

McGovern Criticizes Paris 'Peace Talks'

By CARL P. LEUBSDORF AP Political Writer BOSTON (AP)—Responding to Republican criticism of his Vietnam peace proposals, Sen. George McGovern says the Nixon administration is "willing to surrender hundreds of American prisoners of war to another four years of captivity."

And he criticized the latest round of secret Paris peace talks, saying, "I am tired of secret negotiations that yield propaganda for the administration but do not yield peace for the people of America or the people of Indochina."

The Democratic nominee kept up his attack on President Nixon's Vietnam politics in a speech to a cheering crowd that filled Boston's 6,000-seat National Guard Armory for a \$25-a-plate fund-raising dinner Wednesday night.

McGovern was joined by an array of Kennedy—Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, who introduced him; Joan Kennedy Smith, the senator's sister; Joseph P. Kennedy III, eldest son of the late Robert F. Kennedy; and Caroline Kennedy, the 14-year-old daughter of the late President John F. Kennedy.

It was Caroline's first appearance at a political gathering. Continuing his campaigning in the Boston area, McGovern switched his fire to economic issues, saying the Nixon administration has fought improvements pushed by congressional Democrats in the areas of minimum wage, Social Security, and pension reform.

After the Boston speech, the Democratic nominee planned to fly to Minneapolis for several appearances, including the first in a series of phone-in telethons, before going on to Fargo, N.D., and Seattle.

That raised \$100,000 for the campaign.

At the army, he noted that Republican National Chairman Robert J. Dole had called his Vietnam withdrawal proposal a plan to surrender but said it is the Nixon administration whose policies are really "in favor of surrender."

"In order to keep a corrupt and unpopular dictatorship in power in Saigon," he said, "they are willing to surrender hundreds of American prisoners of war to another four years of captivity."

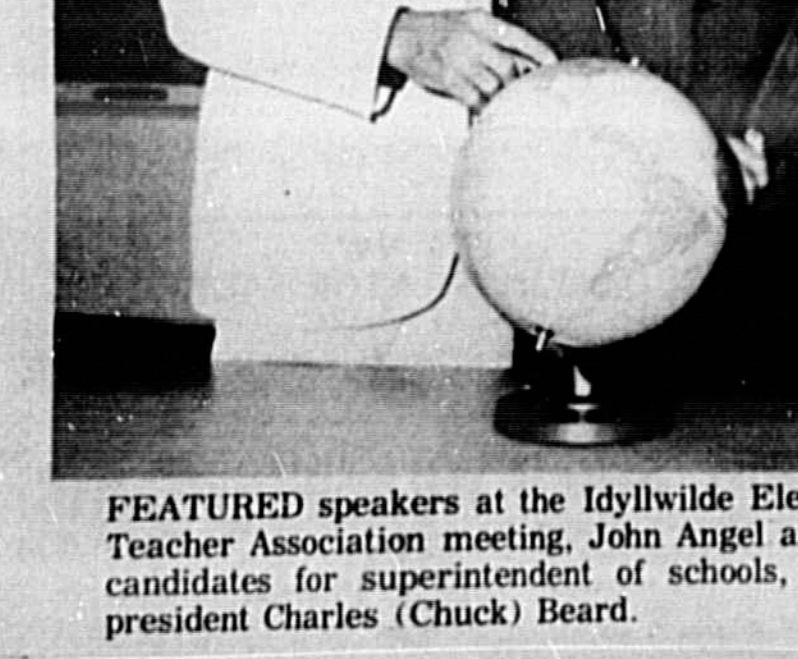
Zoning Board Nixes Runnymede Project

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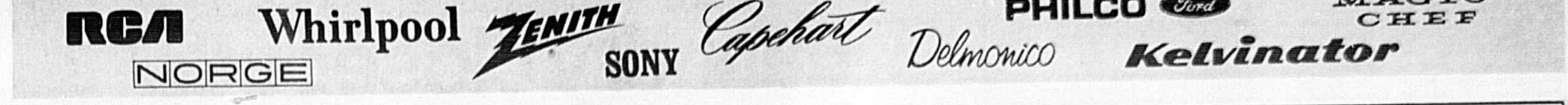

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Visiting Nurse Aid Offered By State

Dr. Julian Fried, county health officer, and Valda Robbins county sanitarian, appeared before the Board of County Commissioners to relate that the State of Florida has offered to include the visiting nursing service into the county health service, making the staff part of the state merit system and taking responsibility for proper operation of the service.

