

STORMY PEACE SESSION DISCLOSES OLD SORES AND NO DISARMAMENT

France Again Comes to Front With Warlike Declarations NOT ON AGENDA

AND LLOYD GEORGE POURS OIL ON THE TROUBLED GAUL AND ASKS FOR PEACE

GENOA, April 11.—A clash over a disarmament proposal by George Chitchein, the Russian soviet foreign minister, which occurred between Chitchein and M. Barthou, France, threatened to disrupt the conference. M. Barthou said that France categorically refused to discuss disarmament at Genoa. M. Chitchein replied that Russia thought France would be ready to discuss this question because M. Briand, the former premier, had said at the Washington conference that Russia's armaments had made disarmament impossible. Russia, the status of which is one of the questions of supreme importance to be decided by the economic conference came to the forefront soon after the opening of that great assembly yesterday. Speeches had been made by the presiding officer, Premier Facta, of Italy; M. Barthou, representing France; Premier Lloyd George, of Great Britain; Dr. Wirth, of Germany, and spokesman of Japan and Belgium, all of a conciliatory nature and voicing adherence to the Cannes resolutions, upon which the present gathering is based. Mr. Lloyd George had said that all the delegates met on a footing of equality provided they accepted the conditions set forth, which, briefly, declared that countries must not repudiate their contracts, that they must not wage war on the institutions of another, that they must not engage in aggressive operations against others and that the people of one country should be entitled to justice in the courts of another. George Chitchein, the Russian soviet foreign minister, in speaking for his delegation, announced their adherence to the resolutions and then declared that Russia was ready to support any proposals that would avoid war or lighten the burden of armament.

M. Barthou immediately protested and declared with some heat France would absolutely refuse to discuss the question of disarmament at this conference. Mr. Lloyd George hastened to intervene, and in his contention that disarmament could not be taken up, certainly not before a peace basis had been reached at Genoa, he was supported by Signor Facta. Eventually the discussion on this point ceased, after M. Chitchein said the Russian delegation would bow to the collective will of the conference. The clash between the Russian and French delegates disclosed the fact that disarmament not on the agenda, and that therefore, this matter is not to be taken up for consideration. The keynote of Lloyd George's speech was peace, and he made a powerful appeal to the delegates to work in unison for the restoration of good relations and normal economic conditions throughout the world. He believed that if the conference was successful in its achievements, the United States "would not merely come in, but come in gladly."

GENOA, April 11.—Consideration of the Russian question by the International Economic and Financial Conference began today with a meeting of Russian commission appointed yesterday by conference chairman. Admission of Russian and German representatives to principal committee of economic conference strongly opposed today by French and Belgian representatives. British, Italian representatives intervened, however and Germans and Russians were finally admitted.

He had spent the winter with his wife and daughter, as had been his custom for a number of years, at the Seminole Hotel, Winter Park, and died suddenly two or three days after his arrival in Washington. Mr. Worthington was for a number of years United States District Attorney for the District of Columbia, and was the recognized leader of the Washington bar, as well as a man of sterling character and attractive personality.

PALATKA JOBBERS PLAN FOR WATER TRANSPORTATION TO OFFSET THE RAIL RATES

Say There is No Danger to Business as Long as St. Johns River Flows

PALATKA, April 11.—At a meeting of the shippers of Palatka Saturday afternoon at the Chamber of Commerce, plans were set in motion to prepare for the institution of whatever revised rates may ultimately result from the fourth section order of the interstate commerce commission. A committee consisting of Dr. L. W. Warren, H. O. Hapm, H. M. de Montmollin, C. C. Hudson and A. A. Corcoran was appointed to investigate and report on the best method to be followed in establishing water transportation that will meet Palatka's needs. This committee will report at a subsequent meeting to be held later.

The meeting was called for the purpose of receiving Secretary Hart's report of the conference of the Southern Traffic League held in Atlanta last Monday and Tuesday, at which time the fourth section order was the main topic. Mr. Hart made an exhaustive report which was commended by those present as clearly stating the situation and indicating necessity for action on the part of those points now enjoying depressed rates on account of water transportation.

H. M. de Montmollin said that he did not favor Palatka entering into a fight to offset the rates proposed, or to fix the minimum basis for two reasons, one was that the roads would put into effect whatever rates they desire, and second that if water transportation really means anything now is the time for Palatka to demonstrate it. "If the shippers of Palatka will patronize a boat line there is no doubt it can be financed and I will undertake to do it," Mr. de Montmollin said.

Mr. de Montmollin also said that the establishment of a line with boats that could make outside trips to Baltimore and New York was not necessary for the present. He indicated that Jacksonville probably will keep a safety valve on the boat lines already operating and provide an independent line if the Clyde and Merchants & Miners attempted to raise their rates. This would permit the Palatka line to connect and bring freight here at the rates enjoyed at present.

