Thousands of dollars have been spent on this pool and garden, more than \$500 for plants and bulbs alone. The development there is nearly finished and I must leave for Nature to do her work.

The great main entrance and the big fountain just inside, both of which are nearing completion, and the beautiful Spanish Summer House shown in a recent issue of The Herald, are the main features of the development and indicate what is coming there. Revona Park, occupying a full square in the southeastern part of Highland Park, is to be the social and recreational center, with club house, courts for tennis, croquet and bowling on the green, and a concrete swimming pool and a wading pool and sand-lot playground for the kiddies. It is already partly covered with a delightful grove of oaks and pines and palms. And along all the drives the planting will be under the direction of one mind, with all its artistic effects worked out in harmony and beauty.

MORE FIGHTS ON TAX BILL PENDING IN UPPER HOUSE

Opposition In Both Ranks Sound Against Repeal Of Inheritance Tax And Public Action Provision

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Taking the vital income tax schedules, the Senate faced new prospects today in considering the tax reduction bill with fights pending against repeal of the inheritance tax and of the provision allowing public action on income tax payments.

Republican and Democratic members of the Finance Committee, who yesterday successfully defended their proposal to cut the maximum surtax rate from 40 to 20 per cent with corresponding cuts in the other rates of the graduated surtax scale, will face opposition within both ranks.

MARKETS

WALL STREET OPENING

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Heavy buying of the oil shares featured the initial upward movement of stock prices today. Mergers negotiations, favored dividend developments and advancing prices for crude and refined products promoted a broad demand for these issues, which embraced Pacific Oil, Canada Petroleum, Sugar and the Standard Oil of New Jersey and California.

The rise continued at a terrific pace in some high priced shares, United Fruit jumping 20 points to 280. Urgent buying of other investment shares continued with gains of three points or more becoming quite numerous.

Raising of the rates for call money to 4 1/2 per cent after renewals had been established at 4 per cent was without immediate effect on the market.

Standard Milling, American Sugar, United Fruit and other food stocks also were in demand, rising one to three and half points.

General Motors and Mack Trucks followed close behind while Nash Motors broke away with a sensational jump of 55 points to a new peak at 640 on a few sales.

Foreign exchanges were steady with demand sterling opening slightly higher at \$1.47-16.

GALES FOLLOWED BY BIG SNOW IN NORTH AND EAST

Two barges sink off the Jersey Coast with probable loss of eight lives and shipping scurried to shelter from all points along the coast before heavy seas and danger from drifting streets. Snow was general throughout Maine and the general storm area around the west to Great Lakes. One death has been reported in New York State because of the storm.

8,900 Men at Work In N. Y.—The short crop of jute in India resulted in increasing the price at Calcutta from \$215 a ton for the first degree on September 1, to \$310 by December 1. A month later it was down to \$285 a ton.

The jute industry of India is somewhat similar to cotton production in the southern part of the United States. It is grown largely by small native farmers in the Bengal district, the only place which has produced large quantities of jute of good quality. There are under cultivation between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000 acres.

Prices Of Commodity Jumps 50 Per Cent In Calcutta When Fields Of Bengal Fail To Produce Normal Amount—The shortage will affect every home to a small extent. The sack in which sugar are shipped are made of the better grades of burlap and then there are carpets, the Bengal district, the only place from good grades of burlap, and linoleum in which burlap is used as a base.

Burlap has become a standard wrapper for many products that do not need the protection of wooden boxes, meats from Australia and wheat from the Argentine are exported in that material. The American potato farmer also uses gunnybags.

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Flour relief work was carried on for the victims of yesterday's twister, which killed one boy, injured a score of persons and did property damage of nearly \$1,000,000. A transatlantic ship was reported in distress. A German steamer reported at Halifax that she was on the way to the freighter's assistance.

DECLINE IN RED LITERATURE IS NOTED IN WEST

Former Years Great Field for Hobbes' And Radicals was Swamped With The Works of Bolshevik Writers

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 4. (AP)—The demand for radical literature is decreasing, reports from various sources indicate. That the two bear relationship to each other seems to be proved by records of police stations and larger book dealers of Seattle, Los Angeles, Portland and San Francisco. From these it is manifest that as the ranks of migratory travelers are thinned the market for "red reading" falls off in ratio.

Observers note a similar fading in the popularity of radical books. The attribute to several possible reaction from the war and waning interest in pre-war unconventional political theories.

