Metts admits facility has no parking spaces

Jean Metts, executive director of Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, said that the meal site which she calls "The Uptown Café" will open in about six weeks, with dinners initially served three days per week.

The agency plans to hold dinners on

Monday, Tuesday and Friday from 4:30 to 7 p.m. Meat, potatoes, vegetables, salads, desserts, coffee and tea would be served. Metts said the agency is also looking into serving lunches for seniors.

Metts was appealing for reversal of a Planning and Zoning Commission decision that denied the agency's requested parking variance. A standing room only

crowd packed the commission chambers to discuss the appeal, as well as other matters before the commission.

"I don't think we can be a good city, a friendly city, unless we allow Jean Metts to serve these 100 people," said commissioner Whitey Eckstein. "Sometimes there's a higher law to consider."

The program has drawn fire from many residents of Sanford's historic district who oppose plans by Seminole Volunteer Enterprises to serve dinners for the needy, saying the program will increase crime and vagrancy in the area.

"This is just an absolute slap in the face to those of us who have worked so See Variance, Page 8A



Plane enthusiasts take to the 'wild blue yonder' in homebuilt aircraft



Doctor Gott

Help for Raynaud's

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have Raynaud's phenomenon. My fingers become white and tingly when exposed to cold, even simple coolness. I suppose that this is a consequence of my lupus, yet I am

very bothered by it and wonder if there is any medicine that I might take. DEAR READER:

Arterial spasm, resulting in the symptoms you describe, is common in patients with lupus, a disease that affects the body's connective tissue. Raynaud's phenome-

non is also common in many people as they **Doctor Gott** age, especially among smokers. Fortunately,

there is help for this condition. To begin with, patients should avoid tobacco smoke, which activates arterial constriction and invariably makes matters worse. Second, it's important to keep extremities warm, either by avoiding cold temperatures or bundling up with mittens when exposed to

Third, avoid substances that cause vasoconstriction (arterial spasm). such as decongestants, caffeine. beta-blockers and other drugs.

Last, if the Raynaud's is frequent and severe, the use of calcium-channel blockers may be a real boon. These medications block vasoconstriction, thereby reducing the severity and frequency of Raynaud's attacks. Ask your doctor about this. DEAR DR. GOTT: [] have been on Fosamax for a year, following a bone density test that showed advanced osteoporosis. A month ago, I slipped in my parlor and took a minor fall. Since then, I've had low back

 ● e pain, sometimes severe, that my doctor says is not caused by the Fosamax. However, I've heard from other people that the medicine can cause backaches. Is this correct?

DEAR READER: Fosamax does not ordinarily cause back pain. It can however, lead to stomach upset and discomfort. Therefore, I side with

your doctor about this issue. Nonetheless, I do not agree with his approach to your back pain. In people with osteoporosis - even on treatment - relatively minor trauma can result in bone fractures, particularly of the spine. In my opinion, you need an immediate Xray of your spine. I suspect that you may have sustained a compression fracture of a vertebral bone. Such crush fractures are commonplace but may not be advanced enough to require treatment, such as physical therapy. Be that as it may, you still need to know why your back hurts. Review this with your doctor. To give you related information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "Osteoporosis." Other readers who would like a copy should send \$2 plus a long.



Hidden signs in plain view

Detecting whether or not someone that you love is involved in a street gang is a lot less difficult than visitation day at a state prison. Just ask all the parents, wives, relatives and girlfriends that make that trip every week.

Parents don't seem to call the Gang Suppression Unit enough any more and when they do, it is usually too late. It is certainly not because gang membership is going down. During my seven years as a Gang Investigator, I have investigated hundreds of gang-related complaints and have yet to see a situation where a parent could not have done something to prevent street gang membership by identifying tell tale signs.

Gang culture is easy to track once we have identified its origin and members. Gangs can be structured as turf oriented gangs, profit gangs, philosophical gangs, or semi-traditional gangs (Valdez).

The most active types of gangs that I've investigated are profit gangs. These gangs specialize in a particular type of crime or crimes and can become fairly well organized. Most of these gangs prefer to be very mobile. They remind me of the New York City junkyard dogs that roamed the streets late at night, cowardly attacking a defenseless person in large numbers. You could not tell one dog from the next, until they all returned to the junkyards. By themselves, they're like a dog with all bark and no bite.

