Why Mother Weaver always has a prayer



Mother Blanche Bell Weaver says that she has been told not to pray so much. She says some of those who have helped fund her Rescue Outreach Mission in Sanford appreciate the tender, loving care she gives the needy but seem to prefer she not preach to them.

Naturally, Mother Weaver is praying for an answer. "God is telling me 'this is my house,'" she said Wednesday. "And he says, 'I'll support your needs.'"

Brian Quail, the president-CEO at Heart of Florida United Way, said that Mother Weaver certainly has the organization's utmost respect and support. United Way gave Rescue Outreach Mission \$52,000 for 1997-1998 and \$52,000 for 1998-1999.

"Mother Weaver's work is very much needed," Quail said. He also said United Way has no objection to prayer. Quail stressed the importance that the mission have a strategic planner who is aware of the various funding agencies and their timetables. "I'm sure the mission qualifies for help from each agency."

Mother Blanche Bell Weaver, 75-years-old, has been working miracles for more than a decade at the mission on 13th street. The hungry and the homeless come to the mission 365 days a year. They come for food, clothing and a place to stay. More than 53,000 meals were served one year at the mission.

There is a chapel adjacent to the men's living and eating quarters. There are Bibles on each of the folding chairs and an old piano off to the side. Mother Weaver conducts services. Guests attend on a voluntary basis.

Mother Weaver said she remembered a man coming to the mission a few years ago. He told her that he had just left his wife and family. His life was a mess. He didn't know what he would do next. He needed more than a meal and a bed.

"As I talked to him and prayed with him, he had a blank look as if he really wasn't listening," Mother Weaver said. "All I could do was pray the Lord's words were registering with this man. He came back a year later, and told me he was reunited with his family."

Mother Weaver's mission is a not-for-profit organization that relies on donations of food, clothing and money from individuals and agencies. One of the needs now are for some small dresses for the women's and Please see Russ, Page 2A

Casselberry gets police chief

CASSELBERRY - It should be no surprise why the City of Casselberry has turned to Martin LaBrucciano as its new police chief.

LaBrucciano, 47, is regarded as one of the outstanding law enforcement officers in the territory. He's a captain and a 25-year vet of the Seminole County Sheriff's Department. He commanded the county's SWAT team. He has a degree in Psychology from Rollins College.

Casselberry narrowed its search for a chief to LaBrucciano and Sadie Darwell, a captain in the Gainesville Police Department. City Manager Jack Schluckebier said that LaBrucciano's personality,

wide-ranging experience and integrity "shined through."

Sheriff Don Estlinger said today that he appreciated the "great contributions" LaBrucciano made to the Sheriff's Office the last 25 years. "He will be missed but I know the people of Casselberry will be well served," Estlinger said. "The city did an extensive search - one of the best I've seen - and they came up with the fine chief."

LaBrucciano, who is in California on a teaching assignment, will begin his new job on Nov. 10. He succeeds Durbin Hatch, who has retired after 25 years service, 8 as chief. There are 80 people in the Casselberry agency.

Arrests made in connection to body found

SANFORD - Three people were arrested in an Orlando bar in the area of 5512 Rio Grande Avenue at 8:51 p.m. Wednesday by Orange County Sheriff's deputies in the stolen vehicle of Lynn Davis, whose decomposed body was found under debris in the backyard of his home in Casselberry Monday.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is questioning 22-year old Anthony Laitoo, 22-year old Myriam Hernandez, and 21-year old Gracey Bush in relation to the death of Davis. No charges have been filed at this time. Seminole County Sheriff's Office spokeswoman Deanna Brown said.

"This is a great break in the case," Brown said. "We are questioning them. This is our stolen vehicle that we have been looking for."

The Orange County Sheriff's Office was searching for Laitoo, who has an extensive criminal record, on an attempted murder warrant, said Orange County deputy Miguel Pagan. In addition to the attempted murder warrant, the Orange County Sheriff's Office is charging Laitoo with armed burglary of conveyance and grand theft third degree of a firearm.

"He pistol whipped his girlfriend's father on his head," Pagan said, describing Laitoo's attempted murder warrant. "He got in an fight with his girlfriend's father, and battered him. Laitoo has a long, extensive criminal record."

