Let Nixon Speak Out: Not "Surrogates"

In a peculiar juxtaposition of events, two approaches to the end of the Indochina war have now earned headline treatment.

One was the formal, definitive and peaceoriented statement by the Democratic presidential candidate Senator George McGovern on the war.

The other was the bombing of the French mission headquarters by American heavy demolition weapons in an attack on Hanoi which is reported as having hit the French five-building group and resulting in the wounding of Delegate General Pierre Susini.

The former was met with the strongest criticism by the Nixon "surrogates." The latter was followed by a statement from French President Georges Pompidou calling the bombing of the mission a "deplorable act" and the lodging of a formal protest with American Ambassador Arthur K. Watson.

Without this contrast by events, the handling of the Indochina War as proposed by Senator McGovern, if elected, and the prospect of a continuation of fighting if Nixon achieves the "four more years" does give the voter an honest

President Nixon must stand on his record of pursuing the Vietnam war's end by extension into Cambodia and Laos and the unleashing of the greatest continued air and sea bombardment by a major power now on record.

Failure of this road to peace is not debatable. Two recent reporters who visited North Vietnam, Richard Dudman of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch and Peter Arnett of the Associated Press, saw the flow of war materials still going south and the North Vietnamese supporting their guerrilla army, but with high spirits and devotion.

Senator McGovern would take immediate steps to hait all this if in the White House. His plan is "public" not private and offers a procedure which can be interpreted as a move not in keeping with the national honor.

But the Democratic presidential hopeful does make a strong point when he parts company entirely with the Nixon policy of support for President Nguyen Van Thieu.

Using the strongest of language, the calm and soft-spoken senator from South Dakota told a TV audience that "... incredible as it seems when all is said and done, our purpose in Vietnam comes down to this - our policy makers want to save face and want to save the Saigon regime of General Thieu.

"Now that is the fundamental difference between President Nixon and me on the issue of Vietnam. It is a choice of four more years of war or four years of peace."

Environmental Note

Much Talk, But Recycling Is Slow

WASHINGTON - The year's environmental catchword - "recycling" - is still pretty much in the bumper sticker

Three environmental experts examine the lack of progress in recycling in the current issue of the Phoenix Quarterly, published by the Institute of Scrap Iron and Steel. The experts are Russell E. Train, chairman, President's Council on Environmental Wuality; Samuel Hale Jr., director of the solid waste management office of the Environmental Protection Agency; and Dr. James Boyd, executive director, National Commission on Materials

The three agree that a change in national attitudes and habits will be necessary to bring recycling to the level where it can have substantial ecological impact. "Economics are clearly the limiting factor to increased

waste use - not technology," according to Train. He notes that municipalities stay with traditional waste disposal - landfill or incineration - as being more economical then recycling.

He said, "Recycling represents, I feel, an area where the profit motive and environmental goals can work hand in hand for a higher quality of life.'

The second expert, Hale, said that "rather than moving closer to the goal of an economically sound resource-use pattern, we have, in recent years, been falling farther tons of major tetals, paper, glass, rubber and textiles each He said it is ironic that despite an increasingly en-

vironment-oriented public, resource recovery has in fact been losing ground in virtually all material sectors. "As every schoolboy knows," said Hale, "we continue to

transport raw materials from remote places and process them in the same places where those same resources, in already processed form, are being dumped or landfilled.' The third expert, Dr. Boyd, sees economics as the major recycling problem. Solid waste from residential, commercial and institutional sources amounts to more than 2,400 pounds per person per year and presents the greatest recycling

challenge, he says. Boyd said the automobile industry is a good place to start on virtual total recycling. He suggests studies be made toward including the cost of recycling in the initial cost of the car or that the cost be shared by both the consumer and the

He said about 7.1 million cars and trucks go to the junk yard each year. Boyd said the 100 giant auto shredders around the country - each of which can process 120 old vehicles an hour - are starting to chew up a backlog of 20 million junked cars.

"Inevitably," he said, "the day is approaching when our natural resources will become much more difficult to obtain, and recycling will become an accepted and welcome

Here's Why Hanoi Balks at Paris

A look back to the 1954 Geneva conference on Vietnam helps explain why a Paris settlement is proving so diffi-Consider these draft notes on 1954 as gathered by a friend now studying that period: France was in Geneva for one purpose: to get out of Indochina with the least possible embarrassment or appearance of capitulation. What it had to offer was re-

moval of the French expeditionary force. The Viet Minh were in Geneva to arrange to become the rulers of all Vietnam. What they had to offer was permission for the French to withdraw in peace. The French interest thus was military, the Viet Minh