NAVAL BILL STARTS ACTION IN THE HOUSE YESTERDAY AND RATIO IS NEGLECTED

Members Afraid of Destroying Efficiency of the American Navy

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The fight on the naval appropriation bill began in the House yesterday with members insisting that it did and that it did not actually carry out the 5-5-3 ratio, as fixed by treaty. All day the discussion centered around this one big question in dispute. Chairman Kelley, of the subcommittee on appropriations, which drafted the measure and others, including Representative Mondell, Wyoming, the Republican leader, declared an enlisted force of 65,000 plus 2,000 apprentice seamen was adequate to maintain the navy in accordance with the arms conference rating. Others, however, including Representative Padgett, Tennessee, ranking Democrat on the naval committee, which in former times prepared the navy bills, asserted the figures were so low "as to destroy the efficiency of the American navy" and give it a standing the same as or lower than that of Japan.

In all there were seven speeches during the day, three for and four against the measure. Representative Byrnes, South Carolina, supported the committee proposals joining Chairman Kelley and Mr. Mondell in its defense. On the other side the speakers with Mr. Padgett were Representatives Tinkham, Massachusetts, Husted, of New York, and Vane, of Pennsylvania, all Republican members of the appropriations committee, who signed a minority report urging a force of 80,000 plus 6,000 and who declared the committee figures disrupted and ignored the treaty. There will be two full days of general debate, with more later when the personnel section is reached. The name of the president was brought into the debate and there were many verbal clashes as a result. Mr. Mondell questioned the propriety of the inclusion in minority views of a statement that the president had urged 80,000 men, or 10,000 less than the number requested by Secretary Denby. Asserting that 65,000 men would not accomplish the aims of the treaty, Mr. Padgett suggested to the committee that if it was unwilling to accept the solemn judgment of the secretary of the navy, somebody ought to be put in his place whose advice would be accepted.

AGED CHICKEN THIEF HAS BEEN RELEASED NOW THAT MOON IS FULL

C. C. Hudson said that while the situation was one deserving of serious consideration that it did not mean that the Palatka jobbers would be put out of business as the "bugaboo in the Palatka News" stated. He said that he was proud that Palatka has a boat line of its own and he agreed with Mr. de Montmollin that the thing to do is for the jobbers to patronize the water line and let the railroads raise their rates to what they desire. Dr. L. W. Warren said that when they asked that their freight be routed by the Palatka line from Jacksonville that the Clyde and Merchants & Miners paid no attention to it, sometimes sending it down the river by the Clyde Line or by rail, but that if shippers would insist and refuse shipments that did not come as routed that this evil could soon be remedied. Coincident with the increase of water transportation a vital need will be additional dock facilities, Mr. de Montmollin said. The establishment of municipal docks has been foreseen as a necessity by every city with water transportation, but Palatka has no municipal docks, practically all of the available docks being owned by the railroad, bottling the port up just as Pensacola was, as Tampa was and as Miami was. Miami is pending over a million dollars on docks, Tampa has spent more than this amount and Jacksonville has invested and is investing more than five million dollars. Pensacola has just won its suit against the railroads for the expenditure of \$200,000 on docks and Orlando is planning to build her own docks on the lake front at Sanford.

COAL STRIKE HEARINGS ARE NEARING AN END COMMITTEE TO MEET

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The hearings of the house labor committee on the national coal strike were concluded yesterday, for a time at least, the last day being devoted to hearings of testimony from labor spokesmen who denied charges of the operators concerning union contract breaking being a factor in the walk-out. Chairman Nolan of the committee said there were no plans at present for a further investigation of the strike but the committee will meet Wednesday in executive session to take action on the Bland bill which would set up a federal coal commission to deal with such situations. Witnesses appearing before the committee yesterday included Edgar Wallace, labor federation legislative agent, and a member of the miners' union, John Hessler, president and William Mitcho, secretary of the Indiana district of the United Mine Workers, and James Lord, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor.

O'NEAL NAMED HEAD OF REPUBLICANS IN FOURTH DISTRICT

PALATKA, April 11.—With the nomination by fourth district republicans in convention here yesterday of Howard McKay, of Miami, as the party's candidate for the house of representatives from this district, two republican congressional candidates have been placed in the field in this state. Judge William M. Gober, of Tampa, was recently nominated as the party's candidate for the house from the first district. McKay won yesterday's nomination over Major Milburn, of West Palm Beach, by a vote of 37 to 15. Approximately 100 persons, about half of them negroes, attended yesterday's meeting. A permanent organization of fourth district republicans was effected with W. R. O'Neal, of Orlando, as chairman, and J. R. Scott, of Jacksonville, secretary.

GASOLINE TAX HELD IN ESCO PENDING ACTION

MATTER MAY BE BROUGHT BEFORE SUPREME COURT AGAIN BY ATTORNEY GENERAL.