Hernandez is being charged by the Orange County Sheriff's Office with fleeing and attempting to elude, and grand theft third degree of a firearm. Bush is Please see Body, Page 2A

Pool to come to Seminole

SANFORD - Construction on the city of Sanford's proposed community swimming pool facility at Seminole High School could begin as early as December first.

"That's the fast-track date," said City Manager Tony Vanderworp. "We're putting all the little details together. The big hurdles are over, we have the players and the funding. It could go before the city commission and the county board members as early as next month. It will be a true recreational facility."

The proposed pool will be 50 meters by 25 yards long, said Tom Farnsworth, Superintendent of Sanford Parks and Recreation. The pool will have heating, a 5,000 square foot bathhouse, decking, lighting for evening use, decking, water Please see Pool, Page 3A

The way we were: 1925 businesses

This past summer I wrote a couple of articles on 1925 Sanford businesses using information taken from "Sanford, Florida in Pictures and Prose." At the time, I promised future columns on other businesses spotlighted in that publication, here is one with another to follow.



GRACE M. STINE - CIPHER

The Yowell Company

The Yowell Company was located in a spacious and modern two-story building at 200 E. First St. The business had been founded circa 1904 and had grown and expanded until it was one of the foremost leaders in its line in the area.

Yowell's was a department store of the better class, carrying a large and thoroughly up-to-date stock of staple dry goods, fancy notions and clothing for each member of the family.

This was the class of store that attracted trade to the city and it maintained an excellent code of business ethics. The stock was equal to that in stores in much larger cities.

Arthur E. Yowell was the active head of the firm. He had resided in Sanford for many years and had contributed much toward the development of the city and district. He was

a man of keen foresight and excellent business ability.

Sanford Electric Company

The Sanford Electric Company, located at 116 Magnolia Ave., was incorporated in October, 1924. It carried a complete line of all the best electrical devices. The growth of the business was attributed to the push and energy displayed by the manager, A.R. Platte. He was described as a hustler in every sense of the word and belonged to that class of progressive businessmen who never lost an opportunity to advance the best interests of the city.

(Most of us remember this business as first being in the above location and then moving to its present location on Park Drive. It was owned and operated by E.C. Harper Sr.

and later by his son, E.C. Harper Jr.)

Seminole Overland Company

The Seminole Overland Company, located at the corner of Commercial Street and Park Avenue, was a dealer in the Overland and Willys-Knight automobiles, auto parts, accessories, oils, gasoline, etc. There was also a service department and a storage business.

According to the article, the Overland Willys-Knight automobiles were favorably known and needed no description. They were sold at economical prices and gave a maximum of service.

The business was owned by A.W. Smith who had much experience in this line; he had been connected with the Huppmobile people of Jacksonville previous to establishing this business two years ago.

Kent Vulcanizing Works

This firm was established circa 1918 and was recognized as one of the leaders in its line. They did steam vulcanizing, repaired and recharged batteries, did an automobile repair and storage business. They also carried a large stock of high grade accessories such as tires, motor oils, and gasoline.

The business was located on Commercial Street near the courthouse and was owned by H.F. Kent. Mr. Kent was described as a gentleman of pleasing personality and excellent abilities; he was courteous and painstaking and had the confidence of the community.

J. Hintermister Piano Company

Among the well known business enterprises in Sanford was the Hintermister Piano Company, located at 112 Magnolia Ave. This was the oldest music house in Seminole County as well as the largest and most complete establishment of its kind in this section.

This firm maintained a well equipped piano repair shop and they also handled several different makes of pianos with a wide range of prices. They had the exclusive agency in the county for the famous Edison phonographs and carried the latest records.

The Hintermister family had been engaged in the piano business for three generations. The first Hintermister started manufacturing pianos in Ithica, N.Y. in 1858. J.H. Hintermister, owner of the Sanford business, had been connected with the piano industry for 20 years, having learned piano building and tuning in his grandfather's factory.

Hill Lumber Company
A Sanford pioneer in the lumber and material trade was Hill Lumber Company located at 223 W. Third St. This business was started circa 1883 by A.E. Hill at which time Sanford was a small village with frame buildings and no railroad. The business had kept pace with the growth of the area and continued to be the leader in lumber and building material businesses in the county.

