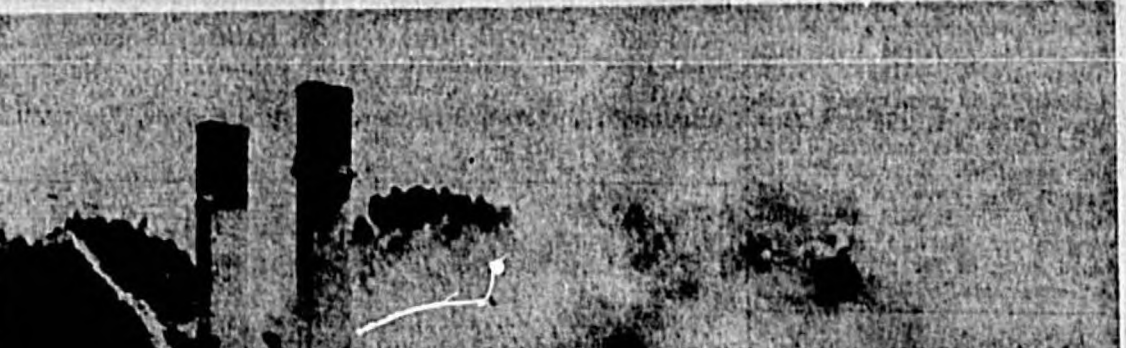

Found: DeeJay Who Admits Taking Payola

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Found: A former disc jockey who admits he took payola.

House investigators made public closed-door testimony in which Norman Prescott admitted he accepted \$9,905 for playing songs of four record companies over WBZ-Radio and WBZ-TV, Boston.

Prescott's testimony was released Wednesday while the House subcommittee met in closed-door session to question Harry Carter, president, treasurer, and majority stockholder in Music Suppliers, Inc., Boston, which Prescott said paid him \$5,515.

Prescott said he took payola for about two years but finally quit in disgust over "the payola conditions."

Prescott, who testified Feb. 9, is the only witness who has told the House group that he either gave or received payola under-the-table payments for giving certain records preferred treatment.

Other disc jockeys have conceded freely they got money from record companies, and the companies admit they paid radio station personnel. But except for Prescott they have all contended the money was paid for other reasons—for "testing" songs at record hops, or for giving advice on "connections."

Integration Leader King Is Arrested

ATLANTA (UPI)—The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., militant leader of integration drives by southern Negroes, was arrested here Wednesday on perjury charges in connection with the filing of Alabama state income tax returns.

King, who moved here from Montgomery, Ala., earlier this month to lead a "full scale assault on the system of segregation," was arrested by two sheriff's deputies on a warrant sworn out by Lloyd B. Hale, auditor of the Alabama Revenue Department.

He was released under \$2,000 bond to await an extradition hearing March 18. Gov. Ernest Vandiver, who must sign any extradition paper, announced he was moving to Atlanta that "he is not welcome in Georgia."

Alabama officials said the two perjury charges stemmed from King's reputed failure to report about \$31,000 on his 1956 and 1958 state income tax returns. Evasion of state income tax is only a misdemeanor in Alabama, but perjury is a felony.

King, who said he has been arrested "six or seven times" in the last few years, accused Alabama officials of harassing him because of his integration leadership.

The young Negro minister led a successful boycott of segregated city buses in Montgomery in 1955 while president of the Montgomery Improvement Assn. He recently is head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference with headquarters here.

The World May Be In 'Terrible' Shape But Temple Still Won't Open 'Mysterious' Box

NEWTON (UPI)—The world is in a terrible state that I got a message with John Temple today that told him to "open the box" he had hidden.

Mr. Temple, a 70-year-old member of the Pentecost Society, said he cannot open the box until there are 10 bishops of the Church of England present.

"And although we've been trying with newspaper advertisements, petitions and other forms of pressure for 64 years, we still cannot persuade enough bishops to gather at the same time."

Temple is one of the guardians of what his society calls "Joanna Southcott's Box."

Miss Southcott was a prophetess who died in 1816 and the society claims that before her death she wrote out a prescription for all the world's ills and had it placed in a large box which was then hammered shut with copper nails and bound with stout cord.