The state feels, according to Dr. Fried, that home nursing services will increase with the increased population, and that the increase will be mostly among the aged. "Since Sept. 1, there have been 40 requests for care which have been refused because of lack of personnel and funds," Dr. Fried reported. "The visiting nurses have been accepting only paying calls since the association has been in doubt."

The state has nine counties operating in this category now, according to Dr. Fried. "However, the state will not undertake this service without county contribution and a show of interest in continuing the service. The state will pay the salaries of the nurses and secretarial help, with the county allocating the sum of \$10,000 toward the annual expenditures of the association in the amount of \$22,000."

A work session for next week with the health department, visiting nurses representative and the State Health Department before the commission has been set.

Dr. Fried said that this visiting nursing service is the only way that those citizens requiring only occasional nursing care could get it even if they are willing to pay for it, because private duty nursing and nursing home care is too expensive. He said that removing the service would be an injurious move to the indigent as well as the paying patient and that the instructions in patient care to families of patients would be a most valuable service lost to those who really need it.

Woman Hurt, County Pays

Mrs. Sharon Edwards, appearing as representative for her mother, Mrs. Erella Robinson, presented a medical bill from Dr. E. Epstein for \$10, a bill from Seminole Memorial Hospital for \$20 and one for medicine from Faust's Drug Store for \$2.50 to the board of County Commissioners.

Mrs. Edwards said that her mother was standing in the yard on Byrd Road, in Midway, when a county operated mower went past, striking her mother, the result of which was the medical care as represented in the billing.

She said that she did not feel that the accident was the fault of the mower because the weeds were high but it was not her mother's fault, either.

J.C. Lavender, road superintendent, said the mower was operating on the shoulder of the road, mowing down the high grass and that none of the guards were missing from the mower. He said, however, that equipment operators had been instructed not to operate within 30-75 feet of persons on the right-of-way.

Lavender said that since the sheriff has removed the trusty help in keeping these ditches cleared of weeds, the only way he has to do the job is with the mowers. Commissioner John Kimbrough said that he went with Lavender to Midway and that they had to stop the mower because they could not keep the "people out of the way."