The status of the gasoline law seems to be in considerable doubt as the following dispatch from Jacksonville would indicate: "From the depths of legal intricacies the status of the gasoline tax is pushed its way through the weak threads of communications and a layman's mentality to the open. "Summed up in a nutshell if the speaker of the house and the president of the senate did not sign the act imposing one cent a gallon on gasoline sales, before the last session of the legislature adjourned it never became a law in the opinion of the state's supreme court. If, on the other hand, they did sign the act before the legislature closed in refutation of the allegations set forth by S. J. Gunn, of Levy county, who contested the act's legality, the state may yet be able to save its approximately \$600,000 revenue fund for the road building and maintenance.

"The supreme court has declared the act invalid, in that it was enacted irregularly. In rendering its opinion, however, it was explained by high legal authorities here, the supreme court assumed the allegations set forth by Mr. Gunn were true. The case came before the supreme tribunal on an appeal from a circuit court decision whereby a demurrer offered by Attorney General Buford to Mr. Gunn's complaint was overruled. In upholding the circuit court's decision the supreme court ruled upon the procedure of a legislative act before it can become a law.

"In defending the state's side of the case in the circuit court, Mr. Buford had open two courses of action. He could either answer or demur to Mr. Gunn's complaint. He chose the latter course and lost.

"Within the next week, approximately 30 days, while the supreme court's decision is pending its way down to the circuit court of Leon county, which court will then issue a final decree, Mr. Buford may file an answer to Mr. Gunn's complaint and possibly the case may find its way back to the supreme court.

"This course, Mr. Buford announced his intention of taking. What Mr. Buford plans to base his answer on is yet in the formative stage. His announcement said that he and the assistant attorney general, Mr. Gaines were preparing the answer. In the meantime Mr. Buford considers the gasoline tax law still in operation, and the comptroller Amos is authorized for the statement that his department will continue to make collections under its provisions.

"A prominent wholesaler here, on the other hand, announced that he would not pay any further taxes under the invalidated law.

"Two meetings of representative citizens at Daytona Saturday urged Governor Hardee to call an extra session of the legislature to re-enact the law.

"Good roads advocates attending the meeting of the South Florida and East Coast Roads Association took the first action of this kind when they telegraphed, its contents decided upon by unanimous resolution, was dispatched to the chief executive. Similar action was taken by the publishers of the Florida Publishers' association meeting.

"Governor Hardee's attitude in the matter has not been made known. He is known to strongly disfavor extra sessions of the legislature as indicated in his refusal to act upon the solicitations of advocates for a session to deal with cattle eradication."

JACKSONVILLE WILL SHOW IT CAN BE DONE

WILL FURNISH ELECTRICITY FOR LESS THAN HALF WHAT SANFORD MUST PAY

(By The Associated Press) JACKSONVILLE, April 11.—A maximum rate of seven cents a kilowatt hour for the first 50 units used, five cents for the next 20 and two cents per k. w. h. thereafter will be charged for lighting and cooking purposes of patrons of the city's electric power plant under the plan to electrify the city.

The city commission which recently went into the business of selling the fuel on an extensive basis, has adopted the scale of prices.

Commercial patrons such as restaurants and hotels who adopt electricity to displace gas as a fuel, a rate of 3 cents for the first 500 k. w. h. is fixed, and two and a half cents for all additional consumptions.

Cooking and other electrical apparatus which the commission is to endeavor to place in the homes, has already been in the city, and it is planned to shortly commence a campaign to popularize their use.

WILL FORM LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS AT EUSTIS (By The Associated Press) EUSTIS, April 11.—Decision to form a Lake county organization of the League of Women Voters was unanimously taken at a meeting of men and women here recently. The meeting was addressed by Mrs. W. F. Blackburn.

Mrs. Clara D. Palmer was named chairman of a temporary organization, which was charged with the work of forming a permanent organization.

GOVERNOR HARDEE WILL SPEAK AT GAINESVILLE (By The Associated Press) GAINESVILLE, April 11.—Governor Hardee is expected to be the principal speaker here April 21 at the ceremonies of laying the cornerstone for the auditorium of the University of Florida.

According to Dr. Albert A. Murphy, president of the University, the chief executive has announced his intention of being present accompanied by his military staff.

Bankers in attendance here at the annual meeting of the State Bankers' Association will also attend the coronation laying, Dr. Murphy said.

The auditorium is to be the first unit of the institution's administration building. Funds for its erection were provided for by the last legislature.

AMERICAN LEGION AT WEST PALM BEACH WILL INSTALL RADIO TELEPHONE SOON (By The Associated Press) WEST PALM BEACH, April 11.—The local post of the American Legion has become interested in the radio telephone and telegraph and have voted to install in the Legion headquarters a radiophone at the earliest possible moment.

BENEVOLENT ORDER OF UNITED NATIONAL DEFENDERS MAY ERECT HOME AT ST. PETERS

(By The Associated Press) ST. PETERSBURG, April 11.—A National Home of the Benevolent Order of United National Defenders may be erected in this city if the city commissioners will donate a plot of ground for the purpose.

Plans for the erection of the home were discussed by persons interested here recently. Committees were appointed to consult the various municipal officials in regard to plans for the structure.