She laid down in her last testament that if the 10 bishops gathered at a time of crisis and opened the box before a consensus of believers in her they would find

therein the secret of eternal peace and prosperity for humankind.

Temple explained that since only Joanna Southcott had the revelation of possible existence it was natural that the commit and all other potential candidates were hereditarily.

His advice to Eisenhower, Khrushchev, Macmillan and company is to save their time and convene the bishops instead.

"To open the box?"

"Certainly," said Temple.

"Where is the box?"

"In safe hands."

"Can I see it?"

"Alas, no—not until the bishops gather."

Temple said they had the right number of bishops in 1948 but the clerics wanted the box opened in private. In 1956 a petition with 31,000 signatures was presented to the Archbishop of Canterbury. But he turned it down.

"We are still hopeful," Temple said, "that before it is too late, the bishops will 'open the box.'"

Hundreds Clash In Virginia Integration Ruckus

PORTSMOUTH, Va. (UPI)—Police arrested 26 teen-agers and scattered a crowd of hundreds Wednesday in the latest outbreak of trouble over demonstrations for integration at lunch counters.

Clubs, knives, chains and a pistol were taken from the milling crowd. One policeman was injured by a rock thrown from a car, but no injuries to demonstrators were reported.

Lunch counter demonstrations began two weeks ago at Greensboro, N. C. and have spread through five states.

Police Chief L. C. Warren said his men would patrol the mid-city shopping center here again today to prevent a recurrence of two days of clashes.

Two dime stores closed their lunch counters indefinitely and a drug store planned to close its soda fountain at 3 p. m. daily, previous closures by Benson, white and Negro high schools.

Warren said charges of disorderly conduct were filed against 26 teen-agers who were released in custody of their parents.

The trouble started when classes let out from Marcus High School for Negroes near the shopping center.

Police said about 500 pupils

marched past the stores and then doubled back. Groups of white persons, who had been dispersed earlier, returned and words were exchanged.

Police called in reinforcements and used their especially trained "K-9 Corps" dogs to push the Negroes into a nearby field and scatter the crowd.

Demonstrations had been largely peaceful except for an outbreak of fist and chain fights here Tuesday.

At Raleigh, N. C., a white man was charged with assault with a deadly weapon and another with simple assault after scuffles with Negro college students picketing drug and variety stores along Raleigh's main street.

Ke, Secret Service Count On Host Nations For Protection On Tour

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower and the U. S. Secret Service are counting on host nations to provide security against any disturbances on his South American tour.

Eisenhower is confident there is nothing to worry about on his trip to four South American countries, from Mexico Monday. He does not have any security details, but he will have a small contingent of Secret Service men.

White House officials point out that when the President visits a foreign country, the local police are responsible for his security. Secret Service men are only there to assist in case of an emergency and to see that the President is not harassed by the local press.

Rights Bill Snag Routed

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House Rules Committee was to meet today to unleash formally a civil rights bill the southern-dominated group has held for six months.

The rules deadlock was broken when Republicans joined northern Democrats Wednesday in agreeing informally to send the measure to the House floor.

Committee members said House leaders had decided to call up the measure about March 10. This raised the possibility the House might act before the Senate wound up its marathon civil rights debate.

The House measure, a stripped-down version of President Eisenhower's 1959 civil rights program, would allow federal inspection of voting records and provide penalties for interference with school integration orders and for "hate" bombings.

Republican rules committee members suddenly pressed for action as northern Democrats needed access in a drive to spring the bill with a discharge petition. Customs Chief Says Gun-Running To Cuba Stopped

Kelly, in testimony told the House Appropriations Committee the illicit arms traffic ended after President Eisenhower ordered more than 100 immigration officers to patrol small airports in Florida.

"I would say that about six or eight months ago there was quite a lot of smuggling of arms to Cuba," Kelly said.

The crocodile, a gift to N. S. Smirnov, mayor of Leningrad, was flown from here Wednesday to the Russian delegation at the U.N.

Smirnov was presented the crocodile two weeks ago when he and 11 other Soviet officials stopped in Miami on their nationwide tour.

