



General Motors reported Tuesday that it's net income for the initial three months of 1938 fell 29 per cent to \$184,601,266, or 63 cents a share, from \$251,367,742, or 93 cents a share a year ago. GM's dollar sales were off 11.6 per cent to \$2,731,378,348 from \$3,0018,974,030 in the initial quarter of 1957.

The corporation's domestic production fell 17 per cent to 780,841 cars and trucks, but its Canadian and overseas output rose 50 ped cent above a year ago to a record 201.022 unius.

As previously reported, Ford's first quarter set income toppled 77 per cent to \$38,700,000, or 48 cents a share, from \$100,800,000, or \$1.85 a share a year ago. Chrys-ler lost \$15,139,802 in the first quarter, against a net profit of \$16,543,521, or \$3.34 a share a year earlier.


