(Continued from Page One) go before the bar of world opinion. The United States aid the foundation for an appeal to the U. N. in a vigorous protest to the Soviet commander in Hungary, charging "flagrant defiance" in Hungarian internal affairs and demanding a joint inquiry by Britain, the United States and the Soviet Union.

Some State Department officials saw the issue as much broader than a Balkan one. They expressed the opinion that it might be raised also in Greece, Italy, France, Germany and wherever else the western powers conflict with Communism.

In Vienna the Russians in the four-power Austrian Treaty Commission rejected all proposals to broaden the scope of the commission's discussions. U. S. Delegate Joseph M. Dodge accused the Soviet delegation of demanding veto powers over the agency.

In London, General Nicolai Radescu, exiled former premier of Romania, said that "the case of Hungary is an episode of what happens in Romania and an example of what Soviet Russia is trying to do to the world."

He said that the "answer to the latest challenge in Hungary should be continued recognition of the cabinet of ousted Hungarian Premier Ferenc Nagy as the only legal government of Hungary."

The same consideration should be given to the Romanian legal government prior to the Soviets' full spread of influence that the King was forced to accept "in respect as much as possible to the Romanian people," he added.

\$19,000 Is Lost, Found Returned To Owner

CINCINNATI, June 12. (AP)—A brown overnight bag containing \$19,000 in bills found in the greater Cincinnati Airport restaurant Tuesday night belongs to Nat Welner, 45-year-old manager of a Miami, Fla., hotel, who must make a return trip to the Queen City to claim the money—his life savings.

Contacted in Miami last night, Welner said he brought the money to Cincinnati in anticipation of a business deal and left the bag in the restaurant as he and his wife rushed out to board a Delta Airliner ready to take off for Atlanta.

The bag was found by Betty Baker, a waitress, who gave it to restaurant Manager Martin W. Hess, who said he turned it over to the Federal Bureau of Investigation here.

(Continued from Page One) an extra 350,000 tons from the world sugar bowl; 2. Cuba has a sugar surplus which is expected to ease demands from other parts of the world, and 3. Some 200,000 tons of Javanese sugar will be offered to world users immediately.

Cardinal Spellman Denounces Bigotry

NEW YORK, June 12. (AP)—Francis Cardinal Spellman, archbishop of the Diocese of New York, says that "bigotry once again is eating its way into the vital organs of the greatest nation on the face of the earth—our own beloved America."

Speaking last night at Fordham University commencement exercises, the Cardinal quoted from Protestant and secular publications which criticized the Supreme Court's 5 to 4 decision of Feb. 10 that held in a New Jersey case that public, private and parochial school children may ride in tax-supported school buses.

"Many persons assumed that heat generated by the big case decision would produce in the end the light of tolerance and understanding, but the whole controversy would be forgotten," Spellman said. "I'm happily the contrary seems to be the case."

He said the attack was directed at the growth and expansion of Catholic education which is claimed to be a constant threat to the supremacy of public education in the United States.

tax reduction bill.

Jesse Jones Has No Fear of
Depression-headline. We wouldn't
either if we were sitting down
behind ten million dollars worth
of government bonds the way he
is.

Reports from Washington indi-
cate that fully half of the Presi-
dent's advisers are urging him to
sign the Labor bill. Well if half
the Democrats and all the Re-
publicans want him to sign it,
that's a lot of people.

What can be done when law-
abiding and resolute citizens are
quickly was illustrated in Hurts-
boro, Ala. the other day when
four men including the mayor
rescued a negro from a mob bent
upon lynching him. It is only a
very small minority in the South
which ever participates in lynch-
ings, or would if the occasion
arose. But the trouble is that the
great majority, which does not
approve of lynching, does not like
to run the risks involved in pre-
venting lynchings. Nevertheless,
quick action by a few decent citi-
zens, and particularly public
officials charged with maintaining
law and order, can prevent lynch-
ings.

Those who believe that Social-
ism is the complete answer to all
our labor problems should consid-
er the state of France. There 700,-
000 railroad men on the complete-
ly socialized French railways are
striking for higher wages, just as
if the railroads were owned by
bloody capitalists instead of by the
government of the people, and
they have brought about a com-
plete paralysis of the entire French
economy. The trouble about social-
ism is that it won't work, and you
get either Communism as you did
in Russia, and more recently in
Hungary, or you get fascism as
you did in Italy, Germany, Spain
and more recently in Argentina.
But in either event you get a dic-
tatorship which eliminates the
rights and privileges of the com-
mon man.