State, Defense Set To Rest Cases In Finch Trial

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The defense and prosecution both were set to rest their cases today in the murder trial of Dr. Bernard Finch and Carol Treguff.

The trial was not expected to reach the seven-woman, five-man jury until late next week, however, because of a long weekend recess until next Tuesday when closing arguments will begin.

Swedish maid Marie Anne Lidholm was one of a few rebuttal witnesses scheduled to testify in the window of evidence today. Her lengthy previous testimony was the state's only eye witness account of events of July 13 when Mrs. Barbara Foster was killed.

Wednesday lawyers for the 47-year-old doctor and his mistress conferred with Judge Walter Evans on his legal instructions to the jury. The prosecution has said it will seek the death penalty for both on a charge of first degree murder and conspiracy to murder.

Assistant Dist. Atty. Fred Whitehead and Clifford Crill were understood to have told Judge Evans they feel the only other verdict—beyond acquittal—would be second degree, unpremeditated murder or manslaughter.

Attorneys for Miss Treguff said they object to any instructions on "included offenses" for their client. They seek complete acquittal.

But Grant Cooper, lawyer for the doctor, said he has suggested instructions for his client which would include lesser offenses such as assault with intent to commit murder, assault with a deadly weapon to commit murder and assault with a deadly weapon.

Judge Evans planned to spend all of Friday studying his instructions. The trial will be in recess today because of Washington's holiday on Monday.

The jury returns a verdict on the first degree murder charge against Finch and the trial will then proceed with evidence and arguments on the severity of sentence. Then the jury would retire a second time to decide whether the penalty should be death in the gas chamber or imprisonment.

It's all part of the carnival season, the nine days of unbridled revelry that will reach its climax March 1 with Mardi Gras Day. Kickoff for the carnival season begins Friday with the first of 24 costly, colorful parades.