GROUND BROKEN FOR A NEW 4-STORY HOTEL AT EUSTIS

(By The Associated Press) EUSTIS, April 11.—The ground has been broken here for the erection of the Fountain Inn Hotel which will be four stories in height and will spread over a block. The ground floor will be divided into ten business offices to be rented for commercial purposes.

Contract for the erection of the building was awarded to C. M. Emmerston & Company, of Brookville, who announced that the work would give employment to between 150 and 200 men.

Sanford needs a good library building and will have one as soon as the bond issues can be prepared and voted upon. Every enterprising city has a fine library building. Sanford has kept up a library association for many years chiefly through the efforts of a few faithful workers who without any room and in a cubby hole of a place here and there have kept alive the spark of reading and a thirst for knowledge embodied in our young people as well as the old. Now that we have a chance to build a beautiful library building we should all take a just pride in the library and push the matter by voting for the bond issue when it comes to the voters.

longs just as much to the man who comes here from other states and behaves himself and become a good citizen as it belongs to the "blck" who sits on the fence and whittles a stick with the idea that because he was born here he is the supreme creature and entitled to something more than the common herd. It is high time the people from other states asserted themselves in Florida and told some of the native birds where to head in. The Pensacola News sums up this ridiculous position as follows:

The discussion in some of the newspapers in Florida anent what we believe to be the certain candidacy of William J. Bryan for United States senator, has raised what seems to us an almost ridiculous issue. Some of the newspapers favor Trammell and oppose Bryan because they say Trammell is a native son of Florida and Bryan is a newcomer to Florida. In the first place, if the statement were true, the issue would be an unsound one and unbecoming a great people about to choose a senator of the United States. And in the second place, the statement is not true. Bryan is just as much a native of Florida as Trammell. Neither is a native of Florida.

Senator Trammell was born in Alabama. Congressman Fletcher was born in Georgia. Congressman Smithwick was born in Georgia. Congressman Clark was born in Alabama. Congressman Sears was born in Georgia. Congressman Drane was born in Kentucky. Florida is not represented in neither house of congress by a native son.

Most of Florida's former United States senators were born outside the state. Charles W. Jones was born in Ireland, Samuel Paaco in England, Wilk. Call in Kentucky, James P. Taliaferro in Virginia, the senior S. R. Mallory in Trinidad, West Indies; the junior S. R. Mallory in South Carolina, David L. Yulee in St. Thomas West Indies; Jackson Morton in Virginia, James D. Westcott in Virginia, Thomas W. Osborn in New Jersey, Adonijah Welch in Connecticut, Abijah Gilbert in Ohio, Simon B. Conover in New Jersey (the last four served during reconstruction).

William James Bryan, W. H. Milton, N. B. Broward and N. P. Bryan were the only United States senators in the history of Florida who were native sons.

Senator N. P. Bryan was a native son, and he is the only democratic senator in Florida's history who was refused a second term, Senator Trammell defeated Senator Bryan after Bryan had served but one term in the senate.

The accidental place of a man's nativity neither fits nor disqualifies him for public office, and it would neither help nor hurt Florida. It is an unsound argument in which broad minded men and women should not indulge.

Of course, a man should live in the state long enough to be familiar with the state's resources and get acquainted with the people and their wishes, as well as their views upon public questions. Otherwise, he would not be fitted to represent the best interests of the state nor to truly reflect the views and wishes of the people of the state. And it would be unseemly in a man to ask or expect to be elected to one of the highest offices in the gift of the people and to learn their wishes.

It may be that William J. Bryan should not ask to be elected to one of the highest offices in the gift of the people, and perhaps the people will turn a deaf ear to his request, but the fact that he was born in another state is not a legitimate argument against his candidacy.

That Mr. Bryan will be a candidate for the senate in opposition to Senator Trammell, we have long been convinced. Whether he will be elected is another question.

Often we read items in the Florida state press of the superiority of our oranges, of our grape fruit and everything else we raise over that of the California product. But we do not tell the outside world that it is so. The Florida Citrus Exchange is using a lot of space with Northern and Mid-Western publications and outside of that organization with the ex-

"If we have been taught to eat California raisins and California nuts, it is because they are advertised in all of the best publications."

Louisiana raises the finest rice in the world but they never have educated the masses that such is a fact. Patrons of grocery stores in buying rice do not know where it comes from and, neither do they ask.

Down in the Ridge county of Florida the finest orange in the world is raised and is sold for high prices. But when it gets into the hands of the retail fruit dealer or groceryman, does that individual advertise the fruit as Ridge Grown Oranges; He does not.

In his advertisements in the local paper they are advertised "Indian River Valencia Oranges," and sell for 80 cents per dozen on the Chicago and New York markets.

Some thirty years ago a campaign was instituted in Florida and aided by the commission merchants of some of the big cities of the North for the exploiting of the name "Indian River Oranges," and their superiority over the russets (there was no plan feasible in those days in removing the dull scale from the oranges grown in the sand) was so well known, that oranges grown in the neighborhood of Ocala, DeLand and other spots many miles from the Indian River were marked "Genuine Indian River Oranges."