Newspaper headlines these days
might lead one to believe that
the next gale that sweeps from
east to west will bring to our
ears the sound of resounding arms,
or something like that, but we
do not think so. The Russians
know perfectly well that if they
get mixed up in a war with the
United States at the present time,
they would be completely annihi-
lated. This wouldn't be enough
of Russia left after a year or two
to bury their dead. They are not
going to start a war with their
country until they have more rea-
son to believe than they have at
present that they could win it. But
if that time ever comes, they will
do what the Japs did at Pearl
Harbor, only they will do it at
New York, Washington, Boston,
Philadelphia and San Francisco
all at the same time.

More Horrors

Glen L. Martin, the Baltimore airplane builder,
produced a new wonder the other day, in the form of a
radio-active cloud which can be released at a great height
without the explosion of an atomic bomb. The inventor
says it would be of great military value. All this sort of
thing is interesting, and apparently necessary at our
present state of what we call civilization. We must be
ready to destroy real or potential enemies, lest they destroy
us and all our works.

It seems like a travesty on our civilization. We have
but lately finished the greatest of all wars, and thought
we might have peaceful progress and the general decencies
of life for at least a few years. Yet we once more seem
to be at the mercy of forces beyond our control, operating
not only on a national but even a supernatural scale.

When shall this great, beautiful and useful world
be allowed to fulfill its destiny and the glories, wonders and
comforts for which it seems to have been created? When,
if ever, shall our race of men be fully developed?

Appreciation

Someone has said that anyone devoted to the cause of
humanity is bound, sooner or later, to be crushed and broken-
hearted by the ingratitude of man. It's mighty fine now
and then to hear about exceptions to this dire viewpoint.
One such occurred recently in St. Charles, Ill., where an 84-
year-old Swedish-born retired carpenter was given by his
fellow-townsmen a round trip flight ticket to Stockholm and
\$1,700 in cash.

All his life he had followed the principle of performing
one good deed a day. Some of these acts were small and as
he thought, unnoticed. Others were on a big scale like the
ham dinner he gave every year to the local troop of 250 Boy
Scouts, whose counselor he is. His neighbors had been
watching him through the years and when he said, one day
that he would like to see his 86-year-old sister in Sweden,
they collected a fund to make the visit possible.

Stories like this are important; heartening chronicles of
a mankind too often seen as uncivilized even yet.

Light In Jacksonville

Jacksonville's municipally-owned electric and power
system had a "citywide breakdown," according to the Jack-
sonville Journal, a few nights ago. The Journal said the
breakdown "showed again in what dangerous straits we are.
It left us without traffic signals in the rush hours and
without cooking current or water supply at dinner time.
The folks at the beaches didn't get their lights back until
9:30 p. m."

The Journal calls it an "outgrown system." The people
of Jacksonville have voted to borrow \$15,000,000 to make
necessary replacements. "But," complains the Journal,
"it will be nearly three years before all of the equipment
can be delivered and installed."

The Journal also complains about the plant manage-
ment, which could have prevented the citywide stoppage,
but didn't. A competent engineer-manager is urgently
needed.

The Jacksonville plant has been played up as a shining
example of the beauties of municipal ownership. As describ-
ed by the Journal it's neither shining nor beautiful.
—Tampa Tribune

