



His Third Accident

Are yos a repeater when it comes to minor anterbile accidents 7 Are you always knicking a fender when you ack out of a parking space, or frequently smashing a head light or a tail light in little mishaps on the highways? Do you often run off the road on to the highway shoulder, or narrowly miss driving into a ditch every time you pass a car? If so, look out. You are a repeater, and ninety percent of automobile accidents are caused by ten percent of the drivers who are repeaters.

In Miami the other day a 26-year-old man and the girl who was driving with him wers killed when their car crashed into a tree at a terrific rate of speed. The car skidded on a slight curve and was a twisted mass of wreckage in another instant. It was his third accident within two years. Only last summer he was severely injured when his car turned over on the causeway. The previous summer he and his wife were hurt in a crash in Georgia.

Little accidents are but the prelude to bigger ones. The primary causes of little accidents are the same as those for the bigger ones; carelessness, speeding, drunken driving, and so forth. If you are a careless driver, you will be continually scraping your fender as you drive through the garage door. And conversely, the continuous scraping of fenders is the indisputable earmark of care-

less driving which is also too often the cause of more serious accidents.
