

Second "Battle Of Mobile" Looms As UDC Forces Deploy

MOBILE—(P) Decks are being cleared for the second battle of Mobile Bay. The United Daughters of the Confederacy in Alabama are lining up against the return of a Yankee flagship to this port.

Mrs. Joe E. Cooper, state president of the UDC, wired the Mobile Press Register from Huntsville that her group was ready to protest the proposed move.

The Mobile American Legion post and Knights of Columbus council fired the first gun when they proposed returning the USS Hartford, 94-year-old Union flagship to Mobile Bay as an historical shrine.

The Hartford was the ship on which Adm. David Farragut invaded Mobile Bay in 1864 shouting "Damn the torpedoes! Full speed ahead!"

Individual members of the UDC here have expressed the opinion that it is not appropriate for the ship to be permanently located in the port it once attacked.

This is particularly so they say since it would lie almost in the shadow of a statue of Mobile's own Adm. Raphael Semmes, famed Confederate naval hero.

The Mobile American Legion is expected to seek support of the national convention now meeting in New York in its efforts to bring the ship here.

Large Sum Saved By State Annually On Insurance Cost

TALLAHASSEE—(P)—The State of Florida is saving more than \$102,000 yearly through a reduction in fire insurance premiums on policies covering state-owned buildings, Insurance Commissioner J. Edwin Larson told the cabinet today.

The reductions became effective with renewals of the 3-year term of the so-called state schedule, the amount of insurance carried with commercial companies, and the 5-year term of the State Fire fund, through which the state insures its own properties.

About 22 per cent of the fire placed with commercial companies, with the remainder carried in insurance on state buildings is the state fund.

Larson said that through the co-operation of the Florida inspection and Rating Bureau every building owned by the state was re-rated before the policy renewal on July 1. The new ratings gave a 45 per cent public property credit on brick buildings and a 15 per cent credit on frame buildings.

This reduced the total annual premium on the fire insurance contracts from \$254,314 to \$151,882.

The reduction was effected, Larson said, even though there had been an increase of \$1,057,402 in the valuation of state-owned buildings, from \$98,438,235 to \$99,095,637.

SLOTS FOR DEFENSE
BOSTON—(P)—The payoff odds on about 100 slot machines were set today at 100-0 in favor of national defense.

The "one-armed bandits" were seized by federal agents and were to have been sunk at sea.

Herbert Wilkey, salvage officer for the Boston Chamber of Commerce, interceded Monday with the suggestion they be used for scrap metal to help defense efforts.

Paul G. Garney, National production Authority agent, agreed it was a good idea.

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HOLLYWOOD

HOLLYWOOD—The film studios are supposed to be betting only on sure things these days. It's a current Hollywood maxim to take no chances. Only the sure-fire money makers are being filmed today. There is one exception to this movement to satisfy the known public demands for orthodox film entertainment. Oddly enough, the picture is being made at MGM, home of glossy musicals and star-packed spectacles.

The film is called "See How They Run," and it is the first non-musical made by a major studio with an all-Negro cast. Its producer, Sol Fielding, admits that the venture is a financial gamble.

"The Negro audience will just about pay for the cost of the picture," he estimated. "If it has enough quality to attract segments of the white audience, it might make a profit."

The whole project began in the mind of a young Negro school teacher, Mary Elizabeth Trotman, Montgomery, Ala. She tried her hand at writing a short story concerning the experiences of a teacher in a Negro school. She sent it, along with a pleading letter, to the Ladies Home Journal. The magazine printed both.

Last year, the story was cited for a Christopher award and brought to the attention of MGM. The studio bought the story and assigned Emmet Lavery, author of "The Magnificent Yankee," to Dorothy Dandridge and Harry Belafonte, plus Philip Hepburn, an 11-year-old veteran of Broadway shows, including "Pinia's rainbow."