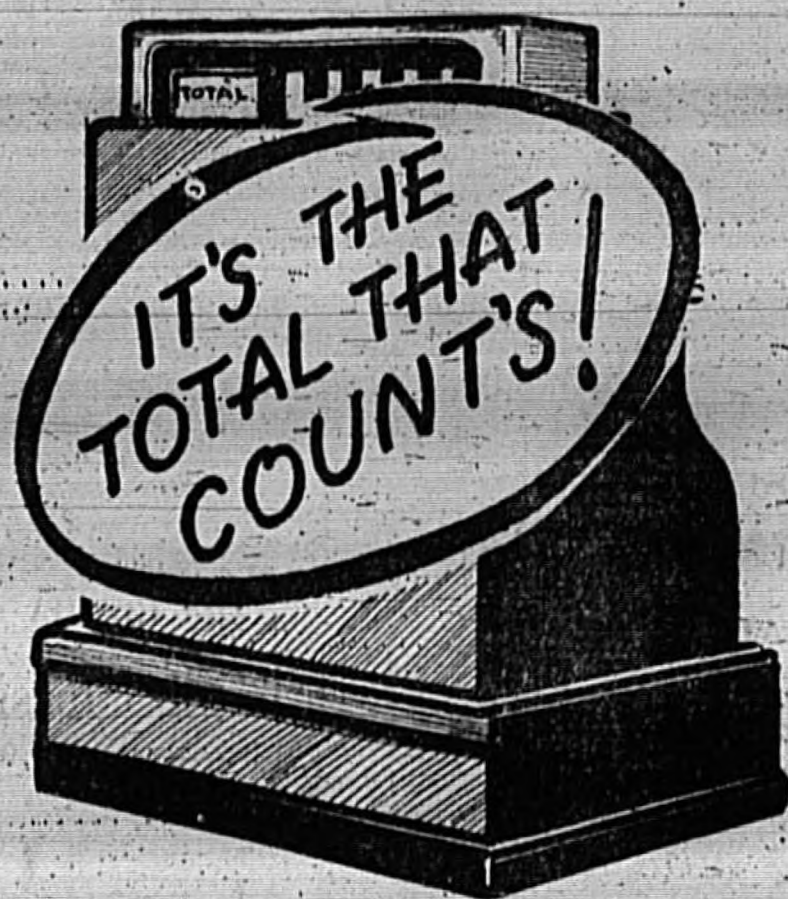

U.N. Deadlock Is Denounced By Australia

Big Five Accused Of Being Unable To Agree On Arms Or Trieste Agreement

Paris, June 13 (AP)—The French National Assembly re-affirmed the treaty of peace with Italy tonight without a dissenting vote.

LAKE SUCCESS, June 13 (AP)—Russia charged today that the American-controlled Japanese government was "closing its eyes to fascist activities" and that the "old Japanese military clique" was in power. The charge was made by Soviet Delegate Vladimir Koretsky at a session of the drafting committee of the U. N. Commission on Human Rights. Koretsky said the Soviet press was particularly interested in how democracy was working in Japan because the Japanese constitution as now drafted was along the lines of the American Constitution. He said the "old Japanese military clique" was arresting political leaders and demonstrators. This military group, he declared, were "wearing sheep's clothing."

LAKE SUCCESS, June 13 (AP)—Col. W. R. Hodgson of Australia led a small nation attack today against a big power failure to break a 60-day deadlock between the United States and Russia on a basic working plan for a world disarmament.

He told the United Nations Commission on Conventional Armaments that the major powers had only delayed the group's work when they were given problems or "suits" among themselves.

While criticizing the "Big Five" inability to agree on how to tackle arms limitation, Hodgson also open criticism to its failure to agree on a governor for the internationalized city of Trieste.

"We are back where we started from in this commission," the Australian said, "in a surprising but not surprising way. It has a great power submitting a proposal and another major power submitting a counter plan. You (Continued on Page Eight)

Only 2,922 Tests Made In County By TB Xray Unit

X-ray tests totaling 2,922 have been made in Seminola County by the State Board of Health Mobile Unit 15 in an effort to screen out possible cases of tuberculosis. Dr. Frank Quillman, director of the Seminola County Health Unit, today termed this number as "disappointing and not nearly as many as should have been taken tests, out of the County's more than 10,000 persons of 15 years of age or older."

Thursday was the last day for taking x-rays at this time though the Board of Health said the unit would return to the county every two years, he said.

The idea of getting as many persons x-rayed as possible is to detect cases of tuberculosis early and to prevent the spread of the disease, Dr. Quillman declared. The earlier a case is isolated, the easier it can be cured, he said.

"If we were able to put into effect what we know about control of tuberculosis, we could eradicate the disease in 10 years or less."

"All new cases come from open cases, and for every death due to tuberculosis, 8 to 10 new cases develop," he pointed out, and added that with isolation there would be but two or three new cases with every death.

Red Campaign In Europe Develops Along Two Lines

Purge In Bulgaria Is Latest Demonstration Of Soviet Will

NANKING, June 13 (AP)—Trouble in Tibet cropped up today as Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek ordered his garrison in northwestern China — scene of an Outer Mongolian invasion — to defend China's border "to the last man."

