Wave Motor.

A motor, or power producer, operated by the waves of the sea has been tried in England. It resembles a great steel buoy. A long, hollow spindle is maintained in a vertical position. Near its lower end is a platform which, being far below the surface of the water, tends to realst any vertical displacement. An annular fiont surrounds the spindle and rises and fails with the waves. Thus a pump-like action is produced between the moving float and the relatively stationary spindle, and this is utilized. to produce power. In one experiment a stream of water was thrown across a ship's deck. It is proposed to mount a complete electric plant spon such a wave-motor, and have the dynamo driven by the same, so as to supply an electric lamp. This would give a selfsupplying lighted huoy.
