

Business leaders support strong mayor

SANFORD — Business leaders in the city of Sanford overwhelmingly support a strong mayor form of government.

The Sanford Chamber of Commerce conducted a straw poll Tuesday during a lunch meeting to gauge its members' opinions. At issue is whether the city should adopt a form of government that elects a mayor who is responsible for the day-to-day operations of city or keeps its current government where the elected commissioners appoint a professional manager to handle those duties. Sanford voters will have a chance to official-

ly register their vote on March 4 at the polls.

By a 4-to-1 margin, chamber members approved changing to a strong mayor form of government, with 37 members voting in favor of the change and 9 voting against.

"This was one of the larger luncheons we've had," said Angella Gordon, president of the Sanford/Seminole County Chamber of Commerce. "We believe this is an important issue. Before the chamber can take a stand, we need to know what our members

want. They told us today."

David Gierach attended Tuesday's meeting and said he was pleased with the cross-section of chamber members who participated.

"We wanted to have good representation there so that whatever the outcome we could accurately say it represented the position of the chamber membership," said Gierach, who is president of CPH Engineers and this year's chamber chairman.

"We actually had at least two dozen more members who couldn't attend but faxed their sheets back," Gordon said. "We didn't count those, but every one of them were in favor of a strong mayor."

Business development and smart growth will be key issues for years to come, Gierach said. He noted that Sanford has lots of land and substantial growth potential that requires a leader who can balance the continued business growth while still maintaining a high-quality of living.

"From the business community's standpoint, we're looking for a strong leader in the

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Four people die in Sanford flight bound for Titusville

A plane that took off from the Sanford Orlando International Airport crashed Saturday afternoon on an island in the inter-coastal waterway off shore from the city of Edgewater near Mosquito Lagoon.

The plane had four passengers aboard that were killed in the crash. Among the fatalities were the pilot Scott Shaw, 31; his wife Lisa Shaw, 30; Lisa's mother Kathlene Stanley, 53; and brother Kevin W. Stanley, 29, visiting from New York state.

The plane was a single-engine Sesana 172p, which was owned by a Sanford aviation firm, was headed to Titusville. Scott, a pilot for 10 years, had rented the aircraft to fly his visiting relatives over Florida.

A second plane saw the crash and hovered overhead until Daytona County Sheriff's helicopter arrived at the scene. The crash is being investigated by the Federal Aviation Administration and the National Transportation Safety Board. It may be several weeks before the results are released.

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Arizona man arrested in Stonebrook rape case

SANFORD — Police arrested an Arizona man wanted in connection with a rape and hostage situation.

George "Tyrese" Franks, 24, was arrested Friday by Sanford police after a three day search for a man who raped a woman at Stonebrook Apartments in Sanford Monday, Jan. 13.

At approximately 7:15 p.m., Franks knocked on the victim's door attempting to sell a cleaning solution. According to police, Franks is a resident of Arizona and was working for Pumper Trust, a company that drops off its employees in an area for a given period of time with an intent to sell its product door-to-door.

Franks entered the victim's apartment and gave a typical demonstration of the cleaning

Letey Gulf veteran dies at 80

Leo P. Zeola, known for his love of his family, music and the U.S. Navy, died Saturday, Jan. 18, 2003. He was 80.

According to a family report, Leo, an excellent saxophone player, was working a dance in the Daytona Beach area this past Friday night, when he developed a cramping in one of his arms. The following morning, he passed away because of a blood clot.

Leo worked with the Deltonans dance band for many years, and was well known for his saxophone solos at the Sanford Civic Center during the Deltonans' Wednesday afternoon senior dances.

One of his loves was the U.S. Navy. He spent over 30 years in the Navy, first during World War II, then after a brief stint in the Naval Reserves, was recalled to duty for the Korean War.

Former mayor delivers banquet's message

SANFORD — Taking the first step of any journey is always the hardest, but it's made easier when there is a spirit of love.

Former mayor Bettye Smith delivered that message Saturday night at the 18th annual Martin Luther King Jr. celebration banquet. Smith, who served 12 years as Sanford's mayor, helped start the banquet nearly two decades ago and was invited to be the keynote speaker of this year's event.

"Bettye Smith not only worked to put on the first Martin Luther King Jr. Banquet in Sanford, she was the first mayor to put on the first statewide Martin Luther King Jr. Banquet at the request of Gov. Lawton Chiles," said Dorothea Fogle in introducing Smith.

