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DEATH CLAIMS JOB E. HEDGES LAWYER OF N. Y.

Famous Politician And After Dinner Speaker Is Stricken While On Visit To Atlantic City; Funeral on Thursday

Had Led Remarkable Career For 40 Years

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Job E. Hedges, nationally known New York lawyer, wit philosopher, and political sage, died of heart disease at 9 o'clock Sunday morning at the Hotel Chalfont, Atlantic City.

Twelve hours later Mrs. Hedges arrived at the Pennsylvania station here with the body, which was taken to her home. Tentative plans were announced for burial Thursday at Danville, N. Y., with funeral services here Wednesday evening.

Mr. and Mrs. Hedges went to Atlantic City Friday. Apparently he felt better than at any time since his collapse in the hotel Astor a year ago at the dinner of the "Inner Circle," an association of political reporters...

Mr. Hedges, besides being considered by many the best after dinner speaker in America, long bore the reputation of having as many friends and personal acquaintances as any man in the country.

Among the first to express their sorrow and sympathy were former Governors Whitman and Miller, Chief City Magistrate McAnbride, Colby, former secretary of state, members of the Union League Club and Deputy Police Commissioner Leach.

Mr. Hedges' death, at the age of 62 ends a legal and political career of 40 years, marked by the friendship of President Roosevelt, Taft, Wilson, Harding and Coolidge, the late Senator Henry Cabot Lodge and virtually every figure of importance that has arisen in New York City or state politics in the last quarter century.

Birthday Of George Washington Quietly Observed In Sanford

Washington's Birthday, though his calendar, occurring Sunday, was quietly observed in Sanford Monday. Banks and the post office were closed throughout the day in commemoration of the event.

Officers in the county courthouse and the city hall remained open during the hours regularly observed. Business houses, however, remained open according to schedule.

A number of social functions in observation of Washington's Birthday have been held during the past few days. Other functions are scheduled to be held Monday night.

SULLIVAN, Ind., Feb. 23.—An unexplained search started by mine rescuers today for the bodies of 51 men entombed after an explosion in the City Coal Co. shaft here last Friday, ended early Sunday, when the last corpse was brought to the surface.

Burial of the dead was started, services for two of the victims being held here and for another at Dugger, Ind. There will be no community funeral. Each family will bury its own dead.

Under the direction of Henry Boker of Washington and Eugene Foster of Indianapolis, Red Cross representatives, plans were completed for extending relief to the bereaved family.

Albert Dally, state mine inspector who directed the removal of the bodies, left for Indianapolis after that work had been completed, but announced he would return Tuesday to make further inquiry into the cause of the explosion.

Sullivan county officials are disposed to accept the theory that the explosion was caused by the sudden precipitation into the mine of a quantity of gas from an earth pocket, the gas being ignited by the spark from a miner's tool or the flare from a worker's lamp.

Clark has been with the Brewers for the greater part of the time since 1914, when, as third baseman of the team, he took over the managerial reins for three years. He resigned to go into semi-pro ball where he remained, at Lima, O., until 1921 when he was persuaded again to become manager of the "Brewers".