In Central Florida, the gang culture is a strange phenomenon. Even though the much larger inner city areas have a more serious gang problem, our problem imposes unique challenges. Central Florida's gangs have mixed characteristics, and are more geographically spread out. Identifying the members is a lot more like a science nightmare than an investigative strat-

The inner cities of Chicago,

California and New York, have a unique gang culture specific to that particular area. Central Florida's gang culture includes characteristics of Chicago, California, and New York style gangs, and gangs with a combination of all three cultures. This does not include our own "home grown" gangs that will have their own gang characteristics, specific to their communi-

Even though it is difficult for us to identify these thugs, the signs of gang activity are clear if parents are willing to look for them. If you return home from work and ask your child to clean his or her room, and he or she tells you where to go and how to get there, you have a problem.

If you're cleaning your child's room and find either violent or hate-type reading material, gangster rap CDs bandannas, knives, guns, or drugs, you have a problem.

Maybe you have just returned home from work and discovered that your child has burned a strange symbol on his or her body. Guese what? You have a problem. Call somebody. This is more serious than "Well, he or she is just going through a stage."

Parents should not let society dictate the clothing your children wear, movies they watch, the music they hear, or the material they read. The more a child is exposed to violence, the more desensitized they become to violence.

I have found that children who are exposed to these influences seem to be accepting the perceived problems portrayed by these artists as their own problems. For example, the lyrics within gangster rap describe the conditions within the inner city. Some gang members, born and raised here in Central Florids; have accepted these conditions as their own.

Stay involved with your kids. Give them responsibilities and boundaries. Parents should pend more time raising their children. All the money in the

world will do you no good once your kids are in jail or dead.

Even though Central Florida's transient status has attracted these thugs of the future, we are very fortunate to have started tracking street gangs as early as we have. The inner cities' repeated denial of the problem early on contributed to it being out of control today. As the gang members continue to migrate away from these areas, so does the violence associated with them. Recognizing and reporting certain activity within your neigh-

borhood will help us help you. In recognizing gang activity, the first thing that should jump out at you is graffiti. If you see graffiti painted on building, fences, or any other type of structure, pick up the phone and call the gang unit. They will send a gang expert to take pictures of the graffiti so they can track these gangs. Graffiti is a form of communication between ganga; therefore, it needs to be removed as soon as

When you see or hear of children congregating in a certain area, intimidating other kids, and soliciting their membership, call the police department. Criminal street gang recruitment is a felony. The police can't do this by ourselves. It is just as much your problem as it

No matter who you are or where you live, if you lose control of your family, you run the risk of living among gang members. Gang members will become your child's new family. Don't make that trip to state prison. We only get one shot at being the best parents we can be. We can't go back and do it over again. The signs may seem to be hidden, but in reality they're in plain view.

Winter lawns in Florida

In Central Florida, lawn grasses such as bahlagrass, bermudagrass, and St. Augustinegrass, go dormant in the late fall and winter. During this period, these grasses grow very slowly, loose color, and turn completely brown with the first frost.

In order to get an attractive green lawn during the winter, a temporary grass is seeded into the permanent lawn.

This practice is called "overseeding."

Winter grasses: Several cool season grasses can be used for overseeding, but by far the most common temporary grass used in Florida is rye-

There are three types of ryegrass, annual, intermediate, and improved (perennial).

Ryegrass has a fast seed germination, a good initial growth rate, has wide adaptability, and is relatively low cost. It can grow well in either sun or shade, and tolerates close and frequent mowing. If seeded heavily and mowed closely, ryegrass can provide a very dense and beautiful lawn throughout the winter.

By the time the ryegrass dies, the permanent lawngrass should be actively growing again, and will provide color and cover the rest of the growing season. Ryegrass needs to be overseeded every year.

Timing: Seeding time for Central Florida is from mid-November to early December. It is recommended that seeding should be done when daytime temperatures are in the low-to

mid-70°F range. If seeding occurs during the warmer periods, water stress and diseases will reduce the stand.

Seedbed preparation: To prepare the lawn for overseeding, the grass should first be raked to remove all debris.