In the larger cities the casual or "hobo" are to be found in "flop" houses and around small employment agencies. The type known as "pan-handlers" work the streets or principal streets supplying to the more generous appearing citizens for the price of a meal or bed. 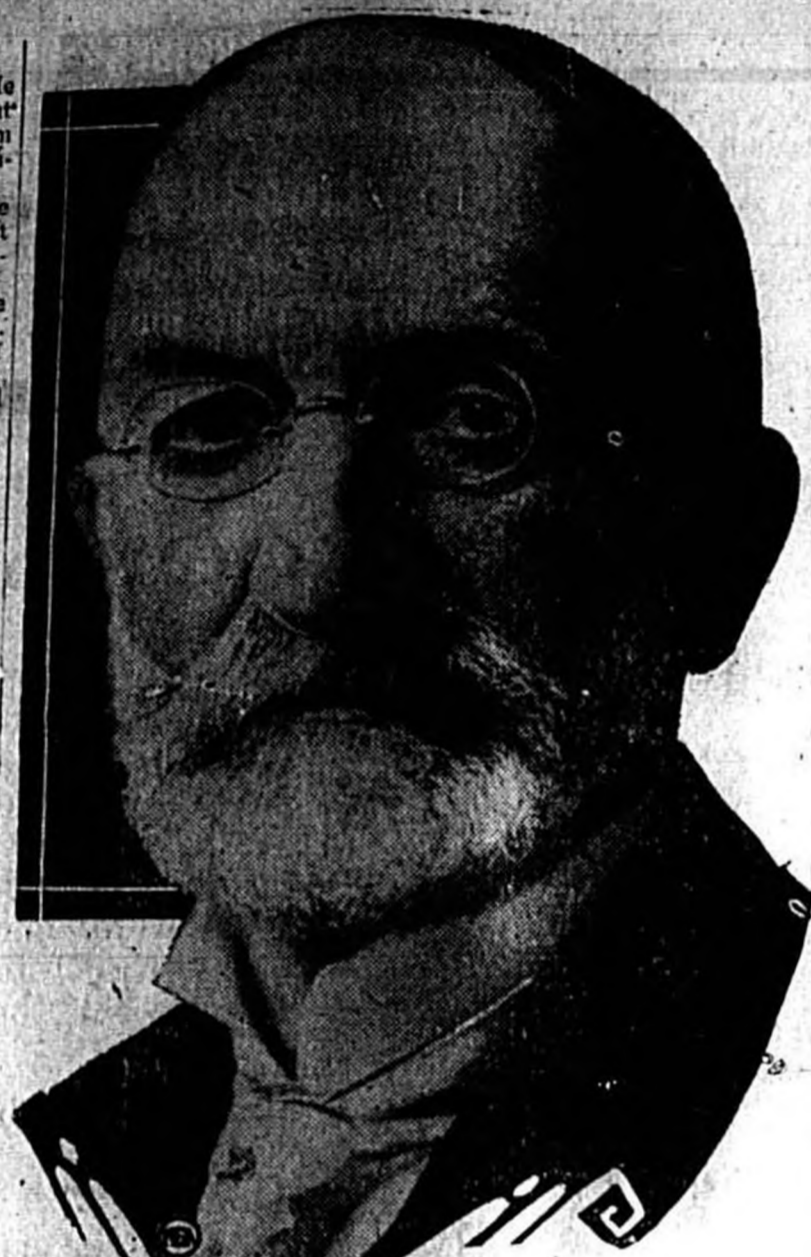

Even some of the lawmakers who put the Volstead act on the books slip occasionally. It's that way with the groundhog legislation.

In theory, the groundhog is a national institution. In practice, he is a four-flusher. He can't be everywhere at the same time, and while it is raining here there is sunshine yonder at the noon hour. Tampa had 100 percent of sunshine exactly at noon when the varmint is supposed to have emerged from the earth. And 100 percent of sunshine yesterday was more to be enjoyed than the groundhog is to be feared in 40 days.

Nobody believes in him down here. Take the record at Tampa for the last 40 years. Sunshine and more sunshine. The groundhog may be the cat's pajamas in Georgia, as they say at Harvard; he may be the cat's pajamas in Georgia. But in Florida he has no standing, no following, no bank balance, no nothing. So why worry?

Uncle Sam's dope shows an average of only 10 days in a year without sunshine in Tampa. Already, there have been nine of those dreary days. Just one more from now to the end of the year!

