



# Seminole Experiment: Four-Day Work Week

Seminole County Public Works Director W.J. Schuder today announced he has put some of his road crews on a four-day 40hour work week in an attempt to conserve diesel fuel. Schuder told county commissioners he has some crews working Monday through Thursday from 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. If the four-day week is successful in conserving fuel, he said, he will recommend expanding the plan and keeping it in effect while fuel supplies are

"From all indications and news reports, it looks like the supply of diesel fuel is going to continue to get tighter; we had to do something to conserve," Schuder said. "What this will do is to cut down the setup time. We won't be wasting fuel driving out and back to the sites one day a week."

Schuder said fuel suppliers have indicated that the present allocation to the county of 80 percent of last year's total fuel may dip further before the summer is over. He said before allocations were given to the county, vehicles in his department were burning about 18,000 to 20,000 gallons of diesel fuel a month. Since the 80 percent allocation was announced, he said he has had to function on only 14,000 to 15,000 gallons per month. The crews working the four-day week are those widening

those working on projects in the Rolling Hills Development. Schuder said there are 10 diesel trucks and several miscellaneous vehicles and bulldozers involved in the pilot project. Schuder said he is hopeful that the four-day week can be successful enough so that normal refuse and disposal operations by the county do not have to be altered.

He said the experimental project involves about 30 employees. He said he will report back to the county commission with a progress report on the project later this month. On the municipal level, Longwood Public Works Department

reports no problem so far in getting diesel fuel to operate its Oviedo has a tractor and a fire truck which use diesel fuel, but have experienced no problem in getting enough, officials said

In Winter Springs, fuel for diesel tractors is purchased from Phillips in Sanford and fuel for the diesel fire truck is supplied by Exxon, officials noted, adding they have not had a problem in

Casselberry, which uses diesel for its heavy equipment in public works and standby generators used by the utility department, says it is cutting down, and is having a problem obtaining fuel, according to officials.

"We run quite a few diesel vehicles," said Bob Kelly, Sanford public works director, "but so far we've had no shortage. Our gasoline allocation was cut 20 percent from last year, but diesel fuel seems to be holding steady."

Lake Mary runs only one diesel vehicle, a road grader. Officials say they have had no problems obtaining fuel for it. Altamonte Springs is not having difficulty obtaining enough diesel fuel for its needs, according to Fred Hepner, General Ser-None of the city officials indicated any desire to initiate a pilot program similar to that of the county public works department.



## Tax Hike Unnecessary For Engine: Fire Chief

Lake Mary interim fire chief, Jim Orioles, says his engine and does not need the tax hike suggested by City Manager Phil Kulbes to pay for it. Kulbes last week called for a tax increase of \$1 per

thousand of assessed valuation to be used, among other things, for the purchase of a new \$52,000 fire engine. "Our department never asked for \$52,000," said Orioles Orioles said it was his understanding that \$11,500 of his department's \$64,000 budget had previously been set aside for the purchase of a fire engine.

Kubles said today the tax increase not only was needed for a fire engine, "but to provide the necessary services and equipment that a growing city needs." "We have 26 miles of dirt roads we want paved," he

In addition to paving roads, Kulbes said he would like to extend the city's water and sewage lines, improve storm drainage and perhaps build a new city hall. Lake Mary's current tax rate is \$3 for every \$1,000 of a property's assessed value. Kulbes' proposed increase would make the rate \$4 for every \$1,000.

Lake Mary's tax rate, for its portion of the tax bill, is among the lowest in Seminole County.

#### Malaysians Prepare To Push Vietnamese Out To Sea

KUALA LUMPER, Malaysia (UPI) - Despite world outcry, Malaysian authorities today rounded up pockets of Vietnamese refugees stranded on remote beaches and prepared to push them back to sea in small boats. "There are an estimated 5,000 newly arrived illegal immigrants stranded on our beaches and we are rounding them up," refugee coordinator Maj. Gen. Ghazali Che Mat

Prime Minister Datuk Hussain Onn, who backed down on a government threat to shoot Vietnamese "boat people" on sight, reiterated his nation's policy to prevent any more refugees from landing on Malaysian shores.