But unlike the other two all-Negro films of recent years—"Cabin in the Sky" and "Stormy Weather"—"See How They Run" is not a musical. Nor is it a story of Negro-white relations, as were "Home of the Brave," "Pinky," "Lost Boundaries" and "Intruder in the Dust."

"See How They Run" is the story of a boy in the third grade, said Producer Fielding, a former newspaper artist and foreign correspondent. "It could take place any place and to a boy of any race, but some of the events have more significance because they happen in a Negro community. There will be only one white actor in the cast, a doctor."

"We are taking a chance, not only because it has a Negro cast, but also because it does not have the climaxes of most film dramas. It is a tender story about a kind of Kluckhohnery Finn."

"It is being made economically, so there is not too much risk. The cast is inexpensive, and so is the story, and it is all being shot on the lot without locations. Just only large expense would be if we went overtime in the shooting schedule. It is 15 days." (Average for a big picture: 40).

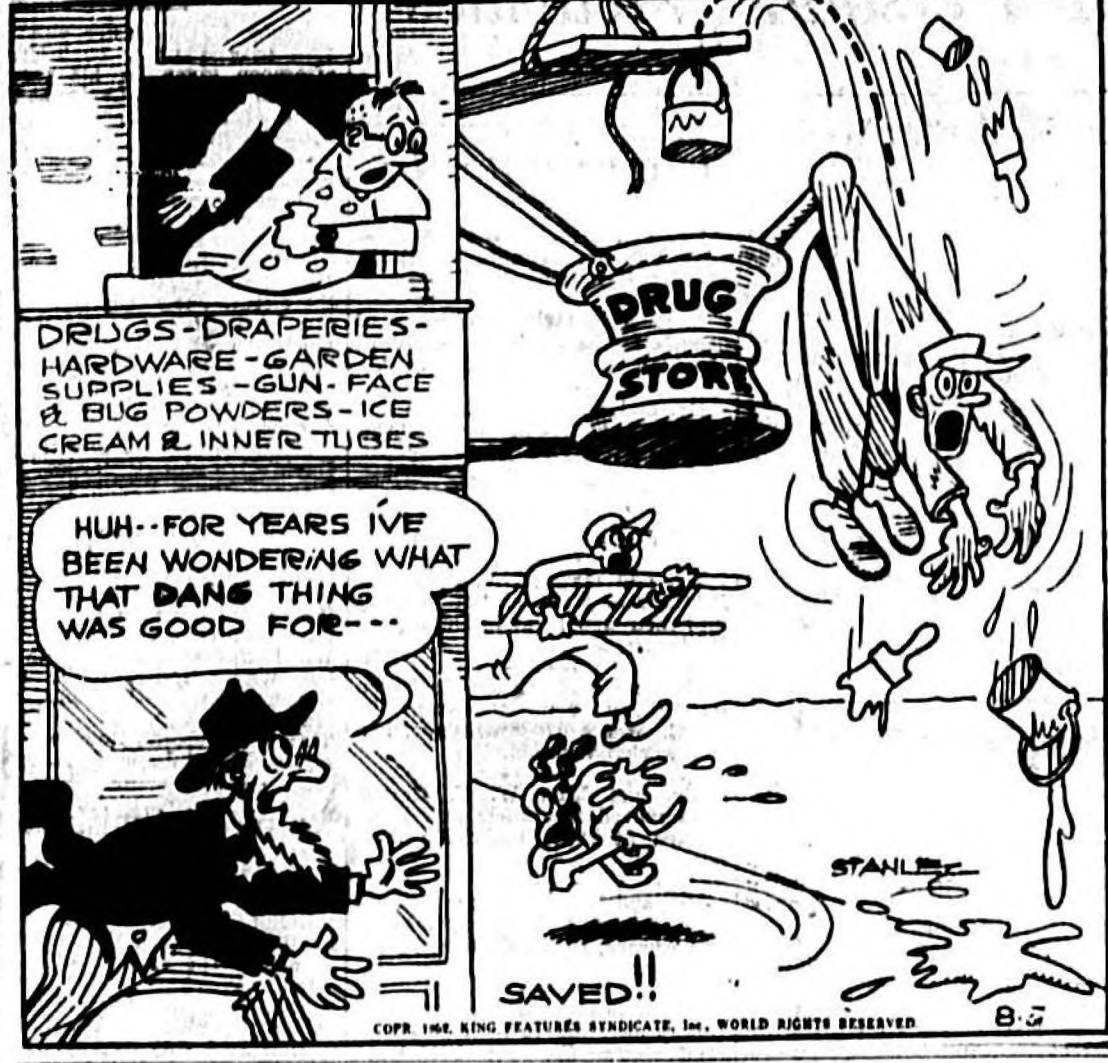
The Reconstruction Finance Corporation in Washington Monday declared this city a disaster area. That entitles homeowners, businessmen and civic authorities to lower interest loans.

