County plans birthday party

Museum's slogan: Register now

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The Seminole County Museum has such a rich history that members of the Seminole County Historical Society are confident the building soon will be included in the National Register of Historic Places.

"We believe our nomination will be approved," said Douglas Stenstrom, president of the Society, which is observing the county's 85th birthday with a number of activities beginning at 10 a.m. Saturday. The museum is located at Five Points across from Flea World.

"The Museum was built in 1926 and we believe it to be a true community asset that preserves Seminole County's heritage, as well as our national heritage," County Commission Chairman Randy Morris wrote to the Bureau of Historic Preservation in Tallahassee.

In order to be considered for the year 1998-1999, the nomination had to be received by May 12, 1998. The selection process takes six months to complete.

Child abuse: Stressing need for more concern

SEMINOLE COUNTY - While Seminole County is relatively small in size, its population is plentiful. And with a large population, more child abuse problems are found.

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month in Florida. While child abuse prevention is a continuing effort rather than just one month per year, Stuart Doyle, public information officer with District 7 Florida Department of Children & Families, says it is a time to consider the facts so the general populous gets a closer look at this serious problem.

To stress the need for more concern, Doyle's figures for fiscal year 1995/96 for Seminole County showed 2,099 reported cases of abuse (allegations, not confirmations). By fiscal year 1996/97 the number had climbed to 2,321 or 1.81 percent of the total reports of child abuse in the state (128,240).

District 7 is comprised of Seminole, Brevard, Orange and Osceola counties.

For the 4-county district, Children & Families receives more than 1,100 reports of child abuse and neglect each month. The reports are made through the Florida Abuse Hotline Information System.

In February of this year, District 7 received 1,305 reports, which required investigation. Statewide for that month there were 10,732 reports filed.

In fiscal year 1996/97 the district's report of 16,089 represented 12.55 percent of the state's total.

With concern for the problem, Governor Lawton Chiles issued a proclamation designating April, 1998 as Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Month.

Bridge repair update

SEMINOLE COUNTY - No one disputes that the bridge that connects Seminole and Volusia counties by way of I-4 is in need of repair. What with an estimated 70,000 vehicles traveling on it each day, officials say it is no wonder.

The original designers and planners in the 1950s estimated that the bridge would be handling about 30,000 vehicles a day.

Currently the bridge has two lanes in each direction with no

shoulders or room for more lanes to be added. The bridge, which was built in 1960 helps connect neighbors besides the 70,000 vehicles each day.

The original planners never envisioned having such tremendous growth in Central Florida. "This is the number one unfunded priority for us and Volusia County," says Harold Barley who is the Executive Director of Metroplan, the regional authority on transportation coordination, planning and financing.

Recently, Congressman John Mica was successful in getting

an additional \$14 million dollars for this project in the House Transportation Proposal, "which is an important boost," says Barley. The \$14 million is to pay for the complete design and land for the right of way.

With many accidents occurring on or near the bridge which causes further delays in both directions this is of major concern to local planners. Although it is imperative that this bridge be replaced right away, the current plan has the replacement coming in 2012 at

Safehouse mission: Empowering abused spouses

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The Safehouse of Seminole is a shelter for domestic violence victims.

Recently, officials and volunteers from the shelter had their first clothing drive for Safehouse residents. Donated clothing gave the residents proper attire for jobs, job interviews and to appear in court. These items included: shoes, shirts, ensembles, and more.

The drive was organized and developed by Seminole County Circuit Court Judge Nancy F. Alley, who says that she got the idea from when she lived in Washington, D.C. about six years ago. Alley also says, "The drive, which we called Empower with Power Suits, is to build their self esteem or confidence level when they go for a job."

Alley continues, "They know they look their best. They know they are starting on an equal footing as everyone else when applying for a job." Alley says that the reason it is called Empower is that a lot of battered women and children have a feeling of worthlessness.

The clothes were brought to Bob Dance Dodge who helped sponsor the project with the Seminole County Bar Association and Attorney Gary Siegel's office by way of a truck and two cars. "It is because of this drive that the shelter has enough clothes for five to six months. The exact location of the shelter is kept secret for security reasons."

