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## Lake Mary protest takes strange twist

### No one shows for protest; 'Organizer' smells a rat

LAKE MARY — Controversy over Paradise Park won't die.

A press release sent to local media during the weekend indicated residents planned to protest Lake Mary City Commission's decision to scrap plans for Paradise Park. However, only the local media and several curious bystanders showed up at the designated time Monday afternoon if what appears to be political gamesmanship.

The news advisory stated a protest was planned for 4:30 p.m. at the corner of Country Club Road and Lake Mary

Boulevard. By 5:30 p.m. Monday, the only indication of a protest were unattended signs and flyers.

Lisa Patterson, whose name and phone number appeared as the contact person on the new advisory, said she knew nothing about the scheduled protest until several people called her Monday evening

asking her questions about it.

"I did not authorize or initiate this press statement," Patterson said. "It could possibly be politically motivated."

Patterson said she believes politics may be involved as a result of a postcard that was mailed this weekend protesting Lake Mary Mayor David Meador and the City

Commission's decision not to go forward with the Preservation 200 grant for the proposed Paradise Park. Several quotes, including one made by Patterson, are included on the mailout.

"I believe someone from the Seminole County Democratic Executive Committee used my name without approval to orchestrate this so-called press conference for their own political gain," Patterson said. "This has nothing to do with the park."

"It is not fair to the cause, which has always been the preserve."

The postcard's return address was listed.

## Soup kitchen open or not?

Despite mediated compromise, controversy continues

SANFORD — The compromise between Historic District residents and a local soup kitchen has become a source of controversy between the two groups.

Seven residents who filed a lawsuit against the city of Sanford, agreed to drop that suit if Jean Metts, director of Seminole Volunteer Enterprises (SVE) would limit the hours of operation

and number of patrons served. However, those residents are now considering on whether to push ahead with the suit because they say Metts has already violated the agreement and an order by the city to cease serving meals.

The residents and their attorney, Clifford Correia, say Metts violated the agreement when she opened for business Friday night. Despite Thursday's compromise, the agreement states in paragraph 4 that the "mediated settlement agreement is contingent upon approval of the city commission of the city of Sanford, Fla."

The City Commission has yet to take up the matter.

The fact of the matter is the

## Woman drowns in her hot tub

### Boyfriend finds body in River Oaks facility

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Police are searching for answers as to why a 23-year-old Altamonte Springs woman drowned in a jacuzzi on Friday.

Maxine Moore, who resided in unit 115 in the River Oaks Apartment Complex, 551 Little River Loop, drowned in the

apartment complex's community hot tub Friday morning. Altamonte Springs police are still investigating the cause of her drowning, but consider it to be an accident.

"Right now, we have no idea how she drowned," said Officer Mike Nelson, spokesman for the Altamonte Springs police. "We are waiting for results from the toxicology report and the autopsy."

At 10:29 a.m., a 911 call was received from the River Oaks Apartment Complex. One of the apartment workers reported

## City may demolish troubled apartment complex by May

### Inspectors test for asbestos before moving ahead

SANFORD — The Ridgewood Villas apartment complex located near Seminole High School could be demolished within 30 days. Sanford is accepting bids from demolition contractors. Charles Ruwe, director of community development for the

city, said Monday that demolition of the 60-unit apartment complex is expected to take place in about 30 days.

Before the demolition can proceed, the city will also contract for an asbestos survey to be performed. The survey is expected to be complete in about one week, at an estimated cost of about \$3,000.

The total cost of demolition is expected to be between \$80,000 and \$100,000.

"It's impossible to say how much demolition will cost, because that depends on the asbestos issue," Ruwe said. "The survey may say there is

only a small amount of asbestos, or there may be quite a bit."

City officials expect that any asbestos found within the apartment complex will be non-friable. Friable asbestos is easily released into the air when disturbed, while non-friable asbestos is more easily contained.

The apartment complex is about 20 years old. At that time, companies were not using friable asbestos during construction.

"We hope this is not friable asbestos," Ruwe said.





# Life Style

## Irrigation necessary to maintain good growth of plants

The demand for water in Florida is always increasing due to a steady population growth. We must learn how to make better use of the limited water resources available by practicing water conservation.

Rainfall in Florida is about 52 inches of water per year, which could be considered adequate if we think that one inch of rain per week is sufficient to cover the needs of most plants. Most of the rainfall occurs during the months of June through September, with little rain occurring the rest of the year. During this period, supplemental irrigation is necessary to maintain good growth for most landscape plants.

### When To Water

Frequency of watering depends on plant species, soil type, time of year and weather conditions. That makes it difficult to establish a general rule that will apply to all cases.

There is only one rule that never fails, most plants will show their need of water by wilting. Some plants will not show obvious symptoms of water stress but sometimes other types of symptoms will appear such as leaf drop, browning of leaf tips or leaf margins.

**How much Water:** As a general rule, plants in full sunlight will need watering every three to five days. Most Florida's soils will hold about 3/4 inches of water per irrigation period.

