

### Connie Mack Is Looking Great But Team Isn't

#### Their Pitching Isn't Good, Catching Fair, Batting Poor

AP Features Sports Editor WILMINGTON, Del. — Connie Mack, Philadelphia Athletics manager, is looking fine this spring, and it's too bad you can't say the same about his ball club.

The tall straight tutor of the Philadelphia Athletics doesn't appear to be past 80, an old man starting his 14th season in the American league. His hair is snow white, yes, but you'd take him to be maybe 15 years younger. He has good color, and there's a bright twinkle in the keen blue eyes that sit well back in his face.

Connie Mack is a good conversationalist and, as he sits in the dugout at the A's practice field here, he keeps up a running stream of talk with the players and baseball writers, remembering something that happened for a year, and then quickly jumping 30 years back to tell about a spring training trip through Texas, or a funny anecdote about the unpropitious left-hander Rube Waddell.

Mr. Mack sits on a pillow on the rough board bench of the dugout. You glance at his straight back and notice your own curved posture and admire the old gentleman's erect carriage. Mr. Mack, that's what everyone calls him. Connie seems a little flippant for a man with Mr. Mack's age and quiet dignity and extreme courtesy.

He likes a joke, even if it's on him. One of the writers in the dugout was saying that Roberto Estalella, the Cuban outfielder obtained from Washington, had never played on a first division team. Roberto says he's always in the "second or third division."

Mr. Mack chuckled quietly and remarked: "Well, he's come to the right place to keep that record intact."

Mr. Mack seldom moves from his dugout seat but he keeps a close watch on the field. He'll lean forward at the crack of a bat to see how far one of his players blasted one. Or he'll motion to Earl, his son, to do this or that. Earl is in uniform and actually directs the team's drills.

The long, lean manager is a much more interesting subject than his ball club, which seems doomed for another eighth place finish. In fact, the war probably will remove Mack's lingering hopes for another pennant winner before he leaves baseball. It would take the better part of another decade to build the A's into a pennant contender.

The A's have a young chap, Irving Hall from Wilmington, Pa., at shortstop, Pete Suder, last year's shortstop, is at second. Dick Siebert, perhaps the club's best performer, is at first and Eddie Mayo at third. Mayo had previous unsuccessful trials with the Giants and Braves.

Bob Johnson, the A's best hitter and outfielder for the last decade, has been traded to Washington for infielder Jimmy Fofahl and outfielder Estalella. The Cuban, an inconsistent batter who raps a long ball when he connects, probably will handle one outfield spot. There are five other flycatchers—Jo Jo White, back to the majors from Seattle; John Weis, up from Buffalo; Elmer Valo, who played regularly a year ago; James Tyack from Little Rock; and Felix Mackiewicz from Wilmington.

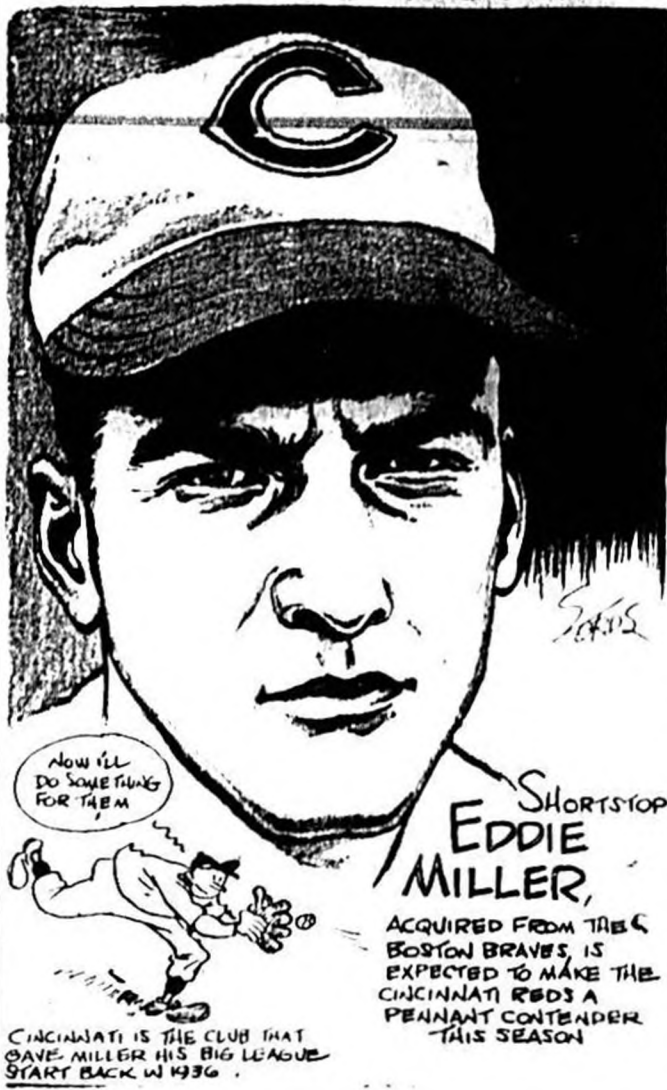

No one knows what help may come from the promising group of new twirlers. These include Jesse Flores, from Los Angeles; John Burrows, a Wilmington lefty; Don Black, from Petersburg, Va., and Sam Lowry and Talmadge Abernathy from Wilmington.

