

According to Lynn Risner, city building official, Harry Licht, of Orlando, has proposed to build a subdivision of ---

modular (manufactured economy housing) homes within the city. Risner said because of the city code which outlaws mobile homes locating within the city and the

possible relationship of the modular homes with same type construction as mobile homes, a problem could develop in zoning City Manager W. E. Knowles told the planner.

that as long as the building code is met by the modular units, they could not legally be stopped from lo cating within the city. Risner said he had told Licht that he could not approve the units unless it can be proved that the electrical and plumbing systems are satisfactory.

Arthur Harris, zoning chairman, recommended that a city ordinance be passed requiring all manufactured off-site homes to meet standards of the Southern Building code and inspected by either city building official or by a reciprocal agreement with another qualified building official where the units are made.

mmission and Gerald Dake, city planner, mentioned the need to put modular housing in a separate zoned R-2 and R-5 areas for one- and two-family dwellings. Sections of Georgetown and Geidsboro will be checked to determine what three- or four-block area will be delineated for the city's first renewal project. Application will then be forwarded to U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in Washington for a survey grant, Gainer said.

"I was most interested in your comments concerning 'junk' mail. In this regard, I also agree with you. I do not believe the taxpayers of this nation should be called on to subsidize those who use the mails for commercial profit. "For example, those who use the mails to advertise and

solicit orders for goods pay a maximum of three cents an ounce. This is the material commonly referred to as 'junk' mail. "Newspapers, as you may know, pay even less. After an

initial charge of three cents, newspapers pay only ONE cent an ounce to mail their product. "This is to be compared to the six cents an ounce for segular surface mail and 10 cents an ounce for air mail.

"The use of the Congressional frank is limited to official business. A letter to a constituent who has requested help or information is an example of official business. "Most assuredly, my views and my voting record as well as information on what goes on in the U.S. Congress is the

people's business. "Communication, particularly in these trying times, is most important. 
