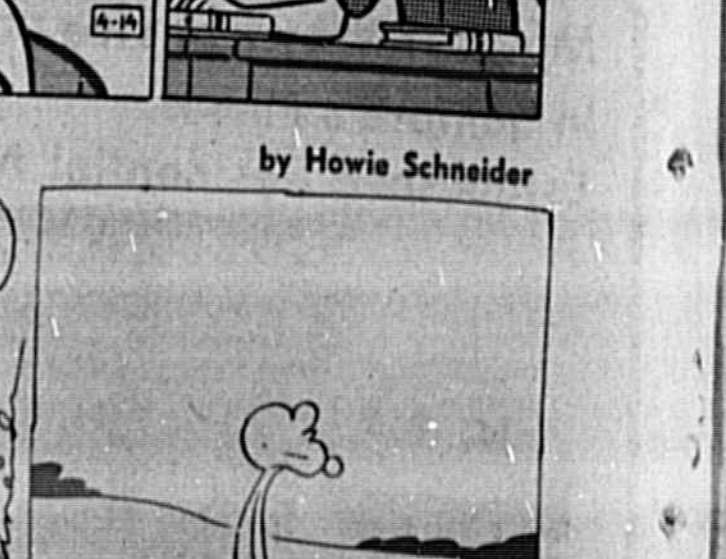
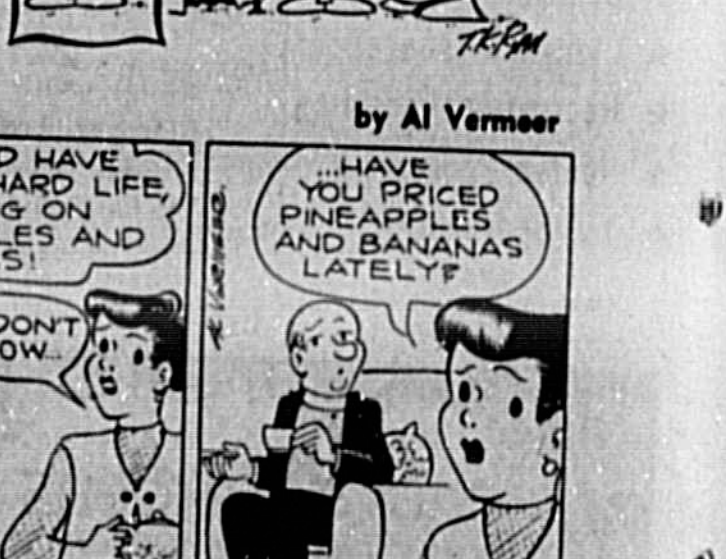
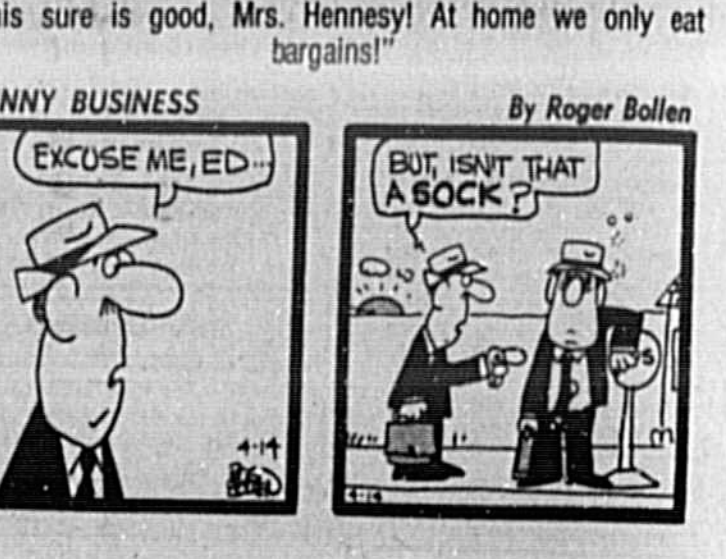

## 130 Local Jobs Involved SEEDCO To Invest \$100,000

Seminole Employment and Economic Development Inc. (SEEDCO) is finalizing the legalities of a more than \$100,000 investment to stabilize the economically floundering J. Smith Fruit Company in Oviedo, it was learned today.