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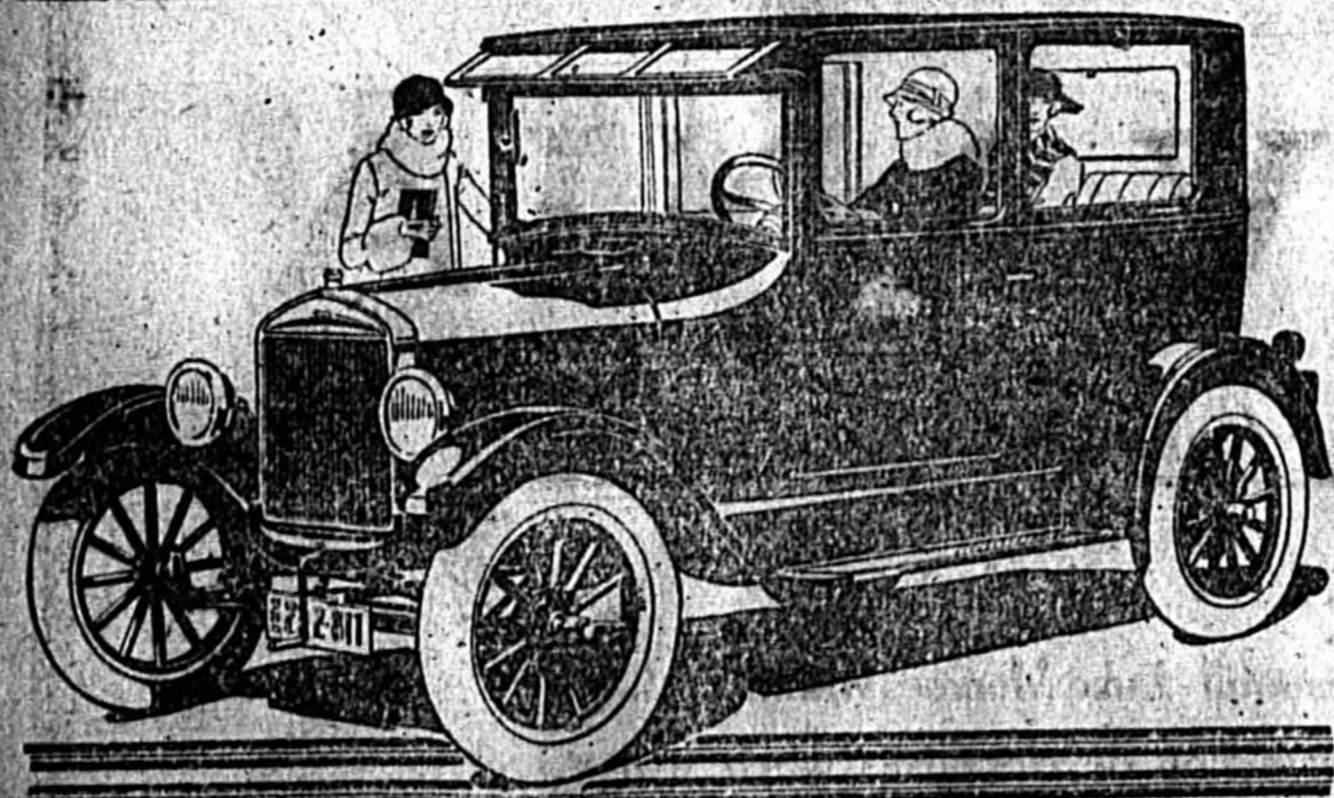