In 1925, it was managed by W.C. Hill, a son of the founder and one of the best known and most progressive men in Sanford commercial circles.

This company dealt in rough and dressed lumber, cement, sand gravel, brick and building materials of every description. They kept a large stock which enabled them to offer low prices on high grade materials. Their motto was "Zip Service", and having six trucks in use and the best of facilities. They made it a rule to live up to their motto.

Wight Brothers Company, Inc.

One of the foremost leaders in the sale of automobile accessories, oils, gas, etc. in Sanford was the Wight Brothers Company, Inc. who operated three stations here. At Store #1 (Second and Magnolia) they utilized a modern brick building whose dimensions were 110 by 117 feet. The other two stations were located at First and Elm and Tenth and Sanford.

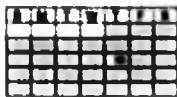

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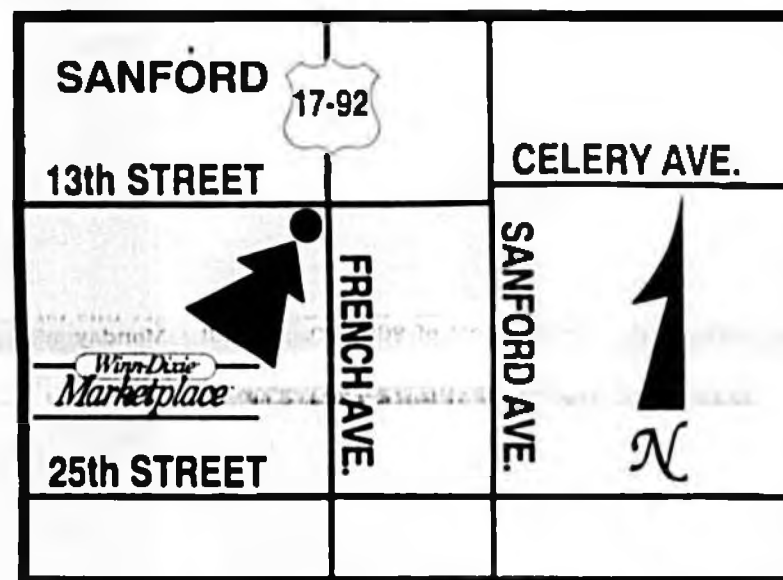

involved with the school, I was trying to think of a way that I could help while motivating people to go out and support the team," Robinson said. "My expertise is in television production and I figured if we worked with the television production classes at the school, I could teach a little to the students while making the show for the team. It has really worked out great."

Robinson has actually been in the entertainment business since he was in his early 20s. He started out managing bands and solo artists and wrote songs for the musicians he worked with. After selling his sound company, Robinson entered the promotional end of the music business. In fact, he promoted over 75 major acts in 25 cities.

While filming a two-day event at the Brevard County Zoo, Robinson was asked if he would like to start producing a cable show about what to do in the area. For three years, Robinson produced "Stepping Out This Week" along with many commercials.

After the successful television show stopped airing, Robinson decided to take a break. He entered an ill-fated business venture after four years of rest, then retired again for a year or two before getting back into the business that had been so enjoyable to him, tele-

vision production.

"I have learned so much over the years," Robinson said. "I can create, produce, edit, and shoot. I am working on three new shows and really feel like everything is taking off for me. By far, though, the most rewarding show I work on now is the football show."

When Robinson approached Worthington with the idea for the show and peaked his interest, he still had to get the go-ahead from Seminole High School Principal Gretchen Schapker.

That would prove to be the easy part. Schapker immediately loved the idea of a show to promote the successful football team that would be produced in the television production classes by the students. On the job training is hard to come by and this was the perfect opportunity for the classes to learn by doing.

All that was left was to find a co-host for Worthington. Several students tried out but one was a shoe-in from the start.

Senior Sylvester Wynn earned the role of co-host and has done a great job on the show. In fact, he doesn't even use the teleprompter to ask Worthington questions. He just has a knack for hosting.

"As soon as I saw Sylvester I knew he would be perfect," Robinson said. "Worthington is such a natural at this and I knew we needed someone who

could be as comfortable and natural as he is. That was definitely Sylvester."