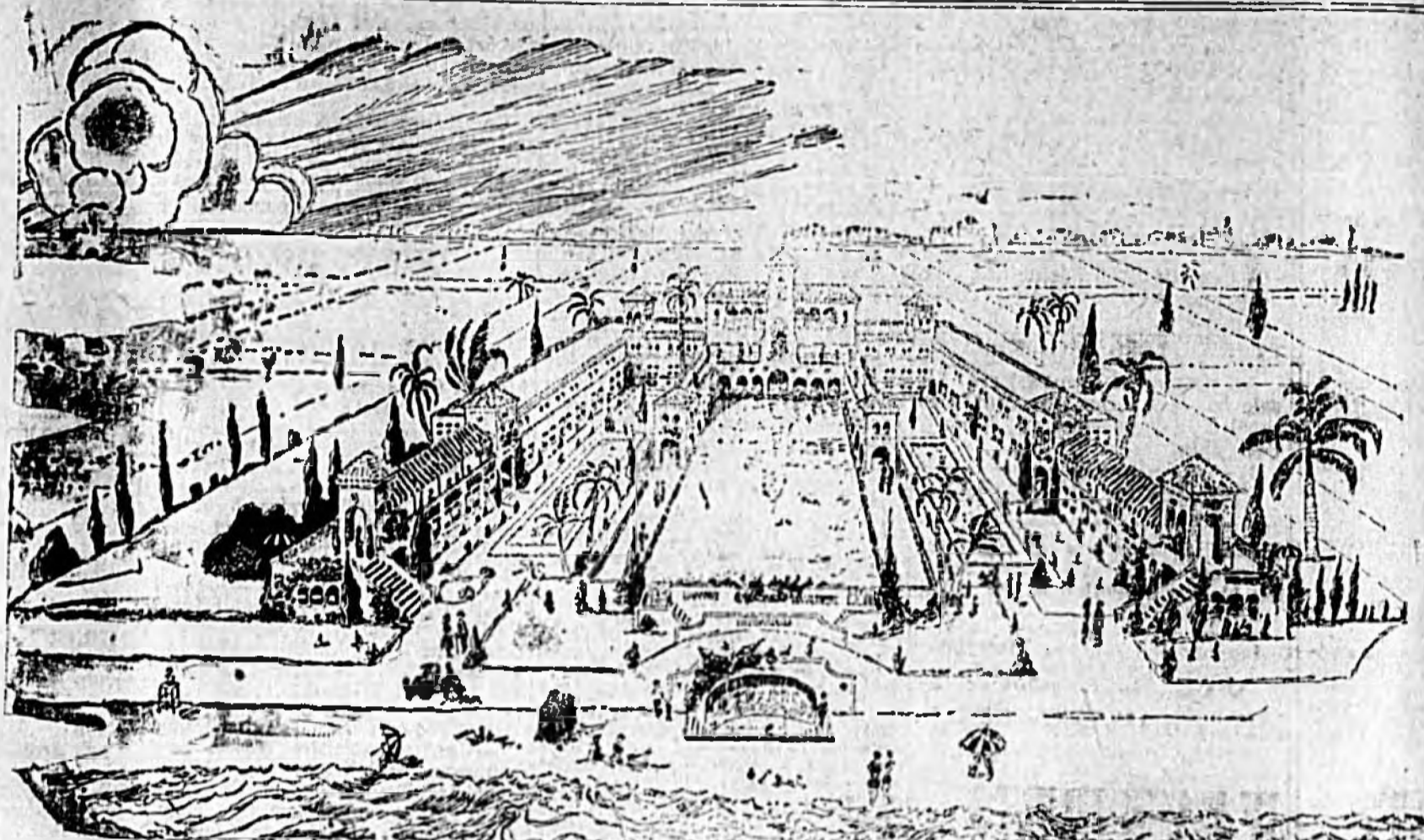

Children Are Given Illustrated Sermon By Dr. E. D. Brownlee

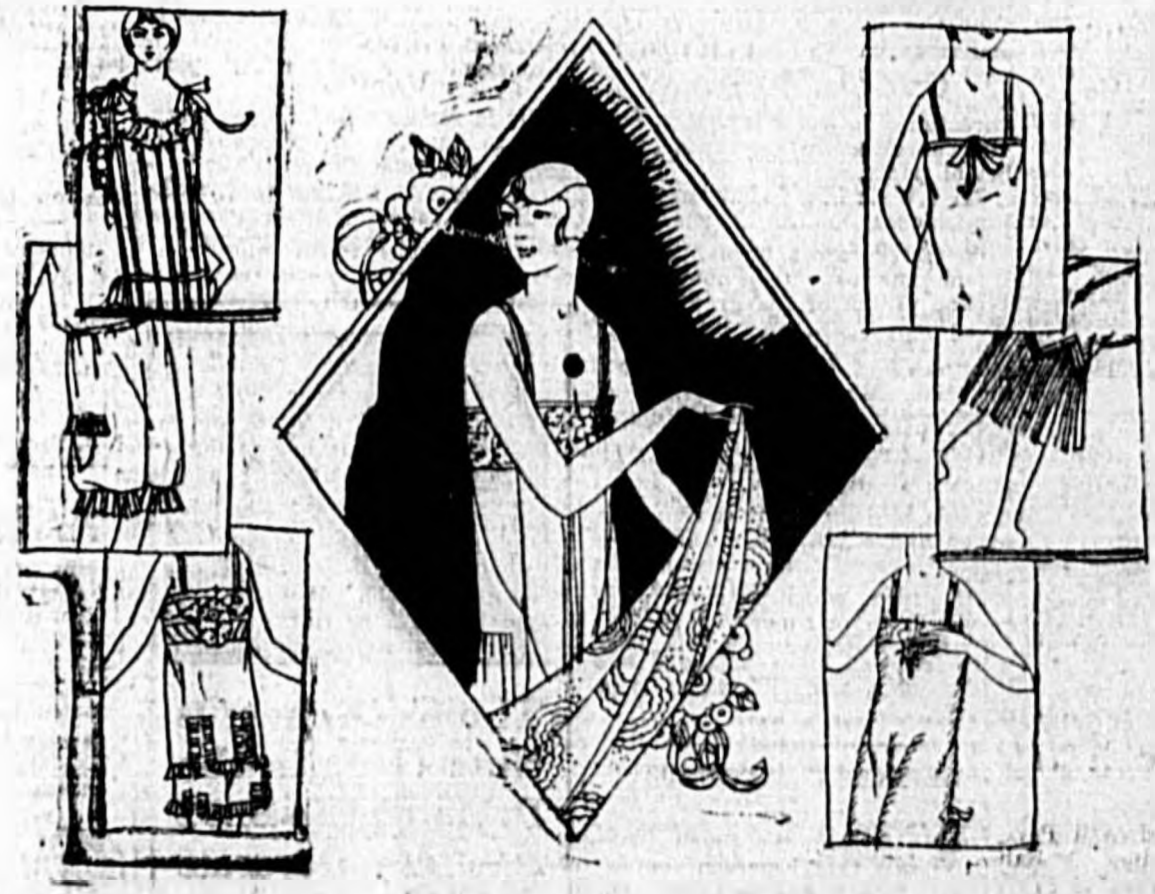