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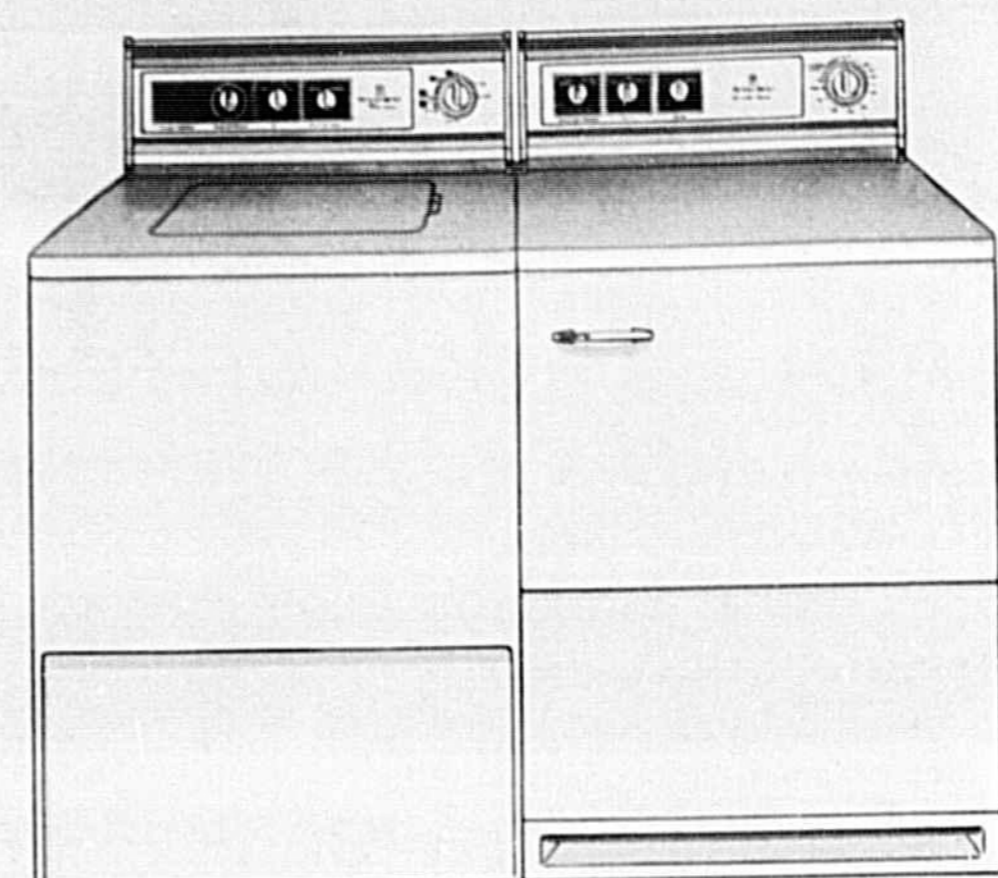
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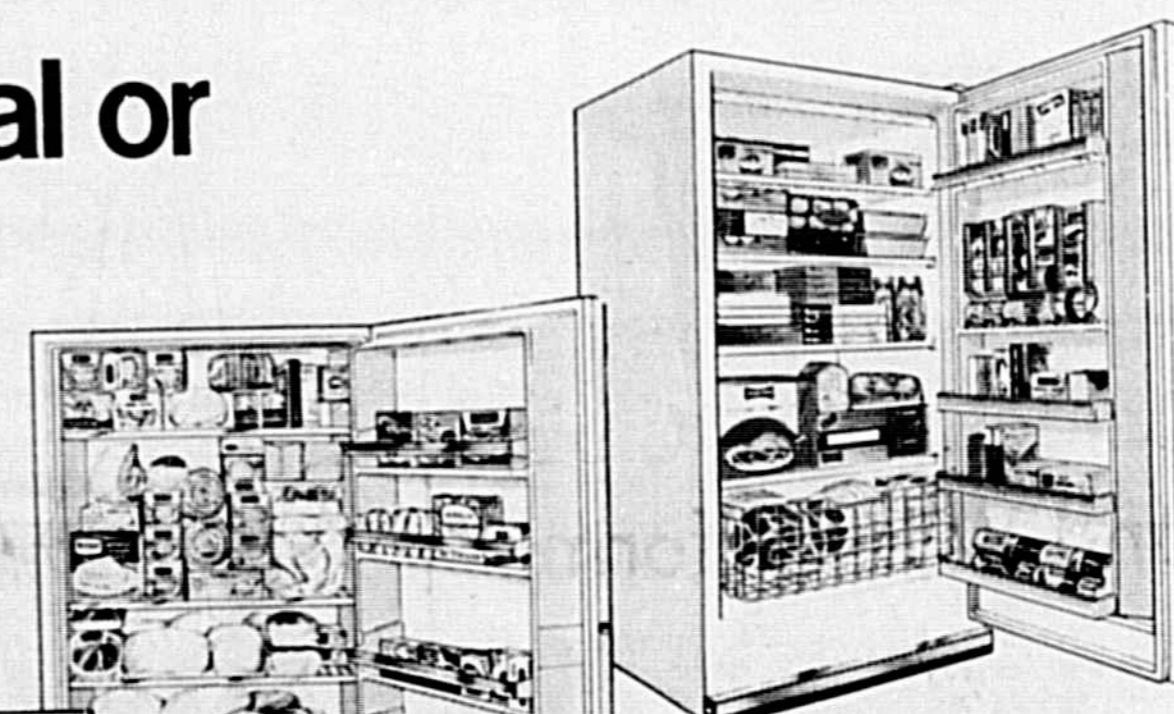

