Poppy is tall, blond and mini-skirted. Also smart. As a student at the University of Texas, she was a society girl and a beauty contest finalist. She was also a math major.

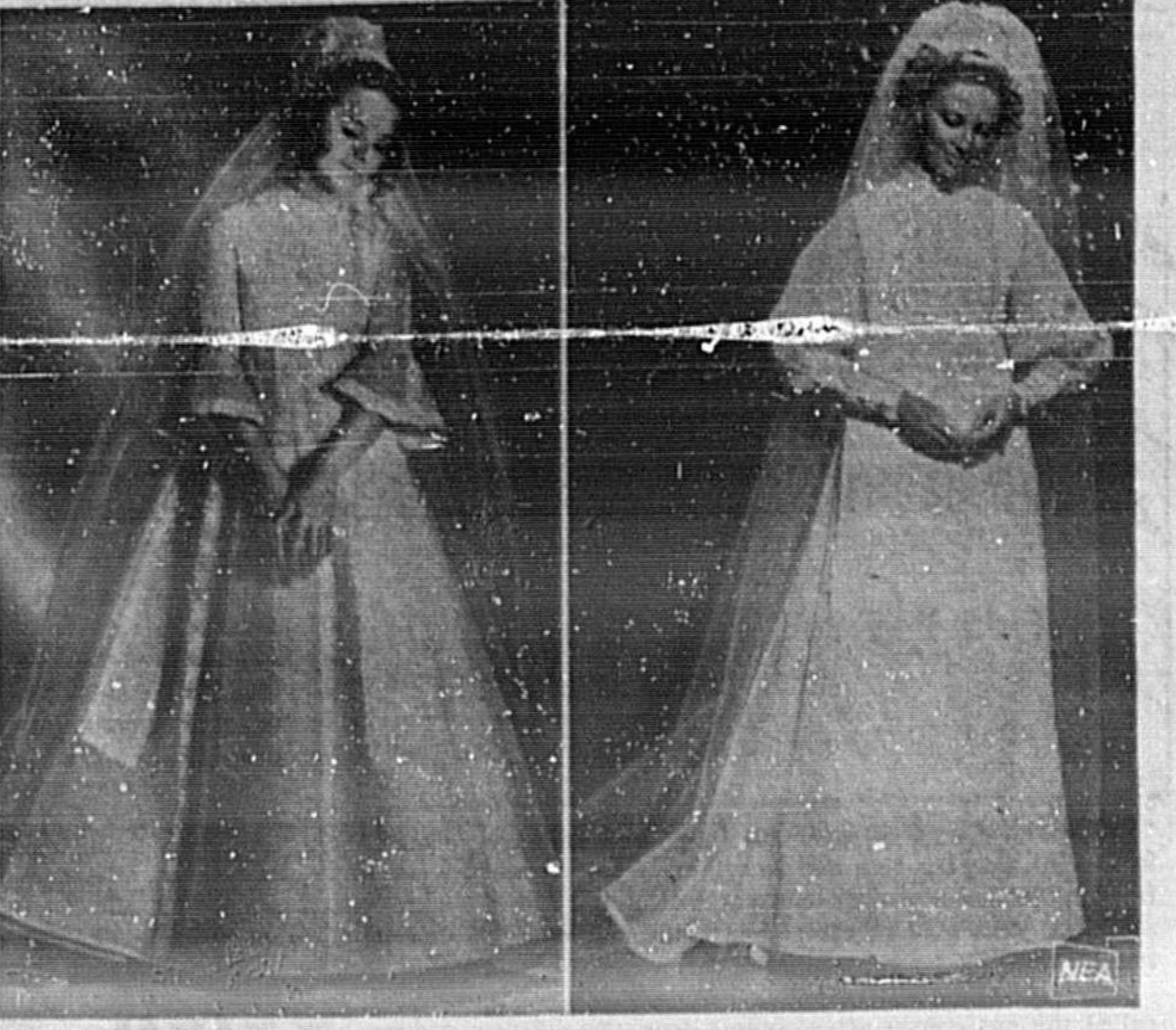
"I always had a high aptitude for math," she said, "and I also didn't want to be a secretary, which made math and a technical career appealing."

