It is also interesting to note that this talk of revolution is coincident with the introduction of various measures calling for some two and one-half billion dollars in appropriations for the "relief" of these particular states.

When one stops to consider the relief in the form of special appropriations from the federal treasury which our government is already providing, including funds for agricultural experimental stations, co-operative agricultural extension work, forest fire co-operation, federal highway aid, agricultural colleges, veterans aid, national guard, vocational education, farm board stabilization, seed loans and what not, and when one understands that it is the rest of the not, and when one understands that it is the rest of the country which is supplying the funds, aggregating hundreds of millions annually, for this "relief" work in these same complaining states, one's sympathy for their problems is apt to give way to impatience.

If they are really sincere in their threats of revolution,

wonder what form of government they could set up which would be more generous to them with federal money than the one to which they are already connected. We wonder to whom they would turn for their farm relief loans, their seed loans, their unemployment relief loans, and their cash advances for innumerable other purposes. We wonder whom they would get to finance their army and navy, their veterans pensions, and the many incidental expenses of government, for them.

As a matter of fact, a revolution in that part of the country, if successful and resulted in the creation of an in-

country, if successful and resulted in the creation of an independent nation, actually has its advantageous aspects from the point of view of the rest of us. It would be an normous saving in our federal expenses. Those states contribute nothing to the cost of our national government.
They receive back far more than they are taxed. Tariff walls which now keep out foreign wheat, could then be reduced. We could buy wheat from Argentina for coniderably less than we have to pay these middle western

Rather than condemn this revolutionary move, we are inclined to be all for it. It provides the simplest method we have yet seen advanced to balance the federal budget. We dare say if Congressmen told Nebraska and North Da-kota to go shead and revolt, instead of using this publicity rmers have been hearing so stunt as a weapon to browbest another couple of billions out of the federal treasury, there'd quickly be an end to come control of the federal treasury, there'd quickly be an end to all talk of revolution.