> Then, mow the lawn closely, catching or removing by raking the grass after mow-

If the lawn has excessive thatch, it should be dethatched with the proper equipment, to produce a uniform bed. Remove any additional material from your lawn before overseed-

Overseeding: A seeding rate of 10 lbs/1000 sq ft is used for annual or common and intermediate types of ryegrass. A seeding rate of 10-20 lbs/1000 sq. ft is used for perennial or improved ryegrass. Use a mechanical seeder and sow half the seed as you walk in one direction, and the remaining by walking at right angles to the

After seeding, rake the ground with a stiff broom to ensure the seed gets through the grass and is in contact with the

Watering: Water should be applied lightly and carefully to the seeded lawn once or twice a day until all the seeds have germinated. Watering should continue until seedlings are well established. Water only asneeded once plants are well established.

Maintenance: Winter lawns will require the same maintenance practices as the perma-

nent lawn, such as mowing, watering, fertilizing, and pest control. Mowing can be done after plants are 1-2 inches high.

Under normal conditions mowing should be done weekly. Mower blades should be sharp to avoid damaging the seedlings.

Water only to keep the grass from wilting. Use a complete fertilizer such as 6-6-6 at a rate of one half pounds nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. initially, then monthly applications of a nitrogen fertilizer such as ammonium nitrate, at a rate of one half pounds of nitrogen per 1000 sq.

Diseases: Ryegrass is very susceptible to the fungus Pythium which can cause damping off or a disease called cottony blight. Over watering and over fertilizing promotes the development of the disease. This disease is more severe during warm, humid conditions. If cottony blight is present, a fungicide should be applied immediately because this disease can kill the entire winter lawn in 24 to 48 hours. Plant only fungicide-treated seeds to prevent seedling infections.

Reestablishing permanent grass: Ryegrass will normally die out in late spring, but if the weather is cool, and the lawn watered frequently, it can remain for a longer period of time. 



Continued from Page 1A hard to improve the quality of life in the downtown historic district," said Linda Kuhn, the executive director of Sanford Main Street who sald she was speaking as a resident of the

historic district. The variance was granted 3-2, over the objections of Mayor Larry Dale and commissioner Brady

"No matter how good a program is, it can't be above our ordinances," Dale said. "The ends don't justify the means. Whether it's a good cause or not, they need parking for a restaurant. This sets a dangerous precedent."

Dale, following the advice of the city attorney, limited discussion concerning the variance to testimony that had been given during the Sept. 16 Planning and Zoning Commission meeting when the variance request had been denied.

Dale prohibited Metts from reading a prepared statement, and prevented anyone from speaking who had not testified at the Planning and Zoning hearing.

The agency requested that the Sanford City Commission allow the restaurant to be established with 14 parking spaces, rather

than the 80 required by the city's off-street parking requirements for the site, which can seat up to 200 people according to a fire inspec-

However, Metts agreed to limit seating to only 100 people. She also admitted in dialogue with the commission that the site does not actually have 14 parking spaces, but that the parking exists along city right of ways and other public parking areas.

"I'm trying to help people," Metts said. "I never had such a hard time trying to help someone."

The city requires 4 parking spaces for every four people served at a restaurant, and the agency's planned restaurant could serve up to 200 people according to a Sanford Fire Department

Unless granted a variance, a site with seating of 200 people would

required to have 80 parking spaces, and a site with seating for 100 would be required to have 40 parking spaces.

"I do feel that we have indeed met the standards for consideration of dimensional variances." Metts said.

The commission's discussion

concerning the variance at times became a debate about whether allowing the free dinner program would harm the residents of the historic district, who provide a significant portion of the city's tax

"When you use poor planning like this you harm this tax base," said commissioner Brady Lessard, who represents the historic district. "I guarantee you that you'll see the flood gates open up in this city. We're not just damaging our tax base, we're damaging our peo-

Lessard has been an out-spoken critic of the proposal. However, commissioners Vehna Williams, Whitey Eckstein, and A.A. "Mac" McClanahan have been consistent supporters of the proposed dinner

You can't be a quality city if you forget about the poor, the disabled and the hungry," Eckstein said.

The agency is zoned special commercial and is located within the old residential historic district.

Three people currently work in the agency's building on a regular basis. Metts said the workers would increase to 10 if the restaurant is started. Metts said she encourages volunteers at the agency to car pool.