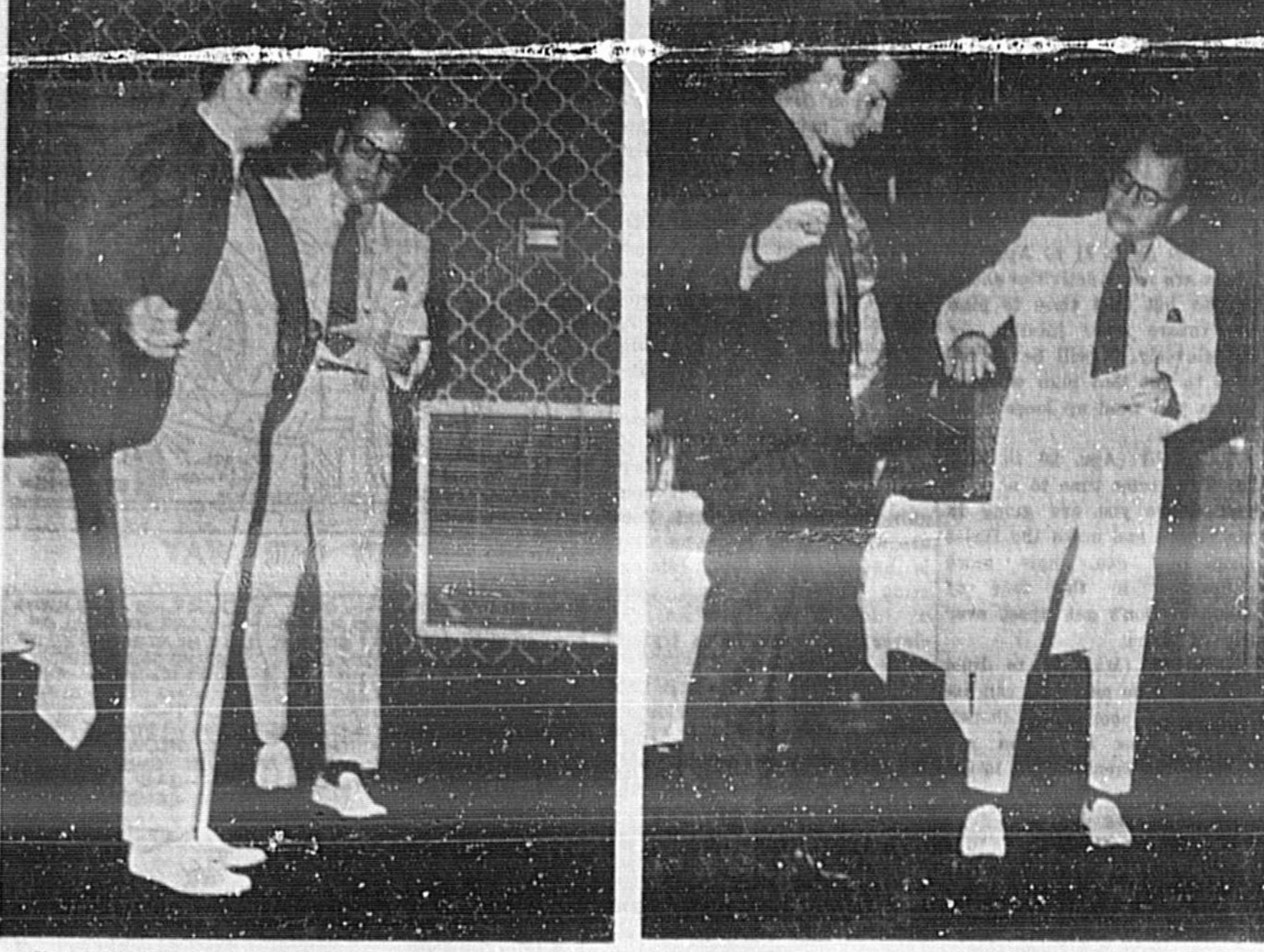

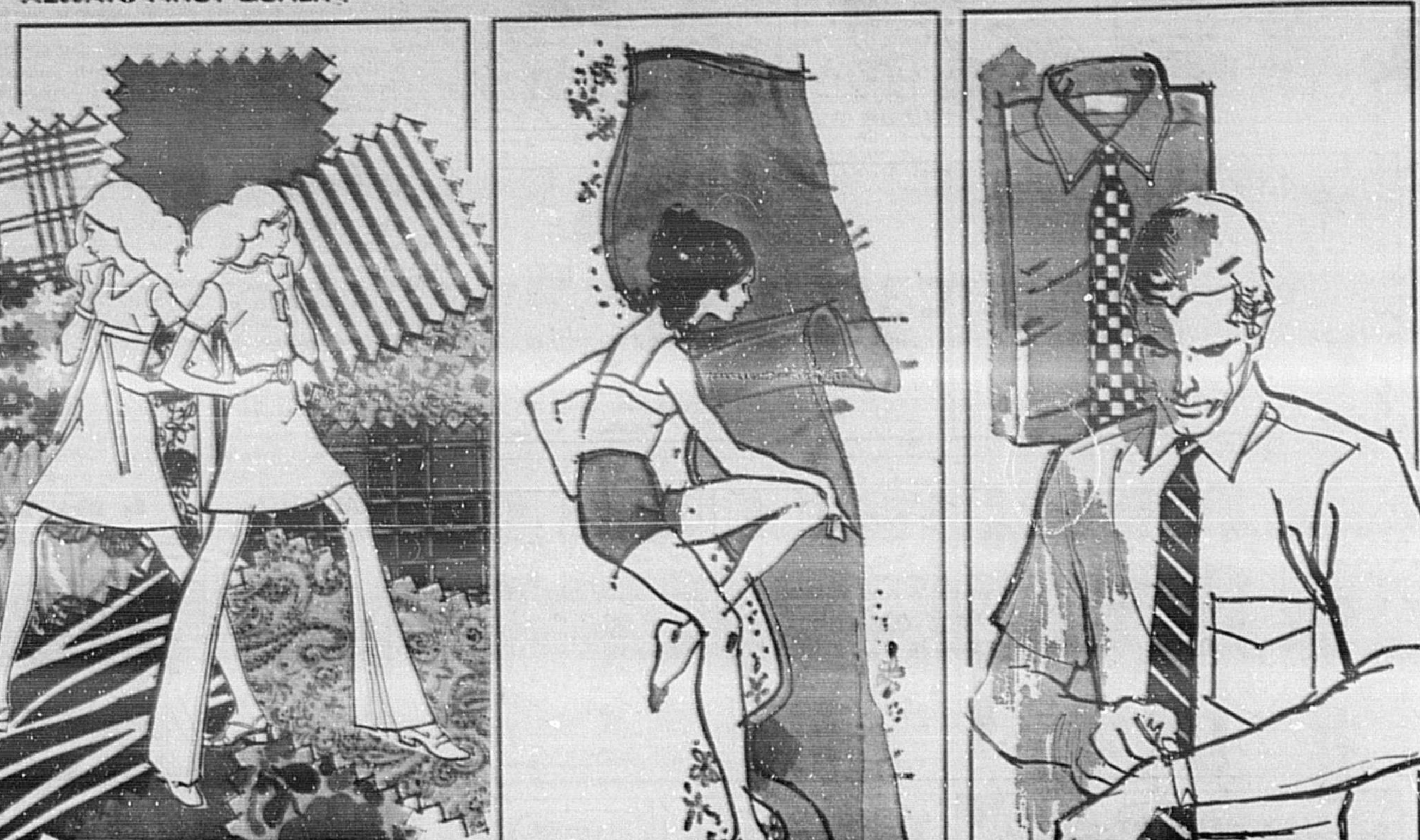

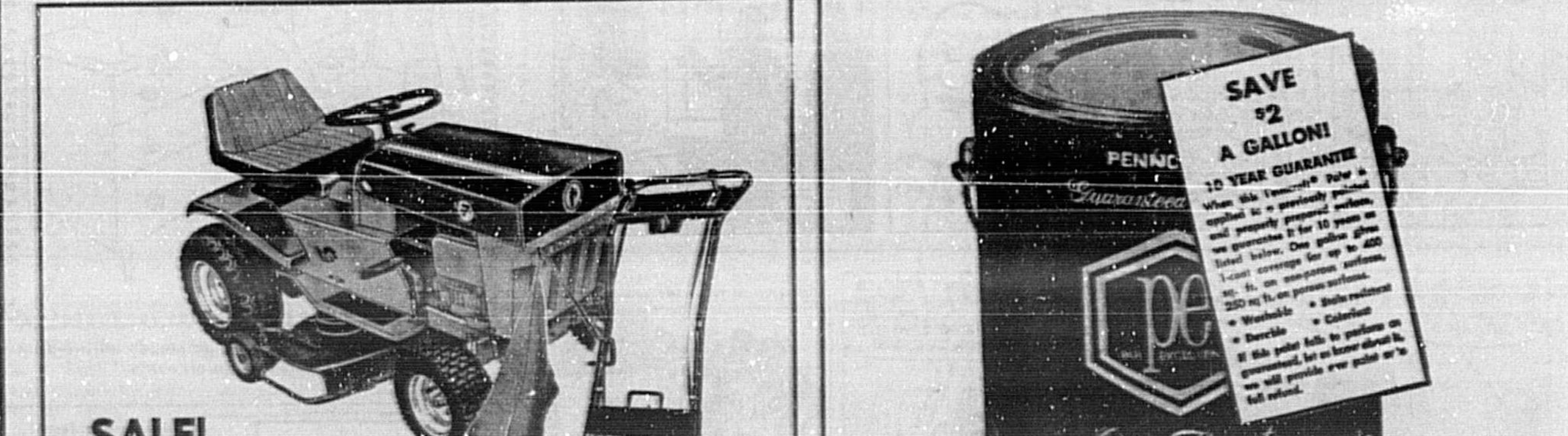

U. S. Transport Shot Down Reds Clobber Allied Bases

SAIGON (UPI)—Communists shot down an American transport plane and shelled 40 Allied bases Thursday night and today in the third day of an offensive that has killed more Americans than died all of last week.