The show starts with Wynn asking questions of Worthington about the previous Friday's game. Then the highlights are shown while Worthington goes over the plays and results. Then it's time to select the players of the week.

Everyone likes to be on television and Worthington uses the spotlight on the show to motivate his players to make big plays in the game.

Finally, Wynn and Worthington preview the next game on the schedule. The half hour show ends with another dose of highlights.

"When I was asked to do the show, I knew it would be fun," Worthington said. "But I had no idea that everything would work out so well. We are really enjoying this and like the fact

that the students get the first hand experience."

Although Robinson does a lot of work on his own time with no compensation, he said that he loves being able to help the school and the team.

"It is really great for me to know that I'm helping kids by teaching them something that they may one day decide to make a career out of," Robinson said. "The whole thing is coming together so well and we are really having a great time with it."

At this time, Seminole is the only high school with a show like this. The educational benefit to the students and the motivational benefit to the players is really coming through as the season progresses.

grass," said Tina Kendrick, the executive secretary at Crooms academy who called 911, then waited with Mr. Green for emergency medical workers to arrive. "Larry saw Bob lying in the ditch. He ran in to have us call 911, then helped Bob as he was trying to crawl out of the ditch. Bob was coherent, but he was in shock."

Mr. Green was released from the hospital at 6 p.m. Tuesday with a broken ankle. Doctors were able to pump any hazardous waste from the ditch out of his lungs.

"We could see things crawling around within the water," said Kendrick. "It's full of waste, storm water, algae, all kinds of junk. I spoke to Bob last night, and he's fine except for his ankle. We were all worried that Bob's lungs could be infected. I know he was worried."

going to miss him," said an aide in the Diversified Investigative Services Division at the Sheriff's Office. Schluckebier said that he was impressed with "the thoughtfulness" of LaBrusciano's answers in the Casselberry review process.

In addition to his Rollins degree, LaBrusciano is an FBI Academy graduate.

The pay range for police chief, said Casselberry personnel director Christina Vivo, goes from \$47,519 to \$69,378. LaBrusciano will begin at \$61,000.

polo capcettes, and diving boards.

Sanford will pay \$500,000 toward construction of the proposed pool, while the county and the school board will split an additional \$500,000. So far, said Farnsworth, the total cost estimate stands at \$942,500.

"We're going to be meeting with the School Board and Seminole County for finalization," said Farnsworth. "Then, it's going to go to legal departments. After that, we'll need to decide between hiring an architect or a contractor to design and build it."

Sanford's proposed pool will be 705,000 gallons, the same size as the pool at Lake Bran-

they High School in Altamonte Springs. Sanford can expect maintenance costs at the community pool to parallel the costs at Lake Brantley, said Scott Stegall, Director of Capital Outlay for the Seminole County School Board.

Annual maintenance costs at the Lake Brantley pool are \$122,951, said Stegall. This does not include unscheduled major repairs. In six years of existence, Lake Brantley has not encountered any major repairs.

To save on maintenance costs, Sanford is looking at a type of pool surface that will not need resurfacing. The Lake Brantley pool will need resurfacing at the ten-year mark, with a cost of \$65,000. Stegall

said Sanford and Seminole County would split the cost of such a resurfacing repair.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale said Monday night after the city commission meeting that "I don't expect any obstacles at all" to begin construction by the end of the year.

Sanford city commissioner Whitey Eckstein wants to quicken the pace of awarding contracts and meetings with the Seminole County School Board, so construction can begin on December first. The original schedule for building the pool called for construction to begin in March, 1999.

"There were a lot of nay-sayers who said we couldn't get this done," said Eckstein at Monday afternoon's city com-

mission work session. "This can be something we're proud of. Let's get to work. I want to begin construction and break ground December first."

Vanderworp said choosing the design plans for the pool and awarding contracts will be "the easy part. Putting it up for bid is not going to be a hold-up at all. We're moving on all fronts simultaneously."

Vanderworp said constructing a community pool is part of an overall strategy to "bring a high quality of life to Sanford. Our strategy starts with jobs and economic opportunity. We have a strategy here that includes public improvements, midgets on the lakefront, downtown revitalization, street and park improvement, and public safety, among others."

not being charged.