The SEEDCO action is intended to pull the 13-year-old fruit and packing company out of an economic down-spin and strengthen the job security of more than 130 employees who



work during the height of the citrus season.

SEEDCO President Horace Orr said the investment is a "complete financial package" to bring the company under the SEEDCO wing to "get the company operating."

SEEDCO, a federally funded organization developed under the Seminole County Community Action Agency, develops and provides management for several county businesses to provide jobs for county residents.

"The investment will provide a means to continue the existing

## Sends Opinion To Vogt Shevin Nixes Comptroller Immunity

Florida Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin has popped another fly in the soup of the County Commission's plan to split the duties of the Clerk of the Circuit Court and create a county comptroller.

In a hand-delivered ruling to State Senator John Vogt, D-Cocoa Beach, Shevin says it would be "out of harmony" to exempt an appointed comptroller from the liability of criminal prosecution.

Vogt, who is chief of the Seminole

County Legislative Delegation, said today that Seminole lawmakers had hoped to exempt the comptroller—if such an officer is created here—from criminal prosecution because he would be "serving at the whim of the County Commission."

"If a person is going to be appointed, it would be improper for him to be considered criminally liable," Vogt said. He said the delegation must address themselves to that question at the show down at high noon on Thursday, when the delegation has scheduled a meeting.

Shevin, in his opinion, says the comptroller can be appointed if a special law is approved by the legislature and okayed by the voters in

questioned the "impracticality and impropriety" of giving the Commission the right to hire and fire.

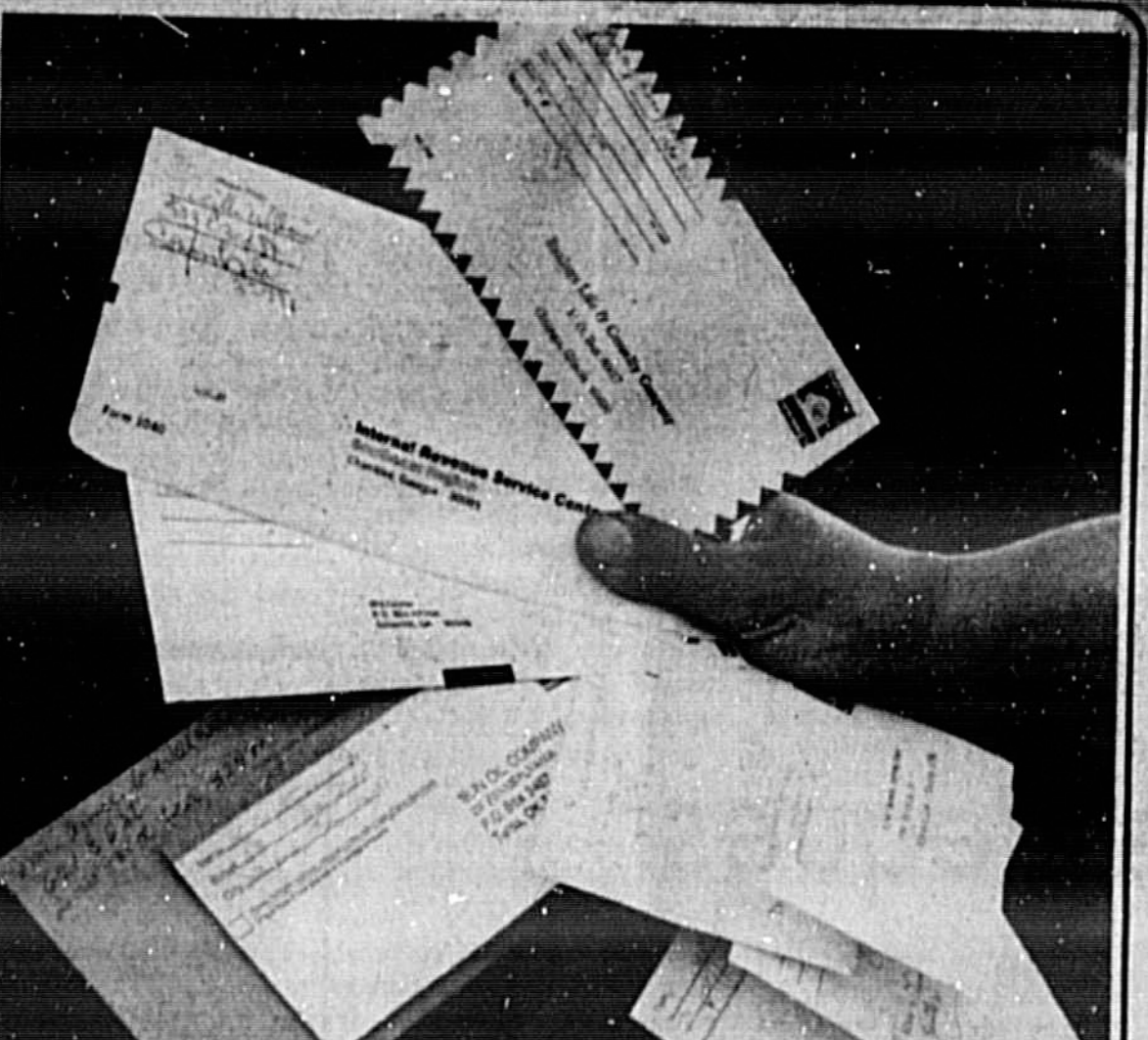
Vogt had asked Shevin first if the officer could be hired, and secondly, "can the appointed comptroller be absolved from any criminal liability relating to county expenditures or disbursement of county funds?"