These Indian River oranges were grown in the hammock west of Rockledge and Cocon, and as they were all brights, they commanded a higher price in the markets of New York, Chicago, Cincinnati and other large cities. Attempt at that time was made to gain a name for the oranges grown in the hammocks west of New Smyrna, Port Orange and Daytona, but the growers did not take to it, preferring to label their boxes "Indian Rivers," and let it go at that.

A lady writing from Chicago says that she is a lover of the Valencia orange and calling at a large fruit store asked for them and was told they were genuine "Indian River Valencia oranges." A glance at the box in which they were shipped revealed the fact they were shipped by the Citrus Exchange from Lake Wales, and on account of the reputation gained by advertising years ago by the Indian River Fruit Growers' association, these fruit dealers prefer to call them that.

They are called "Indian River" simply because the orange growers at Lake Wales, Lake Hamilton, Sebring, Frost Proof, Haines City, Winter Haven and other points will not band together and tell the world of a superior orange they are shipping to Northern and Western points.

If Florida wants recognition of her many resources and advantages she must advertise to the outside world that we have them. The people must be educated. If the Florida grown fruits and vegetables are superior to those of California it is up to our citizens to tell the outside world about it.

BONNER'S AD

There is an old story of Robert Bonner, when he was conducting the New York Ledger, who filled a page of one of the largest dailies of that city with the line, "Read the New York Ledger," repeated over and over. Only that line and nothing more. Mr. Bonner's pastor, it is said, was struck with the extravagance of the advertising and called to remonstrate with Mr. Bonner for spending so much money in such a way. "You saw the advertisement, didn't you?" asked Mr. Bonner. "Yes." "Well, that is just what I wanted everybody to do."

The above paragraph is from the Miami Herald. It points out a fact too often overlooked by advertisers. In fact, some of the best advertisers in the country make the mistake of moving the picture too rapidly before

the eye. The lesson is not driven home until a new one appears. A daily change of copy is not always good policy.

The first daily newspaper in the United States to put one a one-cent paper prepared the way for a great circulation, by running an ad an entire week which read: "One a Day Will Do It." People talked about that ad and wondered about it. The one-cent paper came along and made a great hit.

A prominent Chicago merchant, who was a large advertiser, contracting his space by the year and changing his copy daily, took a notion that he would like to know how many and what class of people read his ads. He decided upon the novel plan of putting a very matter of fact ad in all the newspapers and running it for an entire week without change. After the third day his banker called him up and inquired if he had noticed the carelessness of his advertising manager in not changing copy. The same day five wholesale houses, who were interested in the success of his business, called his attention to his unchanged ad. The wife of a United States senator, who was a regular customer of that store, jokingly reminded the proprietor of the oversight, and clerks in the store and heads of departments were inquiring after the health of the advertising manager. Even jealous competitors increased their advertising and gave it all the latest and brightest touches in their desire to take advantage of the competitor's oversight. That ad set people to talking. The proprietor got the information he wanted. He got a practical demonstration of ad reading. He learned that his banker and the wholesaler were interested in his advertising.

Suppose the Yowell-Drew or the Dickson-Ives ads disappeared from the newspapers of Orlando for even a day? You can imagine the comment. What would people think if the United Markets and Baker Bros., who have a system of advertising marked by the sameness in appearance of each ad and the amount of space used, failed to run the ad, that shoppers have become accustomed to? It would at least cause comment and disappointment to shoppers who study these price lists before leaving home. Piggly Wiggly advertisements look alike all over the United States, and are everywhere read.

Advertising not only pays, but it is a convenience to the public. In this age of hurry and hustle people want to do a part of their shopping in the

office and the home. Advertising is as much the part of the service rendered the public as the placing of clerks at convenient distances in every department. In fact good advertisers say that the amount of time saved in business by the work of the public and preparing for quick business transactions and rapid shopping will pay for the advertising.

Thus it will be seen that advertising not only serves a san accelerator to business, but increases the capacity for handling business. Like the telephone, it is a convenience and a time-saver that pays for itself.—Reporter-Star.

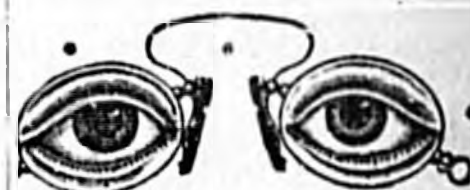

ORDINANCE NO. 29

(Continued from page 3)

ance the compensation of the City Auditor and Clerk and ex-Officio Assessor, and shall fix by ordinance the compensations of the Chiefs of the fire and Police Departments, and members of the fire and police forces. The City Commission shall have the power to fix by ordinance the compensation of the Municipal Judge. The City Commission shall have the power to fix the compensation of the City Tax Collector, which may be based on either fees or salary. The City Manager shall fix the number and compensation of all other officers and employees. The salaries or compensation so fixed shall be uniform for like services in each grade of the City service as the same shall be graded and classified by the City Manager. All such salaries and rates of pay with dates of employment and discharge shall be immediately reported to the City Auditor and Clerk. All fees and monies received or collected by officers and employees shall be immediately paid over to the proper official or depository as designated by the City Commission or City Auditor and Clerk on the day of their receipt.