Sanford passes strict ordinance regarding parking on rights-of-way

Ordinance gets The ordinance makes it

SANFORD — The Sanford City Commission may have granted a variance to Seminole Volunteer Enterprises that will allow meals to be served on the site, but an ordinance restricting parking on city rights-of-way passed by the commission on Monday may make parking at the facility difficult.

Jean Metts, executive director Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, the agency located at 407 W. Fourth Street in Sanford's historic district that plans to serve free dinners to the needy three days per week, said she is concerned about the ordi-

"We don't have any on-site parking," Metts said. "We do have plenty of parking on public rights-of-way. I just think that police have better things to do with their time."

Metts plans to start serving The non-profit agency is current- operator of the vehicle, and giv-

unlawful to park on a city easement or parkway unless authorized by the city commission or city manager. Parkway is defined as "that area from the right-of-way line to the edge of pavement of the lateral lines of a roadway including any grassy or unpaved median between two paved areas."

The commission unanimously passed the ordinance, which was proposed by Mayor Larry Dale.

"I just get so tired of us saying that because we're an old city that we have to be a piece of junk," Dale said.

However, several commissioners expressed concerns about enforcement of the ordinance, particularly in residential areas in the east and west sides of the city where there are narrow streets.

"If you came to visit on my street, for example, you would have to park in the street," said commissioner Velma Williams. "There are a lot of neighborhoods on the east and west sides of the city with very narrow

Sanford Police Chief Brian Tooley said the ordinance will be enforced by first attempting meals at the site in six weeks. to contact the owner or

If the vehicle is not moved after a 24 hour warning period, police will issue a city parking citation and impound the vehi-

When unable to contact the owner or operator of the vehicle. police will post a notice stating the code violation, and tow the vehicle if it poses a hazard or danger to the public. A parking citation will be issued and the vehicle impounded 24 hours after the notice is posted.

Manager Tony VanDerworp said the ordinance will not be enforced until after an advertising campaign to inform city residents about the

VanDerworp also said that exceptions may be made in neighborhoods with narrow

"I would think that if we found a situation in a particular neighborhood that has a difficulty because of narrow streets or lack of drive-ways, we with that," can deal VanDerworp said.

However, several commissioners said that the ability to make exceptions to the ordinance concerns them.

"I just don't want it to be arbitrary and capricious," said commissioner Whitey Eckstein.

Fish and wildlife stressed by Irene

SANFORD - Scientists are bracing for some bad news concerning Hurricane Irene's effects on south Florida's fish and wildlife.

Twelve inches of rain, associated with the storm. flooded agricultural areas which drain into the St. Lucle estuary near Stuart. Historically, large freshwater flows into the estuary have been associated with a dramatic increase in the appearance of fish with lesions (sores). Very low numbers of fish with lesions are normally present in the St. Lucie estu-

People may see an increase in the number of lesioned fish as a result of the freshwater pouring into the estuary now," said marine biologist Ann Forstchen of the Florida Marine Research Institute (FMRI). "When the water in the estuary becomes much less salty, some fish, particularly mullet and sheepshead, can become more susceptible to infections and may develop these lesions."

Normally the salt content of the estuary's water is about 20 parts per thousand. Currently, the level has dropped to less than five parts per thousand.

Forstchen said that although some people may be quick to blame contaminants overflowing Lake Okeechobee for problems with fish in the estuary, increases in the occurrences of fish with lesions are associated with any large input of freshwater.

The data suggest any large freshwater input that drastically changes the salinity (salt concentration) in the estuary can cause health problems in the fish." she said. "We don't have any concrete answers, but that's what we've found over the past 20 years."

FMRI has set up a statewide fish kill hotline at 1-800-636-0511 to enable observers to report fish kills or diseased fish to authorities.

Forstchen said fish kills may be possible because of recent sewage spills into St. Lucie area waters. These fish kills may be the result of low oxygen levels caused by the sewage rather than freshwater flowing into the estuary.

Meanwhile, scientists will collect samples of fish, water and sediment from the St. Lucie estuary during November to help determine if there is an increase in the number of lesioned fish.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, which came into existence in July, bears responsibility for monitoring and protecting a broad range of resources including estuaries, wetlands, freshwater species and wildlife.

South Florida scientists report that wildlife also is under stress because of high water. In south Florida's Everglades, wild animals have crowded onto tree islands and any other high ground they can find.


