a picked gang of Nazi assassins plotted last winter to kill General Eisenhower, Allied Headquarters announced today. Krueger, now captured, and his group kept the entire Western Front on the alert for months.

A London dispatch from Luenberg reported Himmler has been traced, and said the British Second Army could take him into custody anytime.

The driving force behind the plot to assassinate General Eisenhower was Adolf Hitler's nephew, 35-year-old Austrian hatchetman for Himmler.

His picked gang of assassins kept the whole western front in a state of alert for months last winter during and after the Ardennes battle, for the group had the mission of assassinating Eisenhower.

Previously, Skorzey had won Himmler's attention by planning and carrying out the kidnapping of Benito Mussolini. He also was credited with kidnapping Adm. Horthy during the Hungarian crisis.

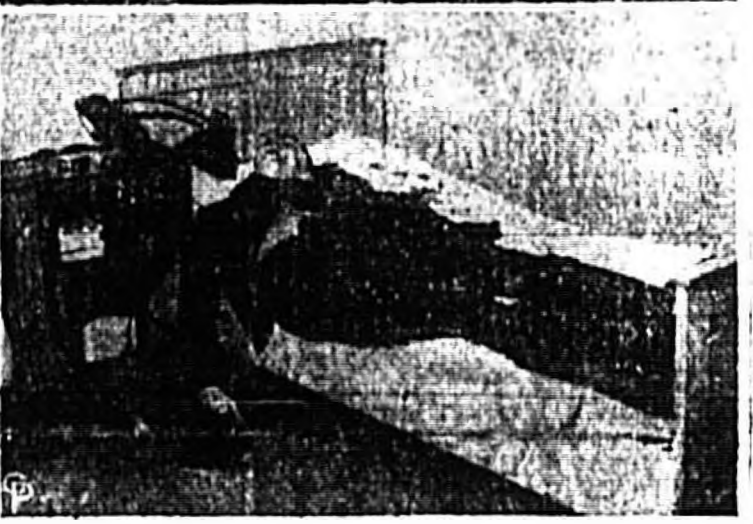
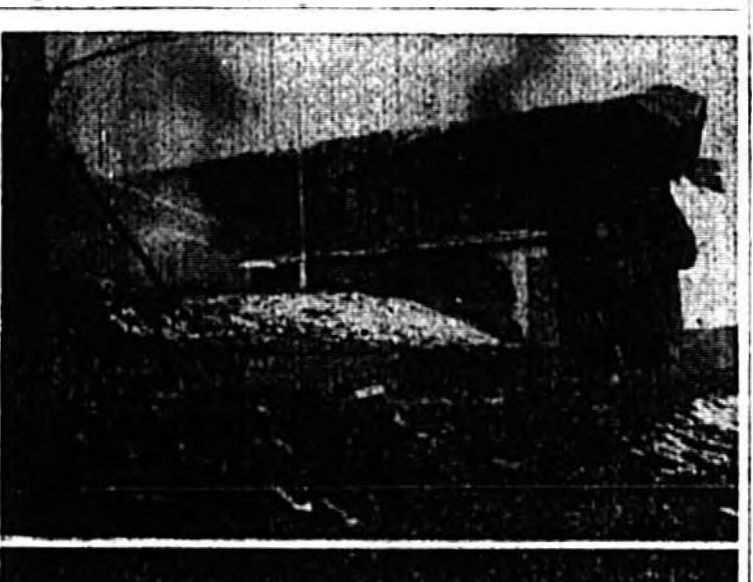
A pictorial supplement of the Sixth Army News, sent Volie Williams to the Sanford Herald, gives some interesting views taken by the Signal Corps on the islands.

Negro Arrested For Robbing School

The series of entries and robberies of the Seminole High School lunch room during the past four weeks has been solved by arrest and admission of guilt for the robbery by Jesse Williams, negro, who up to April 15, was an employee at the lunch room, according to Police Chief Roy G. Williams.