#### Somoza Blasts 'Ingrate' U.S.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) - Sandinista rebels battled President Anastasio Somoza's national guard in the heart of Rivas, where the insurgents plan to establish a capital for "Free Nicaragua," and repelled government troops trying to reinforce the only guard fort in Leon. Most provincial capitals in the north and east were under seige and a number of northern hamlets have fallen to the guerrillas in the embattled Central American

In a brief broadcast on national radio Monday, Somoza called the United States "an ingrate" for refusing him requested aid in his "fight against international communism," referring to the Sandinistas.

#### Israel Shells Lebanon

United Press International Israeli forces shelled Palestinian positions in southern Labanon today, a day after an air attack hit suspected Palestinian targets in Lebanon for the first time in 10

An Israeli military spokesman said today's shelling was in answer to several Soviet-made Katyusha rockets fired into the upper Galilee region of northern Israel. The spokesman said the Palestinian guerrillas fired the rockets into Israeli territory at about 11 a.m. (4 a.m. EDT). There were no injuries, but Israel radio reported the rockets caused some damage.

#### **Leaders Flee Their Homes**

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (UPI) — Moslem guerrillas in Afghanistan claimed they have forced Soviet-backed President Nur Mohammad Taraki and his top officials to flee their homes and take refuge in military camps. Rebel sources in Peshawar, the Pakistan city closest to Afghanistan, said Monday Taraki and Prime Minister Hafeezullah Amin were not living at their homes because

In Tehran, the official Pars News Agency quoted Afghan exile sources as saying the Shiite Moslem guerrillas had been "assassinating well-known figures and leaders of Taraki's party."

Two Freighters Collide;

BOSTON (UPI) - Two large freighters - each equipped with the latest electronic navigational aids collided in "a major shipping lane" off Cape Cod Monday. One of them sank 40 minutes after a 150-foot gash was carved out of its side, but all 38 crewmen were rescued. The 38-member crew of the 575-foot Regal Sword abandoned ship before the craft sank in 270 feet of water following the collision 30 miles southeast of the cape. The crewmen were rescued from life boats by the other ship, the 627-foot oil tanker Exxon Chester, and were brought to Boston. Authorities said no injuries were reported aboard either ship. The Exxon Chester was escorted into port by the cutter

The independents blockaded hundreds of truck-stop fuel pumps in at least 20 states.

above-ground testing of nuclear weapons, said the sheep died of radiation poisoning after they ate forage contaminated by fallout from two blasts in March and May of



### Nothing More Than A Fantasy

For sheer hypocrisy, not to mention misin-formation, it would be hard to match President Carter's stated rationale for refusing to lift economic sanctions against the new, black government of Zimbabwe Rhodesia.

Mr. Carter's prim legalisms and moral posturing measure Zimbabwe Rhodesia's progress toward democracy by standards observed only in the breach by that beleaguered nations' enemies.

The president, reluctantly we assume, conceded that the new government came to power via elections conducted "in a reasonably fair way. . . But Mr. Carter found fault with a constitution that grants whites a temporarily disproportionate share

Has the president forgotten that the settlement urged on Salisbury by London and Washington just one year ago would also have granted whites a disproporationate share of administrative responsibility as the price of continued stability and economic progress? Apparently so.
Mr. Carter contended that the exile guerrilla

groups were "banned from the election." In fact, the guerrillas banned themselves. Guerrilla leaders Robert Mugabe and Joshua Nkomo were repeatedly invited to participate in the elections and to submit their political fate to the

The sole condition on this invitation was that the guerrillas renounce the use of violence and terrorism during the electoral process. This they refused to do.

Instead, Mugabe and Nkomo denounced the elections, threatened death to those who voted, and shunned participation just as they had refused to share power in the transitional government or join in last year's negotiations over a new constitution.

Mr. Carter's contention that Prime Minister Abel Muzorewa's government refused to negotiate with the guerrillas stands the facts on their head. Bishop Muzorewa's government, like the transitional administration that preceded it, has signaled its willingness to participate in an unconditional, allparties conference to end the war.

Mugabe and Nkomo have consistently rejected such a conference and they continue to do so today. Quite recently, Mugabe ruled out any possibility of negotiations with the new government.