And both senators say they will not support any measure that calls for an elected comptroller, instead of appointive.

The controversial issue has caused a split in the delegation, with State Rep. Vince Fechtel, R-Leesburg, against the comptroller's position and State Rep. Bob Hattaway, D-Altamonte Springs, in favor.

State Sen. Lori Wilson, I-Merritt Island, says she won't introduce the measure to the Senate unless the Hattaway-Fechtel squabble is resolved.

Both senators say they will not support any measure that calls for an elected comptroller, instead of appointive.

## Mail Found Scattered On Street

Quite a few people in the Sanford area — 15 at least — owe a debt of gratitude to Herb Pedrick, a City of Sanford employee who lives at 2003 Jefferson Street.

While on his way home from work with the city utilities division yesterday afternoon, Pedrick saw what appeared to be a "bunch of papers" lying beside the road on South Mellonville Ave., between 8th and 11th Streets. Figuring the "papers" might have blown out of a woman's purse or someone's car, Pedrick stopped and picked up what turned out to be pieces of mail that had not been cancelled.

In looking further, Pedrick gathered a total of 15 pieces of mail that were obviously intended to be sent through the Postal Service.

Some of the items he retrieved included an income tax return bound for Chamblee, Ga., the office where people expecting a return file their statements each year; another which was directed to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) in Loraville, Ga.; one addressed to Bankers Life and Casualty Co., Chicago, Ill.; and still another to Sun Oil Company of Pennsylvania in Tulsa, Okla., just to mention a few.

Pedrick said he looked up and saw a

half dozen" pieces of mail in the drop box when he normally has between 25-30 items sack.

This led Berwiech to believe that someone could possibly have tampered with the drop box, since the carrier said a sack was broken on the bottom of the box, but there was no other evidence of tampering with it.

Berwiech said he'd continue his investigation and check the drop box himself to see if in fact it had been tampered with. He further said the carrier was not aware of any mail blowing out of the open left hand door of his vehicle and that it would have been next to impossible for that to happen, since he had stuffed everything into the canvas sack.

One way or the other, those people whose mail might have ended up scattered with yesterday afternoon's gusty winds and drenched by the downpour that followed can be thankful for citizens such as Herb Pedrick.

It isn't everyone who would have taken the time to make sure that all the pieces of mail in sight were picked up, let alone taken the time to deliver them to the post office and personally make sure they were in the out-going mail chute.

But, everyone isn't a Good Samaritan like Herb Pedrick.

## Meyer Proposes Airport Site Silence Greets City Hall Proposal

Sanford Mayor Lee Moore rolled back in his chair. Commissioner A. A. McClanahan rubbed his eyes. Commissioner Julian Stenstrom followed along with the reading and Commissioner John Morris watched as fellow Commissioner Gordon Meyer read himself into a hole.