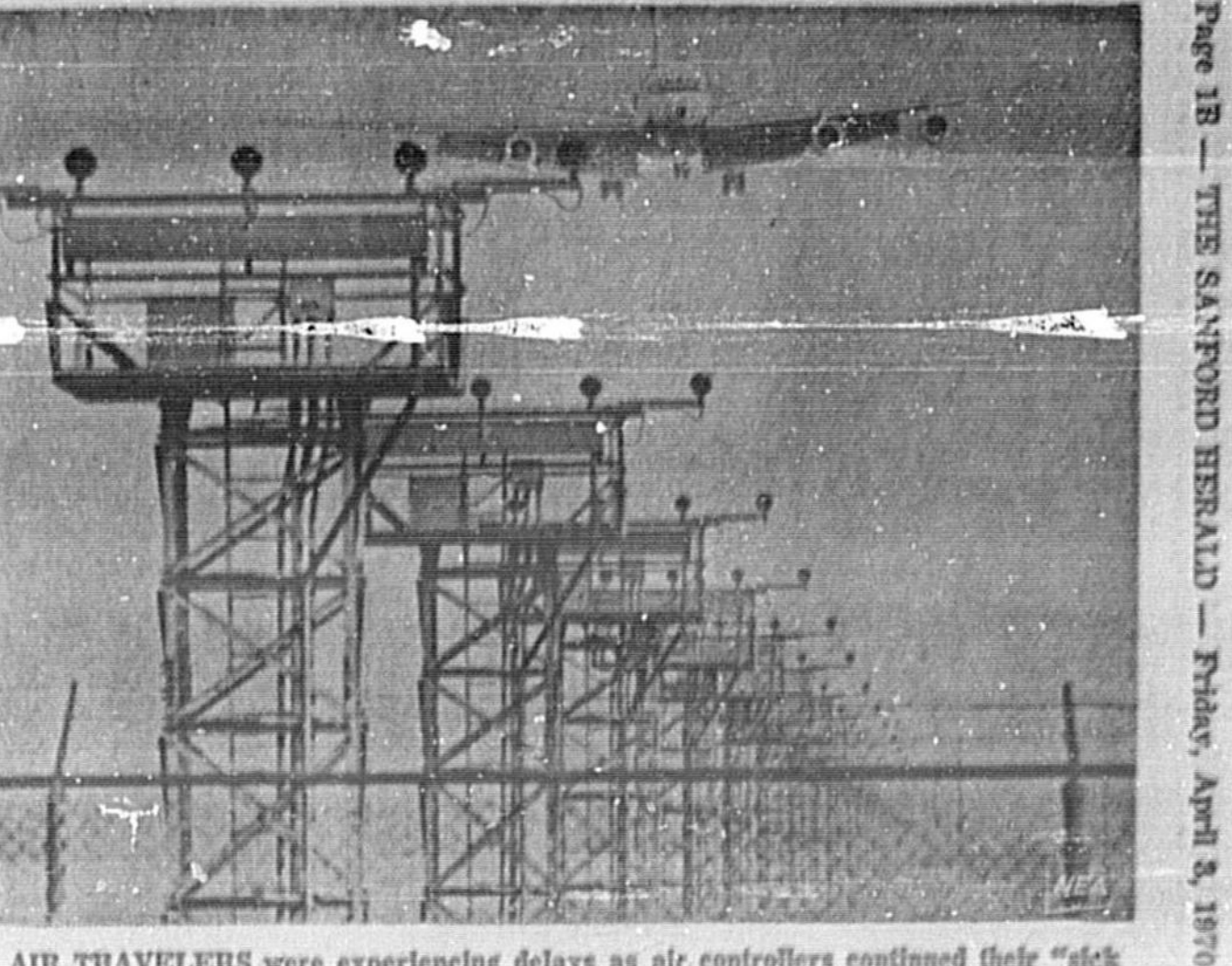
The Viet Cong and North Vietnamese drive has killed more than 80 GIs and wounded more than 400, military sources said. South Vietnamese losses were put at 236 dead and Communist dead at more than 1,000.

The American losses included seven men killed Thursday in the explosion of a Viet Cong booby trap near Duc Pho, 80 miles southeast of Da Nang.

The blast wounded 19 other Americans and killed a Vietnamese civilian and a prisoner.

Ground fire shot down an Air Force C-7 Caribbea transport plane Thursday in the Central Highlands near Dak To, killing three Americans. It was the second U.S. fixed-wing aircraft downed this year in Vietnam.

The overnight shelling were a drop from the 73 bombardments 24 hours earlier. U.S. spokesmen said 20 of the attacks caused damage. Casualties included one American killed and 28 wounded.

'Political Power'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. J. W. Fulbright says the United States should accept North Vietnam's demand for an all-Indochina conference to neutralize the three countries.

Fulbright also supported the conference idea, but he declared it makes little difference—to the United States and to the area's inhabitants—who rules Indochina.

"North Vietnam is far too small a power to have any serious hope of conquering all of Southeast Asia, much less of posing any kind of a threat to the United States," the chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee said Thursday.

His Senate speech came during a new round of discussions on U.S. policy toward Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia. Senators also have been throwing their support behind a French proposal for an all-Indochina conference to neutralize the three countries.

Fulbright also supported the conference idea, but he declared it makes little difference—to the United States and to the area's inhabitants—who rules Indochina.

"The plain fact that comes out of the war in Vietnam—reinforced by recent events in Laos and Cambodia—is that, puny as it is by great power standards, North Vietnam is the paramount power in Indochina," he declared.

"We ought to welcome North Vietnam's pre-eminence in Indochina, because while North Vietnam has shown itself strong enough to dominate Indochina if left alone by outside powers, it has also shown itself willing and able to resist Chinese domination."

He emphasized he is not advocating a Communist-dominated Indochina. "I merely propose to accept it, if it arises from the local power situation, as something unworkable but tolerable."

Fulbright said from the central fact of Indochina is that it does not matter very much who rules in those small and backward lands.