The Seminole County Sheriff's deputies found the badly decomposed body of 55-year-old Davis under lawn furniture and dirty sheets Monday, following an anonymous tip at 1 p.m., in the backyard of his home at 338 Redwing Way in a quiet neighborhood in unincorporated Casselberry. His wife, 53-year-old Patricia Davis, is staying with family.

The body was so decomposed that the Seminole County Sheriff's Office had to wait for an autopsy by the Seminole County Medical Examiner's Office Tuesday afternoon to positively identify the body as that of Davis.

"The backyard where we

found the body had a very strong odor," Seminole County Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy Steve Harriet said on Tuesday. "The body was so decomposed that we have to wait for an autopsy to make a positive identification."

Further details on the findings of Tuesday's autopsy, including the nature of Davis' death, are not available. Brown said the Seminole County Sheriff's Office is investigating the case as a possible homicide, speaking to anyone who had contact with Davis prior to his death.

with their city attorney. The process should have taken 30 days."

Commissioner David McLeod asked, "Mayor, first of all, doesn't the attorney work for the commission? I do not feel it is a waste of the taxpayers' money. I do not believe the charter says you could fire the attorney or the city clerk. That would mean a change every three years."

Commissioner Eddie Martinez said, "This is nothing but a self-serving political statement. You chose to go to court so these expenses are on your shoulders." Martinez also stated that Partyska might be giving the attorney and city manager a message.

The message is that if they do not do what the mayor wants, he will fire them. He added, "these people are working at the pleasure of the commission, not of you." Commissioner Michael Blake read a state statute that said the mayor has certain powers with the commissions approval.

Blake continued, "we have saved between \$50,000 and \$60,000 this year in hiring this attorney over the attorneys of our sister cities." Commissioner and Vice Chair, Cindy Gennell said, "We do not have a strong city manager form of government. We have a strong city manager and strong commission form of government."

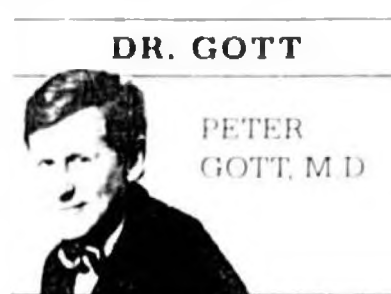

Three main causes of chronic cough

DEAR DR. GOTT: Other than pneumonia and bronchitis, what are the most common causes of chronic cough in the elderly?

DR. GOTT: To begin with, pneumonia does not cause a chronic cough in most instances. This lung infection usually persists either as a better or worse, so coughing would either disappear or be accompanied by other symptoms.

Causes for chronic coughs vary. Long-standing bronchitis can usually be diagnosed by an X-ray; the infection is more prevalent in people who smoke or who are constantly exposed to air pollution. Also, prescription drugs called ACE inhibitors that are used to treat hypertension and heart ailments can cause a chronic, dry cough in up to 10 percent of users. Further, congestive heart failure—the build-up of excess fluid in the lungs from a weak heart—often causes coughs as well as difficulty breathing.

However, the most common cause of coughs lasting more than three weeks is a thin, post-nasal drip and reflux. According to an article in the *Archives of Internal Medicine* (June 3, 1998), these causes account for all the coughs of 10 elderly patients studied—and, post-nasal drip eliminated the cough for all of them.

Asthma is associated with spasms of the muscles lining the bronchial passages. Along with cough, asthma causes wheezing and shortness of breath. The disease is treated with a variety of medicines, both pills and inhalers.

Post-nasal drip is a treacherous secretion at the back of the throat. Seen most often in the presence of allergies or air pollution, post-nasal drip, while harmless, may cause a persistent, dry, troublesome cough. The affliction often responds to antihistamines with or without decongestants.

Reflux refers to the backward flow of stomach acid into the esophagus. Heartburn, indigestion and gas are common consequences, but a chronic cough can also result because esophageal irritation stimulates the nerves that cause coughing. Medicines including H₂ blockers and others

bring about profound relief. The value of the 1998 study lies in its proof that lung disorders are far from the only basis for cough. Those patients with chronic cough must have their hearts, throats, upper intestinal tracts and drug programs evaluated as well as their lungs tested.