A long pause followed Meyer's oration of a two-page proposal for locating a city hall facility in Building 310 at the Sanford Municipal Airport.

The silence was broken when Moore, in an almost boisterous manner, pulled from behind his desk a ledger containing previous city commission minutes and turned to an already marked page for July 14, 1969.

After a brief explanation on a rejected 1969 idea to move the City Hall to airport Building

310, a former Navy barracks, Moore read a motion from the minutes that stated the commission "should never ever consider moving the City Hall from downtown Sanford."

And, although a previous motion by a commission holds little bearing on another commission, the tone of the 1969 decision was still prevalent in the room.

Citing public opposition to moving City Hall from downtown as the main reason for dumping the airport site, Moore warned, "I'm telling you now, it's going to be a tough battle" if Meyer's idea is pursued.

Meyer opposed the idea of building a new city hall until something is done for the city's drainage problem, also presented Commission with an alternative solution of building additional wings to the present City Hall.

Commissioners liked Meyer's alternative a little better than his airport solution.

City Manager Warren "Pete" Knowles was instructed to contact several local architectural firms in an attempt to form a committee to do a professional study on the "suitability and durability" of the present structure for renovating the more than 50-year-old building.

Remaining items to be handled report is compiled on the architects' findings and are reported back to Commission.

Another idea tossed out to the commission was purchasing land adjoining city hall property owned by the Flahship Bank of Sanford. Moore said he would follow up on this idea.

In Meyer's proposal, which was formulated after conferring with several citizens of different occupations and who lived in different areas of the city, called for leasing the 42,000 square foot building from the Airport Authority on an annual payment of \$7,000.

Meyer said this lease payment would be less expensive for the city than paying \$1.8 million for constructing a new city hall facility.

The \$1.8 figure is an estimate

## Missing Transcript Results In 'Show Cause' Order

Official Seminole County Court Reporter Norman Robbins has been ordered to appear before Circuit Court Judge David U. Strawn Friday to show cause why he shouldn't be held in contempt of court.

Judge Strawn signed the order last week when he discovered at a sentencing hearing that the transcript of a Jan. 13 hearing in which 19-year-old Anthony Richard Dew pleaded guilty to attempted third-degree arson was missing from the court's file.

Strawn said he must have the factual basis presented by Dew for the guilty plea before he can sentence the youth who has been in jail since his December arrest by Longwood Police.

Strawn said it would appear that the hearing proceedings had not been transcribed by Robbins' office as required by the circuit court judge's administrative order setting forth local court rules.

At the Jan. 13 hearing before Circuit Court Judge Richard Muldrew, Dew told the court he was drunk following a wedding and "lit a candle to meditate."

He said that was the last thing he remembered before being arrested after a fire burned a living room table, personal items and clothing of the newlywed couple.

A slightly better play is to take out some heart-spade insurance. You start by playing two rounds of trumps. Then cash your king of hearts, lead a heart to dummy's ace and a third heart back toward your hand.

If both opponents follow, you can draw the last trump and claim your slam. This time East can ruff, but if he does you still wrap your slam up. He will have used his last trump. Later on you will discard a diamond from dummy on your queen of hearts and avoid a diamond loser.

Of course, if East doesn't ruff you get to ruff your fourth heart and make your slam that way.

South looks over dummy and counts 11 top tricks. A 12th will develop if hearts break 3-3. Are there any ways to collect 12 against an uneven break in that suit?

One way is to draw trumps and duck a club to rectify the count for a possible squeeze. Then you win the second diamond in dummy, discard your last diamond on the club ace, ruff a club, lead your last trump and smile happily if it turns out that the man with four hearts also held five clubs or five diamonds.

## Jones Faces Possible Job Loss Over Directive Violation

Jones has been in violation of a Community Service Administration regional policy for serving as the board chairman while simultaneously serving as executive director of Seminole Community Action, Inc. (SCA).

The violation, however, may have been committed without Jones' knowledge of the administrative directive.

Meanwhile, SCA's Board of Directors has passed a resolution requesting the regional director of the Community Services Administration in Atlanta, to grant a waiver on the policy to allow Jones to remain in the two official positions. Otherwise he will have to forfeit one of the jobs.

