Visitors Out To Aton for 36-34 Loss Handed Them In Overtime Tilt

Preliminary Tilt Tonight; Varsity Game At 8 O'clock

George Trogen's London Lions will be the main attraction at the Seminole High School gymnasium tonight when they clash with the Celery Feds in a contest scheduled to get underway at eight o'clock.

Following the battle rescheduled at the meeting of the two teams at the Lions' court in Jacksonville Saturday night, Trogen's Lions are expected to be one to remember for some time to come. In this earlier contest the locals registered their victory over the Lions on their own court since Trogen's underdog team jumped off to a 17-3 lead in the first quarter. In the second quarter, the locals took the lead until the Lions, with a score of 13-11, took the lead in the third quarter when they scored the only basket of the contest.

Following a 20-24 edge in the fourth period, the Feds apparently did well on their way to victory as the London crew staged a counter-offensive that resulted in a 35-32, as the final whistle sounded.

In this evening's session, Trogen's London pass and dribble in under the hoop for an easy field goal. With a minute to go, the locals "froze" the ball until the Feds broke through the defensive of the Lions to score another field goal. Then, opening guard, broke down a London pass in midcourt, dribbling the floor for the only London basket of the extra period.

In Defense Of Age

Many an elderly person has read with feelings of regret the recentment, the words of President Roosevelt which have been called a reorganization of the Government. Little by little, new facts become blurred through the glasses, fitted as it were, for the needs of another generation. Older men assuming that the same is the same as it was in the past, cease to explore or inquire into the present of the future.

The President has said here with respect to the Senate Court judges might just as reasonably have been said about members of the House of Representatives, or the Senate, and yet Mr. Roosevelt has advanced no plan for limiting the membership of these extremely important bodies to men under seventy. Nor has he sought to restrict by law appointments in the various executive departments to younger men.

As a matter of fact, age has very little to do with a man's capacity to serve. History records some of the youngest men of great abilities, such as Alexander the Great who conquered most of the known world and died by the time he was forty-two; Napoleon Bonaparte, who was the most powerful ruler in Europe at the age of thirty, and who had defeated the British at the battle of Waterloo at the age of 52. And to bring our history up to date, Adolf Hitler of Germany, too, is a young man.

But there are plenty of illustrations to prove the achievements of elderly men. George C. Marshall, who guided the destinies of France through the World War was 73 years old at the First Battle of the Marne. On the other side was Von Hindenburg, leader of the Germans, who was 65 at the time of his retirement from the army. In the service of the United States, he was again elected president of the German republic when he was eighty-five.

Michel Angelo was doing some of his best painting after he was eighty. Lincoln, the greatest statesman, was called back into power by Queen Victoria at the age of 70 and for six years continued to guide the destinies of the British Empire throughout the period in which England and the United States were at war.

There are in Florida today a number of newspaper editors who have reached the age of seventy and beyond, and nobody would suggest that they, because their youth was spent in the "horse and buggy" age, should retire, and if anyone did it would be depriving the public of its most fair and able critics.

The Strike Is Settled

With the signing of an agreement between representatives of General Motors Corporation and the United Automobile Workers of America, the great "sit-down" strike which has paralyzed one of this country's greatest industries for forty-four days of bitter labor disputes, has come to a hundred thousand workers in idleness throughout this entire time, cost workers and stockholders alike \$2,000,000 a day for forty-four days, and allied business and industry in millions more, and resulted in many deaths and hard feelings between capital and labor, has at last been settled.

For its part General Motors has agreed to recognize Louis U. A. W. A. union as the representative for this industry, to bargain with its members on matters of wages and other conditions, and to consent to the dismissal of injunctions and damage suits against all "sit-down" strikers, the union, and union officials. At the same time it announces a five-cent an hour increase in all wages, without discrimination against union members, amounting altogether to some \$25,000,000 a year, and to the highest level in automobile history.

On its side the union has yielded with considerably less than its original goals. These, which included a 30-hour week, minimum wages, production "speed-up" and similar demands, remain to be negotiated, while Lewis' principal ambition, that his union be recognized with its limited membership as the exclusive bargaining agency for all General Motors employees, is denied. The "sit-down" strikers further agree to surrender the plants which have been illegally seized, and to cause no further trouble for six months.

