To prepare frosting, in a small saucepan melt chocolate and butter, Stir in one half cup confectioners' sugar, water and vanilla. Beat until smooth. Frost top of torte and sprinkle with chopped peanuts.





Amtrak To Ask Floridian Be Dropped; Others, Too

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Amtrak management recommended today that the Chicago-Florida "Floridian" passenger train be discontinued because Congress failed to appropriate enough funds to operate the entire national passenger system. The recommendation will go before the Amtrak board on Nov.

In addition, Amtrak said in a letter to all congressmen, five other routes are being "formally examined and are subject to discontinuance," and several other transcontinental routes may

Amtrak officials had issued a warning that the route, which stops in Sanford, Fia., might be terminated and had asked for public reaction to the proposal. The company's officials also saidnegative reaction to the proposal was not strong.

Amtrak asked Congress for an additional \$56 million in addition

to the \$488.5 million approved earlier for the current fiscal year, but a House-Senate conference committee agreed on only \$

The Floridian is one of Amtrak's biggest money-losers. It operates from Chicago south to Louisville, Nashville, Birmingham, Montgomery, and Jacksonville, splitting into sections that travel to both coasts of Florida.

The five other routes subject to later discontinuance are: - The National Limited between New York, Washington and Kansas City.

- The Lone Star between Chicago and Houston.
 The Lake Shore between Chicago and Boston.
 The San Joaquin between Bakersfield, Calif., and Oakland.
- Seattle-Portland local service.

Carter: World Economy

Slowing Employment Effort WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Carter said today there is no easy answer to high unemployment because it is "a tedious, slow process" affected by a worldwide economic slowdown. He repeated his support for the concept of the Humphrey-Hawkins full employment bill.

Carter said he would have an announcement on HumphreyHawkins "within the next few days," and hopes a final agreement will contain an anti-inflation clause as well as full

employment provisions. He said he hopes the White House and Congress can hammer out some differences in the bill and it can go to the House and Senate with his full support.

Court Rules On Confession

ATLANTA (UPI) - The Georgia Supreme Court has ruled a suspect's right to have an attorney present during interrogation does not have to be "literally expressed" by police officers in order for a confession to be legal.

The court ruled Wednesday that failure of police to advise a suspect of all of his so-called "Miranda rights" is not grounds in every case to reverse a criminal conviction

Cancer's Death Toll Climbing

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Cancer's death toll s expected to climb to 390,000 in the United States next year and the American Cancer Society predicts nearly one of four victims of the disease will die of lung cancer.

Of all the cancer deaths expected in 1978, perhaps three of 10 could have been saved by earlier diagnosis and treatment, the group said Wednesday in an annual report.



Ammonia Gas Kills,

Injures, Routs Hundreds PENSACOLA (UPI) - Ammonia gas that killed one person and injured 32 others late Wednesday continued leaking today from two overturned railroad tank cars.

Authorities said more than half of the 1,100 people routed from their homes would remain away from the area into the afternoon.

Emergency crews set up a command post near Escambia Bay and fought to dissipate the gas still spilling from two of three cars that ruptured when 35 cars of a Louisville & Nashville freight train derailed. The derailment about 6:08 p.m. Wednesday





Tax Reform And Carter

President Carter is holding back his tax reform proposals until next year. First things first, says Mr. Carter. He wants Congress to finish on his energy program and Social Security legislation before he submits his tax package, and besides, the delay will give him a few more months to see how the economy is responding to the stimulus measures passed by Congress earlier this year.

The fact is that the White House and Congress are engaging in tax reform already, in the very legislation the President mentioned, energy and Social Security. Mr. Carter concedes there are "tax connotations" in the Social Security bills. which is an understatement considering the staggering increase in payroll deductions voted by the House. And the Senate balked at his energy program because it served mainly to produce more tax revenue rather than more energy.