Sens. Fred R. Harris, D-Ola., and James B. Peason, R-Kan., introduced a resolution to put Vietnam back on record in support of an all-Indochina conference on neutrality.

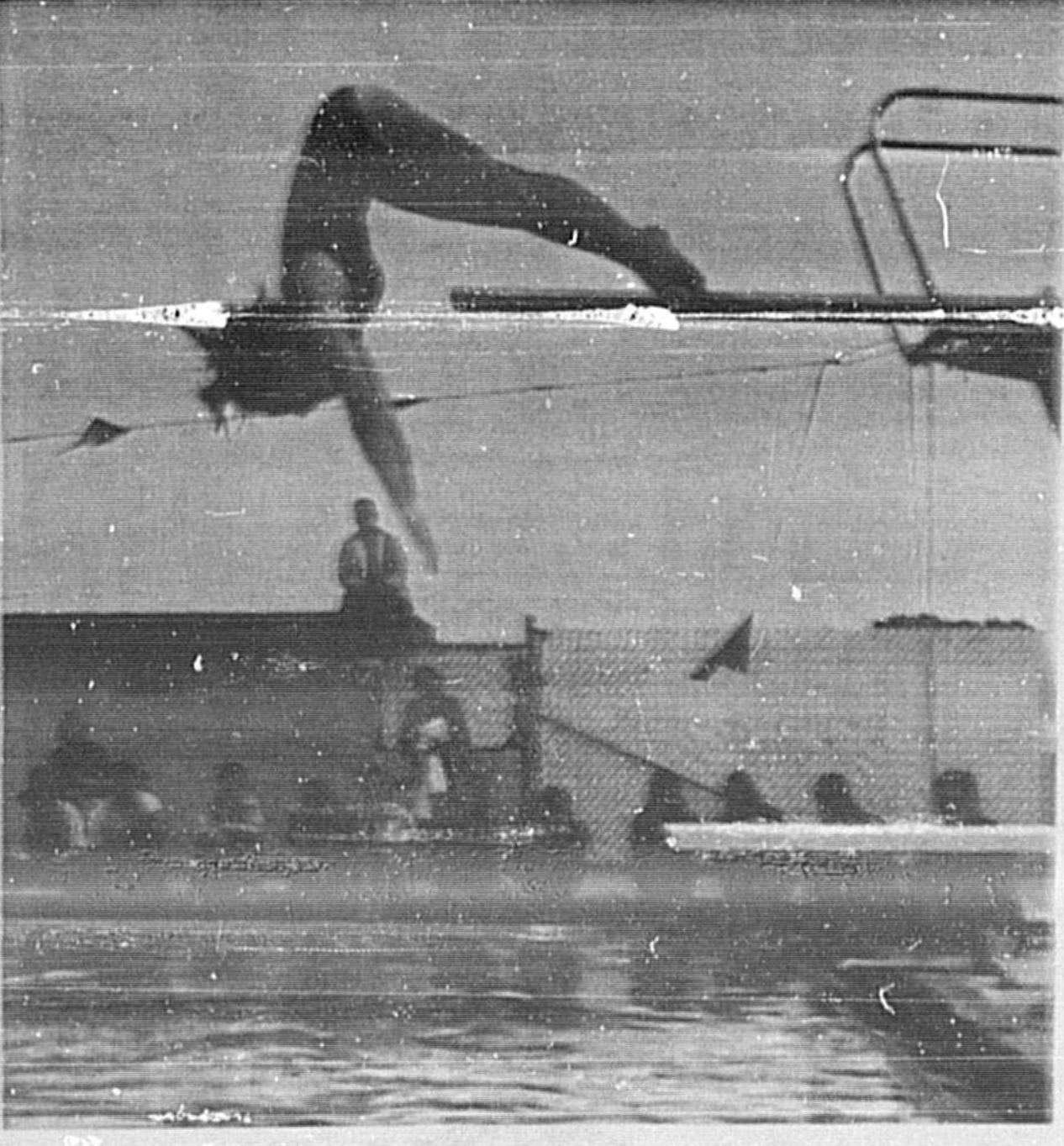

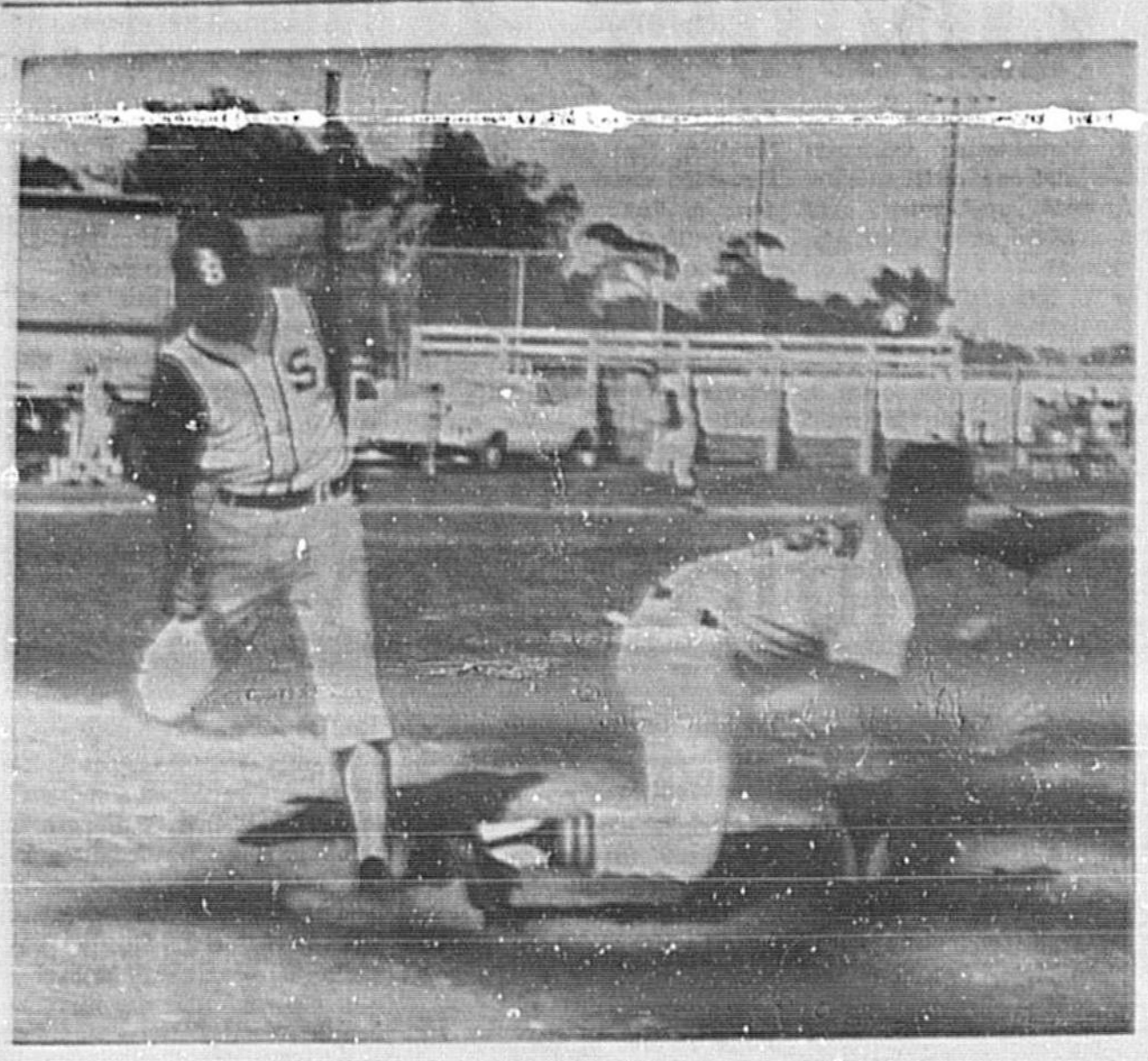

The Casselberry City Council will discuss during a work session tonight, the possibility of hiring an administrative assistant.