Despite her work to publicly celebrate King's accomplishments, Smith told the audience that her personal journey regarding race relations began from a much different position than the beliefs she holds today.

Born in North Alabama, Smith recalled growing up in a segregated community that was home to the national headquarters of

the Ku Klux Klan. As a child, she said adults placated her questions about the Klan by saying the group helped women

12-year-old student is dancing his way to top

SANFORD — Drew Stanley of Sanford has danced his way to the top — literally.

The 12-year-old tap dancer was recently named Florida's Male Rising Star at the Florida Dance Master's Solo Competition held in Orlando.

"Dancing is like breathing," Stanley said. "I've just got to dance."

Competing against other male dancers ages 11 to 13, Stanley danced his way to the top of the judge's score card when he performed "Fit as a Fiddle" from the hit musical "Singing in the Rain." Dancers of all genres were critiqued on stage presence, dance technique and choreography.

"The competition is like comparing apples and oranges," said Valerie Weld, one of Stanley's dance instructors and co-owner of Mariam and Valerie's School of Dance Art in Sanford. "You might dance for a judge that likes ballet more than any other style of dance and might judge you according to that preference. That's a chance you take."

"You just get out there and do your best," add Weld.

Four of Weld's students represented Mariam and Valerie's School of Dance Art during the competition. While Stanley finished in the top position, the school's other qualifiers placed respectfully. Mallory Gladman was the second runner-up in the male division while Claire Schirard and Shelby Ratchford both placed in the top 12 in the female division.

"Drew is kind of new in relation to dancing, but the judges love him," said Weld. "Everyone finds his personality appealing on stage."

This is the third consecutive year the school has taken top honors in the male division. During the 2000 competition, Vince Autorino was honored as Florida's Male Rising star, followed by Joshua McLamb in 2001.

Stanley began dance lessons four years ago at Mariam and Valerie's School of Dance Art with Weld. Although concentrating on tap, he also attends classes in

Sanford resident saves lives 1 pint at a time

SANFORD — Carl Gilliland recently reached a milestone in his effort to save lives.

The Bram Tower resident donated his 10th gallon of blood Monday afternoon at the city's blood bank. It's taken Gilliland several years to reach his 80-unit goal.

"There are a lot of benefits to giving blood," Gilliland said. "And, why not give. It doesn't take but a few minutes, and you are helping someone, somewhere."

As long as he can remember, Gilliland has been giving blood. He

became a local donor when he moved to Sanford a little more than a year ago.

With no fear of needles, Gilliland said sitting on a couch for 10 to 15 minutes is the least he can do for his community.

"I actually give the people who work at the Blood Bank all the credit," he said. "All I do is lay on the couch and squeeze a ball for a few minutes."

The people at the Blood Bank, however, think Gilliland and people like him are doing an incredible service for the Central Florida community. And, since the Sanford resident's O positive

blood contains rare antigens and antibodies, he is helping people throughout the country.

"Carl's blood, because it is so rare, goes to help anyone in the country, not just in this area," said Donna Walker, donor services specialist. "Each time he gives, we file the information in the computer and there is a national record of it."

It's not only rare blood types that are currently needed — especially now when blood is in short supply due to the holidays, travel schedules, inclement weather and illness. According to Walker, every

Boom in town center projects is a bust for some developers

A nationwide boom in development of sophisticated mixed-use town center districts - from town centers in suburban neighborhoods to major urban redevelopment projects like Thornton Park in Orlando, CityPlace in West Palm Beach, and The Grove in L.A. - is creating unusual development patterns nationwide, says an economist who has been watching the trend closely.

Some developers and municipalities eager to capitalize on the latest trend are making some big mistakes, said David Marks, founder and president of Marketplace Advisors, Inc. in Orlando.

"Developers who are used to building strip centers base their decisions on a simple set of factors," said Marks. "A successful town center district, from a main street program in a small town to a regional attraction like Winter Park Village or Kierland Commons in Scottsdale, is governed by a much more complex and sometimes subtle set of criteria."

Marks should know. Over the past two years he has conducted a massive nationwide study of town center districts, compiling the world's largest database on the genre.

"We can look at patterns of development, it's very clear that each community is unique and the success or failure of a district depends on the developer's skill in assessing the characteristics of the individual market," he said.