The Viet Minh strategy was to insist that a political settlement be reached before a military cease-fire. The Soviet and Chinese delegates persuaded the Viet Minh to drop this strategy and discuss a cease-fire and withdrawal of the French before a political settlement was arranged. This was a basic tactical error by the It was a sell-out by the Soviet and Chinese, who had

been dealing separately and secretly with France in pursuit of their own interests. The effect was to nullify their Vietnamese ally's bargaining position. The cease-fire was arranged and the military issue settled. The moment this was achieved, French purpose had been served. France had what it came to the conference to get-and so grew indifferent to future Vietnam The Viet Minh no longer had bargaining power. Having

granted France what it wanted, a military cease-fire, it had nothing more to offer. Two documents came out of the conference. One, dealing with military affairs, was explicit and detailed on the technicalities of the cease-fire and separation of contending forces. The second document-the Final Declaration of the Geneva Conference on the Problems of Restoring

Peace to Indochina-was not a legal paper nor in precise judicial language, hence was unclear and vague in key paragraphs, perhaps deliberately so. It was not signed by anyone and was denounced, even as it was being issued, by the South Vietnamese government which had refused to attend the conference. Even as the conference ended, influential Communists

such as Le Duan were describing the conference as snatching defeat out of the jaws of victory. But hope that events might turn out favorably for North Vietnam was kept alive for a time by the constantly reiterated Chinese and Russian assessment of the Indochina scene: North Vietnam powerful, monolithic and victorious, the government in the South weak, divided and under the discredited and ineffectual Bao Dai. It could only be a matter of time before the South

But the South proved more durable than anticipated Gradually the North Vietnamese leaders realized that the passing time was cheating them out of the fruits of victory. On this realization, like a cancer, grew the belief they had been betrayed. The heat of immense moral outrage forged a determined resolve to have what they felt was their rightful heritage.

This determination, or obsession, was to guide the men who had been at Geneva and who charted the course of the next decade: Toward all outsiders, permanent distrust; toward indispensable allies-China and Russiaconstant suspicion and a search for secret revenge. Is it any wonder Moscow and Peking are finding it extremely difficult to pressure Hanoi into making peace



One Man's Opinion A Lesson in Big Soviet Grain Deal

Some people are beginning to call the great grain deal between the United States and the U.S.S.R. the Great The fact that the Soviet Union, the oldest Communist

country in the world, had to ask for help in feeding its people to the tune of \$1 billion in capitalist grain has hardly been commented upon. First came charges that some grain dealers had made windfall profits at the expense of farmers. The government denies it and the dealers deny it. One

of them even went so far as to ask for a tax break as a reward for helping promote exports Most recently, there have been reports in the financial press that the Russians outsmarted the dealers at their own capitalistic game. By tough bargaining and by playing their cards close to their chests, they succeeded in buying up vast quantities of wheat, feed grains and soy-

beans without bidding up prices. By way of icing on the cake, half of the \$1 billion the Soviets are spending in the largest grain purchase in history-that's \$500 million-was borrowed from the United

On the political side, one writer suggests that the reason the Soviets made no protest over the mining of Haiphong harbor, which many feared would wreck the pending summit meeting with President Nixon, was that the Kremlin knew early in the year that there was going to be a poor harvest and that Russia would have to come knocking on the U.S. granary door.

Jackie is definitely the greatest driver still competing in Formula 1. What he will be doing in the 1973 racing season nobody knows. Some people have asked if I thought Stewart was equal in driving skill to the great Jimmy Clark. The answer is a resounding yes. As a matter of fact he maybe a tad BETTER.

NATIONAL 500

The National 500 run this past weekend from Charlotte was every bit as great a race as it was advertised to be. Possibly the best Grand National field ever. With the best that NASCAR and USAC had to offer the winner was Bobby Allison who has again established himself as a threat for the Grand National Points title. With several races in the Grand National schedule still to be run Richard Petty leads with 8.012.40 points to Allison's 7884.50.

Allison won the National 500 because the Junior Johnson Chevy was out classing the entire field with the exception of Buddy Baker's K&K Dodge which was right with Allison at the finish of the race. The final laps saw a really great battle between Baker and Allison with Allison winning by two feet. David Pearson finished third and A.J. Foyt fourth in Woods

Since another local paper picked Pearson and Foyt to dominate the race I would like to make it clear why they didn't. As great drivers as they both are and as great a pit crew as the Woods Brothers are handling and lack of horsepower kept them from victory lane. There's no doubt in my mind that Allison is equal in driving skill to Pearson, Petty, and Foyt on a stockcar track. Handling has been the key to success for Allison and the Junior Johnson Chevrolet. It remains to be seen what the final results will be. Allison now has won more super speedway events in his

career then David Pearson. Allison has 14 super speedway wins to Pearson's 13. Richard Petty has an incredible 17 victorys in super speedways. I applaud the coverage of the NASCAR Motor Racing Network during this season. This year NASCAR has offered the most exciting racing to be seen anywhere anytime. Never have I seen competition so close in one great event after another. And for the life of me can't think of anything they can do for an encore. Just FAN-

PRESIDENTIAL 250

Bill France, president of Daytona International Speedway and John Bishop, president of the International Motor Sports Association (IMSA), jointly announced the official name for the IMSA-Camel GT Challenge race here on Nov. 19 would be "The Presidential 250."