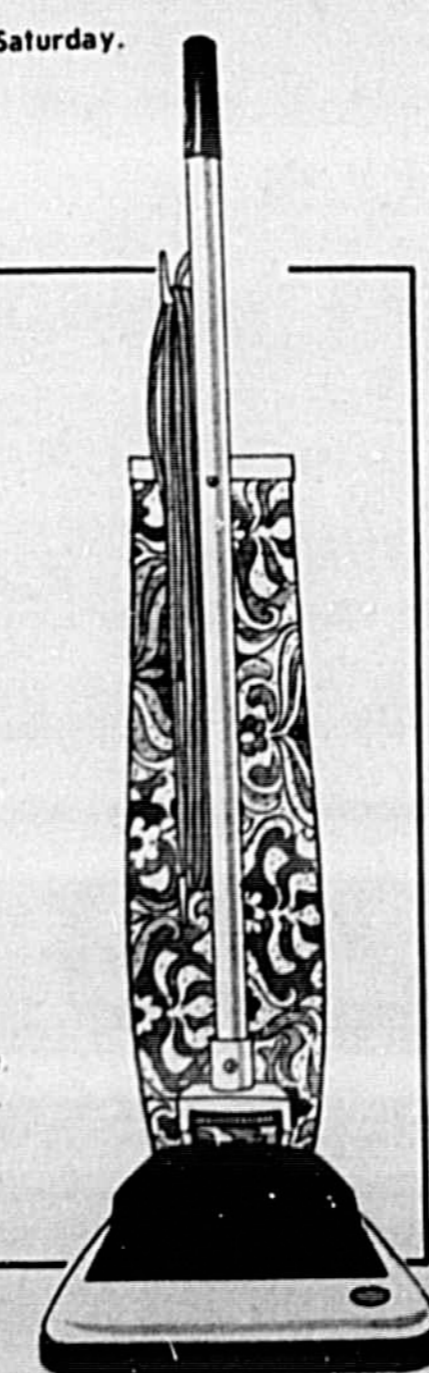

Freak Show Upheld By High Court

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A state law banning freak shows is unconstitutional because it deprives a deformed person of his right to earn a living, the Florida Supreme Court has ruled.

"One who is handicapped or in an unfortunate position because of physical handicaps or deformities, in no wise of his own choosing, must be allowed a reasonable chance within his capacities to earn a livelihood," said the court.

The 6-1 challenge upheld the appeal of Norbert P. Terhune, a dwarf, and Stanley Berent, born with deformed arms and professionally known as "Sealo the Seal Boy."

The decision was hailed by Terhune's and Berent's attorney, Royal Flag Jones, who said it meant his clients "could now work in Florida without having to worry about being arrested."

He said the two, who are associated with World Fair Freaks and Attractions, Inc., travel throughout the nation and "there are other archaic laws such as this one in other states. I hope what the Florida court has done will serve as an example to these other states."

Jones said the decision is "good news for all deformed people in Florida who have no other way of earning a livelihood."

The court, however, said the state could pass a new law that might prevent deformed persons from exhibiting "certain malformations, perhaps those relating to private areas of the body or some which may be repulsive or vulgar in nature."

Astronauts Will Use Divining Rod In Search For Water On The Moon

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Water on the moon? Apollo 17 astronauts are practicing the use of a space-age "divining rod" to sound for water below the lunar surface in their December moon mission.

Cernan and Astronaut Harrison H. Schmitt, the Apollo 17 moon landers, showed off one of the water-detection experiments to newsmen Wednesday while they rehearsed a lunar walk on a sandy, mock moonscape at Cape Kennedy.

It's called a "surface electrical properties experiment" to measure electrical and mechanical characteristics of the subsurface, including matter that might be in the form of ice or permafrost.

"If there is water beneath the surface, we should be able to detect it with this equipment," explained Schmitt, a geologist and the first scientist-astronaut assigned to a space flight.

"So far there's no indication of a subsurface known to be water-bearing," he said. "But the dark mantle deposits at our Taurus Littrow landing site, which may be young and volcanic in origin, could be one of the best places on the moon to find water."

"Still I feel the possibility that water exists there is slim," he added.

Astronaut Ronald E. Evans, who will orbit the moon while Cernan and Schmitt explore below, also will operate a water-detection instrument called a lunar sounder. It is to transmit radio beams to probe for physical properties down to a subsurface depth of three-quarters of a mile.

Evans, in an earlier interview, said he does not feel there is water there. "But, gee, I could be the one who discovers water on the moon."

Cernan and Schmitt also showed off these five new experiments which they are to set up on the moon during the flight, scheduled for launching Dec. 6:

- A tidal gravimeter to gather data on the response of the moon to earth's tidal pull and to determine if gravity waves exist in space.
- A mass spectrometer to measure the composition of the thin lunar atmosphere.
- A device to detect meteorite hits and the effect of lunar material flung out by the impact.
- A traverse gravimeter to measure variations in subsurface structure and to determine whether mountains near the landing site have deep roots or are huge deposits of material.
- A seismic profiling experiment which will use explosive charges and a recorder to examine physical properties to a depth of more than half a mile.