Marks recently presented at the International Council of Shopping Centers (ICSC) annual CenterBuild Conference in Scottsdale, Ariz., where the chatter among development professionals was focused almost exclusively on town centers.

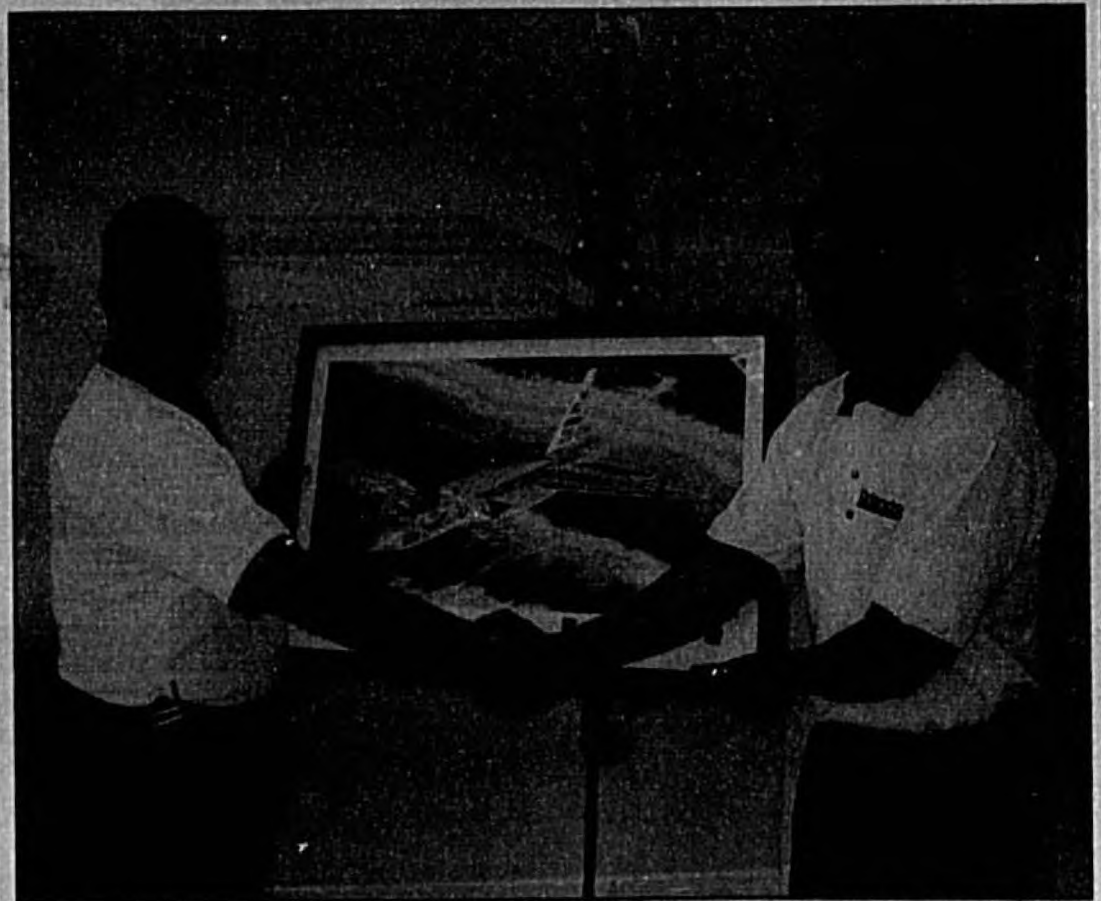
"A lot of communities around the country would prefer not to see any more strip centers. They are looking for higher quality development," Marks explained. "Developers, on the other hand, are worried about costs. A strip center constitutes relatively low-cost

design and construction program, but part of the attraction in a successful town center district is the architecture, the articulated facades, the landscaping, the extra details, the human scale of the buildings."

Community leaders and developers who don't study their market closely are in for an economic drubbing, Marks said.

"Developers who rely on a town center concept to make their development project a success without having their economic fundamentals addressed are fooling themselves," he added. "The urban plan and the architecture are very important parts of a town center program, but other elements are also critical to the success of a project such as transportation access, demographics and competition. It is like baking a cake, if the proportion of the various ingredients are off, no one will want to eat your cake, or visit your town center as the case may be."

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17-92 crossing closed starting this Friday

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has announced that work will begin Friday, Jan. 24, on rebuilding the railroad crossing on U.S. Highway 17-92 (French Avenue) in Sanford near 6th Street. This is one of a pair of crossings at that location. Work on the other crossing was completed in a similar project in November. Lack of adequate material at that time prevented work on the second crossing.