Officers C. Heintzbaugh and J. B. Smith were today complimented by Chief Williams in solving the case. They first picked up the negro on suspicion Thursday morning, then got a search warrant to explore his home. They found some canned goods and glass jars of rice and beans that had been stolen from the lunch room, and most important, a bunch of school keys that had enabled the negro to enter the building at will.

The officers were sent on their quest by the fact that Janitor H. D. Stevens saw the negro prowling about the school building at 7:30 o'clock Tuesday morning. The negro, who when he worked at the school was known as Willie Jeff, has been turned over to Assistant State Attorney George A. DeCottis for prosecution.

Experiment Station Sought By Boyle

TALLAHASSEE, May 14. (AP)—House bill 338 introduced by Seminole County Representative M. B. Smith and L. B. Mann, became a law yesterday without the Governor's signature. The law prohibits horses, asses, mules, cattle, swine, sheep, goats and other grazing animals to graze at large in precincts six and seven, embracing the Geneva-Chuluota areas of Seminole County.

Senator Lloyd P. Boyle introduced S.B. 575, authorizing the State Board of Control to establish branch agricultural experiment station near Sanford to conduct experiments for bettering growing of parishes in that area.

M. L. Cullum, president of the Seminole County Farm Bureau which is backing the project, pointed out that the need for such an experiment station is very great. Within a 50 mile radius of Sanford, he said, there are 25,000 acres being used for vegetable cultivation. In 1944, the value of vegetables grown in this area was \$16,000,000 dollars. Dr. Dame Reports Increase In Rabies Among Local Dogs

"It seems that human diseases are not the only ones that increase during the stress and strain of war. There has been a noticeable increase in rabies (hydropic) in both dogs and humans," writes Dr. Leiland H. Dame, director of the Seminole County Health Unit in the Marine Corps hospital at the Sempronox, Fla.

Local children have already died a horrible death in Florida and some have been reported to other states from this disease, he stated.

"Rabies have again been reported among the foxes in Georgia," he pointed out. "Their carcasses are being found showing a mild epidemic of the rabid disease. Several years ago thousands of foxes died in one year from rabies in the State of Georgia. Rabies have been reported for several years in the State of Florida, but it has not been established whether or not a wild dog or fox dog is present. Anyway, this gets us down to the fact that we are having a mild epidemic of it around Sanford. Several children and one adult have been bitten recently here. Upon investigation, it has been found that at least three of these bites were by mad dogs."

"The heads of two dogs sent to the state laboratory for diagnosis and both proved positive. Several other dogs that were sick with some symptoms of rabies have been shot and reported to us until too late to send the heads off. In some instances the dogs have been killed by shooting into the brains with shot guns. This mutilates them so until they cannot be examined."

"For years and years it has been advertised to the public and sought to individuals not to kill the animal. If the animal is suspected of having rabies, or if the animal bites one without provocation, it should be chained or shut up in a tight stall or box. If the animal has rabies it will become plainly diagnostic within a few days and die within ten days. These signs give anyone time to start and take the treatment. Only in cases where the animal is large and vicious should it be killed. Even then, these dogs may be shot up with little danger."

"The City of Sanford is now calling for treatment of all dogs with the preventive. This preventive is good in about 80 percent of cases, thus eliminating danger to that extent. All dogs worth keeping are worth the small expenditure of having them protected. Do not kill suspected dogs. Report them to the Health Unit or the City."

Rabies investigations for the year so far, all made during April, totalled five, according to the pamphlet.

Heroic Action On U.S. Carrier Gets Ship Back To Port

Over One Thousand Casualties On Ben Franklin When Hit

PEARL HARBOR, April 8. (AP)—Starting from a cloud dead ahead of a fast carrier task force only 64 miles from Japan, a Japanese dive bomber struck the U.S. aircraft carrier Franklin D. Roosevelt on April 18, 1945, and set off one of the most great episodes of heroic action.