Betty Spencer, the shelter manager, says, "We don't know what we would do without the community support we get."

Holland Pugh serves as the executive director. Residents can stay at the shelter for an average of six weeks, maybe longer. There is also a Safehouse Outreach Program.

Battered women it is said, tend to return to an abusive relationship at least seven times, always hoping that their situation will not continue. Again, self esteem issues come into the picture. Alley sees the same issue present in spousal abuse...power. The abuser wants to be in a position of power.

The most important thing Alley says about the residents at the shelter, is that they need time and energy to get help.

Given the current condition, the bridge will worsen with the added 14 years. The current bridge is obsolete and unable to meet the future needs of the region. The project developmental and environmental phase of the project is due to be completed in June of 1999.

Funds are being planned to continue widening I-4, the area west of the bridge between Lake Mary Boulevard and U.S. 17-92. It is expected to be completed by the year 2002. Though the increased capacity is good, the added widening will result in a "choke point," says Metroplan.

Historic Places is an official listing of historically significant sites and properties throughout the country. It includes districts, sites, buildings, structures and objects that have been identified and documented as being significant in American history, architecture, archaeology, engineering or culture.

The museum building qualifies for the Register on both the architecture and for its original use.

In the 1920's, the building was used for a home for the poor and elderly. That's how County Home Road received its name. "It was the County Poor Farm," said Karen Jacobs, staff assistant at the museum. "It has quite a history. We're excited that it has been nominated for the National Register."

The land for the county home

and a convict camp were purchased in 1925 from Cassandra Schultz - 82 acres for \$9,020.

Listing in the Register may make a property eligible for a Federal Income Tax Credit. It does not automatically preserve a building nor keep the property from being modified.

The county's 85th birthday festivities begin Saturday with a welcome by Cecil Tucker of the Historical Society and an invocation by Major Bruce Williams of the Salvation Army, and a patriotic medley by the Sounds of Praise.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale and County Commissioner Morris will talk and a number of entertainers will perform.

At 3:30 p.m. the Historical Society will raffle its 85th anniversary quilt.

Stenstrom Elementary: Where butterflies are free

OVIEDO - Stenstrom Elementary third-grader Karl Banks said he is tired of seeing trash everywhere.

He's worried about the environment and is helping a group of kids in his class try to make the Earth a happier and healthier place.

"I was driving down the road one day and we were driving down all these streets and I just saw all this garbage everywhere," Karl said. "I wish I had time to clean it all up."

Classmate Kate Mulligan added, "People just don't care."

As part of Earth Day celebrations Wednesday, Stenstrom students participated in a variety of outdoor activities to learn more about the state of the environment and to learn how they can make the world a better place. Stenstrom faculty members organized Project S.E.E.D. (Stenstrom's Environmental Education Discoveries) and teachers Ricky Carver, Ruth Meyers and Pam Ferrante went to work.

The teachers came up with a goal to help students develop an awareness, appreciation and affection for nature, and the project seemed to be working as a group of third graders spent part of the day out in the sun organizing the construction of a butterfly garden.

The project started in the fall when school year workshops were offered to teachers to promote environmental education in the classroom. Teachers received training on the Sunshine State Standards and how to integrate

their knowledge into a curriculum. The teachers also received materials to use in the classrooms.

By yesterday, the project was ready to go and the kids seemed to be having a ball, digging through the dirt and looking for ways to attract butterflies. Soon, Stenstrom hopes to have a birdhouse constructed near the butterfly garden and plans are also under way for an outdoor classroom.

For now, the butterflies have everyone excited. Stenstrom Dividend Peggy Gotter is assisting in the project and she is referred to as "Stenstrom's resident butterfly nut" by faculty members.

Gotter raises butterflies at home and she and her children, one of them a student at Stenstrom, have raised over 150 in their own backyard.

The kids explained that they were planting two types of plants: hosts and nectars.

"Hosts attract caterpillars and their eggs and nectars attract other butterflies," Karl said.

The kids seemed concerned about what could happen to the environment and nature if animals started to die because of human negligence.

"All the animals could die," Matthew Tellson said. "Manatees are dying because they keep getting hit by big boats and people that don't care about them."