Work, to be performed by CSX Transportation, Inc. crews will necessitate the total closure of French Avenue at the crossing location beginning at 8 p.m. Friday, Jan. 24, and continuing until not later than 6 a.m., Monday, Jan. 27. The work may be completed by early Sunday. A similar project at a U.S. Highway 17-92 crossing near 13th Street is scheduled for the weekend of Feb. 7.

Highway 17-92 will remain open to local traffic up to the railroad crossing. The 2001 average daily traffic along this section of French Avenue was 33,500 vehicles. Florida Central Railroad will be reimbursed by the FDOT for the crossing reconstruction at an estimated cost of \$135,000.

Variable message signs advising motorists of the impending closure will be put in place this week, with a detour route signed for through traffic.

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Gas prices continue to move upward

As if "John Q. Motorist" doesn't already know it, gas prices in Florida are continuing to rise.

According to AAA Auto Club South, curtailed oil and gasoline exports from Venezuela and the threat of war with Iraq have sent gasoline prices up an average of eight cents per gallon since mid-December.

The nationwide average price of self-serve regular gasoline is now \$1.468 per gallon, returning gasoline prices to levels seen prior to the Thanksgiving holiday last November.

According to Kevin Bakewell, Senior Vice President for public and government regulations with AAA, "OPEC (Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries) members met this past weekend and agreed to increase oil production in order to bring world oil prices at or below \$28 per barrel." On Monday of this week, the price per barrel on the stock exchange was \$32.26.

According to the latest AAA survey based on over 60,000 credit card transactions last Friday, the Orlando area, which includes Seminole County, had the lowest price per gallon for regular gas in the state at \$1.456. The West Palm Beach/Boca Raton area having the highest price for regular at \$1.567, and the highest price for premium gas at \$1.670, but only seven cents per gallon higher than the state average.

Since January of 2002, the average price for regular unleaded in Florida has increased from \$1.136 to \$1.502.

and children whose husbands and fathers weren't around.

"To a child, that sounded like a good thing," Smith said.

As she grew older, she learned of the KKK's real mission. Like a lot of whites of that era, she didn't agree with the Klan but lacked the courage to publicly condemn its existence or the prejudice it endorsed.

"I was not guilty of hate, I was guilty of indifference," Smith said. "I could have spoken out many more times but didn't."

That indifference began to change through her work as a public servant, first as a deputy for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and later as mayor.

"My real education began in the 1970s as a deputy," Smith said. "I saw things I never had knowledge of before."

She said it was love that made those first steps of her journey easier. Though there were countless individuals who shared that spirit of love, Smith cited two examples: Jan Henry and Arlene Davidson.

"Our second granddaughter was born premature and Jan was deeply concerned," Smith said. "Jan prayed for her and he asked the members of his church to pray for her."

As for Davidson, "She taught me about dignity, patience and courage," Smith said. "It was about love. There was no other reason for her to do what she did."

Smith said it was Christ who reminded his disciples that love was the greatest commandment.

"In John 13:34-35 it says, 'A

new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; by this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another," Smith said. "You and I are never going to solve the world's problems, but we can certainly solve the problems right here in our community."

"It will happen through love," she said in closing. "I renew my commitment to love you. Would you join me in that commitment?"

During Saturday's banquet five people were honored by the Martin Luther King Jr. Steering Committee. Richard L. Evans was the 2003 Brotherhood Award recipient, the committee's highest award. Evans is a Sanford native and long-time Seminole County educator. He was the first principal of Lake Howell High School and was named as the Outstanding Educator of the Year in 1973-74.

According to his son, John, Leo was a pilot on the USS Gambier Bay escort carrier in World War II. He was on duty in Leyte Gulf during the second battle of the Philippines when his ship was destroyed by one of the largest battleships of the Japanese Navy.

"My father tried to get to his plane," explained his son, John, "but he was only an ensign at that time and the senior officers took all the aircraft. He went down into the water ending up on a raft."

"But the raft had so many people on it, most of his time was spent in the water, hanging on to the side of the raft. My dad spent two full days in that near-freezing water before he could be rescued," John added.

