Tax Probe Targeted Many,

Senate Panel Chairman Says

WASHINGTON (AP) - Church groups and movie stars, senators and rock singers, civil rights leaders and the mayor of New York City were all targets of an IRS tax probe originally aimed at political extremists, the chairman of the Senate intelligence committee says. In addition, IRS Commissioner Donald Alexander testified Thursday that last year alone IRS agents turned over 29,520 tax returns on 8,210 taxpayers to a dozen other

federal agencies for one reason or another. Alexander said that until he stopped it last year, a computer system had been fed information on 465,442

persons, including Alexander himself. The IRS commissioner also agreed with Chairman Frank Church, D-Idaho, that the taxcollecting agency had no business complying with a 1967 CIA request to audit the tax returns of Ramparts magazine as a means of preventing or blunting its forthcoming expose about the National Student Association operated overseas as a CIA

"There now is no satisfactory transportation system serving the area from Kansas City to Jacksonville," Blaney said. "This area is now serviced and criss-crossed by an assortment of transportation modes that function

SLA Members Arraigned

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Two Symbionese Liberation Army members, indicted with newspaper heiress Patricia Hearst on 11 counts stemming from a May 1974 crime spree involving kidnaping and robbery, face arraignment today.

The most serious of the counts in the Los Angeles Counly Grand Jury indictment returned Thursday against Miss Hearst and William and Emily Harris carries a naximum life sentence. Trial for the Harrises could begin within 60 days. Miss

Hearst is in the San Mateo County Jail near San Francisco awaiting trial on federal bank robbery charges and could not be arraigned today.

Holloway, chief of naval operations, found the veteran skipper guilty of failing to exercise proper judgment, violating regulations and "permitting an action which could have distracted the attention of those responsible

FBI Probes Hoffa Lead

DETROIT (AP) - Sources have confirmed that FBI agents are investigating whether the body of ex-Teamsters president James R. Hoffa was stuffed in a trash compactor and hauled away by a Mafiaorganized

The trash compactor is at the Raleigh House restaurant, less than five miles from the parking lot of another restaurant where Hoffa was last seen July 30. The firm that picks up the trash every Friday at the Raleigh House in Southfield just north of Detroit is Central Sanitation Services Inc. of Hamtramck, Incorporated last year by Raffaele "Jimmy Q" Quasarano and Dominic Corrado, reputed Detroit Mafia figures.

Knight-Ridder Newspapers reported Thursday that tax records show the IRS notified Rebozo in December that he underpaid his 1970 taxes by \$49,029 and his 1971 taxes by

The claims primarily involve some of the business transactions of the Key Piscayne banker, who was not available for comment.

Liberal Plan Offered

WASHINGTON (AP) - In an effort to break the impasse over a national energy policy, Senate liberals are proposing to raise natural gas prices in exchange for a rollback of oil prices. The Senate began debating the unusual proposal Thursday after Republicans and Democrats from energy-producing states won a vote indicating they may have the muscle to force gradual removal of all federal controls from natural

The Ford administration i pressing for an end to controls that have held down the price of oil and natural gas. The majority of Democrats want to retain - and in some cases ex-

Market Freedom **Needed On Farm**

When AFL-CIO President George Meany insisted that the government put some kind of brake on sale of American grain to the Russians, we wonder if he had in mind what is developing from our special trade mission to Moscow.

The negotiations are heading toward what looks suspiciously like a five-year-plan for American farmers. Would Mr. Meany buy that as a protection for American consumers against higher food prices?

Those were not farmers or grain dealers who went to Moscow, but officials of the U.S. government. It is Charles Robinson, the undersecretary of state for economic affairs, who is negotiating a "firm commitment" between the U.S. and Soviet governments fixing how much grain American farmers will grow for the Russians over the next five years.

It is obvious that this government-togovernment bargaining on commodities is leading the American farmer back into that thicket of acreage allotments and federal intervention in the grain market from which he emerged just a few years ago. With him goes the consumer and taxpayer, only lately relieved of picking up the tab for government management of farm production.

Since the 1972 fiasco in which massive Russian grain purchases triggered sharp increases in our food prices, the federal government has required immediate notification from grain dealers when overseas orders are received. This monitoring cartel countries, which for a time funneled system alerted the administration to the new round of Russian purchases and led to the halt of shipments until the size of our 1975 harvest can be estimated more accurately. With its power to grant export licenses, the government can assure that shipments abroad do not cause shortages to develop in domestic supplies.

The fact that this system is now working leads to the question of why our government needs to make any commitments on behalf of the American farmer, or to guarantee to any foreign government that it can obtain stated quantities of a commodity from American markets

The Russians should be able to see that they will encounter resistance if they try to buy grain from U.S. dealers in greater quantities than U.S. surpluses can provide. They can ease their recurring food problems by increasing their grain storage capacity to provide for shortfalls in their harvests. As for the severity of those shortfalls, the failure of their collectivization schemes, economic planning and quota systems to realize the full potential of agricultural production in their vast country is not our problem.

Our problem is to keep American farmers producing as much as they can. A free market is all that it takes. The government's responsibility is to negotiate international trade agreements that open the widest possible market for our surplus commodities. A long-term commitment by our government to provide grain to the Russians, and the need for government intervention in agriculture and the marketplace to meet such a commitment, would not be in the best interests of the American people.
