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Happy New Year!

As we come to the end of 1940, it seems to us that in spite of many trying times and in spite of all the strife and unrest throughout the world, this year has marked a turning point in the course of Sanford's affairs. We believe that for the majority of our people it has been the best year for nearly a decade and one which has seen the development of certain plans which promise better things for the future.

There has been a noticeable improvement in the construction business. A number of nice new homes have been built; a good many have been renovated or repaired. There has been a decided improvement in the appearance of the town as a result of the beautification program. A number of Sanford's leading tourist attractions have been vastly improved; notably, the zoo and the golf course.

And so as we enter the year of 1941, which some have described as a dose of medicine which must be taken, we cannot bring ourselves to feel pessimistic about it. There is no doubt that the world is going through violent upheavals which are bound to get worse before they get any better. We doubt if the New Year will close without even greater disasters than the last one saw. And yet it will have its compensations.

We are glad to see Sanford taking a more active interest in the tourist business. This is something which has built every Florida city which has shown any substantial growth during the past generation. Tourist travel is something which is destined to become greater as roads are further improved and elderly people retire on pensions at an earlier age. Once they learn they can live in Sanford at substantially less expense than in other resorts they will come here in ever increasing numbers.

While it has been said that the war will not benefit farmers as a whole, we cannot see it any other way than that at least for the time being it will benefit our farmers. We have never exported any part of the celery crop abroad. We have depended entirely upon domestic markets for our consumers. Today these consumers are going back to work by the hundreds of thousands at wages which put them in a far better position to buy such luxury products as celery than ever before.

We confidently predict that the long-fought-for long-awaited hospital will be built during 1941. It has the approval of the WPA authorities. It has the approval of the County Commission. It long ago received the approval of the people when they voted overwhelmingly in favor of a bond issue for its construction. There is no reason for any further delay and we don't believe there will be any.

The construction of this hospital and the expenditure in our city of over one hundred thousand dollars, all of which will be out-of-town money, will stimulate materially our commercial life. And when the hospital is finished, it will provide sorely needed facilities to take care of our sick and will be one further inducement for tourists and new residents to settle here where they will be able to have modern hospital care whenever they are sick.

We believe that 1941 will see the beginning of an important army air field, or perhaps an auxiliary base, in this vicinity. This defense program is just beginning. So far Sanford has received little attention from army or navy officials, but their expansion program has been under way less than a year. As it develops they are bound to need facilities which are available here.

And so as we round the corner into the New Year, let's not be down-hearted. Let's be thankful for what we have. Let us wish you a Happy New Year.

New Year Resolutions

We suppose if anyone adopts a New Year resolution tomorrow he will resolve to swear off smoking, or to quit drinking, at least when driving a car, or he will promise himself that he will stop over-eating, abusing his wife, or turn over a new leaf with respect to one or more of the other more common vices, much the same as he has done year after year in times past.

But it seems to us that the situation today calls for something a little different. We believe the year of 1941 is going to be a particularly trying one in some respects, and that the preservation of our democracy is going to depend upon a change in attitude on the part of most of us, a little more determination to get rid of some of our faults and a little more rugged practice of our virtues.

With this thought in mind we would like to see every one adopt the following resolutions:

- 1) To be a little less selfish, not only toward our family and our friends, but also toward our government, to seek a little less for ourselves and to give a little more of our strength, our time and our money, for the common welfare.
- 2) To be a little more tolerant toward the mistakes and weaknesses of those in our own home, of those who are charged with heavy responsibilities in these difficult times, and never to criticize anyone because of his race, religion, or social or economic position.
- 3) To apply ourselves a little harder to the task at hand whether it be training as a soldier, some vital defense industry, a seemingly inconsequential job in private business, or sweeping the living room floor and raising the children.
- 4) To guard our health and that of our family better than ever before so that come what may we will be able to do our duty, shoulder our share of the burden, and not have to depend on someone else either on the firing line or in an air raid shelter.
- 5) To be a little less wasteful of what we eat and what and of all the things we buy, keeping ever in mind that the millions of hungry children in other nations of the world and of their lack of clothing and bedding on cold and wintry nights.
- 6) To remember above all else that we are Americans, that we have inherited a glorious tradition, that we are one of the last remaining strongholds of civilization in the world and that if our civilization is to be preserved for our children and grandchildren, it is up to us.

Heavy Damage By Rains Is Suffered In Collier County

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 31 — The heaviest crop damage in Florida during the heavy rains and winds of the night of Dec. 22-27 was in Collier county, in which it is estimated that 50 per cent of the citrus crops were ruined. The State Marketing Bureau reported yesterday.

The bureau released a report by the federal division of agricultural statistics giving the first official percentage estimates of damage.

The report put damage to snap beans and green peppers at Pompano at 15 percent, and the orange crop at about 15 percent, adding 50 percent to determine the loss to sellers, losses and post-damage.

"Date county vegetables were damaged about 10 percent," the report continued. "Saffron celery and Fort Pierce tomatoes' crop slight damage."

The agency also confirmed limited reports of heavy damage to the Texas grapefruit crop from storms of the same night.

The report said winds blew 55 percent of grapefruit, 55 percent of remaining early orange and 55 percent of Valencia grapefruit from trees. It is expected an 80 percent crop will be produced in the remaining weeks of the season.

WPA Will Assign 75% Of Personnel To Defense Work

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 31 — Florida WPA will assign 75 percent of its construction personnel, about 14,000 workers, to national preparedness projects in 1941, State Administrator Roy Schroeder declared today.

The plan will be made, he explained, to make such important objectives as speedy completion of defense airport projects, roads providing access to army and navy reservations, as well as armories.

Speaking WPA to new effort in defense activities, the Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson's approval of work now underway in Florida, particularly at MacDill Field, Tampa.

Commenting on a staff officer's report made after an inspection of the Florida program, the secretary's approval of the WPA's construction program, WPA Administrator Roy Schroeder said that work has been found "well organized" with appropriate construction equipment on hand to insure rapid progress.

Edwin B. Lofberg, WPA's State director of operations, estimated the 13,500 workers engaged in WPA operations would be increased to about 18,000 not later than the middle of January 1941. He also said plans had been completed to transfer additional workers to defense undertakings in rapid order.

To aid in strengthening important links in Florida's air defense lines will be an immediate concentration of maintenance projects at Tampa, Jacksonville, Orlando, Gainesville, Miami, Daytona Beach, Avon Park, Sarasota, Melbourne, Vero Beach, Palmdale, Ft. Myers, West Palm Beach, Lakeland, Ocala, Cedar Key, Tallahassee, and Deland, according to Director Lofberg.

These undertakings alone will require expenditures of more than \$25,000,000. Early authorization of other airport projects is expected to come early in the new year, Lofberg said.

"We also expect to maintain WPA construction schedules on providing defense jobs at MacDill Field, Jacksonville, Naval Air Station, Jacksonville, Egmont Field, Oklawaha county, and at Camp Blanding," he said.

Major defense road projects already approved include those providing access to MacDill, the Air Station, Jacksonville, and to Camp Blanding. Another project of this nature is active in Brevard county.

Army construction projects to be pushed by WPA include two at Jacksonville and others at Tampa, St. Petersburg, Fort Myers, Miami, Daytona Beach, Winter Haven and Ocala.

At 1940 ended national defense projects operated by WPA, including both active and completed.