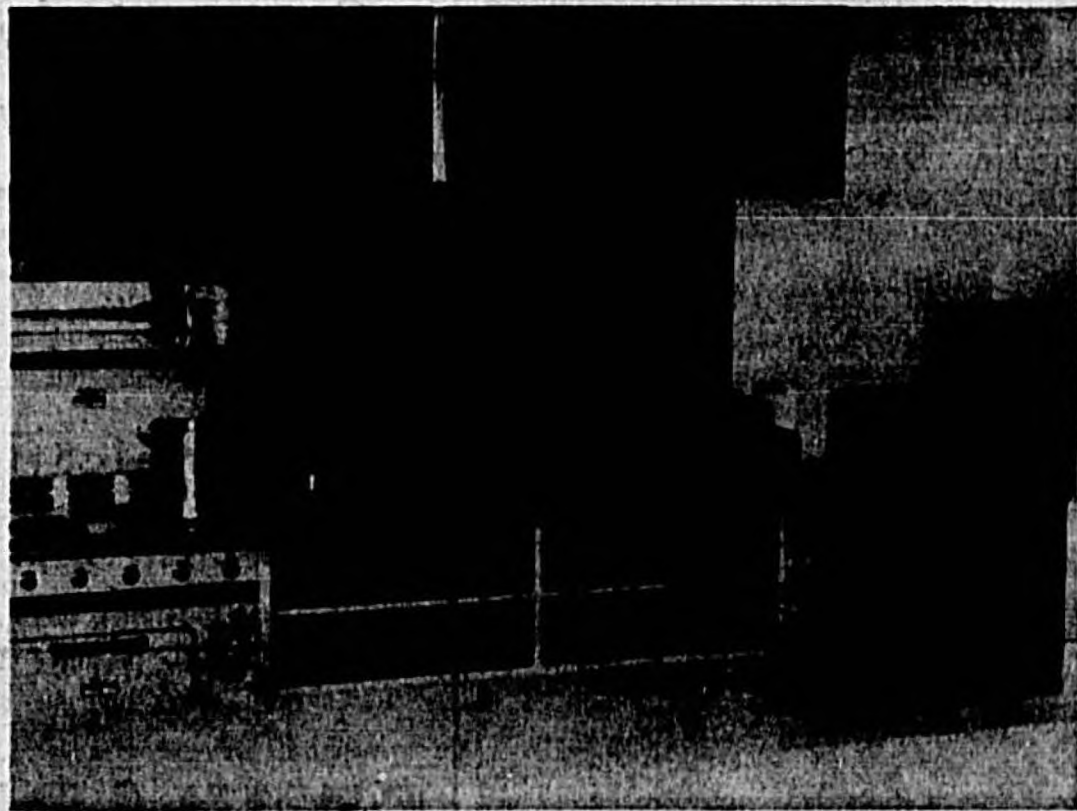

Chimp's Trainer Has To Stand Trial

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Animal trainer Robert Tomarchin will have to go back to St. Louis and stand trial for stealing a chimpanzee from the zoo, Gov. LeRoy Collins decided Tuesday. Collins signed extradition papers for Tomarchin, who admitted taking the chimpanzee "Mr. Moke" from the St. Louis Zoo.

Tomarchin, 37, is charged with larceny in the theft of Moke, a 20-pounder who formerly appeared with him on a Miami television show.

Tomarchin's Miami lawyers said they would fight the ruling on the ground that the indictment secured by the zoo was "futile and improperly drawn."

That was one of the grounds overruled by Collins in his decision. Tomarchin, an orphan, reared Moke from infancy. He sold Moke to the zoo, then stole him back after he saw that the chimp looked "heartbroken" behind cage bars.

He left a \$1,000 cashier's check and an I.O.U. for \$3,000 in the case, but zoo officials prefer to have Moke.

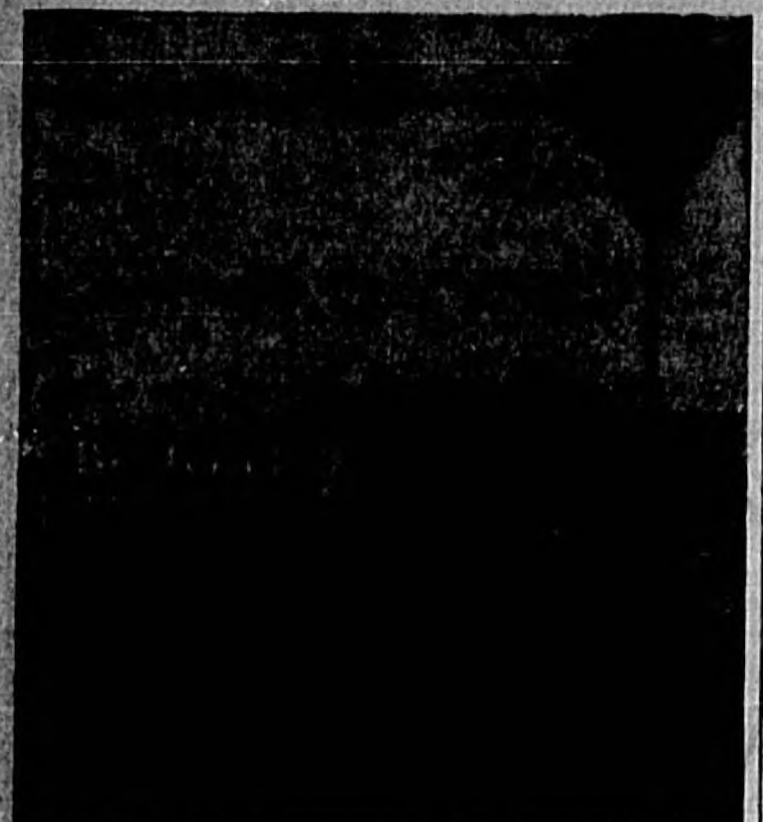

DURHAM, N. C. (UPI)—A Negro minister, who used boycott and passive resistance as a means of ending bus segregation, urged Negroes Tuesday night to "fill the jailhouses of the South" if necessary in a drive for complete integration.

Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. of Atlanta spoke to a rally of about 800 persons called to strengthen a sit-down protest of segregated lunch counters at drug, dime and department stores. King led the successful boycott of segregated city buses at Montgomery, Ala., in 1956.

North Carolina has a program of limited integration in public schools of seven cities, but King told his audience that "we are not satisfied with token integration."