Section 5. That paragraph (b) of Section 217 of the charter under which the City of Sanford, Florida, is now operating and functioning, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Paragraph (b).—Such petitions shall be signed by not less than fifty of the electors of the municipality."

Section 6. That Section 174 of the charter under which the City of Sanford, Florida, is now operating and functioning, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 7. That the Mayor is hereby instructed, authorized and empowered to call an election in accordance with Section 7 of the Revised Ordinance of the City of Sanford, Florida, to determine the question by referendum vote as to whether Sections 7, 97, 164, 206 and 217 of the charter under which the City of Sanford, Florida, is now operating and functioning, shall be amended in the manner hereinabove stated and set forth; and as to whether Section 174 of said charter shall be repealed.

Section 8. That at said election to be called and held in the manner provided by Section 7 of this ordinance, this ordinance shall be voted upon as a whole by title only, and also, each Section of the charter under which the City of Sanford, Florida, is now operating and functioning, sought by this ordinance to be amended or repealed, shall be separately voted upon by the electors participating in said election.

Section 9. That the ballots used at the election ordered to be called and held by Section 7 of this ordinance shall state the title of the ordinance to be voted upon in the manner following:

"An Ordinance Providing for an Issue of Bonds by the City of Sanford, Florida, in the sum of \$625,000.00 for Municipal Purposes; the Proceeds Derived from the Sale Thereof to be used for Building and Constructing a Municipal Building, for the Extension of Park Avenue Northward into the Waters of Lake Monroe, for the Extension of the Drainage and Sewerage System, for Constructing Paved, Macadamized or Other Hard Surfaced Streets and for Funding and Paying the Outstanding Floating Indebtedness of the City of Sanford, Evidenced by Vouchers Heretofore Issued, and Authorizing the Mayor of the City of Sanford, Florida, to call an Election to Determine the Question as to the Issuance of Said Bonds for the Aforesaid Purposes.

Whereas, the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, deem it expedient and to the best interests of the City of Sanford, Florida, to issue bonds of the City of Sanford, Florida, in the sum of \$625,000.00 for municipal purposes, the proceeds to be derived from the sale of said bonds to be used for the following municipal purposes, to-wit:

- (a) Building and constructing a municipal building for the housing of the municipal library of the City of Sanford, Florida.
- (b) The Extension of Park Avenue Northward into the waters of Lake Monroe to enable the public to avail themselves of the right of commerce and transportation afforded by water, and to furnish the means of access from the highway by land to the highway by water for the use of the public.
- (c) The extension and enlargement of the drainage and sewerage system of the City of Sanford, Florida.
- (d) The construction of paved, macadamized and other hard surfaced streets in the City of Sanford, Florida.
- (e) The funding and paying of the outstanding floating indebtedness of the City of Sanford, Florida, evidenced by the vouchers heretofore issued by the City of Sanford, Florida.

Therefore,
BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA:

Section 1.—That a bond issue in the sum of \$625,000.00, for the municipal purposes enumerated and specifically set forth in the preamble of this ordinance, be, and the same is hereby authorized, provided, however, that before said bonds, or any part of said bonds shall be issued, this ordinance shall be first approved by a majority vote of the electors of the City of Sanford, who are qualified to vote as shown by the registration and tax books of the City, at an election called and held for that purpose, at such time and in such manner as prescribed by law and the ordinances of the City of Sanford, Florida.

- Bonds numbered from 181 to 210 to mature July 1st, 1931.

Bonds numbered from 211 to 240 to mature July 1st, 1932.

Bonds numbered from 241 to 270 to mature July 1st, 1933.

Bonds numbered from 271 to 300 to mature July 1st, 1934.

bonds to be numbered from 301 to 625, both numbers inclusive shall bear same date of maturity, bonds numbered 301 to 625, both numbers inclusive, shall mature 30 years after date of the issuance thereof; this entire issue of bonds to be dated July 1st, 1922, both principal and interest of said bonds to be payable at some bank in the City of New York, State of New York.

Section 3.—That it is the determination of the City Commission that the sum of \$15,000.00 will be required to pay the cost of building and constructing the municipal building for the housing of the municipal library of the City of Sanford, and that the construction of said library building is a necessary public improvement and will be of great benefit in its relation to the municipality of the City of Sanford, Florida.

Section 4.—That the amount of bonds required for the purpose set forth in Section 3 of this ordinance is the sum of \$15,000.00, and the sum of \$15,000.00 of said proposed issue of bonds is hereby appropriated for the exclusive use and purpose of constructing and building said municipal building referred to in Section 3, of this ordinance.

