### Cosmic Champs Returning Home To Work

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—General F. Estimote Gordon Cooper and Charles Conrad headed home today for a reunion with their families, a "well done" by project officials and another week of reporting on their eight days in space.

The space heroes were scheduled to leave their spaceport retreat by plane at 9 p.m. (EDT) and arrive at Ellington Air Force Base near Houston three hours later.

Trudy Cooper and Jane Conrad were expected to be waiting at the airport with their children to see their husbands for the first time since before General F. blasted Aug. 21.

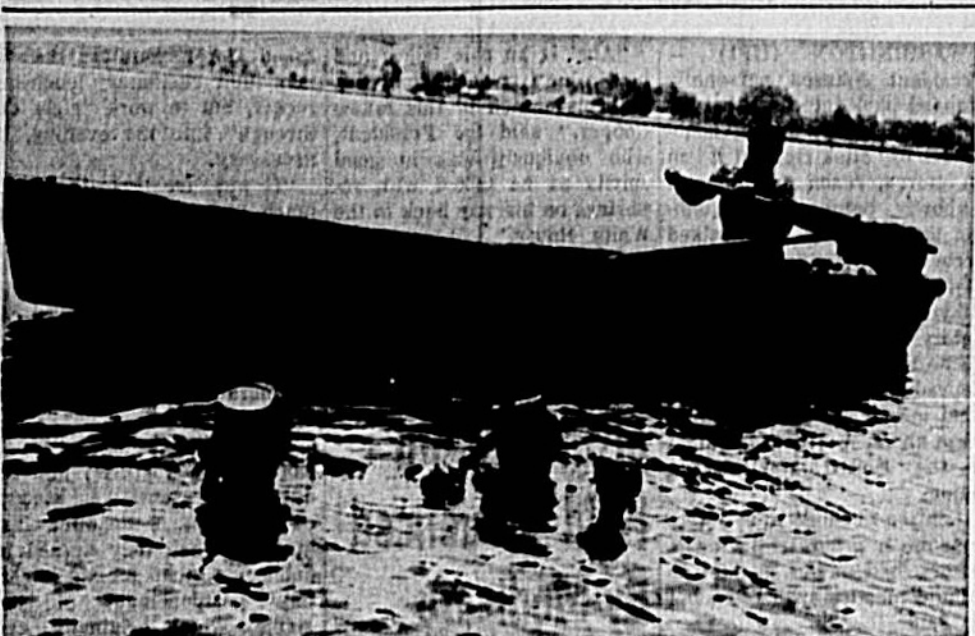
The space agency's rigid program allowed the astronauts a few minutes with their families at the air base and the nearby Manned Spacecraft Center, but then Cooper and Conrad were scheduled to resume work.

The space pilot planned to spend the next week at the building housing the Gemini control center. They will eat and sleep in the quarters used by Gemini flight controllers during the 130-hour voyage.

The astronauts Friday will brief project officials on their historic trip and then on Saturday they will discuss the mission with the astronauts assigned to the next two Gemini spaceflights.

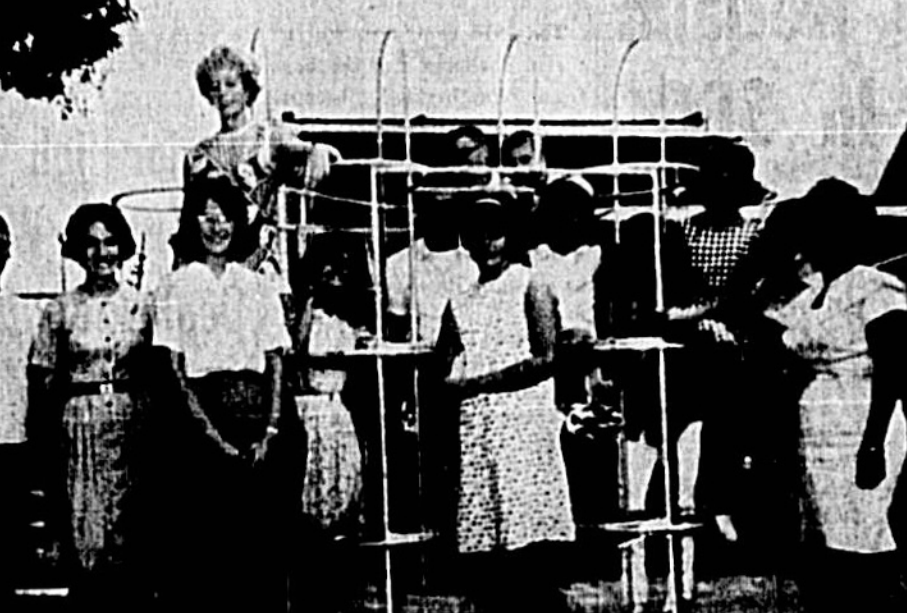

### Jailed 'Ghost' Dines Heartily

TITUSVILLE (UPI) — John H. Phelps is taking it easy and showing a good appetite during his stay in the Broward County jail. He feels and looks very much alive despite the story told by his fingerprints.

Phelps, a 30-year-old laborer, was arrested here on charges of aggravated assault. His fingerprints were mailed to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a routine check.

"Impossible," said the FBI. Phelps, they said, was killed in a gun battle with South Florida police six months ago.

The police department at Davis in Broward County confirms that John H. Phelps indeed drove his car through a police road block and died in a hall of bullets. "We've got him dead and buried," said a spokesman for the department.

But the sheriff's department here thinks it has the real John H. Phelps. Fingerprints filed there a month ago after a 1963 arrest in Broward prove he is the same man now locked up, local deputies say.

No one is certain, however, who the "other" Phelps is, or the physical descriptions of the "dead" and the "live" Phelps list the same date of birth.
