

Open Mess

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A congressman today bared the contents of still another Air Force manual instructing airmon on how to stage fashion shows, round up dates for bachelors and mix drinks.

The book also advises persons who run officers' clubs to feed employes - often enlisted men - cheaper cuts of meat than those served to members.

The publication, which still is in use, is called "Open Mess Operating Manual." It was issued in 1957 by order of Gen. Nathan F. Twining, then Air Force chief of staff and now chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Rep. Frank Kowalski (D-Conn.) disclosed existence

of the manual in a letter urging the House Armed Services Committee to investigate all military training books.

The manual says that if getting dates for bachelor officers is a problem then "call the nurses, women's colleges or the Junior League."

The manual also contains this advice:

On promoting food: "A short descriptive sentence heips seil food.