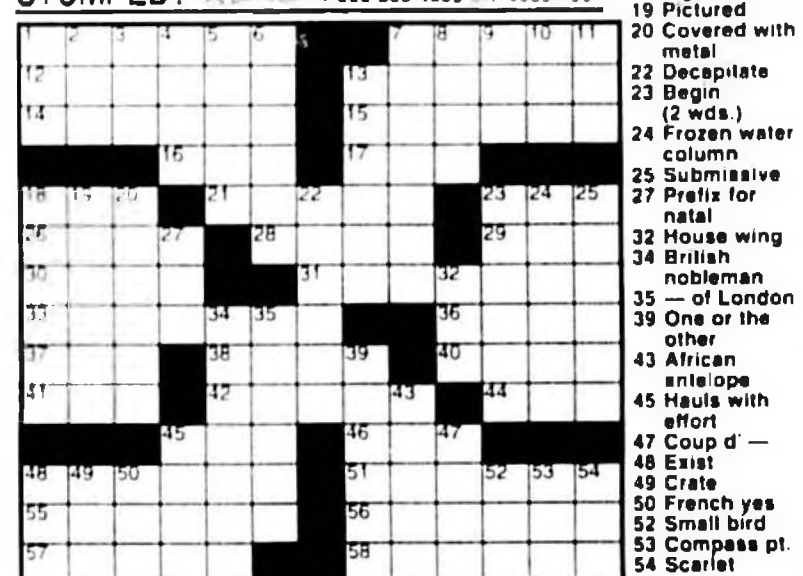

Showing the minor

What did Nubar Gulbenkian, the late oil millionaire, think was the best number for a dinner party? And who were they?

So far, we have looked at Michaels Cue Bids that show a major two suiter. But if the opening bid is one of a major, an immediate overcall of two of that major shows at least 5-5 in the other major and either minor. If you are the advancer (the cue bidder's partner), don't like the other major and would like to know which minor your partner holds, what do you do? Answer: Bid two no trump. Instead, bidding three clubs or three diamonds is natural, showing a long suit of your own and telling partner you don't care for either of his suits.

Here, North didn't like spades, so he

asked for the minor with two no trump. Because South had a strong hand, he jumped to four clubs. North might have passed, but judged that his two honor cards would prove useful — and there was a vulnerable game in the offing.

How would you plan the play in five clubs? West leads the heart 10 in answer to his partner's opening bid. As dummy's trumps were so low, declarer decided to assume a 4-1 spade split but cater to a 4-1 trump break. So, he won the first trick with dummy's heart ace, unblocked the spade queen, played a trump to hand, ruffed a spade in the dummy, drew the remaining trumps, and ran the spades. He lost only two diamond tricks.

Nubar Gulbenkian said, "The best number for a dinner party is two myself and a dam' good head waiter." I would have thought a talented chef and an excellent wine cellar wouldn't hurt, either.