And, President Carter indulged in fantasy when he maintained that continued sanctions against the duly elected government of Zimbabwe Rhodesia will help achieve "genuine majority rule. . .based on constitutional process that exemplify the very principles on which the United States has been

The maintenance of sanctions can only serve to lessen Zimbabwe Rhodesia's ability to resist Marxist guerrillas backed by Cuba and the Soviet Union and further diminish future prospects for any kind of human rights in that war-torn land.

We hope and expect that Congress understands enough about the realities of Zimbabwe Rhodesia to override Mr. Carter and lift economic sanctions without delay.

### Is It An MX Or Rx?

By DON GRAFF It sounds like something a demented Rube

Goldberg might have devised. Twenty miles of railroad track sunk in a trench. An intercontinental missile tipped with a nuclear warhead is trundled endlessly back and forth on this route to nowhere - on the ground, at least. Its exact position at any given time is known, or so we will all be hoping, only to the men with their fingers on the buttons of the nation's strategic defense system. In case of war, the buttons are pressed and

surprise! The missile pops out of the trench to be launched toward a programmed target thousands of miles away in the Soviet Union. Multiply many times over, spread over the open spaces of four Western states, attach a pricetag of \$30 billion and what you have is not the antic imaginings of a cartoonist but a soon-tobe military reality, or so President Carter has decided with his go-ahead on construction of the MX mobile intercontinental ballistic missile

MX is designed to replace the existing Minuteman network, which, with its fixed launching sites and as technological advance improves the accuracy of Soviet missiles, is becoming increasingly vulnerable to a potential pre-emptive strike.

It represents, at least in the administration's reading of the fine print, the most in new nuclear weaponry permissable under the SALT II agreement the president and Soviet Chairman Leonid Brezhnev formally signed in Vienna prior to ratification by the U.S. Senate.

When Billy and I talked Sunday, I wanted to make sure he understood exactly what he was undertaking, and I feel he did." ## Small Firms Getting 'Feet Wet'

NEW YORK (UPI) — Seven hundred small companies in New England are seeking to participate in an export program spon- sales in one year through the Massport program, 700 conceivably sored by the Massachusetts Port Authority that already has might generate \$50 million a year in time. achieved considerable success.

Only a little over a year old, the program has enabled 25 small companies to get their feet wet in the export business. Their combined export sales were a modest \$1.9 million, but William F. Tobin, marketing and development director for the authority, believes the program will grow.

The Smaller Business Association of New England is cooperating with the port authority, commonly known as

Massport advertises the program and then screens applications from companies that want to participate. Not all the applicants can be accepted at once. Those accepted are chosen on the basis of their manufacturing record, the potential overseas demand for their products and ready access to foreign customers.

Massport then sends periodic trade missions of the companies chosen abroad and makes interest-free loans to finance the trip to the extent of half the air fair, \$100 daily expenses and some small

A minimum of 10 sales meetings with foreign customers is arranged for each participant in the program.

Additional space at the jail is expected to become available next year when a new jail at Five Points is scheduled to be completed. -The space committee report recommends that the state's attorney's office utilize the added space in the jail cells as it becomes available through remodeling.

shifts that would convert the first floor of the courthouse into a court complex, with an added mini-courtroom and judges' chambers. The juvenile room now on the fourth floor of the courthouse would be moved to either the first or second floor, according to the plan.

One unresolved issue is whether to move the Sanford branch of the County Library. The committee report made no recommendation on the issue, although the report does state that the current library building in

State Attorney's Office

County administrator Roger Neiswender said there are three options considered by his staff as viable answers to space demands of the library. They are, he said: 1) to purchase or rent another building in downtown

2) to build or lease a building outside downtown Sanford; and 3) to make space available in the first and second floor

of the Roumillat Building on First Street, The latter option, he said, is not the choice of his staff since it would provide only about 4,300 feet of space, less than half that recommednded by the space committee. "The key issue to any relocation of the library is accessibility and space. It needs to be in a safe comfortable environment," he said.

However, to move the library from its downtown location, Neiswender warned, could generate opposition from nearby residents, who now comprise the greatest number of patrons. Downtown merchants also could be expected to oppose a move of the library from the central business district, he said.

The commissioners ordered the space, conunittee to calculate the costs of the various departmental relocations recommended in the report, and a final decision on which offices and staff members will be moved should be made prior to the completion of budget hearings in July, Neiswender said. - GEOFFREY