Mr. Carter railed against the "disgrace" of the federal tax system during his campaign, so he is committed to tax reform. But the tax system is so disgraceful — with its loopholes, inequities and oceans of baffling fine print — because Congress is forever amending the tax laws, with a new levy here or a new credit there, meeting some special circumstance, fine-tuning the economy, or using tax provisions as a penalty or reward to get people to behave in a certain way.

That is exactly what the President and Congress have been doing so far this year. The energy program Mr. Carter is pushing would make the tax system enormously more complicated, with its taxes, rebates and credits aimed at getting people to conserve energy or convert plants from oil to coal. The payroll tax increases proposed to rescue the Social Security trust fund would exaggerate the inequities of a program which is rapidly losing the faith of the people who must support it.

If Mr. Carter wants the tax system to simpler and more fair, he is going about it the wrong way. If he is concerned about the economic cations of tax reforms he has in mind, he faces the added complication of the potential effect on inflation, unemployment and economic growth of new energy taxes and the increasing burden on employers of the Social Security tax.

Some analysts believe the poor performance of the stock market recently is the result of uncertainty among investors about the fiscal and monetary policies of the Carter administration. That's easy to understand, and now Mr. Carter's hesitation with tax reform suggests that even the administration is uncertain about what those policies are going to be.

Tax reform is now promised as part of a com-prehensive economic program that will emerge with Mr. Carter's budget early next year. With the energy and Social Security taxes likely to be on the books by then, it will be a case of reforming a tax system that is even more disgraceful than the one Mr. Carter inherited.



VIEWPOINT German Code Cracking

The British government has begun un wrapping the details of one of the best-kept secrets of World War II. Summaries of 70,000 V messages between Berlin and German commanders in the field, which had been intercepted by British intelligence's fantastic Operation Ultra, are being made available to historians and journalists for the first time.

The story of how Ultra geniuses cracked the German secret code by duplicating the Nazis' Enigma encoding machine became public knowledge some time ago. But the 70,000 nessages are the first to be released from a file that began to be accumulated as early as February 1940.

It was months, however, before Operation Ultra was fully cranked up, during which Hitler scored some of his most stunning successes such as the blitzkrieg through the Lowlands and France in May 1940. But eventually, the Allied high command was reading virtually every nessage the Germans sent out on the air. ometimes even before they reached their in tended recipients.

The intelligence ranged from the tactically significant to the strategically crucial, from the camouflaged positions of planes on a German airfield, for example, to the extent of German rength opposing Allied troops begged down the Normandy beaches on D-Day. A number of tantalizing questions have been

posed by the Ultra revelations. But chiefly, since the Nazis were in effect fighting with one hand behind their back, at least in the latter part of the war, why did it take so long to smash them? Or was the war shortened by Ultra, and if so, by how much? Could it conceivably been lost without Ultra?

The documents now being made available are not expected to result in any fundamental rewriting of the story of World War II. But the knowledge of what the generals and strategists on both sides knew, and when they knew it, may shed new light on individual operations of the

The papers will reveal, perhaps, Allied bungles that should not have taken place, or opportunities missed-and will certainly keep scholars well-fed with the raw meat of history for years to come.

Queen Pay Rise: 'Nose-Thumbing?'

LONDON (UPI) - Labor reacted with anger to Queen Elizabeth's \$522,000 pay raise, one union leader warning it made "us all a bit more bloody minded."

Despite the government's adamant defense of its 10 percent wage ceiling, Chancellor of the Exchequer Denis Healey Wednesday announced the 18 percent raise in the queen's pay from \$2.9 million to \$3.42 million, citing rising costs.

But Willie Hamilton, a member of Parliament from ruling Labor Party, attacked the action, saying the pay raise "is thumbing a nose at working-class people who are being asked to tighten their belts."

"It is not going to help matters one little bit," miners union President Joe Gormley said. "They are making us all a bit more bloody minded than we are."