Frankly, the A's may be just pushovers for the other American league clubs. It's a tough break for a grand old man like Connie.

### DFC Award Is Presented To Lieut. Coley

The permanent citation of the Distinguished Flying Cross has been awarded Lieut. Vernon J. Coley, Jr., USN, in recognition of heroism and extraordinary achievement during a raid on enemy Japanese shipping the night of Oct. 22, 1942.

Signed by Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox, the citation and the Distinguished Flying Cross were presented Lieut. Coley by Commander F. M. Hughes following inspection of the station personnel March 29.

Lieut. Coley was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross "For heroism and extraordinary achievement as Commander of a Patrol Plane during a raid on enemy Japanese shipping on the night of Oct. 22, 1942. By skillful planning and bold execution, Lieut. Coley launched an assembly of long-range torpedoes and bombs, and secured a direct hit on an enemy battleship and a heavy cruiser, and a large Japanese transport. His cool courage and conscientious devotion to duty maintained under order regard of personal safety were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Navy."

### Yanks And Cards Are Selected As Pennant Winners

#### But Dodgers And Indians Given Chance To Steal The Show

By DILLON GRAHAM AP Features Sports Editor NEW YORK — With the draft winds blowing furiously this spring, it's really a stab in the dark to try to pick the major league baseball pennant winners.

Nothing won't decide the races this year. Neither will pitching or fielding finesse. The draft boards will.

The majors have already been hard hit by Army and Navy call, and many more players will drop the khaki or the blue before fall. Every team has some key men who are IA now and may be beckoned anytime. The two teams that best weather these draft commings will win the championships.

On the basis of all-round strength as the 1943 season opens, your correspondent, the only professional sports writer to visit all 16 major league training camps, likes the Yankees and the Cardinals.

The Yanks look like a sure thing in the American league but the Cardinals might be tripped in the National by the Dodgers. (Cincinnati) may develop into a threat, too.

As I see it, this is the way the teams shape up: American League — Yankees, Indians, Red Sox, Tigers, Browns, Senators, White Sox, Athletics. National League — Cardinals, Dodgers, Reds, Cubs, Giants, Pirates, Braves, Phils.

Both the Dodgers and the Cardinals have excellent pitching. Brooklyn seems to have an edge in power but St. Louis has a big margin in speed. There's not much gallop in the Brooklyn roster. The older Brooklyn players may survive the draft longer than St. Louis' youngsters and this might swing the pennant to Flatbush.

The Dodgers will miss Reiser and Reese. Reiser and Reese while the Cardinals will find the going more difficult without Slaughter and Moore and Beasley. Service calls won't do much damage at Cincinnati. The Reds still have crack pitching, with Bucky Walters, Johnny Vander Meer, Ray Starr and Elmer Riddle. Eddie Sawyer, shortstop will tighten the infield, but Manager Bill McKechnie is wondering where he's going to get power.

The Cubs may nose out the Giants for a first division berth. Paul Derringer should aid the hurling corps which with Claude Passeau, Bill Lee, Lon Warneke and several good recruits, stacks up as better than the Giants' group topped by Cliff Melton, Cagie Ebbell and Bill Lohman. Lou Novikoff, who found the range late last year, may develop into one of the loop's better hitters.

Hans Becker and Eddie Sanky from Milwaukee give the Cubs a better infield. The Giants could surprise but you can't expect too much of a club that lost Johnny Mize, Willard Marshall, Babe Young, Hank Danning, Harold Schumacher and Bob Carpenter. Experience may help Pirates' outfielders, Huck Geary may strengthen the infield and the pitching may show improvement, even though Ken Henzel's arm was lost, but I can't see the Pirates finishing in front of the other five.

The Yankees have better pitching but there's little other improvement. On the other hand, Casey Stengel has lost Max West, Nanny Pappas and batting champion Ernie Lombardi. He'll still have enough to keep the Phils in the cellar despite favorable efforts of new owner Bill Cox to climb out.

The Yankees have entirely too much pitching talent to be headed. Furthermore, the team has two of the league's best distance hitters in Charley Keller and Joe Gordon. Bill Johnson and George Stinewiss, if the army doesn't nab him, should team up well with Gordon and Keller. The infield Joe DiMaggio will be missed, definitely, but Ray Weatherly is not a sorry substitute.

The Red Sox, who lost a complete outfield, a star shortstop, and two good pitchers, probably won't be able to stand the runner-up race against Cleveland.

The Sox do have fine pitching, almost as good as New York's, but Joe Cronin's gang hasn't the depth of the Yankees. The Sox are short on young Red Sox players, shortstop Johnny Pesky, Don DiMaggio and Lou Piniella. For outfielders Cronin has Joe Judge, Al Simmons and...