Former Employee Seized In Theft Of Armored Car Sum

WASHINGTON—(P)—Police announced today a 26-year-old former employee of the Brink's Armored car service has admitted that he had pilfered a company car of \$65,000 Monday. The money has been recovered.

Police Inspector Jeremiah Flaherty identified the man as Ray Eugene Farmer, Washington, and said he has been charged with grand larceny.

Flaherty said Farmer entered the parked, unguarded armored car at noon Monday by using a duplicate key he had in his possession for some time.

The 4-man armored car crew was lunching at the Wardman Park Hotel at the time of the robbery.

Flaherty said Farmer hurried to Glen Echo Park in nearby Maryland and buried the \$65,000. The arrest was made, Flaherty said, because of a "hunch" by the Washington police chief, Robert V. Murray.

Murray recalled that Farmer, who worked for Brink's from 1946 to 1949, once belonged to a gang of youths who showed up with a number of Brink's uniforms and, when arrested for another crime, told police they had planned to attack one of the company's armored cars.

So police went to Farmer's home at 9 p. m. Monday night and took him to headquarters. After an all-night questioning session, Flaherty said, Farmer admitted the robbery and took the police to the amusement park and dug up the money.

It was all there, all \$65,000 of it, Flaherty said that while Farmer took the loot in small bills, he passed up another \$200,000 in large denomination money.