Ignores Federal Court Order Kirk Leads Manatee Schools

BRADENTON, Fla. (AP) — Gov. Claude Kirk of Florida, directing pupils and teachers to ignore desegregation transfers approved by the U.S. Supreme Court, today personally assumed "official supervision" of the Manatee County public school system.

Kirk called his action "in the best interest of the children." In a executive order, Sunday, Kirk acted 14 hours before the desegregation plan was to be implemented in Manatee, a coastal county 70 miles south of Tampa.

On the scene before classes opened, Kirk "dictated" behind closed doors with Lt. Gov. Ray Osborne and two assistant superintendents, Col. Philip Doyle and Dr. William Bastaw. Then addressing some 150 administrative staff members, Kirk said, "We have exercised every legal opportunity possible with the Manatee County School Board. We will now exercise our rights as governor."

"Our job is to educate children," Kirk said. He added that the federal judge who handed down the desegregation order "never concerned himself with this."

"There will be no changes," Kirk said. "I see no problems. I see a great staff."

"My main interest is in keeping the schools running and in keeping the children in school," Kirk said. "The legal ramifications are secondary."

Kirk said, "We have come to this reluctantly. He said: 'We have not been given our day in court.'" "We imagine we will be given our day in court now," Kirk said.

U. S. District Judge Ben Krentzman, of Tampa, who issued the desegregation order, said he planned to give Kirk's action "my prompt attention to day."

Krentzman said he did not plan to act in haste—"the wheels are turning." He indicated it would be late in the day before the court took any action in the case.

The 400 pupils who are to attend Blackburn originally were scheduled to attend two other schools.

Outside the meeting room at the county school board offices, parents flooded telephones with questions about what their children were to do.

A secretary told them to send the children to the schools they attended last week.

Kirk suspended the county school board and Supl. Jack Davidson Sunday but said they would be reinstated "at such time as they shall be free to administer the school system consistent with sound educational principles and the law of the land."

Anyone who interferes with that order and continues to do so would be in contempt," Krentzman said.

The integration order required the busing of an additional 3,000 pupils and the transfer of 187 teachers to achieve a ratio of 80 per cent white to 20 per cent black in classrooms. Manatee's schools were integrated in September but four all-black schools were left intact.

A petition for a delay in implementing the plan was turned down without comment last Friday by the full Supreme Court.

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Clinic Bids County Assistance

"A mental health facility operated directly by county government is usually a sterile operation," said Dr. W. L. New, of the Division of Mental Health in Tallahassee. He is the director of the Community Mental Health program. He was speaking to County Commission chairman John Alexander, who has expressed an interest in county control of the proposed Seminole County Mental Health Center, Inc.

The facility, located in Longwood Plaza, which has been set up recently as a private corporation, is now seeking county cooperation and financial backing to enable it to actually open its doors to treat patients on an out-patient basis. They need \$30,000 from the community and have appealed to the County Commission and School Board for it.

"We need community and citizen involvement," said Dr. New. He intimated at a formal meeting with county officials, that the matching funds sought by the organizers of the mental health facility will not be forthcoming if this community involvement is not a reality.

The state will only match funds to a county operated mental health facility if they have a good program and if it appears that the community wants the facility to be run by the county government, explained Dr. New. He re-emphasized the community involvement as essential.

Currently the center is a non-profit corporation, put together entirely, so far, by interested citizens without benefit of county government guidance.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Judge G. Harold Carwell survived a move to kill his Supreme Court nomination today and both Republicans and Democratic leaders predicted the Senate would confirm him Wednesday.

Senators refused to send the nomination back to the Judiciary Committee—a device employed by opponents of the 60-year-old Florida federal judge in an indirect attempt to kill the appointment.

By previous agreement, the Senate will vote Wednesday on confirmation.

"Don't underestimate the need of community involvement in a strong Board of Directors of a non-profit corporation to make this program a success," said Leone.

Community backing has been evident. "An international smorgasbord held recently, sponsored by the Sanford Woman's Club, netted almost \$4,000 for the Center, with more coming in each day," said Mrs. J. J. Siczekowski, one of the original organizers of the facility.

She is attempting to circulate a petition to prove the interest of the community in the center.