Section 5.—That it is the determination of the City Commission that the sum of \$67,000.00 will be required to pay the cost of the extension of Park Avenue northward into the waters of Lake Monroe to enable the public to avail themselves of the right of commerce and transportation afforded by water, and to furnish the means of access from the highway by land to the highway by water for the use of the public, and that the extension and construction of Park Avenue northward into the waters of Lake Monroe is a necessary public improvement and will be of general benefit in its relation to the municipality of the City of Sanford, Florida.

Section 6.—That the amount of bonds required for the purpose set forth in Section 5, of this ordinance is the sum of \$67,000.00, and the sum of \$67,000.00 of said proposed issue of bonds is hereby appropriated for the exclusive use and purpose set forth in Section 5, of this ordinance.

Section 7.—That it is the determination of the City Commission that the sum of \$40,000.00 will be required to pay the cost of the extension and enlargement of the drainage and sewerage system of the City of Sanford, Florida, and that the extension and enlargement of the drainage and sewerage system of the City of Sanford, Florida, is a necessary public improvement and will be of general benefit in its relation to the municipality.

Section 8.—That the amount of bonds required for the purpose set forth in Section 7, of this ordinance is the sum of \$40,000.00, and the sum of \$40,000.00 of said proposed issue of bonds is hereby appropriated for the exclusive use and purpose set forth in Section 7, of this ordinance.

Section 9.—That it is the determination of the City Commission that the sum of \$168,000.00 will be required to pay the cost of constructing certain paved, macadamized and other hard surfaced streets in the City of Sanford, Florida, and that the said proposed paving and hard surfacing of certain streets in said City is a necessary public improvement and will be of general benefit in its relation to the municipality.

Section 10.—That the amount of bonds required for the purpose set forth in Section 9, of this ordinance is the sum of \$168,000.00, and the sum of \$168,000.00 of said proposed bond issue is hereby appropriated for the exclusive use and purpose set forth in Section 9 of this ordinance.

Section 11.—That it is the determination of the City Commission that the present outstanding floating indebtedness of the City of Sanford, Florida, amounting to the sum of \$35,000.00 should be funded by the issuance of bonds, and that said outstanding floating indebtedness should be paid, thereby improving the financial condition of said city, and that the payment of said floating indebtedness will be of general benefit in its relation to the municipality.

Section 12.—That the amount of bonds required for the purpose set forth in Section 11, of this ordinance is the sum of \$35,000.00, and the sum of \$35,000.00 of said proposed bond issue is hereby appropriated for the exclusive use and purpose set forth in Section 11, of this ordinance.

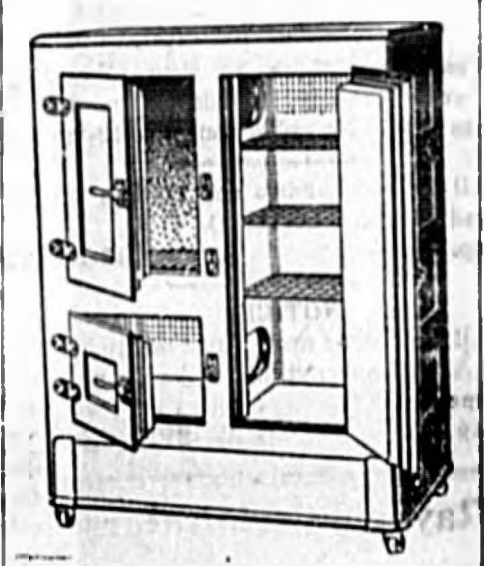

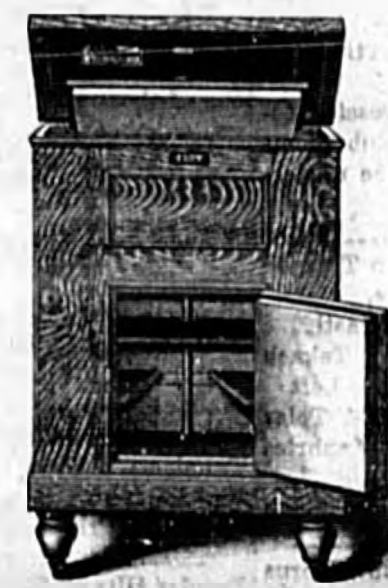

CORN FIELDS IN THE ALPS

Traveler Describes Picturesque Region That is Not Ordinarily Visited by the Tourist.

Europe's highest corn fields are perched well over 5,000 feet high in the Grisons, where the peasants still speak the old Rumanach dialect, a survival of the lingua rustica of the Roman empire. It is a region of barren seeming, despite its wealth of bright Alpine flowers, where the struggle with the land for existence is keen and persistent, writes M. J. Landa.

I had ascended in the motor diligence on one of the few wet days of this remarkable summer. At the summit of the Oberalp pass, nearly 7,000 feet above sea level, beyond a somber trout lake, a cloaked figure with peak cowl and long wand held up its hand.