Park Sites Are Pondered

County planner David Farr reported that four of 10 members of the county parks advisory committee recommended the county drop Lake Howell Park site from consideration in favor of a park site on Lake Mills. The Lake Mills site has 88 acres and the Lake Howell site has 411 acres. Farr said that it is good ground, clean, no marsh land and would cost less and is more ecologically suitable. The committee felt that the Lake Mills site is a better property in light of funding possibilities and the money left in the parks fund. Commission Chairman Greg Drummond said he still believes the Lake Howell site with its beaches is a much better choice as a well rounded facility, its proximity to urban areas and all around availability. "The success of a park is contingent upon its use," he said. Langley Adair, pollution control officer, said the urban run off will pose algae problems in the Lake Howell area for a long time. Mrs. B. Ward, member of the parks committee, said the Lake Mills site is better because it would get away from the urban situation and further that the county would be getting eight times as much land at only twice the cost of the Lake Howell site. She continued that none of the parks thus far are suitable for immediate use, as is Lake Mills, which could be considered a replacement for the Island Pond and Sand Lake sites which also would have been usable. Drummond said that there was no reference in the referendum for pocket neighborhood parks, to which Mrs. Ward replied that the members of the board should see the parks before acting on recommendations. Commissioner Sid Vihlen recommended a work session next Tuesday, at which time funds in the parks budget and facts concerning the cost of Lake Howell, Lake Mills, Pilotan, including federal dollars available and what can be afforded. Acting County Attorney Howard Marsee was given authority to order a \$1,500 appraisal of the Lake Mills site.

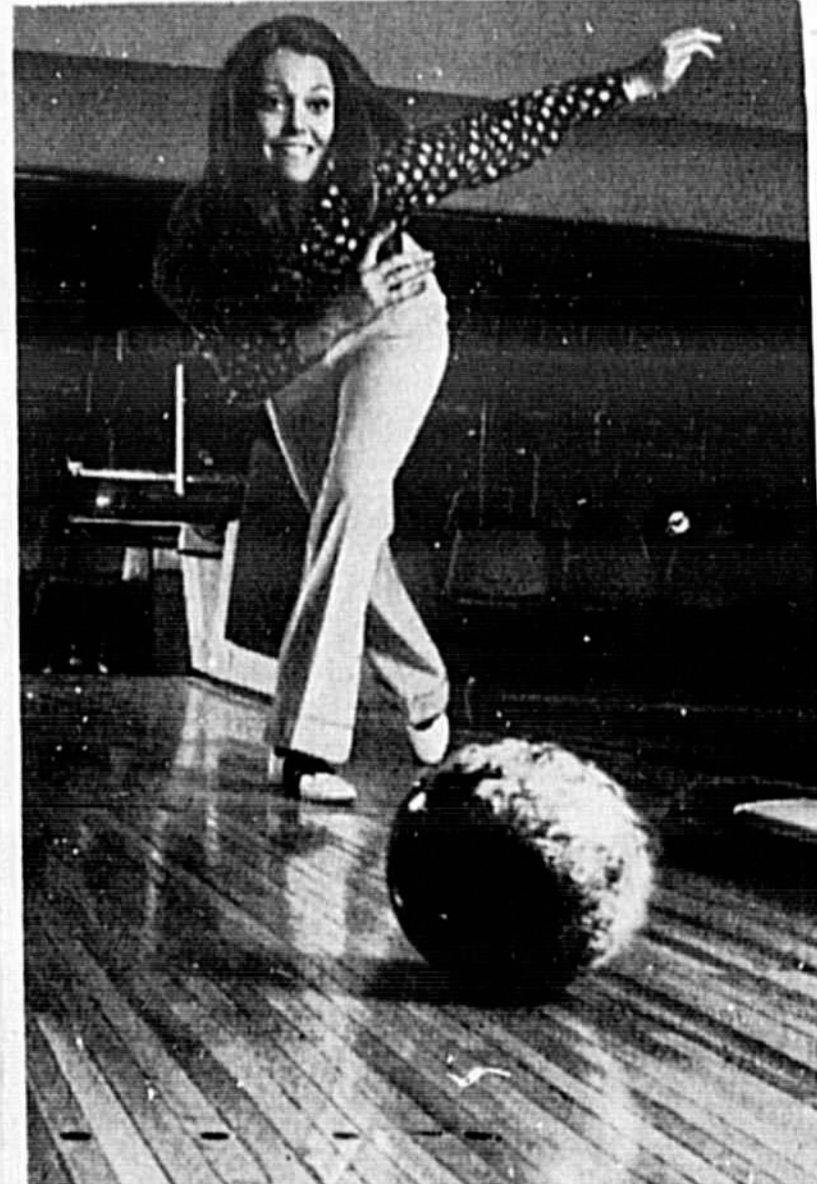

How To Save \$\$ Grocery Shopping

TORONTO (AP) — If you'd like to save money food shopping, leave the children at home and eat before you go.

Judy Stang offers the suggestions as short-term ways to help you resist expensive impulse buys.