**Irrigation of landscape plants** is usually done with sprinklers, which must be calibrated to deliver the 3/4 inches

of water required for most plants. A simple method used is to place containers in the area covered by the sprinklers to determine how much time it takes for the

sprinklers to deliver 3/4 inches of water. Simply, measure the depth of the water level in the containers until it reaches the desired amount of water, and record how much time it took to reach that level. Adjust your timer accordingly if you have an automatic watering system or if you do it manually, remember to turn on the sprinklers for just that period of time. It is recommended that if you have an automatic watering system you should install a shutoff device when it rains.

### Watering Methods

Sprinklers are one of the most popular methods of watering your landscape plants. Sprinkler systems are versatile and can be operated automatically or manually to deliver the necessary amount of water.

A hose-end sprinkler can be used in small areas to cover the water needs of your landscape plants. This method requires more labor to move the sprinkler around but it is very economical.

**Micro irrigation** is a very efficient method of delivering a small amount of water to the root system of the plants. By wetting only the root zone, the amount of water used is minimal and it also limits weed growth.

**Micro-sprinklers** can cover areas of three to twenty feet in diameter and are an excellent way to deliver water to specific areas in your landscape.

Watering plants with a hose is not an efficient way to deliver water to plants. Usually water is applied faster than the soil can absorb it, resulting in soil erosion and exposing plant root to direct sunlight.

### Time Of Watering

The simplest rule is to water early in the morning. In the mornings, there is minimal evaporation, since wind and temperature are low, and the time that the plants remain wet is also minimal.

Watering during the day results in water loss due to evaporation. Watering at night increases the amount of time that

the plant remains wet, creating a good environment for the development of diseases.

### Water Saving Practices

There are some other practices that result in water conservation:


- Mulches** — The use of mulches will reduce evaporation and consequently reduce watering.

- Drought Tolerant Plants** — By landscaping with plants adapted to low soil water levels, you can conserve water because these plants require less water for maintaining a good growth.

- Windbreaks** — Windbreaks, by cutting wind velocity, decrease evaporation. Trees, fences, hedges, and shrub beds will function as windbreakers in the landscape.

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# School hosts 'biggest baby shower'

**LAKE MARY** — Ten-year-old Allie Conti says that she is looking forward to giving to those who are in need throughout her life.

The fifth grader is not alone among the students at Heathrow Elementary School. Nearly all 900 students at the school gave an estimated 1,000 new, reusable items to the Coalition for the Homeless of Orlando in a gift drive that culminated Friday with the fourth annual World's Biggest Baby Shower.

Marks contends that Metts can open when she wants because all parties agreed to the settlement.

"I talked to the city attorneys, I talked with Cliff what his name is, and we told them we would open Monday" (Metts actually opened Friday).

Carenello would not comment about the controversy, citing a confidentiality agreement.

Sanford City Manager Tony Vanderwerp disagreed with Marks.

"I assumed she wasn't going to open until the settlement was complete," Vanderwerp said.

Mayor Larry Dale also said he believed the soup kitchen would

not open until the commission took action.

"That's an in-your-face attitude Jean is taking," Dale said.

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
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
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
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# Longwood considers a tax cut

**LONGWOOD** — A tax cut may be on the way in Longwood. Longwood Mayor Paul Lovestrud said during Monday's City Commission session that he will propose lowering the city's millage rate during budget hearings this summer. The budget hearings will be held in August, with a final budget adopted by Oct. 1.

Currently, city residents pay \$5.06 per \$1,000 of assessed eval-

uation on their home. This means that a Longwood resident who owns a home valued at \$105,000, with a \$25,000 homestead exemption, pays \$404.80 in taxes on the property.

"I am going to ask that the city lower the millage rate to under 5," Lovestrud said. "At least to 4.9. We are doing well financially, and we can afford to give the taxpayers a break. It's not going to break us."

Meanwhile, City Manager John Drago said he will request that Florida Recycling Services look

into lowering solid waste collection rates, which were raised for Longwood two weeks ago because of increased fuel costs.

Seminole County on March 14 lowered the tipping fees of the county landfill, which translates into lower garbage collection costs. Florida Recycling was not aware of the county's actions when the request to raise garbage collection rates in Longwood was made, Drago said.

Residents of Longwood will pay higher solid waste collection rates beginning in May.

An inspection of the condemned apartment complex performed by city officials on Friday did not find any vagrants on site, Rowe said.

The fire was contained, and only Building two was lost. No one was injured in the blaze.

An earlier fire broke out in two units in the apartment complex in August, 1999.



## Drug/ Alcohol boating deaths up 20% in 1999

TALLAHASSEE - Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) Executive Director Allan L. Egbert has announced that 58 boating fatalities occurred on Florida waterways in 1999.

This represents a decrease from 73 in 1998, but Florida waterways are still the deadliest in the nation. Statistics compiled by the FWC Division of Law Enforcement also show that while the number of fatalities decreased, the percentage of alcohol and drug related fatalities increased, from 35 percent in 1998 to 55 percent in 1999.