During his Navy career, he spent time at Naval bases in Korea; Memphis, Tenn.; Chicago; Jacksonville; Argentina; Newfoundland; Norfolk, Va.; Willowgrove, Penn.; Washington, D.C.; Glenview, Ill.; and several others. He was at one time Commander of the Naval Air Reserve for the state of New Jersey.

Although never stationed at the Sanford Naval Air Station, Leo met his wife, Marjorie Newman, at a dance at the USO in Sanford. Marjorie was the daughter of Hall and Marjorie Newman of Sanford, and Leo always considered Sanford as one of his homes, although he was originally from Connelville, Penn., and had only moved to Sanford following his retirement in 1975.

Continuing his love for the Navy after retirement, he became a member of the Vigilante Memorial Committee, the group preparing to have a Naval Memorial (Vigilante aircraft) put in an appropriate marker at the entrance to the Orlando-Sanford Airport, formerly the Naval Air Station.

His other love was that of his family, and he is survived by his wife Marjorie of Lake Mary, daughter Karen McBea of Winter Springs, and son John Zeola of Fort Mill, S.C.

A graveside service will be held Thursday, Jan. 23 at 11 a.m. at Oaklawn Park Cemetery. A memorial service will be held that afternoon beginning at 2 p.m. at First Baptist Church of Sanford.

Central Florida encourages local families to stay safe during cold weather. Exposure to

cold can cause injury or serious illness such as frostbite or hypothermia. The likelihood of

injury or illness depends on factors such as physical activity, clothing, wind, humidity, working and living conditions, and a person's age and state of health. Follow these tips to stay safe in cold weather:

- Dress appropriately before going outdoors. The air temperature does not have to be below freezing for someone to experience cold emergencies such as hypothermia and frostbite. Wind speed can create dangerously cold conditions even when the temperature is not that low.

- Dress in layers so you can adjust to changing conditions. Avoid overdressing or overexertion that can lead to heat illness.

- Most of your body heat is lost through your head so wear a hat, preferably one that covers your ears.

- Mittens provide more warmth to your hands than gloves.

- Wear waterproof, insulat-

ed boots to help avoid hypothermia or frostbite by keeping your feet warm and dry to maintain your footing in ice and snow.

- Get out of wet clothes immediately and warm the core body temperature with a blanket or warm fluids like hot cider or soup. Avoid drinking caffeine or alcohol if it seems that you or someone you are trying to help has hypothermia or frostbite.

- Recognize the symptoms of hypothermia that can be a serious medical condition: confusion, dizziness, exhaustion and severe shivering. Seek medical attention immediately if you have these symptoms.

- Recognize frostbite warning signs: gray, white or yellow skin discoloration, numbness, and waxy-feeling skin. Seek medical attention immediately if you have these symptoms.

- Holiday traveling and winter can be a dangerous

combination. Allow extra time when traveling. Monitor weather conditions carefully and adhere to travel advisories.

- Keep a winter storm survival kit in your car. This should include blankets, food flares, chains, gloves and first aid supplies. Visit the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Web site for a more extensive list.

- Remember to keep your pets indoors during very cold days and nights. Also protect plants that might be affected by the low temperature.

three minutes, someone needs blood. Blood has a shelf life of only 42 days, which means it constantly needs to be replenished.
"Donating blood is about giving the gift of life," Walker said. "That's what it is all about."
Every day in Central Florida, blood is required in hospitals and emergency treatment facilities to save the lives of accident victims, patients with cancer and other diseases, as well as those undergoing routine surgeries, Walker said. The Central Florida Blood Bank has facilities in 17 counties and services 51 hospitals.
There are several other benefits of giving blood on a regular basis — especially for men.
According to research, donating blood three times a year can dramatically reduce the chance

of a heart attack and certain types of cancer in men. Medical evidence shows that too much iron in the human body may lead to colon cancer and clogging of the arteries, which in turn may lead to a heart attack.
Blood loss is a simple way to rid the body of excess iron. Because men store iron at a much higher level than do women, it is important for them to be able to continually reduce the level. Regularly donating blood is one way to lower the level of iron in blood, thus reducing the risk of heart attacks and strokes.
People can donate blood as often as once every eight weeks, Walker said. As long as a person's iron levels, blood pressure, pulse and temperature are in check, blood can be donated following the required registration.
"We have people who come in

