Cabbage growers are asking \$1.75 on the dock for their products. Two cars have been shipped this week, some of the goods being brought under this price.

No tomatoes are going forward from any part of the east coast in car lot shipments now and there will not be such until the new fruit comes on, the freeze having damaged plants in the Miami district.