"All of the animals are dying out," Kate added. "People are cutting through all the forests and the animals are losing their homes."

At Stenstrom, the kids are making sure that, in their own small way, at least a lot of butterflies will have a home.

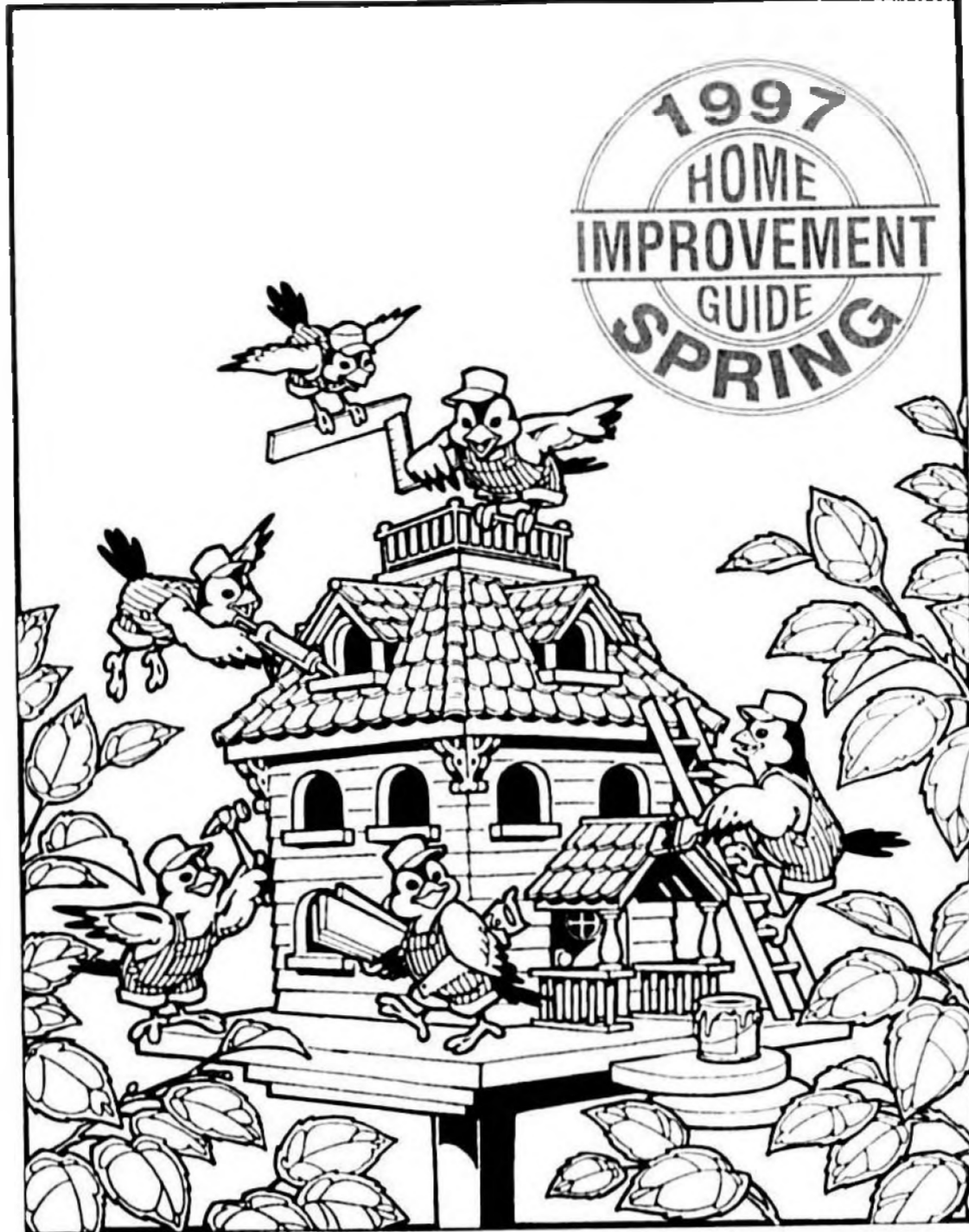
