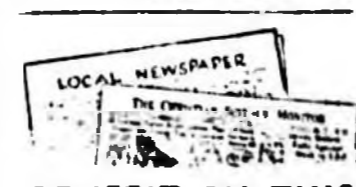

mended by President George Stine for his efforts in behalf of water transportation to this section.

The next step in developing the river, Mr. Higgins said, is to provide terminal facilities for barge lines, and work in this direction has already started. The application to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation for a \$350,000 self-liquidating loan has been assured just as soon as the City's charter is amended to make provision for the issuance of revenue certificates for this purpose.

Mr. Higgins pointed out that the proposed loan is not left on the taxing authority of the City, but must be repaid out of the profits of the terminals and may be liquidated over a period of 50 years. A bill has been prepared for introduction in the next session of the legislature giving the City authority to issue these revenue certificates.

Speaking of flood control, Mr. Higgins said that Sanford is included in an overall federal flood control project for the entire state of Florida which is expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$208,000,000, the first phase of which has already been started in South Florida. The upper St. Johns-Kissimmee River phase will come in the latter part of the project and may not be completed for some time, Mr. Higgins said.

The proposed St. Johns-Indian River canal project is in about the same status it was four years ago when a survey of the upper St. Johns River valley was authorized. Jacksonville interests are favorable to this project, he said, because of the pleasure boats which would be likely to use the river in preference to the East Coast canal.

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Dolphin, Whales Have Fight At Marineland
MARINELAND, Oct. 11, (AP)—Bottle-nosed dolphin and three of 44 pilot whales which came ashore near here Friday staged a hour-and-half battle in their tank here early today.
A five-month-old baby porpoise, the first conceived and born, and the second ever born, in captivity was killed.
Arthur F. McBride, curator of the oceanarium, said the fight might explain the mass beaching of the whales, 40 of which died in the churning surf. Four were captured but one of these died in the tank here Saturday.
Dr. McBride said that recently literally thousands of the dolphin (or gray porpoise) have been seen close inshore migrating to the south. The Dolphin, ranging up to 600 pounds, are very dominant animals, he said.
Thus, he explained, the whales—which also were migrating—may have blundered into porpoise territory and been attacked. Dr. McBride pointed out that the whales follow a leader and that this leader may have been attacked or frightened, may have fled toward the beach, leading the others to their deaths.
The average adult brown bear weighs about 800 pounds.
