AKRON, Dec. 6, (AP)—The War Department has unveiled one of the closest guarded secrets of the war. And it's no wonder that a rubber band or a riddle or an automobile tire was a collector's item during the duration. It seems that rubber was one of the grand illusions of warfare, and as such, added the American Army inevitably.

the illusion that seemed the reality. It took the place of huge combat vehicles. The whole story is so fantastic, so much like something out of Hollywood, it seems hardly believable that such a trick could work so well. But it did. It was all a matter of balloons -- balloons as ingenious and much more practical than the ones you see in parades sometimes, and in Mardi Gras festivals. Several of the country's biggest rubber companies built to actual size great numbers of pneumatic balloon-fabric models of boats, tanks, guns, planes, and other equipment -- to be inflated or deflated, as it was needed. They simply blew up the balloons placed in the air, where they wanted them, and presto. There were fleets of invasion craft that didn't exist,

loaded with weapons that never were forged, and pointed for attacks that never were planned. But it all appeared so real that the Germans didn't know the difference. Hence, confusion. As fast as the companies could complete the dummies, they were turned over to the Army and Navy for shipment to Europe. They made the journey inflated and folded, with a minimum demand upon precious cargo space. The last shipment, just before D-Day, was rushed to England by plane. Tacticians would place what appeared to be an entire army in the field or in British toris at some point where enemy observers would find it. Then while the enemy was concerned with that equipment, the actual armies would move under cover of darkness or camouflage to some point isolated from the illusionary army. And when the balloon army had served its confusing purpose in one spot, it was folded up and moved by truck to another false base. Confusion of the enemy was a valuable weapon, and these inflated rubber balloon models and the trick.

18 Year Old Marine Visits St. Paul To End It All

NEW YORK, Dec. 10 (AP).—It was Sunday afternoon. In the streets the Sunday crowds strolled not too briskly, because it was pleasant for December. The towers and steeples of Manhattan lifted and caught the sunlight, the sunlight lay in the streets. Shop windows glittered with Christmas luxuries with furs and perfumes, satin and lace and sermons.

He was a young Marine, a private. They learned later that his name was Harold Dunster, that his home was in Auburn, N. Y.; that he was just 18. They found he had been attached to the New York Navy Yard, had recently been a patient in St. Albans Naval Hospital; that he had entered the Marine corps last July, and had not been overseas.

But that was before the young man had walked into the forty-third church and had in the first row. Suddenly a shot rang out in the dim quiet. They found a boy there, with a bullet through his head. He had fired the shot himself. And no one seems to know why he did it.

The school believes a field house out there would be worth its cost a hundred times, especially if gym equipment could be installed for public use outside of school hours. This town needs a good gymnasium. Prof. Morris says plans are being made to build one.

Repatriation Of Jap Troops Topic Of Meet

Presence Of Japs In China Seen As Menace To American-Chinese Relations

(By Associated Press)
Lieut. General Albert C. Wedemeyer says the repatriation of the Japanese expeditionary forces was the main topic at the high command conference in Tokyo over the weekend. This meeting was attended by Wedemeyer, as the American commander in China; Vice Admiral Daniel E. Barbey, of the Seventh Fleet; Admiral Raymond Spruance, and General MacArthur.

It may be assured that the conference was not concerned with merely accommodating Japanese troops aboard in the same sense that American doughboys are being sent home. The presence of Wedemeyer and Barbey at the meeting implied strongly that it bore strongly on two questions: First—the American position after the North China powder keg; and secondly—the coming arrival of General George C. Marshall, as soon as he can shake loose his Pearl Harbor question.

The importance of demobilizing and repatriating the Japanese, which has been proceeding slowly, is to be seen in the disposition of the various forces in North China. The American Marines are concentrated around Tientsin and Peiping. The Chinese Nationalists are strung out in a thin line all the way from Tientsin to Mukden. In the same area are the Chinese Communist Fourth and Eighth Route Armies. It's impossible to get an accurate picture of the Communist strength in this zone, but the Chinese Reds undoubtedly are stronger than the Nationalists who are engaging in skirmishes on several widely-scattered sectors. In the background Japanese still armed and perhaps still in many as all the other combined.

With all these forces together a potentially dangerous situation exists—made even more delicate by the presence of the Japanese and the American Marines who already are involved in shooting incidents. Although the Marines were sent to North China for the purpose of demobilizing the Japanese, there are some who believe that this has become a camouflage. There are suggestions that their real purpose is to support the Chinese Nationalists against the Communists. This already has resulted in complications. There have been at least two incidents in recent days in which Marines have been killed or wounded by what are generally referred to as Chinese bandits. There was the Marine shelling of an undefended civilian Chinese town. Two fires, which are officially listed as being of undetermined origin, destroyed more than \$1,000,000 worth of American radio and radar equipment last night at the operations and control tower building at Peiping's west airfield.

CHUNGKING, Dec. 11. (AP)—

The official Chinese News Agency says that the Chinese and Soviet have reached an agreement on the occupation of Manchuria by Chungking troops.

The Chinese troops are to be flown into Manchuria. The News Agency dispatch says Russian military authorities have agreed to give protection to Chinese central government troops whenever they land in Manchuria.

Chief Of Staff Says FDR'S Instructions Being Followed At Time Of Jap Raid

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11. (AP)—General George Marshall has testified that President Roosevelt was responsible for orders to American commanders to wait for an overt act by the Japs. The former Army Chief of Staff told the congressional committee investigating Pearl Harbor that the late President had ordered such instructions included in orders issued prior to the Jan. attack on Dec. 7, 1941. Marshall added that Mr. Roosevelt's directions were being followed when Gen. Walter Short was shot, quote, "The United States desires that Japan commit the first overt act." At the time of Pearl Harbor, General Short was commander in Hawaii.