While the controversy over the queen's allowance raged, Prime Minister James Callaghan ordered the armed forces to be prepared to intervene if the nation's 32,000 firemen strike next

Fire union leader Terry Parry said his men will refuse to answer all calls and emergency ambulance duties as of Monday, whatever the consequences, unless they get an immediate 30 percent wage increase.

RALPH HUNTER

Ralph Waldo Hunter, 95, of 37 Cedar St., Jacksonville, died Tuesday morning in the Veterans Administration Hospital in Gainesville. A former Sanford resident, he is the father of Mrs. Marcia Hunter McLaulin of Sanford, his only close survivor.

His working career began in 1902 with the L&N Railroad Co. and except for his Army service career during WWI, continued for over 60 years. He attained the commissioned rank of captain in the AEF First Engineers and was discharged in 1920 with advanced tuberculosis and given little or no chance for recovery. But through his strong determination he lived a long and roductive life. He held 17 U.S. Patents, one of which - a method of using a





Should governments in Seminole County - the county, the cities and the School Board - be consolidated? A group of citizens, most of them former elected officials,

agreed Thursday night to put the Seminole County Legislative delegation on notice that a local law will be proposed to create a government study commission to look into consolidation. The study, according to the proposed legislation, would call for \$30,000 funding over a two-year period from county coffers. At the same time, the group decided that it would appoint members of the study commission, a total of 17, refusing to leave the appointments open to recommendations from any of the city governments, the county commission or the legislative

Altamonte Springs City Commissioner Cal DeVoney, one of those who organized the meeting, said appointments by the elected officials would by necessity become political.

State Rep. John Mica (R-Orange County), who was a consultant for the Orange County governmental study commission several . years ago, explained the methods of studying local government with a view toward limited or full-scale consolidation. He noted that efforts toward consolidation or charter county government have failed in 75 percent of the cases in Florida. He pointed to successful instances, specifically Jacksonville,


which was not a total consolidation and for all intents and purposes abolished county government there.

Because of the method used, whereby city residents voted separately on whether to retain or abolish their city governments, several cities including Jacksonville Beach and Neptune, were not consolidated with Jacksonville. Mica said that in his opinion it is not necessary to have individual elections in the cities. "You could have consolidation and not put the question to each

"The League of Cities is trying to get law through to give each unit the right to be in or out," Mica said. The state representative said a "major crisis" is needed for consolidation to be approved by the voters and the crisis

Seminole County is its growth and taxation. He said that a study commission does not really need to hire consultants to accomplish its study and that he recommends against such hiring. He said that in Alachua County the study commission spent \$62,000 for a study by professionals and then had to hire a legal firm and pay another \$10,000 to \$15,000 to draft

"When a county grows to more than 100,000 and county government begins to provide services formerly provided by cities, it is time for charter county government," he said. Former Altamonte Springs City Commissioner Dan Dorfman isked that the group state its purpose, which he had believed was

term from Oct. 1, 1978 to 1980, Davis said, adding the group's function would be to "gather facts and make recommendations not wave flags or banners."

Tom Kanelis, president of the Seminole County League of Civic Associations, said many citizens have approached him about the need for such a study, particularly concerning "double taxation and multiple jurisdictions," adding many are fearful of being annexed by cities.

Mica said the group would have the authority to go into every overnmental unit and "look at anything you wished."

Also attending Thursday's meeting at the invitation of DeVoney, included ex-Oviedo Mayor Leon Olliff; Bob Cuevas, recent unsuccessful candidate for the Altamonte Springs City mmission; former Lake Mary Councilman Virginia Mercer; past Casselberry Council Chairman Charles Glascock; former County Commissioner Al Davis; and Gloria Ward, a past unsuccessful school board candidate and current member of the Seminole County Planning and Zoning Commission

The next meeting of the group was scheduled for 7:30 p.m., Nov. 21, at First Federal Savings and Loan, Longwood branch.