every eight weeks," Walker said. "Some of them come in a little sooner to get checked out so they know they can give blood."
Now that Gilland has given his 80th unit of blood, he plans on setting another goal for himself and reaching it. He will be back at the blood bank in eight weeks ready to give another pint.
"People like Carl, I think they are just wonderful," Walker said. "We just have to have these donors."
Walker said right now is also the perfect time to start donating blood. The Central Florida Blood Bank is challenging the community to donate 23,633 units of blood during the month of January as part of National Volunteer Blood Donor Month. Last year, the Blood Bank collected 22,087 units of whole blood

during the month-long observation.
"Our goal is to ensure that blood is available to patients whenever and wherever it is needed because it is the blood on the shelves that saves lives," said Karen Shoos Lipton, chief executive officer for American Association of Blood Banks.
The Sanford branch of the Central Florida Blood Bank is located at 1302 E. 2nd Street, and can be contacted by calling 407-322-0822. Hours of operation are Monday and Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Thursday from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. People should remember to eat within several hours prior to donating blood.

solution. After finishing the demonstration the victim believed Franks was about to depart but instead he forced her to the floor.
"He either physically pushed her down or they had some physical contact causing her to fall," Officer Cleo Cohen, public information's officer for the Sanford Police Department, said.
Franks proceeded to sexually assault the victim two or three times. He gagged her with his tie and tied her hands behind her back, threatening to kill the victim and as well as himself. At one point he also used a wire brush against her.
Franks kept the victim trapped in her apartment for about 21 hours, leaving the residence slightly before 4:00 p.m. the following day. The victim alerted police soon after he left and the story ran in the news the following few days.
On Jan. 17, police received notice that Franks's co-workers were transporting him to the Orange County Sheriff's office.
"When the area supervisor saw the news, he arranged to take (Franks) to the police station," Cohen said. "To my knowledge (Franks) did know prior to his arrival."
Franks was arrested upon arriving at the station and denied the allegations. He is charged with three counts of sexual assault, kidnapping and battery.

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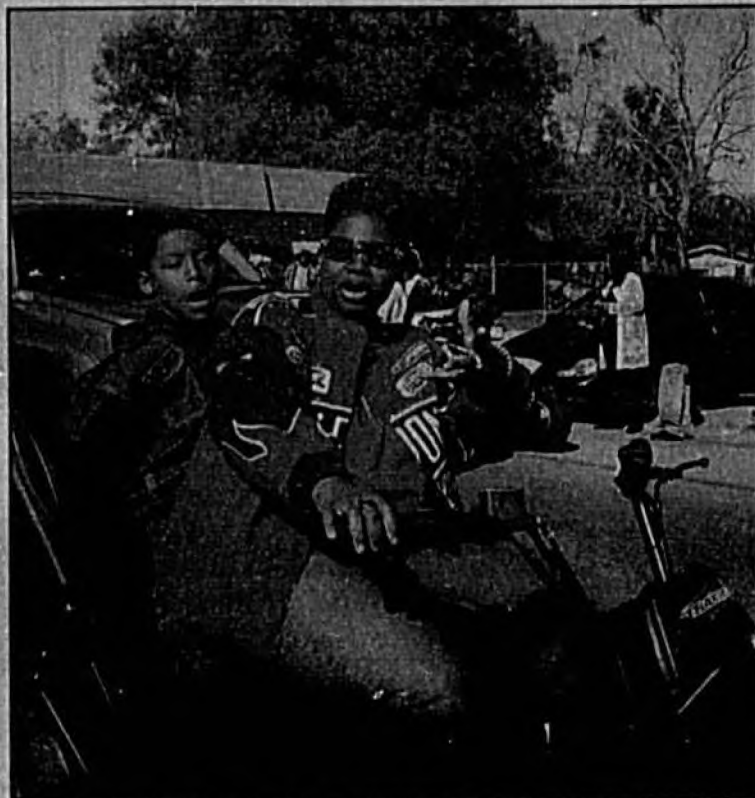