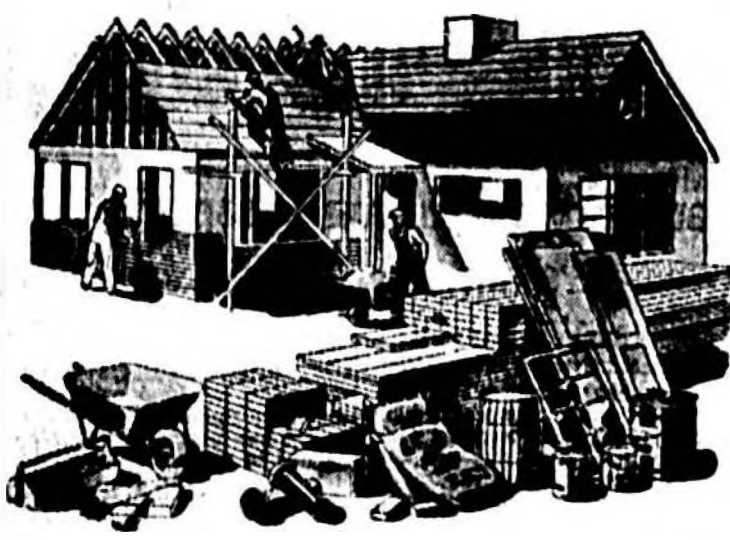

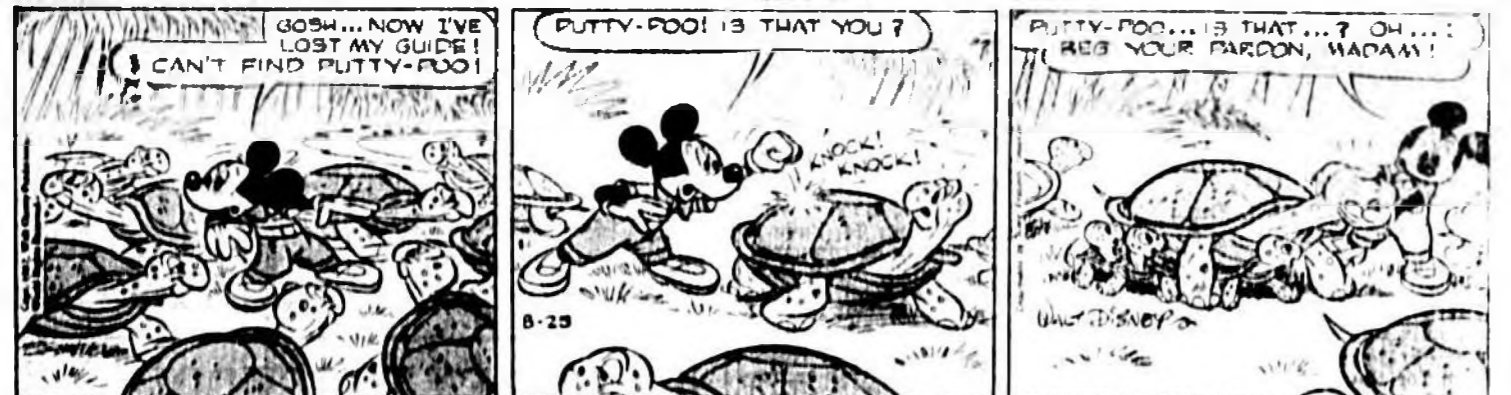

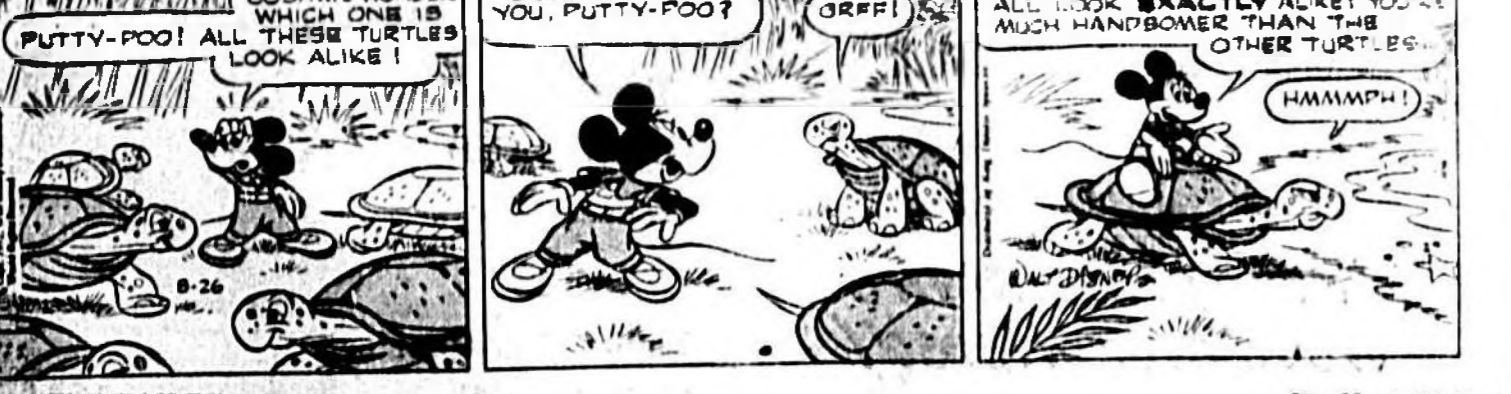
