British Jet Bomber Spans Atlantic Two Ways In Single Day

History Making Flight Also Establishes City Commission New Time Record For West-East Hop

NORTHERN IRELAND (49-A British jet bomber flashed across the Atlantic Ocean and back today In slightly over 10 hours.

The double crossing in a single day was the first in history. The sleek black Cunberra also sinushed all previous records for a west to east passage as it streaked home from Gauder, Newfoundland, western terminus of the epic flight.

The whole trip of 1.111 miles took 10 hours four minutes, including a 2-hour stopover at

11:00 A. M.—Arrived Gander. 1:10 P. M.—Left Gander. 4:88 P. M .- Reached Aldergrove. The plane fought 100 mile an hour headwinds on its east to west flight, but was helped by them on the trin home.

The average speed on the home leg was just over 600 miles an hour. The 2,072-mile flight took three hours 26 minutes. The flight from Northern Ireland to New-foundland required four lours 38 minutes. That was almost 40 miles an hour slower than the east-to-west record of 483.91 miles an hour established last August in the same plane by the same pilot-Wing Commander Roland Beaumont of the Royal Air Force.

The new west-to-cast record was easy to establish. For more than 15 years the record has been 20 hours 29 minutes, set by the Americans H. T. Merrill and J. S. Large Sum Saved By State Annually **On Insurance Cost**

TALLAHASSEE -(A) Tho State of Florida is saving more than \$102,000 yearly through a reduction in fire insurance pre-miums on policies covering stateowned buildings, Insurance Com-missioner J. Edwin Larson told the cabinet today.

The reductions became effective with renewals of the 3-year term of the so-called state schedule, th amount of insurance carried with commercial companies, and the 5-year term of the State Fire fund, through which the state insures

Its own properties. About 22 per cent of the fire placed with commercial compan-ies, with the remainder carried in insurance on state buildings is the state fund.

Larson said that through the tion and Rating Bureau every building owned by the state was re-rated before the policy renewals on July 1. The new ratings taye a 45 per cent public property credit on brick buildings and a 15 per cent credit on frame build-

This reduced the total annual premium on the fire insurance contracts from \$254,314 to \$151,-

The reduction was effected, Larson said, even though there had been an increase of \$4,657,-402 in the valuation of state-owned buildings, from \$88,438,235 to \$98,095,637.



HOLLYWOOD By BOB THOMAS

HOLLYWOOD on — The film studios are supposed to be betting only on sure things these days. it's a current Hollywood maxim to take no chances. Only the surefire money makers are being filmed today. There is one excep-tion to this movement to satisfy the known public demands for or-thodox film entertainment. Oddly

thodox film entertainment. Oddly enough, the picture is being made at MGM, home of glossy musicals and star-packed spectacles.

The film is called "See How They Run," and it is the first non-musical made by a major studio with an all-Negro cast. Its producer, Sol Fielding, admits that the venture is a financial gamble.

"The Negro audience will just about pay for the cost of the picture," he estimated. "If it has enough quality to attract a seg.

ture," he estimated. "If it has enough quality to attract a segmen of the white audience, it might make a profi."

The whole project began in the mind of a young Negro school-teacher, Mary Elizabeth Vroman, Montgomery, Ala. She tried her hand at writing a short story concerning the experiences of a teach cerning the experiences of a teach-er in a Negro school. She sent it, Ladies Home Journal. The maga-zine printed both.

Last year, the story was cited for a Christopher award and brought to the attention of MGM. The studio bought the story and assigned Emmet Lavery, author of "The Magnificent Yankes," to Dorothy Dandridge and Harry Belafonte, pplus Philip Hepburn, an 11-year-oid veteran of Broadway shows, including "Finian's rain-bow."

But unlike the other two all-Ne-gro films of recent years—"Cabla in the Sky" and "Stormy Weather"—"See How They Run" is not a musical. Nor is it a story of Negro-white relations, as were home of the Brave," "Pinky," "Lost Boundaries" and "Intruder in the

"See Ho wThey Run' is the stor; of a boy in the third grade," said Producer Fielding, a former news-paper artist and foreign corre-spondent. "It could take place any place and to a boy of any race. dut some of the events have more significance because they happen in a Negro community. There will be only one white actor in the cast, a doctor.

a doctor.

"We are taking a chance, not only because it has a Negro cast, but also because it does not have the climaxes of most film dramas. It is a tender story about a kind of Huckleberry Finn.

"It is being made economically, so there is not too much risk. The cast is inexpensive, and so is the story, and it is all being shot on the lot without locations. Our only large expense would be if we went overtime in the shooting schedule. It is 15 days." (Average for a big picture: 40).