In the next 10 hours almost 100 tons of explosives and more thousands of gallons of aviation gasoline were fired out from the great carrier as it steamed out of control straight for Japan. She suffered because of a 1,200 ton bomb, the largest of its kind ever used by any plane, which struck her.

But she escaped and finally reached an American port to have her hurts repaired. "So valiant" and to get ready to fight her enemies again.

772 Men Lost

The navy revealed in Washington that the repair job being done at the Brooklyn Navy Yard has cost the lives of 772 men and 100 missing and more than 100 wounded.

The new Vietnam program expected before the end of this week probably will scrap much of a 1940 meat policy issued several weeks ago. The 1940 program failed to break the beef shortage and 4 million head of some cattlemen complained that it forced them to take losses on their stock.

Apparently dropped from the new program is a suggestion for fixing quotas at the big cattle markets, allocating live cattle from the range to certain market areas. Cattlemen objected that they could not split up their shipments among markets and could not risk sending beef to market only to find that market already at a quota ceiling and unable to buy.

Local Census Count Lags Behind '40 Total

Edward Higgins, manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, reported today that the State census count in Sanford is running behind figures of five years ago, despite other indications of an increase in population.

He added that there is reason to believe there are many people here who have not yet been counted in the census. These who have not yet been counted or who have any reason to believe they have not, are urged to contact the Chamber of Commerce in order to be included in the count. No other census will be taken before 1950.

Russia Is Reported As Planning To Enter War On Japan; Jap Cruiser Sunk

Tokyo is worried over American fleet movements today while the British reported the deepest slashes yet made in the campaign to regain Singapore. The Japanese broadcast warned that a powerful Allied fleet leaving the Marianas Islands "requires rigid watching."

London announced that British warships and planes sank a Japanese cruiser Wednesday in the Malacca Strait, 470 miles northwest of Singapore. Allied airmen riddled the Andaman Islands, guarding the sea-way to Singapore, and also the Bangkok-Singapore railway in the narrowest point of the Malay peninsula.

Washington reported a northern war plane's abortive drive toward U.S. airbase at Chikung in northern China, falling up as the Japanese retreated more than 100 miles.

The Japanese made Hanzai (Hankow) a base on Okinawa and Manila. An acknowledgment that the U.S. fleet is not far off. The Paris radio quoted British (Continued on Page Three)

Ceiling Prices On Meat To Be Frozen For Six Months

WASHINGTON, May 14. (AP)—Member of Congress said today the government is likely to freeze all ceiling prices on meat for at least six months.

The price ceiling freeze would be a seasonal measure of the government to raise or lower cash prices, described as the key element of a reworked program by the Federal Reserve Board, Director of Food, M. Vinson, and other government officials to break the growing meat shortage and black market.

Having just made changes, the program as reported by legislators would include their other food producing incentives.

A 10 percent per hundredweight increase in the price of cattle would be allowed until they develop into prime beef.

A requirement that all cattle worth \$125 hundred be sold direct to slaughterers, intended to keep a supply of good meat moving to market.

Legislature Scans Bill Raising Taxes On Chain Stores

TALLAHASSEE, May 18 (AP)—Bills calling for increased taxes on chain department stores and liquor to produce an additional \$4,200,000 a year were sent to the house floor with committee approval Wednesday as the legislature added more new expenditures to the balance sheet.

While awaiting a committee report on the big general appropriations bill which was almost ready for introduction, legislative leaders completed on a \$500,000 branch hospital for the insane.

County Funds
 The House passed a bill guaranteeing each of the counties up to \$23,000 a year—\$2,211,000— from the general revenue fund if racing tax receipts fall short of that figure.

The House Finance and Taxation Committee completely rewrote the liquor tax increase bill that had been passed earlier in the Senate. As it came over to the House, the bill provided for an extra tax of five cents on half pint bottles, 10 cents on pints and 15 cents on quarts and fifths of a gallon.

