Ludendorff resigned his post as first quartermaster general and real leader of the German army as the result of a complete disagreement with Prince Maximilian, the chancellor. There was no hope of a reconciliation, according to these advices, and the emperor was compelled to accept Ludendorff's resignation.

The toll of life from influenza has not been heavy so far in Palatka, but measured by the character of those taken it has cost in quality what in other places has been exemplified in numbers.

Quite two million American troops are now across the seas, withdrawn from protective employment. They must be supported, as well as help extended to the starving millions of desolated lands. Remedies of this class are usually accompanied by many testimonials which are used as strong arguments to recommend them. Dr. Logan says it should be borne in mind that reliable cures do not require such testimonials.

It should also be remembered that no great discoveries of this character have been made inside the laboratories regularly equipped for, and recognized by state and national governments as doing reliable research work.

If livestock owners would remember that they have competent representatives in the department of agriculture at Washington, the State Experiment Station, at Gainesville and State Live Stock Sanitary Board at Tallahassee, who are glad to give them all the information they can along these lines and that such information is reliable and free for the asking, they would save themselves much trouble and money.

LOSSES BY INSECTS CAN BE PREVENTED Watch for Evidence of Injury and Apply Remedies.

Maximum yields of grain must be produced not only during the present year but for several years to come. The present international situation renders this imperative. Insects are responsible for great reductions in grain crops annually, but such losses are largely preventable. The injuries caused by insects often remain unnoticed except where their work is very conspicuous.

A great portion of the annual loss to the grain crop due to insect injuries can be avoided by vigilance and vigorous action on the part of the grain growers. Insect outbreaks frequently originate within limited areas, and when this is the case it is often possible to stamp them out before any great damage has occurred. In other instances the outbreaks are of general origin, and then community action is essential in order that the proudest of the pest may be overcome. The most serious insect enemies of cereal crops, such as the Hessian fly, the chinch bug, and white grub, belong to the latter class.
