

TALLAHASSEE, May 1 .-- UP) atate-wide highway survey, to establish a master plan for future construction, was started today by a corps of works-under dires tion of Walter Parker of the State Road Department.

The federal bureau of public oads, which will supply funds for the survey, will direct it, with the state planning uoard, the State Road Department, and other agencies co-operating.

About 150 persons will be eneployed and the project, requiring wo to three years, will cost an estimated \$225,000, the state planning board said.

The survey will be divided into three main divisions (1) map making and engineering surveys, (2) finance, and (3) traffle. It will mbrace data on existing roads. traffic flow, location and density ulation, industrial and populaation trends, land uses and watr, resources, agricultural, horticultural and industrial possibilities. 