It looked like a familiar of the inquisition summoning the modern invader to some ancient rite in a monastery hidden in the mountain fastnesses, but as the car obeyed the command, the figure uncowed and revealed itself as a road-mender in an enveloping mackintosh. His "wand" was a long-handled spade, and he merely wanted a lift to another pitch to continue his lonely labors.

Then came the corn fields. The grain had been cut and was stacked horizontally on tall, narrow frames that looked like race-course indicators. The corn just commences to grow, but refuses to ripen, and it has to be laid on the shelves of these roofed frames to be dried and ripened.

The Rhine is born here—in a little green lake, 7,000 feet high, sequestered amid enormous rock precipices—and continues a turbulent course for some time through ravines and weird gray gorges that might be relics of the Stone age.

Motors are a novelty yet. Cows occasionally contested the right of way; now and again a child fled screaming, while others sat stolidly under umbrellas to watch the yellow monster scurry past. Soon the motor will be supplanted, for a railway has already been commenced, but it will have a steeper gradient than the highway.

The line has a derelict appearance; it is thickly overgrown with weeds all along the route. It has not been used yet; the war interfered with the work. But completed it will be, to form a link between the Engadine on the one hand and the Bernese Oberland and the Rhone valley on the other.

Connecting the sources of the Rhone and the Rhine, it may be an omen of the linking up of the nations.

Old Campaign Button.
In the Globe recently there were published pictures and a brief description of a campaign button used during the campaign of Abraham Lincoln and Hannibal Hamlin for the land's two highest offices in 1860.

A. P. Curtis of Fitchburg saw the item and mailed to the Globe a similar button used by Lincoln's opponents, Stephen A. Douglas and Herschel V. Johnson. The brass buttons are identical except for the tints which they contain.

Mr. Curtis received the Douglas-Johnson button from his father, who in turn received it from his father. Mr. Curtis doubts whether the coin-like campaign badge was used as a charm, and points out that the ribbon attached to the Johnson-Douglas button (which he says is the original ribbon) indicates that the brass buttons were suspended from the coat lapel buttonholes by means of the short ribbons.—Boston Globe.

Wave Motor.
A motor, or power producer, operated by the waves of the sea has been tried in England. It resembles a great steel buoy. A long, hollow spindle is maintained in a vertical position. Near its lower end is a platform which, being far below the surface of the water, tends to resist any vertical displacement. An annular float surrounds the spindle and rises and falls with the waves. Thus a pump-like action is produced between the moving float and the relatively stationary spindle, and this is utilized to produce power. In one experiment a stream of water was thrown across a ship's deck. It is proposed to mount a complete electric plant upon such a wave-motor, and have the dynamo driven by the same, so as to supply an electric lamp. This would give a self-supplying lighted buoy.

The Periscope.
Under this name the Commandant Soulie de Cenac of the French Legion of Honor has designed a pince-nez, or eyeglass, which enables the wearer to see at the same time on all sides, and even behind. This is ingeniously effected by means of reflections. At the same time the glasses are so constructed as to correct myopia and other errors of vision. A use for the instrument that the inventor did not think of has been revealed to him by deaf persons employing it. They say that it increases their safety by enabling them to perceive the approach of dangers.

Joyful Reunion.
While I was in service I loaned a buddy in our company 100 francs, which at that time amounted to almost \$20.

Recently as I was touring the loop buying Christmas presents we met. We hardly got through greeting each other when he handed me \$25. This amount, he claimed, was due me, including interest. I never expected to see him or the money any more, since he was sent to the hospital to be operated on while I was still in Germany.—Chicago Journal.

Like Modern "Put and Take."

Almost identical in principle with the present-day game known popularly as "Put and Take," is the game of "Trendel," particularly popular with the Jewish people during the Chasidka holidays. It is a very ancient game and is said to have been known to the Greeks and Romans.

"Trendel" is from the German word "dreben," or turn, hence the name for the toplike instrument with which it is played, explains the Detroit News. The trendel has inscribed on its four sides the Hebrew letters "nun," "gimel," "heh" and "shin," which are the initial letters of the words "Nea godol hoyo shon," meaning "a great miracle was performed then." In playing the game the consecutive meanings given these letters are "nichte," "gnna," "halb" and "stetl." Thus when the top falls, with the "nun" upward the player turning the top gets nothing, "gimel" takes the whole pot, "heh" takes half, a "shin" calls for "putting" or "adding" to the pot.

Astronomers Were Wrong.

A sixty-inch reflecting telescope purchased for the Harvard college observatory nearly 20 years ago and later abandoned as unsatisfactory has been proved by recent successful tests to be of decided value. It is one of the four largest reflectors in the world. Made 30 years ago in England by A. A. Common, a famous telescope maker, it was bought by Harvard in 1902, for a special type of visual work, but when set up and tested was called unsatisfactory. Since that time astronomers have learned much about the characteristics and special uses of big reflectors, and the recent tests promise good results with this telescope in radiometric work.
