

SCIENCE, CIRCUMSTANCE MAKE CASE AGAINST HAUPTMANN

New Jersey's Evidence Built From Meager Clues Of Crime

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Feb. 2.—(AP)—To the entire world, the history of Alvin Karpis' kidnapping trial has been added as a notable example of criminal prosecution.

On other factors, in many respects, were phases of the prosecution's case against Bruno. The kidnapper and his chief henchman, the thin-faced German carpenter who lived as a notorious bandit through the country, had the law's eye by means of the law's spotlight.

But by New Jersey's word, the circumstances of the trial, the manner in which the court was conducted and the manner in which the kidnapper was a fugitive from justice, were the chief factors in the trial.

Yet when David T. Wilentz, attorney for Bruno, called a formal witness to stand in the witness box, he had no evidence or witness to back him up.

Mystery, Science In Case

To the three-year hunt for the kidnapper of the Lindbergh baby who was born in the spring of 1932, the public paid little attention. Between the death of Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., on March 18, 1933, and the arrival of Bruno's arrest, almost three years transpired.

A packet of ransom notes, recovered and identified, was exhibited in the courtroom yesterday.

After an hour of testimony, the trial was adjourned until Monday morning. The judge said he would have time to consider the evidence presented.

The trial will resume at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. The defense will present its case.

Wilentz, the defense attorney, said he would present his case in the afternoon.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Marking another significant milestone in the development of jurisprudence, the Supreme Court today held that Congress—as well as the courts—has the power to impose contempt fines.

The decision, affirmed in 10-day jail sentences imposed by U.S. Senator William P. McCracken, Jr., former chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Small Business, was a victory for the Senate.

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Miamis Reported As Having Biggest Year Since Boom

Tourist Business Is Thirty Percent Better Than Last Year

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 5.—Not since the boom days of 1926 has Miami enjoyed such a great flow of tourists. One hotel, railroad, steamship lines, travel agencies and business houses report an increase of over thirty percent; all time record, exceeding by nearly fifty percent the volume of tourist traffic during the boom days of 1926. The record of flow of tourists is half a million, a half-million visitors last season being America's fourth largest industry, the tourist business last year having exceeded the figure of 1926.

We have just completed a survey of business and tourism statistics in Miami, which show that this area can accommodate another fifty thousand visitors without any appreciable increase in cost. We have found that there will be ample apartment houses and private residences as low as seven dollars weekly available at rates under twenty dollars daily. Miami has accommodations for one hundred and fifty thousand visitors at a time. We have about four hundred and a half fifteen hundred buildings varying from palatial water front estates to comfortable apartments in the heart of the city. There is an excellent winter vacation in Miami, and if the weather is good we have some "sheering." We have medium-priced houses and apartment houses that are the best in the country in the winter months.

Miami is well able to care for all of its guests this winter. A great many tourists are taking a two-week trip which takes more than twice as long as travel than ever before. They are staying longer because of the weather, averaging six months, according to a week in Miami, and the other three months in the north.

social workers helping out that would be justified in the Hall-Mills murder trial, but the witness denied he was in any sense a preferable witness.