Representatives of the liquor industry protested it would be unfair to the larger chains, while independent merchants quoted figures to show that the big chains were able to pay the tax. The bill would put additional taxes of \$5 on single stores, \$25 on chains of two to five, \$50 on chains of six to 10, \$100 on chains of 11 to 15, \$400 on chains of 16 to 25, \$1200 on chains of 26 to 50, and \$2000 on chains of more than 50 stores.

and would be expensive to handle. They proposed, if the legislature put any new tax at all on their products, that it be done by a 50 percent increase in the present gallonage rate.

State Beverage Director James T. Vocelle said that proposal would produce \$600,000 less than the \$3,200,000 estimated in the senate approved act.

Rep. Simpson then suggested a 60 percent additional tax, the liquor industry representatives agreed and the bill was approved at that rate. Vocelle estimated it would yield \$3,000,000 a year extra.

Rum supplies which the liquor men said now are so glutted that the product is selling almost at cost, would be exempt from the floor tax which the bill would impose to keep low tax whisky from competing with high rate products immediately after the new levy goes into effect.

The chain department store tax increase bill, introduced by eight house members more than two weeks ago, would yield an estimated \$1,200,000 a year extra, with \$600,000 earmarked for school teachers, \$500,000 for war veterans' and adult education, and the rest for the general fund.