"We are encouraged by decreases in the number of boating fatalities, but we are very concerned that alcohol-related fatalities are at record levels in the state," Egbert said. "These accidents are preventable. We need strong deterrents to boating under-the-influence, and we must raise the public's awareness."


The Division of Law Enforcement is placing an emphasis on reducing alcohol- or drug related boating fatalities. FWC law enforcement officers will increase water patrols and be on the lookout for impaired boat operators.

The FWC reminds all boaters to "Stay Afloat. Don't Drink and Boat."



areas, and now is the perfect time of year to hike."

You can begin your hiking adventure in the Ocala National Forest, where the famous Florida National Scenic Trail was started by a handful of volunteers about 30 years ago. The Ocala Wildlife Management Area (WMA) is a 382,408 acre expanse of Florida scrub habitat located in Putnam, Marion and Lake counties. The trail runs in a north-south direction through the middle of the area, and you're likely to see a large variety of wildlife including deer, fox, alligator, bear, and a wide assortment of birds, including scrub jays and bald eagles.

"If you venture into the forest, don't forget your fishing gear and fishing license," said Hill. "Numerous fishing holes along the way offer excellent opportunities for those who want to stop and cast a line."

If you continue south on the Florida Trail you'll end up in the 6,000 acre Seminole Ranch WMA, which borders the St. Johns River in east Orange County. The area is a wildlife haven consisting primarily of river marsh, open pasture land, hardwood hammocks and cabbage palm hammocks.

The Tosohatchee WMA is next along the way. It consists of 28,000 acres in Orange County near the community of Christmas. Here the famous trail runs beside swamps, through pine flatlands, oak forests and along tree-lined dikes along the St. Johns River flood plain. The loop trails in Tosohatchee make good day hikes for those who don't want to spend days in the woods, and there's plenty to see whether you're there for a few hours or a few days.

In fact, right now is a great time to head to Jim Creek Swamp on the north side of Tosohatchee to see a virgin bald cypress stand. The area is home to a wide variety of wildlife including deer, turkey, osprey and bald eagle. In the springtime it bursts with colorful

wildflowers including wild iris whose purple blooms blanket the woods, drainage areas and the edges of the swamp. Don't forget the camera for some unforgettable pictures!

In addition to the wide variety of flora and fauna, there are at least 30 known Indian mounds on Tosohatchee WMA.

Bull Creek WMA is the next stop along the Florida Trail. It's a 22,000 acre expanse of pine/palmetto flatwoods, scattered bayheads and creek swamps in Osceola County. Remnants of the old turpentine, pitch and resin industries are still evident in Bull Creek in the form of rail and tram roads used for logging during the early 20th century. Pines in the northeast corner of Bull Creek WMA still have "catfaces" - areas on trees where iron gutters were attached to harvest the pitch.

The trail passes through stands of cabbage palms, hardwoods and cypress, scrub oak and sand pine communities. The west leg winds through pine flatwoods and prairies dotted with cypress domes.

Before the Florida Trail leaves the FWC's Central Region, it passes through beautiful Three Lakes WMA, a 45,300 acre area in Osceola County. The WMA includes the Prairie Lakes Unit, which is open from 8 a.m. until sunset, and requires a permit for camping. Call the FWC's Ocala Regional Office at 352-732-1225 for more details.

Much of Three Lakes WMA is open pine/palmetto flatwoods, but there are some scattered cypress domes and small oak hammocks. There is an abundance of wildlife, including sandhill cranes and a population of whooping cranes, which have been introduced by the FWC in an effort to establish a resident population of these beautiful and endangered birds.

Hiking any area of the Florida Trail can offer exciting, memorable experiences, depending upon how much planning you do, the time of day and year, and

weather conditions. Early morning and evening are the best times to view wildlife, when they are out and about feeding.

Now that you know where to go, it's time to get your family and friends together and head out to see some of Florida's wild areas. Be sure to wear comfortable hiking shoes and suitable clothing and bring along bug spray, binoculars, field guides, a camera, and a canteen of water. Also remember that most of these areas are primitive, with few or no modern amenities.

"Before you set off, let someone at home know where you're headed and when you plan to return, and learn how to use a compass so you can find your way out if you wander off the trail," said Hill.

### FISHING FORECAST

**Sebastian Inlet** has good catch-and-release snook action with fish to 20 pounds. Bare leadhead jigs tipped with a large live shrimp is the top offering. Also expect trout, redfish, ladyfish, and jack crevalle.

River action is great with bass, bream, catfish, and speckled. Bass are hot from Puzzle Lake south to Lake Winter, while bream, catfish, and speckled prefer deep bays. Use tiny Rapalas and light spinning tackle to really slay the bass.

**Captain Jack at Port Canaveral** reports that offshore action is slow due to high seas. Inside the Port look for flounder and sheepshead. Trout and redfish are fair in the Banana and Indian rivers.

**Dance Inlet** has fast action with sheepshead, small bluefish, drum, redfish, jack crevalle and ladyfish. Live or dead shrimp is the top bait. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.
