## 1858 SPEECH OF LINCOLN MADE PUBLIC TODAY

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—The text of a speech made by Abraham Lincoln in Springfield, Ill., Oct. 30, 1858, published today in the New York Times, which states that the address never before has been made public.

The manuscript of the speech is said by the Times to be in possession of Oliver R. Barrett, Chicago attorney, who has given permission to the University of Chicago press to print it in a book with correlative material.

Students of Lincoln's career, it is stated, regarded this speech as highly important. It was made shortly after the debates between Lincoln and Stephen A. Douglas had been concluded in their campaign for the senatorship from Nov. 2, and it was said to be apparent to Lincoln when he delivered the address that his defeat was inevitable and his political career probably at an end.

Lincoln himself kept it until after his first election to the presidency in 1860. It was then distributed to the only one that the major portion of the trust be distributed in Cincinnati.

He had received several threatening letters predicting that he would never be inaugurated so he instructed Mrs. Grimsey to dispose of the manuscripts as she saw fit if he did not return to Springfield.

About five years later, after he was shot by Booth, Mrs. Grimsey distributed some of the speeches to his friends. Many others, it is reported, was burned by a servant who thought them of no value.

Among those which were preserved was the Springfield speech, the text of which follows:

 (not conscious) departed from my purpose. I regret it.  
 I have said that in some respects the center has been painful to me. Myself and those with whom I act have been capably used of a purpose to destroy the union; and I have said that I have cultivated patience and made no attempt at a report.  
 "Ambition has been ascribed to me. God knows how sincerely I am moved from the first that this right of ambition might not be general. I claim an insensibility to political honors; but today could the Missouri restriction be restored and the whole slavery question placed on the old ground of toleration by necessity where it exists, I would not yield hostility to the spirit of the principle. I would in consideration gladly agree that Judge Douglas should never be elected and I never in an office so high as will both or either live."  
 Mr. Barrett, owner of the manuscript, writes in the book in which it is being published "this long forgotten speech marks a turning point in Lincoln's career" and that in its brief paragraphs, the last of the politician is set in the language of the clearer note of Lincoln the statesman. His denunciation of the restriction, Mr. Barrett writes, "extinguished the last spark of ambition for political preferment, but left him firm in his determination to carry on the contest against slavery."

 pointed out, the hull may have worked loose and fallen out of the bucket. The last previous test, made Tuesday midnight, indicated that Collins was breathing the experimenters said.  
 An official bulletin issued at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon by those in charge of operations at the shaft, announced the depth at that time was 44 feet.  
**Cave Unnerved Best of Workers**  
 "There was something in Sand Cave that unnerved the best men and all of them were absolutely exhausted when they came out," testified Hanson, town marshal, William Hanson, town marshal, testified before the military court of inquiry at the opening of the afternoon session Wednesday. He told of early unorganized efforts of volunteers to rescue Floyd Collins, entombed in the cave since June 30.  
 "Johnnie Gerald, a young man known to have a good nerve and a good reputation, volunteered," he said, "to go into the cave if he would be allowed to pick a crew whom he could trust not to pull out loose rock and make the opening more dangerous."  
 "He went into the cave and came out a physical wreck."  
 Lieut. Burdon of the Louisville Fire Department, he said, "did the same thing. There was something that unnerved the best men and all of them were absolutely exhausted when they came out."  
**Had Been Some Disorder**  
 Asked by Capt. Alex M. Chaney, if there had been any disorder before or after the troops arrived, Hanson replied that there had been some disorder but since the arrival of soldiers everything had been orderly.  
 He said he considered the shaft the only way the rescue might be effected and that the work was in competent hands.  
 Samuel H. Matlack of Louisville was recalled to the stand because a telegram had been received from the Louisville Herald stating that complaint had been made that Matlack had not received proper consideration in his examination by the court Tuesday.  
 Matlack said he had made complaint to no one. He said his only dissatisfaction was that the final question put by Captain Chaney was one which no man could answer either "yes" or "no" without condemning himself as a coward.  
 He said the report of his testimony had been misinterpreted, that he had made no criticism of Lieutenant Burdon or Gerald, and that his only criticism of William Hanson was that his paper had given him so much publicity it had gone to his head.  
**Lee Collins Examined**  
 During the morning session several witnesses were examined, including Lee Collins, father of the entombed man. Proceeding Mr. Collins, of Beech Grove, Doyle county, testified that the entrance of Sand Cave is located, gave testimony.  
 "I was out at the cave Sunday night after Collins was caught," he said, "and I saw evidence of climbing. The work proceeded in a disorganized manner. There were dickering and quarreling over the methods used. I left because of the conditions there."  
 "While I did not see any men drinking out of bottles, I saw empty bottles and plenty of evidence of drinking going on."  
**Times Rumor Set At Rest**  
 H. B. Honaker, of Horse Cave, described his visit into the cave and his appeal for stone cutters who, however, found that their skill would be unavailing.  
 "Have you heard," asked Captain A. M. Chaney, who conducted the questioning for the board, "anything that would lead a reasonably intelligent man to think that the body of Floyd Collins was not in the cave?"  
 "No, sir," Dr. Honaker replied, "but I have heard some men say they do not believe he was in there. I have heard that, but that did not change my opinion. For many people had gone in there Sunday, February 1, and had talked with him, and looked at him. Some of them had talked to him that were not close enough to see him, and I had talked with them."  
 He went on to explain that he had attempted to discuss the matter with Honaker, but in reply to a question if he knew whether this rumor came from two newspaper reporters or if he knew certain reporters, Dr. Honaker answered that he did not know a single newspaper man on the story.