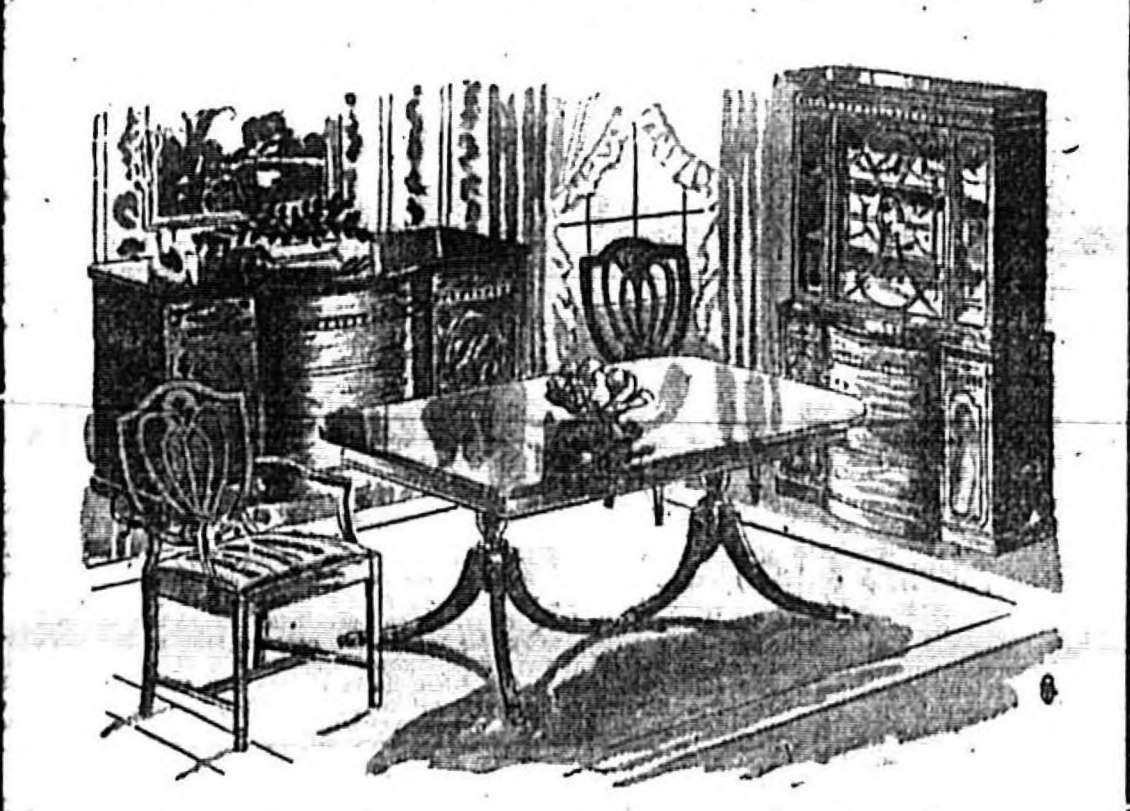

The miracle is that any ship could live through three days of such terrific pounding and fires. For a carrier, and a carrier of aircraft—a mass of instruments packaging an arsenal of explosives and high octane gasoline—to achieve it is a testimonial to the toughness of American ships and the courage of the men who man them.

There probably will be no greater story written of individual bravery in this war than those of the men of the Franklin who defied the bursting bombs, the blazing gasoline and the Japanese' declined to abandon ship and finally brought the Frank through, battle-scarred and flame-seared on every inch of her upper decks, but with her land playing "The Old Gray Mare At What She Used To Be."

Superhuman Bravery
Her beloved chaplain, Lt. Cenur Joseph Timothy O'Callahan, "the Irishman from Boston," and Lt. (jg) Donald A. Gage, of Ankleton, Calif., both of whom were "superhuman" feats of bravery during three days and nights that virtually were without sleep.

"Some of these recommendations, I believe, are of such a nature as to be put into action. The fate of the others is in your hands. The committee hopes to look upon you favorably.

"At this point, the committee proposes the question, 'What about the future of this planning?' Does the City Commission believe the committee has been useful and can be of use in the future? Have they been making suggestions and will their recommendations be given careful consideration by the Commission? I believe I express the unanimous opinion of the Planning Committee when I say we do not want to give time and attention to projects that will not be given any consideration by the members of the City Commission. Never was it so necessary for Americans to think clearly, to treat fallen enemies justly and sternly but without cruelty, and to live kindly and justly among themselves.

There are probably a thousand stories in any day's news on the war front, if you could only get at them. Here is a baseball yarn from Okinawa, relayed from Gordon Cobbletick, a Cleveland Plain Dealer correspondent.

Two Japs, dug in half way down a slope, were operating a knee mortar, which is very effective when lobbing missiles from a hole in a hillside.

They appealed to a near-by compatriot, Pfc. Bill Reeder, normally a pitcher for the Texas League.

So the boys lugged a box of 50 grenades up the hill and put them at Bill's disposal, and then a second box, while the pitcher stood there and pitched as he had never pitched before.

Finally he happened to notice that it was very quiet on the hillside, and stroled up to investigate. Nothing was there but two very dead Japs.

WANTED: A GUIDE TO THE RUSSIANS

By Joseph Barnes

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17.—"Where to in San Francisco" is popular little number of the bookstalls of hotels in this city, where delegates from forty-odd nations can also find geographical, historical and gastronomic guides to what is possibly the largest and certainly the most confusing international conference in history.

But one delegation—the Russian—is either the subject or the source of most of the confusion, and there is, unfortunately, no guidebook to it or to the mysterious Russians it has brought here in the flesh for Americans to see.

So the delegates, the local citizenry and the press are all confused. They watch the Russians with interest greater even than that aroused by the loving robes and fancy headgear of the Saudi Arabians, and with somewhat the same bewilderment.

Here we are, the two greatest powers in the modern world swinging like trapped artists through the space of post-war peace problems and we hardly know each other's names.

There are five pressure groups, or political traditions inside Russia whose influence can be sensed half way around the world from Moscow.