Chinese dispatches from Chungking disclosed that Tibet, China's southwesternmost province, was seriously disturbed by local clashes between monks and non-monastic residents.

The trouble started, Chinese correspondents related, when Chinese military authorities arrested the leader of the Buddhist monks and reportedly put him to death.

Monks of three important monasteries which practically rule the major portion of Tibet then staged an armed rebellion against Chinese authority, and fighting was reported under way near Lhasa, provincial capital. The monks were described as pro-British while the non-monastic groups favored the Chinese.

Government reports said warplanes, bearing the Soviet Red Star continued to bomb and strafe Chinese positions in the Tibetan region of Sinkiang province. They said the Mongolians have rushed into Sinkiang by truck to Tefishan, 50 miles inside Chinese territory.

A new slant was given the Sinkiang invasion by the American-owned Shanghai Post-Mercantile which probably was a tribal clash with some Soviet link.

The newspaper said Communist rivals from northwest China told reports that two brothers of the Sherif-Khan family, among (Continued on Page Three)

Two Coast Shipping Tieup Is Threatened By Maritime Unions

NEW YORK, June 13 (AP)—A two-coast shipping tie-up is threatened by five maritime unions who last night accused the Pacific American Shipowners' Association of "stalling" in negotiating a contract with the Maritime Cooks and Stewards Union.

The present contract expires at midnight Saturday. Joseph Curran, president of the National Maritime Union, presided at a news conference held by the policy committee of the five unions, all former members of the old CIO committee for Maritime Unity which broke up last winter after Curran's withdrawal as chairman. He issued a statement in which he said that if any lock-out or other action is taken by the five-union stand, East and West Coast and vice versa.

Hugh Bryson, president of the cooks and stewards, said a contract with the shipowners was broken off last Friday. His union sought continuation of the present contract, for a \$159 monthly minimum wage, he said.

Group Told U. S. Duty To Take In Refugees

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—Queen J. Roberts, retired Supreme Court Justice, said today that America has a moral duty to lead the world by taking in 400,000 European refugees.

"We won't be able to hold up our heads if we turn our backs on these people," she said, "who are America's 'wards,'" Roberts told a House Judiciary Subcommittee. The committee is considering a bill to allow 100,000 displaced persons to enter the United States annually the next four years.

Mayor J. M. Curley Stricken Ill In Boston

BOSTON, June 13 (AP)—Mayor James M. Curley of Boston was stricken ill today even as his attorneys prepared a last-ditch fight in an attempt to save the 72-year-old Massachusetts political leader from going to jail for mail fraud.

Curley, who boasts that he is one of the last of the political chieftains still in power among a group that included Flanders of Kansas City and Balducci of Chicago, was taken to a hospital reportedly suffering from hypertension caused by arteriosclerosis.

KLAN KILLED
ATLANTA, June 13 (AP)—The Ku Klux Klan surrendered its charter as a national corporation in Superior Court today and the attorney for the hooded order said the action "works a final end, I hope, conclusive termination of the Klan." The chief mourner, said Attorney Morgan Bales, "will be political demagogues who will find themselves without a political issue."

Group Cuts Budget Of 33 Agencies

Veterans Administration Slashed 1.8 Per Cent. Weapon Research Increased

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The Senate Appropriations Committee approved today a \$211,530,353 appropriation for the Interior Department, adding \$54,116,840 to the amount voted by the House.

Principal increases are \$36,375,932 for the Reclamation Bureau and \$9,214,600 for the Bonneville Power Administration.

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The House Appropriations committee whacked \$330,540,732 today from the funds President Truman asked to finance 33 independent government agencies next year.

It approved an \$8,498,409,759 bill to finance the agencies work during the 12 months beginning July 1. The total cut was 3.7 percent below the amount Mr. Truman requested.

Veterans Administration Funds were trimmed \$130,884,220 or 1.8 per cent. VA got \$6,944,437,000. The cut for the 33 agencies brought to \$3,584,000,000 the claimed savings of House Republicans in their drive to chop \$6,000,000,000 from Mr. Truman's 1948 budget of \$37,500,000,000.

The committee proposed a \$43,449,000 fund for research in aerial weapons after hearing that potential foes might "jump at it" if they ever get air superiority.