Officials in Atlanta report they have received the request, but no action has been taken on the matter.

The 1971 policy states: "A staff member of one OEO (Office of Economic Opportunity) grantee may not serve as the Chairman of the Board of another grantee, nor may he serve on another grantee's executive or personnel committee or other policy committee."

OEO has since undergone a name change to the Community Services Administration.

Jones, who has served as SCA executive director since 1967, was first elected as SEEDCO board chairman in 1970. He has been re-elected each year.

The internal policy was handed down in a memo dated Dec. 21, 1971, by Acting Regional Director John A. Dyer.

And while Regional Deputy Director Charles Moore says that the policy "was mailed to every agency in 1971 for which we provide funds," another Atlanta official says the Seminole County agency may not have been mailed the directive.

Jones, who would have been the recipient of any correspondence with the regional office, denies the memo came to his office in 1971.

Jones said the first time he saw the policy was when he received a copy of the 1971 memo last month.

Eddie Johnson, field supervisor for the Georgia and Florida district, said he sent the 1971 memo to Jones in March of this year following Johnson's visit last fall to Seminole where he discovered Jones holding both positions.

The memo is aimed primarily at preventing one person from spreading himself too thin between the two jobs, and failing to perform his job to full capacity.

In the SCA's resolution, and also in a coincidental SEEDCO letter to CSA, Jones is defended as being able to adequately handle both jobs.

"As far as the time factor goes, it isn't in any way hindering the execution of the job between the two jobs, and failing to perform his job to full capacity."

## Non-Partisan Prosecutor Measure Becomes State Issue

A bill requiring non-partisan election of state attorneys ran into legal trouble as a local bill and has been revised to affect state attorneys statewide, State Rep. Bob Hattaway, D-Altamonte Springs, said today.

Hattaway said he filed the bill Monday after a state law was found prohibiting it as a local bill applying only to Seminole County.

"We were advised by some people here to take it statewide. If the bill has been picked up some support," he said. The bill will be referred to a subcommittee next week.

Hattaway also said he will ask Seminole's Legislative Delegation for opinions on the bill during tomorrow's session at high noon in Tallahassee.

When Hattaway first announced the bill, he said it was partly aimed at Seminole-Brevard State Atty. Abbott Herring, who Hattaway said is an object of "displeasure" in the county. Hattaway claims his office has received complaints from citizens, politicians and lawyers about operations of Herring's Seminole office.

The impetus for the bill came from County Commissioner Mike Hattaway. Commissioner Hattaway said this morning he's "kind of happy" to see the bill go state-wide.

Commissioners will attend the delegation meeting tomorrow. And County Atty. Tom Freeman was in Tallahassee today, according to Rep. Hattaway.

A major item up for discussion is the County Commission proposal to split the Clerk of the Circuit Court's duties and appoint a county comptroller.

Hattaway and State Rep. Vince Fechtel, R-Leesburg, have split over the issue, with Hattaway in favor and Fechtel against creation of a county comptroller.

State Sen. Lori Wilson, I-Merritt Island, has indicated unless Hattaway and Fechtel stop squabbling over the issue, she will refuse to endorse the measure. Such a refusal would kill the measure—at least for this year.

Fechtel's continued opposition to the measure also could disallow the bill's introduction to this year's legislature.

## Police Benevolent Group Halted City Revokes Solicitation License

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — City commissioners last night revoked the occupational license of the Florida Police Benevolent Association (FPBA) to halt its donation solicitation drive which had brought complaints from Sanford and South Seminole residents.

Mayer Norman Floyd said the FPBA's "misrepresentation" on its license application was one factor in the revocation. The purpose of the business as listed on the application, Floyd said, was "law enforcement association (union)" and did not mention the telephone solicitation drive.

Norman Perry, of Fort Lauderdale, vice president of the state organization, said the employee who acquired the license for the group should have listed the activity as "campaign headquarters," adding the man has since been dismissed.

He said the office at 222 Sanford Ave. was rented for a 90-day period for the fund-raising activity and the main offices of the organization were in Miami, Orlando and Tallahassee.