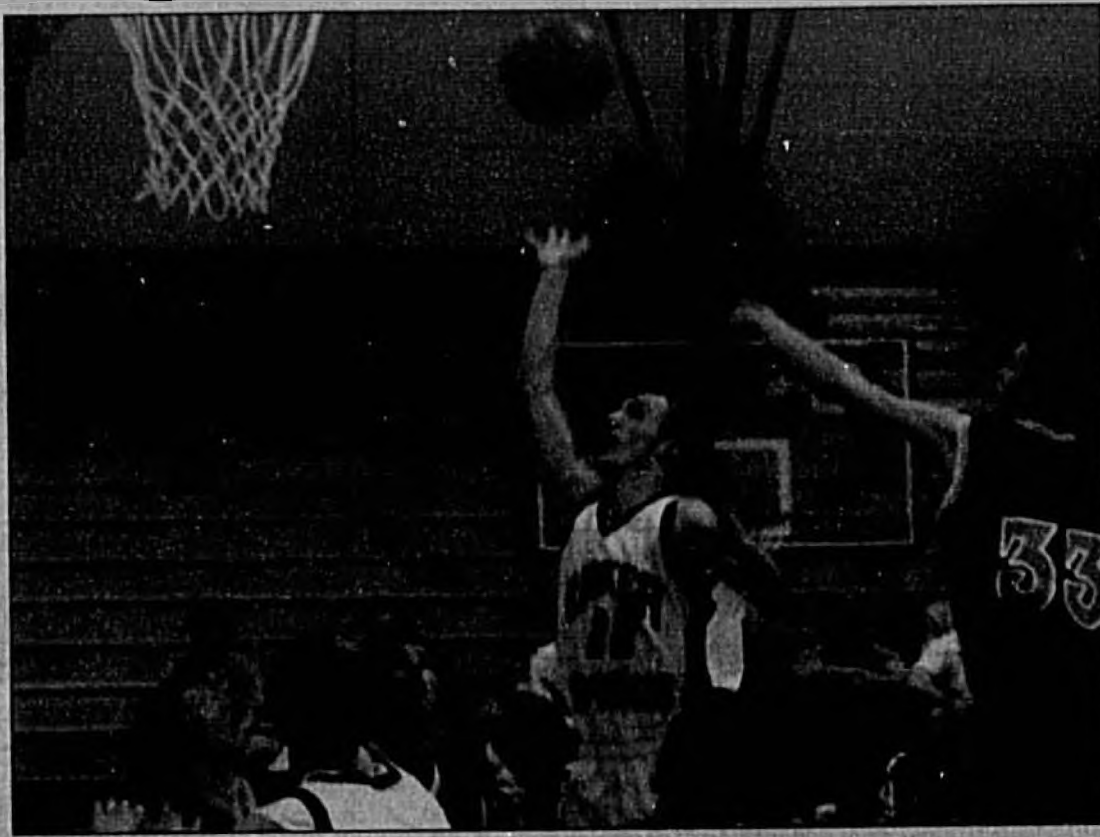

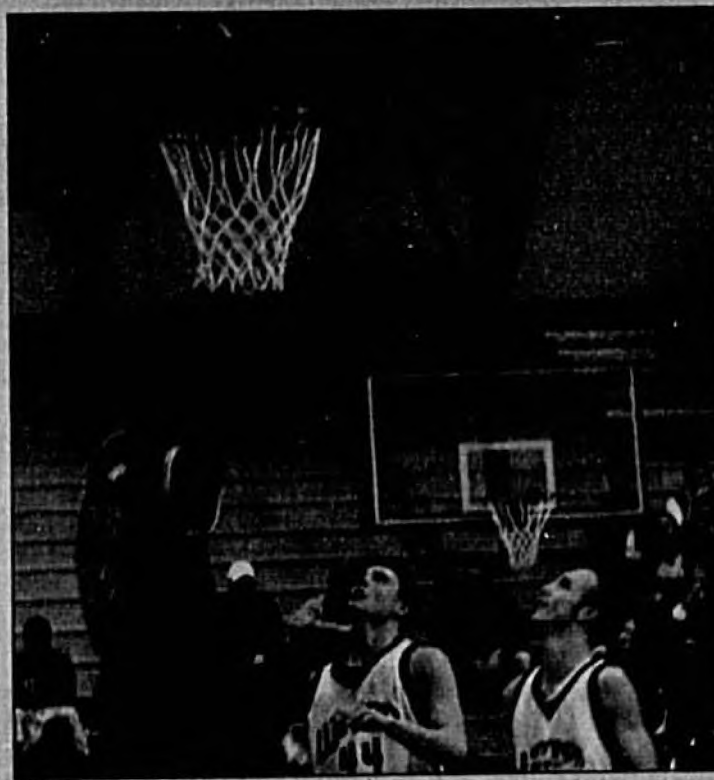
The only other local boys team ranked is Oviedo, which remained at No. 4 in Class 6A with a 14-4 record.