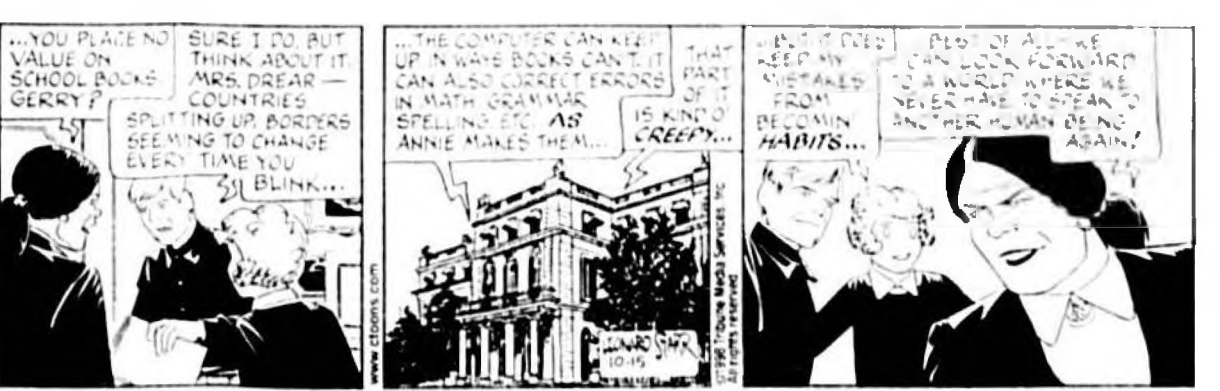

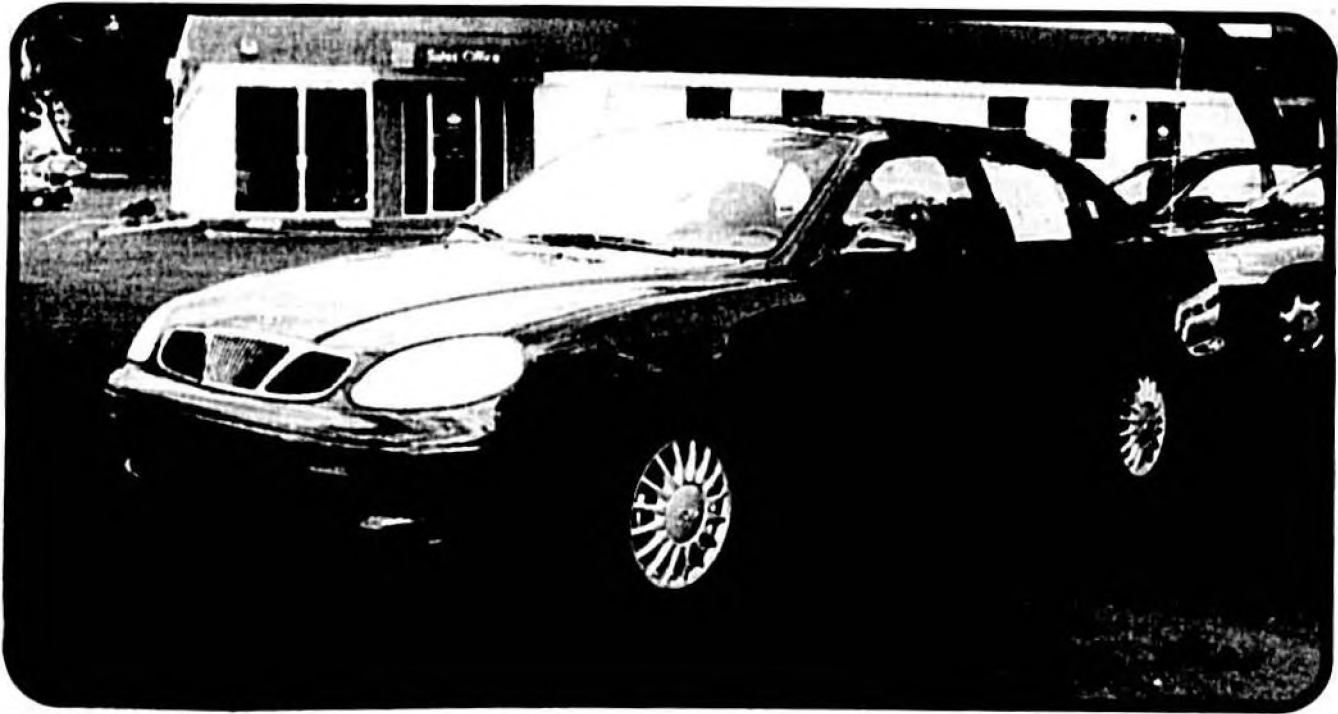

The rest of the night belonged to Signal Zero. Signal Zero took the lead for good in the second

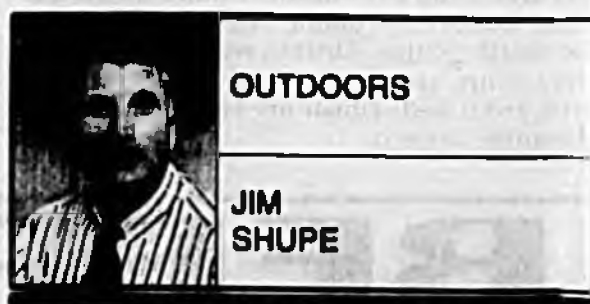

TEAM efforts on the Kissimmee Waterway

SANFORD - Any list of favorite fishing sites compiled by members of Florida's army of freshwater anglers will probably include Lake Kissimmee somewhere among its Top-10.