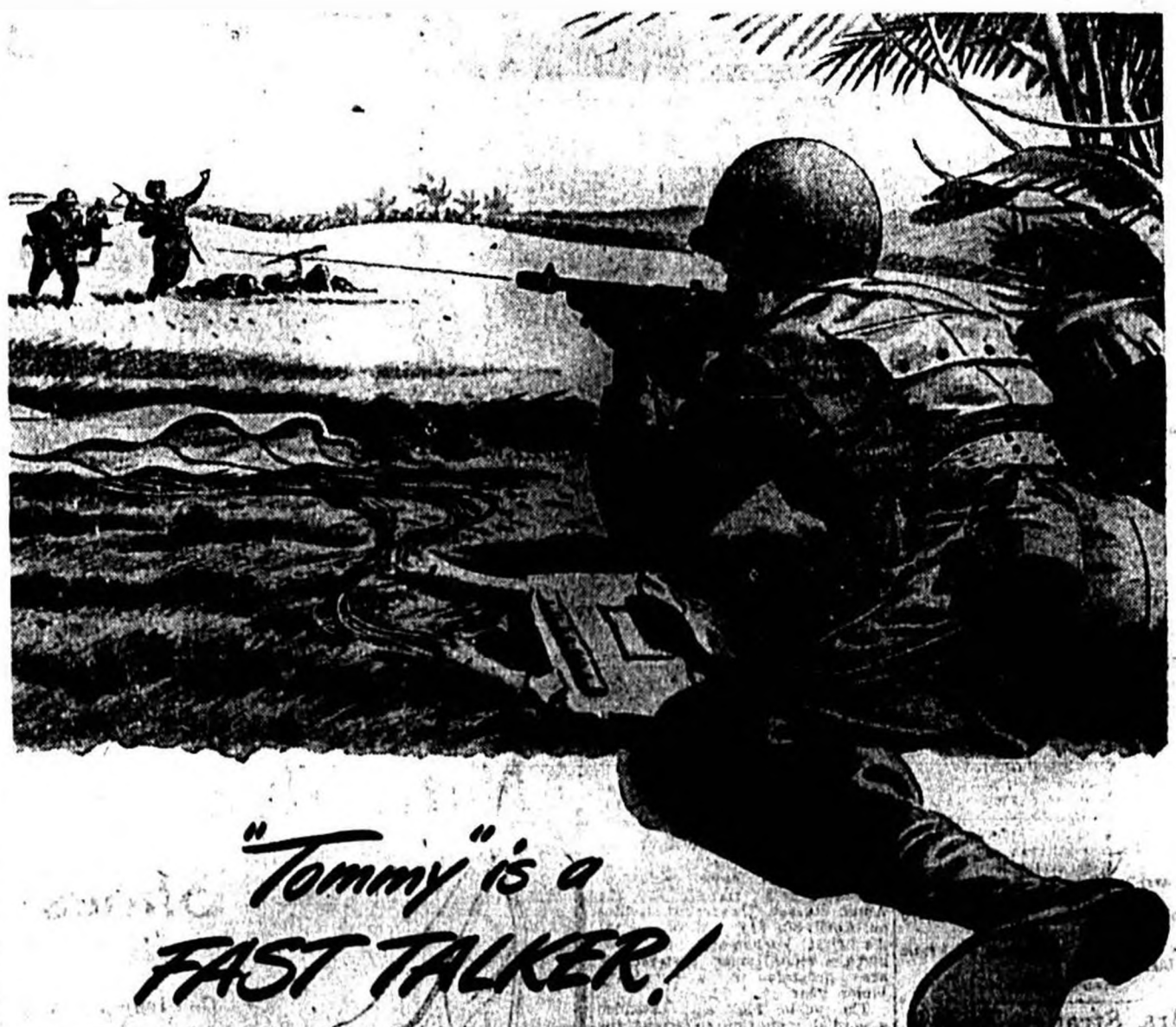

More Blind Persons Are Put To Work

TAMPA, Apr. 14.—(FNS)—More blind persons have been put to work in Florida during the

past year as a result of the efforts of the Florida Council for the Blind, than during the entire previous history of the State. The semi-annual report of the Council shows that 15 vending stands in Federal and State buildings are being operated by blind persons. 352 aid recipients were employed and classified for medical treatment. 341 of 501 cases referred for home teaching services have received attention by the council. 2,578 talking books have been distributed by the Library of Congress to the 324 blind persons using talking book

machines. 12 newly blinded persons were called to the attention of the council and adjustment services were given to 11. In cooperation with the State Defense Council, principal defense regulations were compiled and distributed in print and Braille to more than 3,000 blind in Florida. The report points out that Florida has more than 400 blind persons needing medical attention, 500 need competent employment guidance, and 3,000 need social adjustment services. A staggering unmet need for medical services for the restoration of sight is indicated by a recent survey made by the council. It hopes to broaden its sight conservation program to meet this need. In order to develop this program and to carry out its other activities, it is requesting a greatly increased appropriation by the Legislature.