I have seen rattlesnakes appear as though uninformed of my approach when their tongues were not moving back and forth from their mouths, but the moment they became conscious of it the tongues started. Rattlesnakes have no ears, but those little tentacles on the end of the tongue serve the purpose."

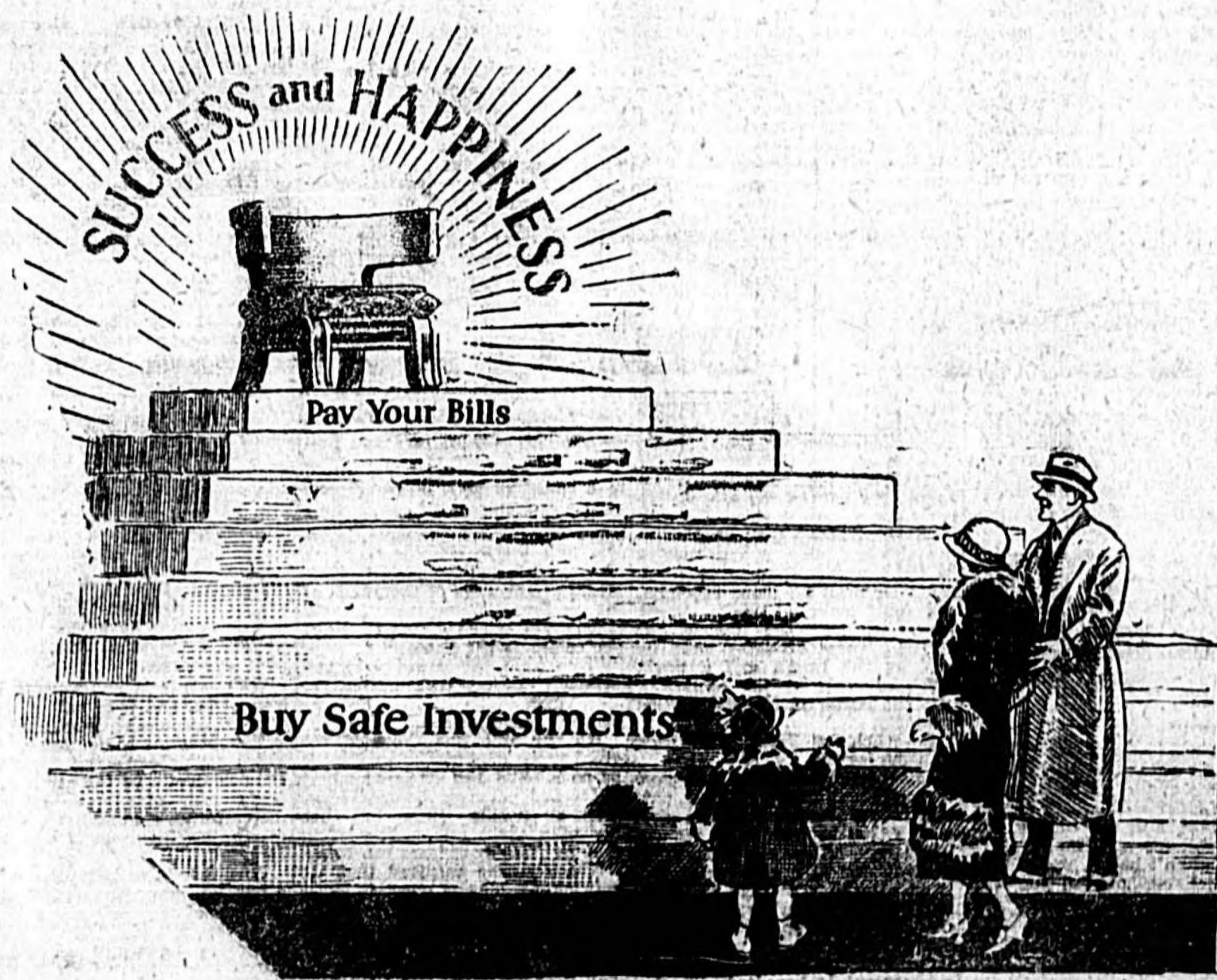
# FORT MELLON
