# Cities, Roads Under Water; Bridge Lost

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI) -The swollen Mississippi River rampaged through makeshift dikes and sandbagged levees today and rose toward a record crest.

The vast Mississippi created flood conditions all the way to Missouri, where Gov. Warren H. Hearns declared a state of emergency. Water flowed down the main street of Hannibal.

But the flood was worst today in the twin cities of Minnesota.

# **A Better Generation**

Next to dear dad, the person most concerned with the antics of college students is certainly a college president.

If the younger generation is going to the dogs, he is one of the first to hear the barking. If, miraculously, it is a better generation than the one before it, the college president is one of the first to see evidence of it.

One of those who thinks it is very much the latter is Vernon R. Alden, president of Ohio University in Athens, Ohio, who detects an increasing maturity in the nation's students.

"Today's students," he says, "regard college not as a haven from responsibility but as a training ground for citizenship. They see themselves as the conscience of the nation; they are supplying the energy for needed social change."

Attempts by a college or univers-ity to curb this "dialogue" with society, Alden says, sets the stage for an explosive reaction-such as the student protests at the University of California last year.

Alden, who has taken a hand in changing society himself by helping to plan the Job Corps part of the government's antipoverty program, thinks universities are often unwilling to treat today's earlier-maturing young people as adults.

"As I look at today's students," says Alden, "I am deeply moved by their maturity. It is fortunate that they are accepting responsibility as such an early age, for already the torch of leadership is being passed to them."