The fund-raising was not being done from an Orange County location, Steve Mische of the Orlando Police Department and an officer of the Orange County PBA, said because of "political reasons."

Orlando attorney Dale Anstine, who represented the association, said a major reason both the Altamonte Springs and Sanford police departments were opposed to the FPBA fund-raising drive is because of competition for their own money-raising efforts.

He added that many of the complaints received by the Sanford Police Department were solicited through a newspaper advertisement, most of the complaints were vague; and further that someone else could have been making the solicitations referred to in the complaints.

Anstine said the PBA's telephone solicitations were all monitored, but Perry said monitoring was done on a selected basis. The solicitors read a prepared statement to those called, Perry said, adding solicitors at times got over enthusiastic and deviated from the prepared remarks.

Sanford representatives said Sanford Patrolman Herb Shea was told by a solicitor the fund-raising campaign was under the auspices of the Sanford department and the money raised would be used to "help widows and orphans of Sanford policemen" and would also benefit the Little League.

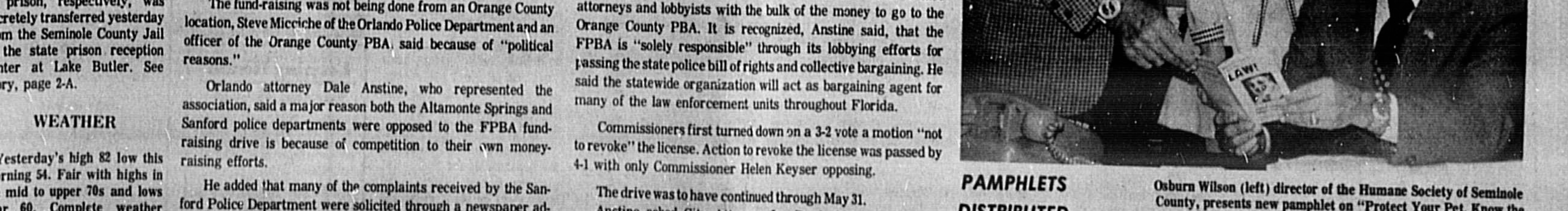
Altamonte Commissioner George Perkins said the solicitor that called him inferred the local police department would benefit. The local department is to receive any part of the donations, representatives of both said.

Anstine said the proceeds of the drive will be used to hire attorneys and lobbyists with the bulk of the money to go to the Orange County PBA. It is recognized, Anstine said, that the FPBA is "solely responsible" through its lobbying efforts for passing the state police bill of rights and collective bargaining. He said the statewide organization will act as bargaining agent for many of the law enforcement units throughout Florida.

Commissioners first turned down on a 3-2 vote a motion "not to revoke" the license. Action to revoke the license was passed by 4-1 with only Commissioner Helen Keyser opposing.

The drive was to have continued through May 31.

Anstine asked City Attorney Joe Davis for an opinion on whether the city actually has authority over the statewide organization since it is a charitable group and whether it really needs an occupational license.

## In Wekiva Hassle Camp Operators Get Dump Limit

Wekiva camp "owners" who were ordered last week to remove their shacks from state-controlled islands on the Wekiva River, will have only 60 days free use of county money for disposing of the island rubble.

Pollution Control Director Langley Adair last Thursday told private camp occupants of the 40-plus structures along the river they could dump the disassembled debris into nearby county dumps and transfer stations at no charge.

Normally, the charge for just one load of rubbish would run from \$1 to \$7 depending on the quantity, according to County Roads Superintendent J. C. Lavender.

Since most of the structures are the size of small, albeit ramshackle cottages, camp occupants estimated that it would take "numerous" trips up and down the river to disassemble the structures—just as it required to initially build them. Dumping fees alone could range in the hundreds of dollars.

In offering the occupants free use of the nearby dumps, Adair had originally set no time limit on the gratis dumping since most occupants agreed it would be a considerable length of time before all the camps could be removed.

But yesterday, Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski reacted negatively to the "open-ended" aspect of the free dumping. "If a guy goes out to the river once a month and picks up a few cans, this will take 18 years to pay off," Kwiatkowski said that he favored a time limit and suggested 60 days.

"The time limit," Kwiatkowski said, "would encourage immediate camp removal."