The committee recommended the appropriation for use by the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics during the fiscal year starting July 1. It would be a \$12,736,000 increase over the amount granted last year.

The committee report said research in such weapons as guided missiles and planes of unprecedented speed is essential to national security.

Civil Service Makes Loyalty Check Report

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The Civil Service Commission has informed Congress that 21 persons were fired or resigned from the federal payroll and 42 were denied jobs after checks of their loyalty to the government between Jan. 1, 1946, and March 31, 1947.

Of the total of 63, the commission listed 47 as Communists, 3 as Fascists, 11 as Nazis and 5 as Japanese.

Since 1941, the commission said, it has rated 1,313 people as ineligible for government positions because of disloyalty.

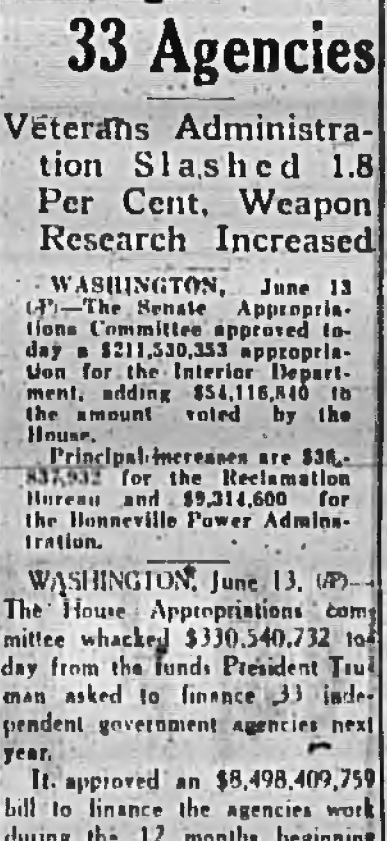
Bulwinkle Bill To Be Voted On Wednesday

Negro Released Without Bond At Murder Hearing

Arthur C. Siehn, Jr., young Colored negro, who for the past week has been held in County Jail on a charge of murder in connection with the death from bullet wounds of his father who died in a local hospital, was released without bond after a hearing conducted this morning by County Judge R. W. Wate.

After a number of colored witnesses had been questioned by Judge Wate, by Assistant State Attorney George A. DeGates and by G. W. Speckers who represented the defendant, Judge Wate pronounced that in the opinion of the court it was a justifiable homicide.

The young negro was released pending re-arrest on the charge of carrying a concealed weapon on May 31 when the shooting took place in the yard of the Siplin home at Thirtieth Street and Lincoln Court. Two pistols were produced by Sheriff Meier for the investigation; one of pearl handle, Smith and Wesson .32 caliber, from which the fatal bullet was allegedly fired; the other a black handled Lee Johnson pistol, purportedly the property of the deceased man.

Governor Caldwell Vetoes TB Measure

TALLAHASSEE, June 13 (AP)—The act of shifting to the State part of the counties' expense of hospitalizing indigent tuberculosis patients was vetoed today by Governor Caldwell because the Legislature failed to provide revenue necessary to meet the extra state cost.

He also vetoed an act establishing a new budget system for commissioners and transferring authority to approve county budgets from the State Comptroller to the State Budget Commission.

The Governor said the tuberculosis act "eliminated the present formula under which the several counties are required to pay \$125 per diem or one-third of the charge for indigent and semi-indigent patients in the sanatoria of the State Tuberculosis Board."

This act reduces the county contribution to 75 cents per patient per day and shifts the difference between that figure and the presently charged \$125 per day patient from the counties to the State.

On the state basis of the anticipated cost, this would result in an additional cost to the State of \$12,500 a year.

St. Louis Strike Disrupts Public Transportation

ST. LOUIS, June 13 (AP)—Virtually everything on wheels that would run was pressed into service today as thousands of St. Louisans sought a way to get to their jobs after an early morning strike of street car and bus operators tied up public transportation in the St. Louis area of more than 1,000,000 population.

Public automobiles, ancient taxicabs which have been prohibited by the death of new cars and all available taxicabs jammed main thoroughfares, snarling traffic at most of the principal intersections.

Absenteeism ran high in the heavily industrialized city during the first hours of the strike which became 100 per cent effective with such suddenness that most individuals were totally unprepared.