Appropriately, champions in all four classes (Touring and Grand Touring O & U) will be crowned in the IMSA season finale - The Presidential 250.

Hurley Haywood of Jacksonville, and Bob Beasley of Richmond, Va., enter the final event of the year with only 3.5 points separating them. No other driver has a chance at the overall Carnel GT Challenge title. Both Haywood and Beasley drive Porsche 911S machines.

The Haywood-Beasley "infighting" may be completely overshadowed by the surge of the powerful seven-liter Corvettes that seem to fair well or Daytona's steep banking and long straights.

The two-day, three-event meet moves into high gear Saturday, Nov. 18 with a 1%-miler for Baby Grand cars at 3:30 p.m. The preliminary Sunday will see the speedy little International 160 Formula machines in a 50-mile event at 1:00 p.m., and then at 2:00 p.m., some 40 or more of the top IMSA GT drivers move in for "The Presidential 250."

All competition will be contested on the twisting 3.81-mile international road and track course. This layout combines the entire sinuous infield section with the east and west banking of the speedway proper.

CAM-AM SERIES

This years Can-Am Series is turning into a tribute to the genius of Roger Penske. Mark Donohue won the Alberta, Canada Can-Am with Denis Hulme second in a McLaren and George Follmer third in the Penske Team car. Follmer has a commanding lead for the Can-Am points Championship. George now has 90 points with Denis Hulme a distant second with 65 points. The Series continues to amaze this year as we have great competition and drivers of first class caliber in at least the top 10 cars in the series.

Oct. 22 brings the Amrican 500 from Rockingham with Petty versus Allison with David Pearson, A.J. Foyt, Buddy Baker and a cast of thousands. Based on past performance this race should offer some real challenges for the top contenders. The mile oval is very steeply banked and extremely difficult to drive for 500 miles.

Nov. 5 the Middle Georgia half-mile track will feature a 500 lap event with the NASCAR competitors at each other

Paula Murphy, known throughout the auto racing world as "Miss STP", was hailed here today as the fastest accelerating woman driv ir in history and the first woman ever to drive a rocket-powered racing car.

Miss Murphy set a world speed record for women drivers here Sunday when she flashed through the two-way quarter mile from a standing start at an average speed of 134.168 mph in the "Pollution Packer" rocket dragster.

Each of her two back-to-back runs were also the fastest in history. On the first pass through the timing lights set up by U.S. Auto club steward Joe Petrali, she was clocked at 6.601 seconds, and on the return run she was timed in 6.708 seconds. The two runs were computed at average speeds of 136,343 and 132,062 miles per hour, and her terminal velocity

Cleaning, drying and pressing flowers - can spread some and preserve flowers, and the way to preserve a blossom's shape and color is by drying it. Some flowers are dried best by hanging them. These include bittersweet, statice, yarrow, hydrangea, salvia and cockscomb, also known as celosia.

Just before they reach their prime, pick them and strip off the leaves. Small flowers may be tied into small bunches and hung heads downward. But don't let the heads touch. Keep them in a dry, dimly lit place for two to four weeks. Larger

Longwood Faces Suit Over Road

LONGWOOD - The city may be involved in another law suit - this time from a builder insisting that a road be paved adjacent to houses which he is building Following a report from City Engineer William Palm, Thurday night, that cost of earth moving and paving of a strip of Georgia Street east would be \$9,900, Mayor Kenneth Brown informed the board that builders W. H. Green and Sons, according to report given to him, are threatening to sue over the matter.

The chief executive said half of the right-of-way is in a lake and much of it is muckland. "I would recommend we let him sue," Brown said.

Council Chairman Eugene Jaques locked horns with the mayor a few weeks ago over another item concerning the Green Company and at the time said he was formerly employed by the company. Last night the chairman stated he had a discussion with "Green" about the paving. Jacques said he told the builder he would refer the matter to the street committee and was "advised by Green if he does not

receive a reply soon, he would seek legal advice.' E. E. Williamson, chairman of the street committee, appeared offended at the fact Jacques had been conferring with the builder and asked why he was not contacted.

Jacques said since there is a possibility of legal action the advice of the city attorney should be sought. Attorney S. Joseph Davis Jr. declined, however, to give an immediate opinion and agreed to view the right-of-way with Williamson. In other business, Brown informed Dr. Gerald Grissom that the city has no authority to change the speed limit on Seminola Boulevard from its present 30 miles per hour. Grissom insisted a speed trap is being conducted on the road.

The mayor said the city's police department is not conducting the trap; but charged arrests are being made by Constable Bob Jane's office. The mayor continued that Police Chief R. E. Sweat has asked the State Department of Transportation to increase the limit to 45 miles per hour.
