Sonnett, in charge of the Justice Department's "anti-trust division, said in a statement that Technicalor Inc., had "entered into a series of agreements with Eastman, whereby patents, new de-relopments and technological in-tormation relating to color pho-tography would be reserved for technicolor's exclusive use in the professional field.."

"In our view," Sonnett added, "Technicolor was thereby enabled to control and monopolize this business and was protected against potential competition from