Most workers faced the situation in good spirits and many drivers went out of their way to pick up hitch-hikers along the most heavily travelled streets. Hardly a single vehicle reached its destination without picking up a maximum load and many had passengers riding the running boards.

No attempt was made by the St. Louis Public Service Company to man street cars and buses which were cleared from their routes as soon as operations completed their scheduled runs.

CLARKSVILLE, Tenn., June 13 (AP)—The locomotive and two cars of a Louisville and Nashville freight train plunged through an open drawbridge into the Cumberland River 30 feet below shortly before noon here today. The engineer and fireman were trapped in the locomotive and given up for dead.

With a roar of hissing steam, the locomotive and cars disappeared quickly beneath the surface in from 20 to 30 feet of water.

OPERATIONS BLACKOUT
ATHENS, June 13 (AP)—The Greek army clamped a blackout on operations in the Olympian-Piera mountain area today, where it was reported that a new phase of the offensive against the guerrillas was underway. One informed source said that approximately 12,000 men were engaged in the newest operations.

Chaplin And Pickford Hit For Cutting Film

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The Federal Trade Commission accused Charlie Chaplin, Mary Pickford and their associates in United Artists, Inc., today of palming off on the public a bootlegged version of the film "The Death of Colonel Blimp" as the whole thing.

Further, the commission said that United Artists, in advertising the British movie, made use of laudatory reviews which were based on the showing of the whole, uncut film.

Ten Percent Sales Tax For Vet Bonus Is Soundly Defeated

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee approved today a \$211,530,353 appropriation for the Interior Department, adding \$54,116,840 to the amount voted by the House.

Principal increases are \$36,375,932 for the Reclamation Bureau and \$9,214,600 for the Bonneville Power Administration.

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The House Appropriations committee whacked \$330,540,732 today from the funds President Truman asked to finance 33 independent government agencies next year.

It approved an \$8,498,409,759 bill to finance the agencies work during the 12 months beginning July 1. The total cut was 3.7 percent below the amount Mr. Truman requested.

Veterans Administration Funds were trimmed \$130,884,220 or 1.8 per cent. VA got \$6,944,437,000. The cut for the 33 agencies brought to \$3,584,000,000 the claimed savings of House Republicans in their drive to chop \$6,000,000,000 from Mr. Truman's 1948 budget of \$37,500,000,000.

The committee proposed a \$43,449,000 fund for research in aerial weapons after hearing that potential foes might "jump at it" if they ever get air superiority.

The committee recommended the appropriation for use by the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics during the fiscal year starting July 1. It would be a \$12,736,000 increase over the amount granted last year.

The committee report said research in such weapons as guided missiles and planes of unprecedented speed is essential to national security.

Bevin Lauds Plan Of Marshall As East-West Link

LONDON, June 13 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin described Secretary Marshall's aid-for-Europe plan today as "a bridge to link the East and West" and said it would be "disastrous for ideological or other reasons to frustrate that great endeavor."

"We are glad to know that misunderstanding has been removed by including Russia in the American proposal," the Foreign Secretary told a luncheon of the Foreign Press Association.

Bevin, describing Marshall's Harvard address as one that "may well rank as one of the greatest speeches in world history," declared:

"As was the case when the U. S. proposed a four-power treaty for Europe, it seems to me that that great, new and wonderful country has acted in the most unselfish manner in its endeavor to use its great capacity to save Europe from another ruin and to rehabilitate it as urgently as possible."

Bevin said Britain was "exploring actively and urgently how best to respond" to Marshall's lead.

Ex-Premier Of Hungary Is On Way To U. S.

Effort To Be Made To Draw Attention Of U. S. Public To Recent Events

Tessie Nagy, deposed by the Communists as premier of Hungary, was en route to the United States today in what diplomats said apparently was an effort to draw attention of the U. S. Public to events in that central European public.

The United States accused Russia earlier this week of "a most flagrant interference in Hungarian affairs" in the alignment which placed the Communists, who polled 17 per cent of the last free vote, in charge.

Deputy Sulyok, who denounced the communists yesterday in the Hungarian Parliament, said today his Freedom Party would refuse to take part in national elections scheduled for September, unless they were supervised by an international body.

President Truman, who denounced the Communist coup in Hungary as an outrage, said on leaving Canada that U. S. Foreign Policy had but one objective, peace in the world and friendship with every nation. His words were interpreted as an effort to all troubled international waters.