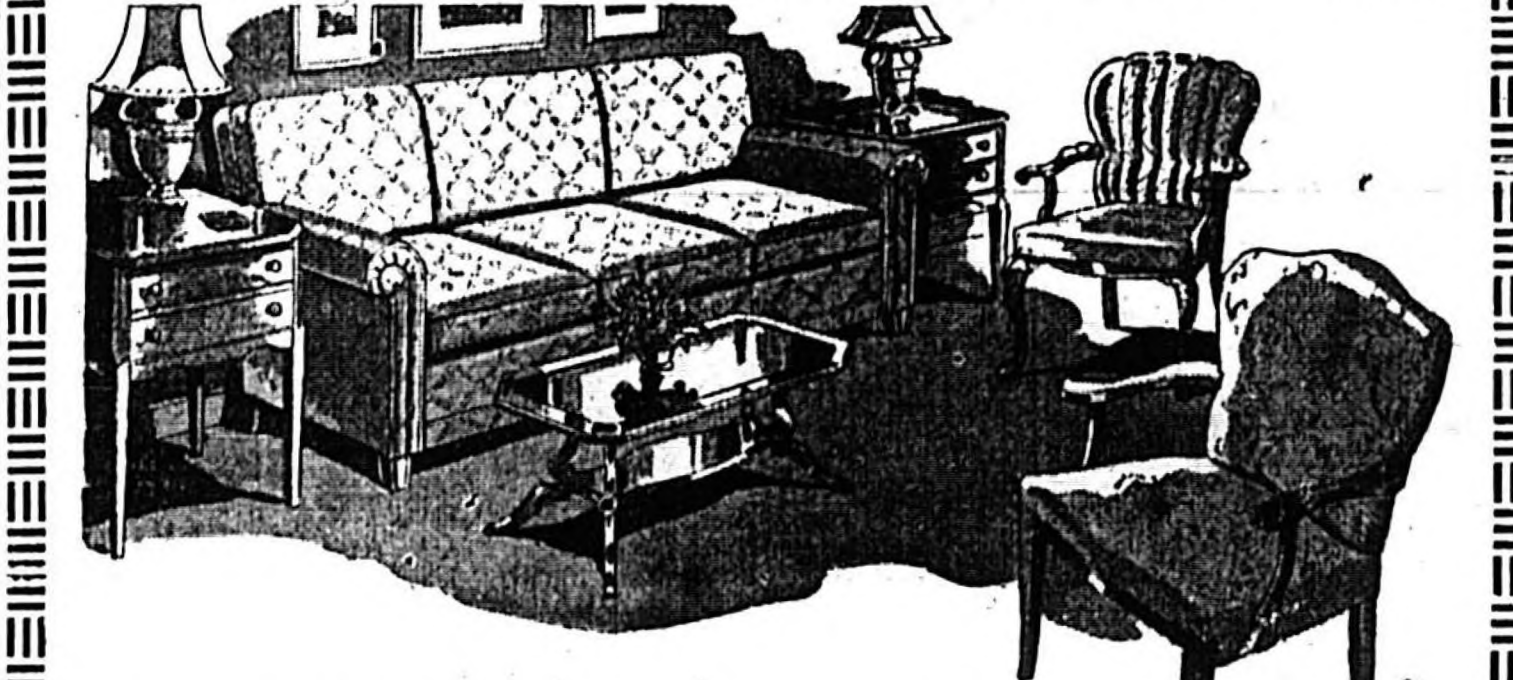
Identity of the Luftwaffe generals was not immediately available.

Ingram also revealed that three weeks before German capitulation, a strong U-boat fleet headed for the U.S. east coast was intercepted and routed by one of the most powerful task forces ever to operate in mid-Atlantic. From prisoners, it was learned that the wolf-pack had orders to blanket the east coast from Maine to Florida.

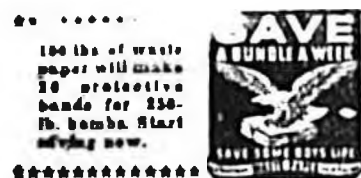

It follows complete victory of the Allied forces over a powerful enemy in Europe. It finds us striking the devastating blow in the Pacific. We are preparing to strike them later in overwhelming force."