"All the things that appeal to children are at their eye level, and it's hard to tell a little fellow he can't have some cereal he wants."

On a longer-range basis, she suggests looking at your shopping habits. Miss Stang is director of consumer interests for the Ontario Food Council, a marketing arm of the provincial department of agriculture.

"People are very price conscious, but sometimes they don't look at the quality they're getting."

For instance, one store may offer steaks at a lower price than another but the lower-priced ones may not match the others in aging or good trimming.

"Fruits and vegetables can be expensive at certain times of the year. We're all tempted by out-of-season, imported produce. Again, it's very important that you get quality for the money. Sometimes a local store or a roadside stand can give you better quality than a supermarket."

"Be familiar with when local produce comes on the market. There are times when canned or frozen fruits and vegetables can be a better buy than fresh produce."

"People sometimes make price comparisons that really aren't accurate. For instance, people look at the price per pound of food rather than price per serving. A roast might have a ten-cent-a-pound difference between bone in and bone out, but the bone out could be less expensive per serving because you use more of it."

"If you buy frozen filets of fish, you get four servings to the pound because there is no waste."

Miss Stang says it pays to know prices so that you know when a special really is a special, and even then, buy carefully.

"Buy what you need. If you can't store food properly or eat it fast enough, a special might not be special for you."

Learn enough about meats and produce to know what you're buying and how to use it, and consider how it's presented to you.

"Look at potatoes wrapped in a plastic bag or you might find when you get them home that you have green potatoes. Plastic bags let the light in; you may be better with a paper bag."

"When you buy foil-wrapped potatoes, you're paying 10 times as much as you pay when you buy a bag of baking potatoes. And foil is a bad thing to store potatoes in; you can get black rot inside because of the moisture."

"It's not always true that the larger the size the cheaper something is per unit. It depends partly on what is the most popular unit. Sometimes it's cheaper to buy the smaller size of instant coffee, because more people do so."

"Most people don't really read instructions or labels unless something goes wrong. Read the labels on frozen dinners, for instance, because they list ingredients in order of quantity. You can get a fair idea of how much meat is in it and how much you're paying for it."

But she says some cake mixes make a cheaper cake than you can make starting from scratch, and frozen french fries can be cheaper than home-made when you consider the cost of cooking oil.

"To be a good shopper today, you have to take it seriously because there are so many products available and so many sizes. It takes ability and some skill as a cook."

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
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Molly Fleischman Honored At Pre-Nuptial Festivity

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Telltale Style Writing Switch Can Change Life

At 14, Bruce was a crazy mixed-up kid. He was sick, sick. His mother, a student of graphology, took a sample of his handwriting to her instructor. The instructor studied the letter and said that the boy was disturbed, physically ill, chronically fatigued and psychotic.

Handwriting is therapeutic. To practice positive-traits handwriting is to change your basic attitudes from negative to positive. The best handwriting analysis, said Mrs. Leibel, is done during a lecture, grocery lists, telephone messages or other samples made at a time when the writer is not concerned with the appearance of the writing.

"At those times, writing is automatic, not contrived to be attractive, and it tells a story," she said.

Some of the stories told are by a strongly crossed 1, which indicates strong willpower; a very exaggerated personal pronoun "I" which shows an inflated ego; an i dotted immediately and firmly over the stem, which indicates a good memory, and an extremely fat and rounded lower loop on a y or i indicates love of money and

"A straight firm base line means a straight-thinking mind, right to the point. He corrected his base line, he corrected his mental approach."

Mrs. Leibel has had a surprisingly varied career which, she believes, has given her an extraordinary insight into personalities as revealed by handwriting. She is a lawyer, and has studied pharmacology, psychology, and sociology.

The WEEDERS GUIDE

By EARL ARONSON AP Newsfeatures Cleaning, drying and pressing — flowers — can spread some summer into your winter.

Autumn is the time to pick and preserve flowers, and the way to preserve a blossom's shape and color is by drying it. Some flowers are dried best by hanging them. These include bittersweet, statice, yarrow, hollyhock, salvia and cockscomb, also known as celosia.

It will help preserve foliage if you crush or split the ends of the stems and stand the plants in a three to five inch solution of glycerin (two thirds) and water (one third). Soon beads of moisture will appear, an indication the foliage is ready to use.

Flowers and many roadside weeds are suitable for pressing. Michigan State University horticulture specialist, J. Lee Taylor, recommends using flowers such as pansies or violas that already are quite flat.