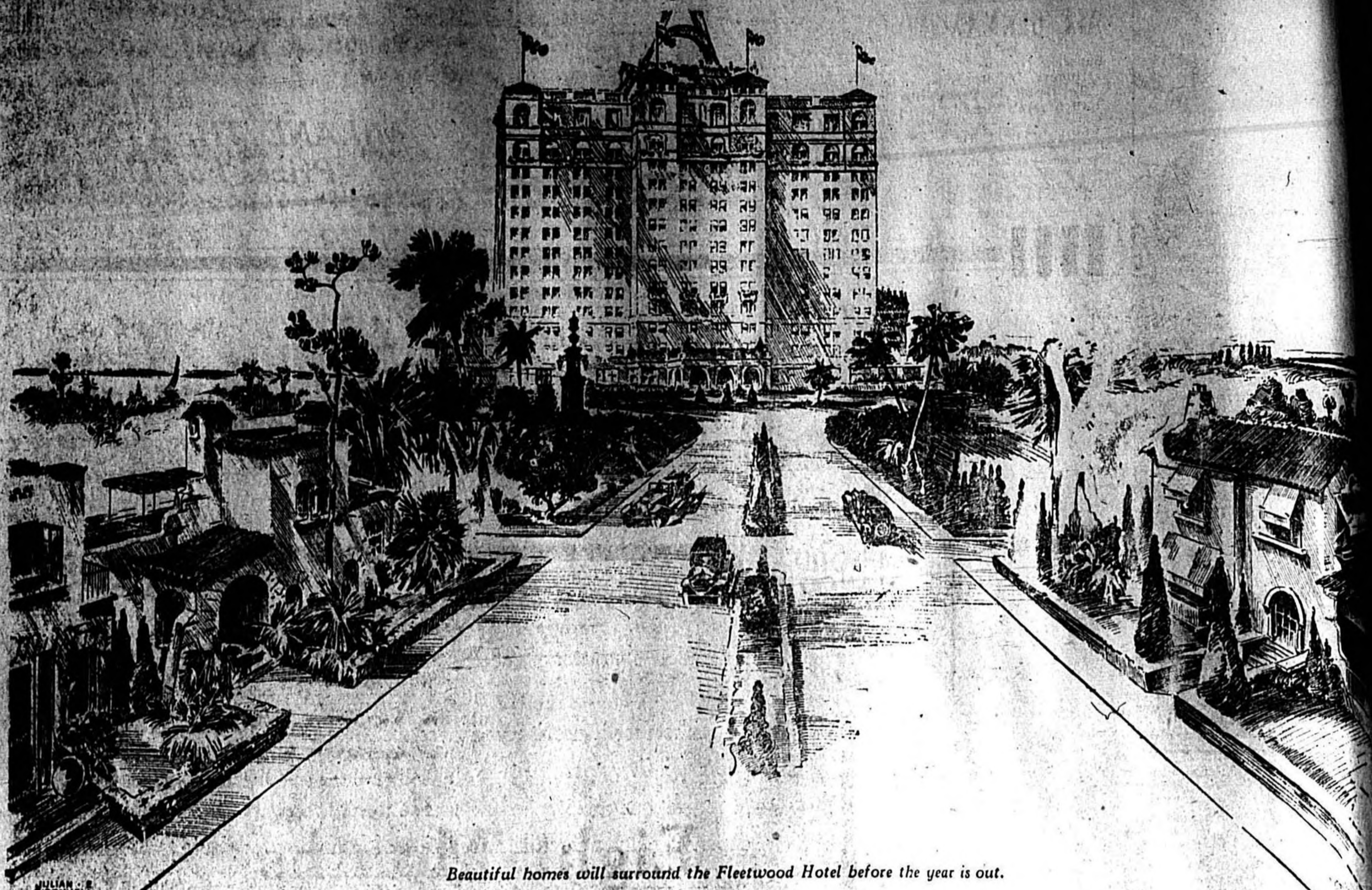

He learned this immediately after he shouldered the missionary burden carried for a score of years by Rev. A. P. MacDonald, the Sea Coast Mission's founder. When Rev. MacDonald first began visiting the fisher folk on the Maine islands life's cycle for them was but to be born, to wring from the sea a meagre existence for shorted years and then to die. Better Living. The practical religion of the Sea Coast Mission and its evangel has accounted for better food, better shelter, better sanitation, and a measure of education, as well as for a growing acceptance of the Old Story. The "Sunbeam" is due much of the credit for this. For 12 years the "Sunbeam" chugged back and forth among the islands with the 45 miles, some of his assistants, and often one or more sick or injured parishioners as passengers. The "Sunbeam" is getting old and decrepit now. She is a bit unsteady in a storm. In the spring, Rev. Gephill hopes to have a new boat built. Reaching the present limits of his boat is difficult enough, and beyond those limits there still are small settlements. "And the denomination of the mission?" I asked. "We promise so far as in us lies to extend the Christian life and to try to lead others to do the same," it reads. "The pledge which it contains is contained. There is no quibbling over creed but accuracy of ritual in the religion of this farthing of offshore parishes. There's just human helpfulness.

TEACHER SEES FRENCH FARMS ALL GERMANIZED

Superior Methods Of Land Hungry Teutons Expected To Result In Penetration Of France's Rural Districts

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 4.—(AP)—France eventually must become Germanized in fact, if not in theory, in the opinion of Dr. R. H. True, professor of botany, University of Pennsylvania.

This conclusion is based upon a study of the history of agriculture and populations from the earliest records to the present day, a subject of which he has made a special study. "I can't see what is going to save France from German agricultural penetration," Dr. True said. "History, as I interpret it, revolves about the problem of food supply, and that is primarily a land question. Politics is the situation through which land affects nations through their rulers. The Germans always have been active populations. From the earliest times they have been boiling over their boundaries. Julius Caesar taught them raiding the Gauls. Not many years ago the German tribes again raided the Gauls through Belgium. The population push is just as great in Germany today as it was before the war. That is why the Germans are making so much fuss about their colonies. France, with a stable population, Dr. True asserted, faced by land hungry Germany possessing a highly developed knowledge of modern agricultural methods, is bound to yield part of her territory. "Italy, too, is faced with the need for more farming land," he added. "That is what is the trouble with Mussolini." "Japan, also, is up against food difficulties. Rich control does not operate in Japan and her population is picking up. What can the Japanese do but hunt unoccupied lands or starve."