The general public, most of whom had no particular interest in the outcome of this strike, but who were vitally affected by it, can rejoice that the strike is finally settled, with both sides claiming victory, and should breathe a sigh of relief that this compromise has been effected without serious bloodshed or loss of life. The situation was loaded with dynamite and a bloody battle might easily have occurred had either side been too quick on the draw.

Let us hope that the settlement of the automobile strike will set an end to labor difficulties for a while at least, and that threatened strikes in other automobile companies, as well as those in the steel and coal industries, will not be called. With a proper breathing spell in the relations between capital and labor, some system for compromise of labor disputes might be evolved which will prevent much of the extreme costliness and dangers of violence inherent in strikes of all kinds.

SANFORD TWENTY YEARS AGO

They were in the city on the occasion of the centennial of the city's founding. Initially the city was known as "Melbourne," but later being named for Gen. Henry Shelton Sanford, San-
ford, Fla., was founded in 1892. It is a suburban city that ships out hundreds of thousands of pineapples and other fruits. The city is the only one in the state that grows in the open field. Sanford's history is interesting and full of interest.

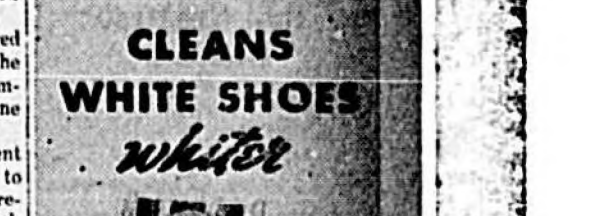

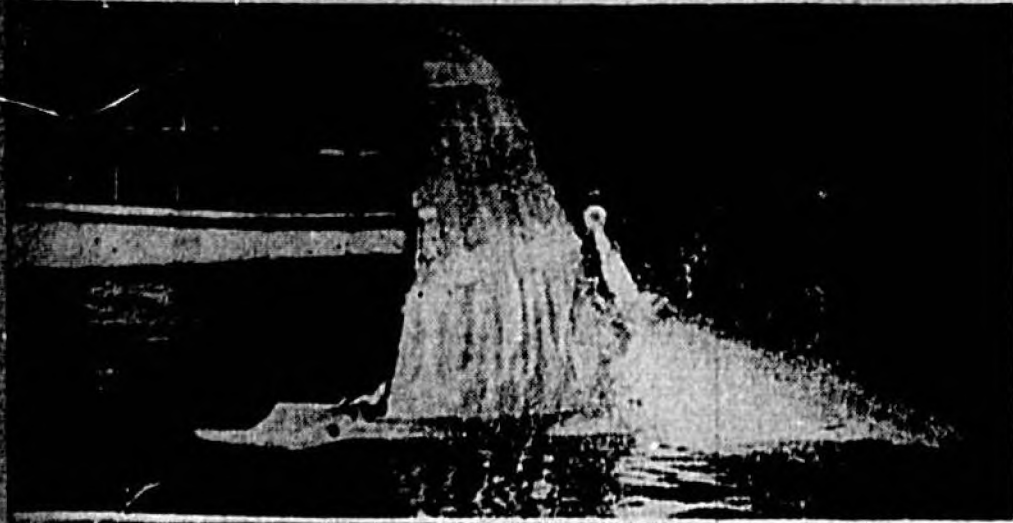

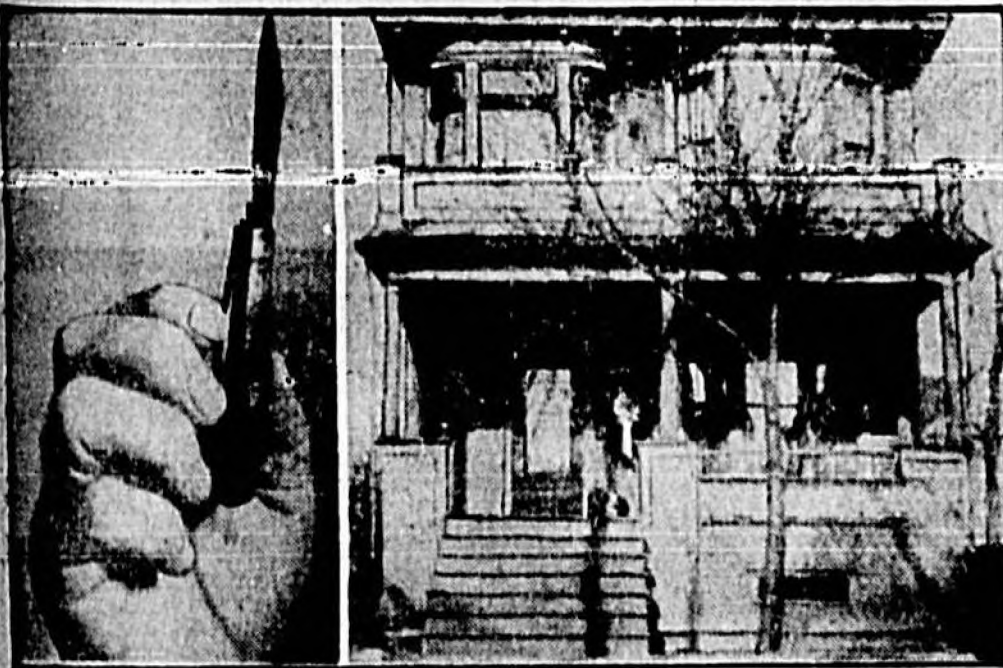

KNIFE IS CLUE IN DEGENERATE SLAYING OF GIRL



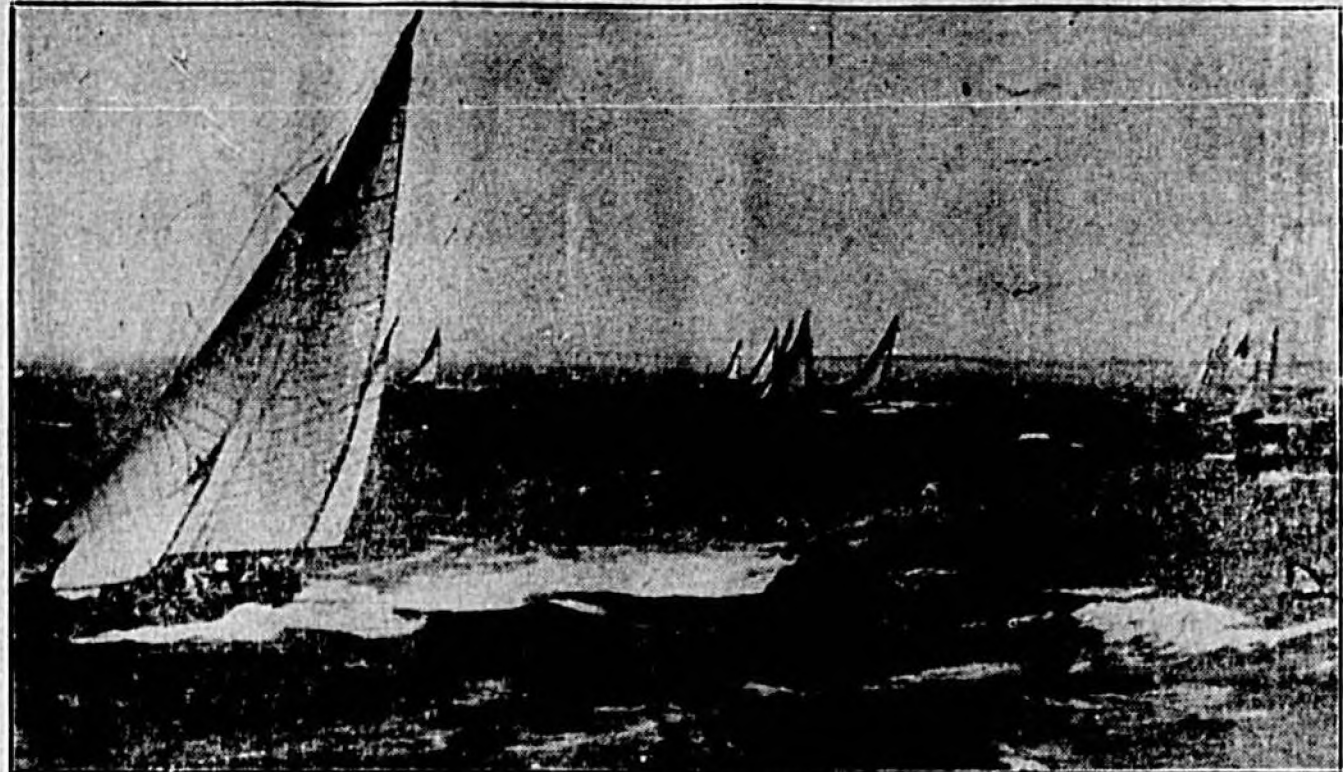

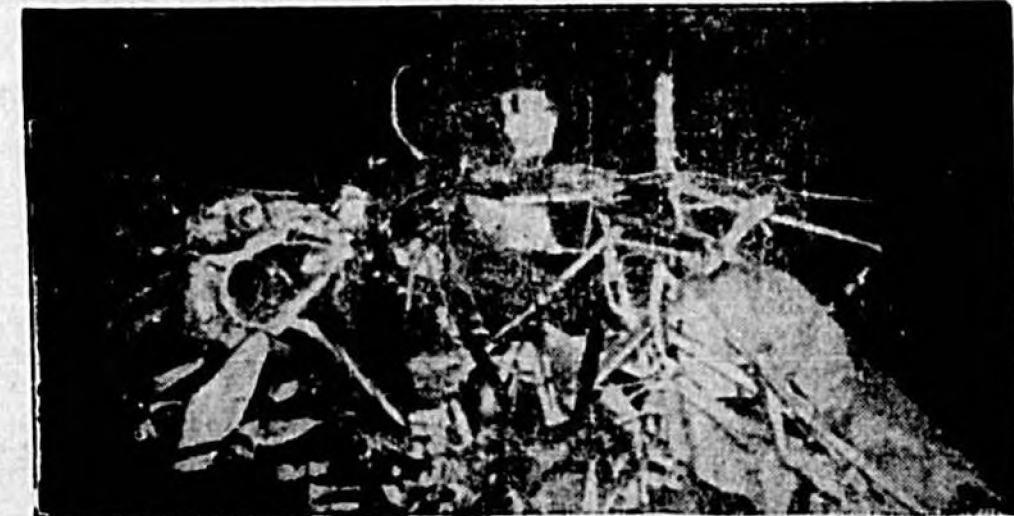

Railroads Refuse Freight Reduction For Citrus Fruit

Transportation Officials Announce Expense Caused By Flood One Reason Blow Is Struck To State Crops Fifty Percent Slash Asked By Industry To Market Crops

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—(AP)—The Association of American Railroads today denied the Florida citrus industry's plea for emergency reduction in the grapefruit freight rates. Officials here said the decision was reached at a meeting of eastern, western and southern railroad traffic executives in Chicago. A memorandum to the industry cited a long list of reasons for refusing the petition, including the railroads' heavy emergency expenditures caused by the Mississippi and Ohio Valley floods. The citrus industry and Florida State officials, declaring an emergency existed, asked a temporary reduction of 50 percent in grapefruit freight rates. They said unless the relief was granted much of the bumper crop would rot on trees.

WPA Will Finish 2 Road Projects Within Fortnight

WPA operations on the Sanford Avenue and Paola Road projects are slated for completion next week, W. B. Earle, work director and engineer for this district, announced today. Appraisals for surfacing the thoroughfares is due to arrive Monday, he said. If weather conditions do not interfere, it will be spread and rolled before Friday. Mr. Earle said road improvement at the State Farmers' Market is progressing rapidly, reporting that nine carloads of rock—totaling 500 tons—are to be used. Only minor "clean-up and touch-up" work remains on the Orlando Park, the director said, indicating that it should be completed within 10 days. Inclement weather has delayed operations on the Paola Road project. Mr. Earle reported the Seminole County WPA employed 172 persons this week, 71 of which were women.