Lake Kissimmee is a prime example of how well the TEAM (Team Effort Accomplishing Management) concept can work to ensure that anglers enjoy a quality fishery while, at the same time, enhancing water quality, restoring littoral habitat, and replacing noxious weed growth with desirable, productive aquatic plant species.

This 35,000-acre eutrophic lake in Osceola County is the crown jewel in a sprawling Kissimmee Waterway that includes such popular lakes as Tohopekaliga (Toho), East Lake Toho, Jackson, Jatchincha, Cypress, Rosalie, Tiger, Alligator, Weohyakapka (Walk-In-Water), Marian and a myriad of smaller piscatorial delights in a chain of lakes that are navigational through an intricate series of canals, creeks and man-

make locks.

TEAM objectives include maintaining or increasing angler utilization above current levels, maintaining or exceeding the fishing satisfaction level of freshwater anglers, establishing Lake Kissimmee as a Fish Management Area, optimizing sportfish production and recruitment through littoral habitat management, and educating the public to resource needs and rational fisheries management practices.

Historically, problems at Lake Kissimmee centered mainly on significantly altered water level fluctuations which culminated in degraded fish and wildlife habitat.

Work in attaining TEAM's objectives and solving the lake's problems is currently underway and will continue on a permanent basis.

In June, 1996, the latest of a periodic, two-decade series of lake drawdowns was completed and, two months later, mechanical harvesting of floating tussocks was initiated, a project that was completed in April, 1997.

Also completed in April, was a combined Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC), Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), and South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) effort to coordinate hydrilla management activities, and conduct vegetation management on enhanced areas.

Concluded last April was an "Early Day"

clean-up of Lake Kissimmee utilizing more than 200 volunteers and, in July, a project using volunteers to replant areas of the lake with bulrush, knotgrass and eelgrass was consummated.

Some 500,000 cubic yards of muck and bottom sediments were removed during the extreme drawdown of 1996, which once again opened large portions of the lake's littoral zone to wade fishermen.

According to GFC Biologist Mikel Hulon, the lake's TEAM project director, 25 miles of Kissimmee's shallow shoreline are now available to waders.

"Prior to the drawdown," Hulon emphasized, "wadable shoreline had dwindled from an all-time high of 53 miles, to a scant two miles. Until the mid-170's," he continued, "Kissimmee was world renowned for its wade fishing and the subsequent loss through lake degradation was significant."

Wadable areas are now found near such public access points as the Overstreet Landing on the lake's east side, Shady Oaks Fish Camp to the south, and Kissimmee State Park at the north end.

Controlling the spread of such undesirable aquatic plant growth as hydrilla, cat-tails, pickerelweed and spatterdock will be an ongoing and long-term TEAM goal.

Presently, Lake Kissimmee affords anglers ample opportunities to bag a limit of bass (including trophy-sized fish). Prospects are also bright for those seeking crappie and bream (bluegill and shellcracker).

Keeping these auspicious fishing conditions at a high level is the OFC's and TEAM's bottom line.

SHUPE'S SCOOP

Big bass will be on the prowl soon and they will be looking for big meals. They would rather chase down one large meal than many small ones. It is a matter of economy of energy. Large shiners are hard to beat because they fit this menu perfectly.

FISHING FORECAST

River action is picking up and bass are hitting along grassy edges and weed beds. Veterans anchor and work proven areas. Bass tend to hold and fee in certain spots. Look for blue herons on the shoreline. I have found many good spots this way. These birds are expert fishermen and know where the baitfish hang out. Bass will not be far away.

Count on good snook action at Sebastian Inlet. Large live shrimp and pinfish are the top baits. Work these bait slowly around rocky structure for snook strikes. Also expect a few redfish, flounder, trout and a stray tarpon or so. Trout are hitting just inside the inlet over grass flats.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports that offshore action has been spotty due to high seas. There should be some king mackerel on B A and Pelican Flats. Sheepshead and flounder will be biting inside the Port. Trout and redfish are rated as fair on the flats of the Banana and Indian Rivers.

Sheepshead and flounder are the big news at Ponce Inlet. Sheepshead are hitting fiddler crabs and live shrimp around the rocks, while flounder are taking finger mullet along the south jetties. Drum, redfish, and jack crevilles are also being caught in fair numbers. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.

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
