Ouster Ruled Unconstitutional High Court Favors Powell

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court found today that the U.S. House was without power to exclude Rep. Adam Clayton Powell in March 1967.

Chief Justice Earl Warren said: "Our examination of the relevant historical materials leads us to the conclusion that petitioners (Powell and a group of Harlem voters) are correct and that the Constitution forbids the House without authority to exclude any person, duly elected by its constituents who meets all the requirements for membership in the Constitution."

Sheriff Probes Rape Charge

A 22-year-old woman was reported raped yesterday, according to Seminole County sheriff's deputies. The crying woman was found near the intersection of SR 434 and 419 near North Orlando.

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of a suspect. Sheriff's officials are continuing their investigation. Midway Market, located near Highway 46, was hit by thieves over the weekend. The market was entered through a sliding window and, it was reported, over \$200 worth of merchandise was missing. Over 40 shirts were taken in the burglary, along with assorted grocery items.

Constable To Explain

Full and detailed explanation of his billing to the county of questionable items will be given by the Board of County Commissioners by Constable Bob Jane at the meeting scheduled for 9 a. m. tomorrow at the courthouse. Jane's explanation, expected to take at least one hour, will include his side of the charges that he sought payment from the county for two separate trips, one day apart, to Panama City to transport prisoners. In addition, he is charged with seeking compensation for the services of a guard or deputy constable and payment for almost daily appearance in Peace Justice Thomas Lovett's court rather than the normal two times weekly appearances. Assistant State Attorney Thomas Speer has been asked by the local Republican executive committee, as well, to investigate allegation that Jane is living outside his district, operating a private detective agency in addition to his duties as constable and has hired deputy constables or guards.

It is planned that the Governor will land at Sanford Airport and motor to the Holiday Inn, where a press conference will precede the stag dinner-meeting.

Hospital Aid Program Is Found Wanting

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 150 hospitals built or expanded with federal aid are standing half-empty in the nation's rural areas while over-crowded urban hospitals plead for more money.

One large city hospital, built in 1954 and already loaded as a

trap for officials, has had to wait five years for federal aid. A small mountain town in the same state got a new hospital promptly even though its old one was two-thirds empty.

A fresh fight is boiling up in the Senate to try to chop the rural favoritism out of the Hill-Burton aid program and channel more cash into the outback.

overcrowded hospitals of America's major cities. But the House has already voted against such a shift.

Rep. Durward C. Hall, R-Mo., doctor, has called many half-empty rural hospitals a waste. He said both politics and provincialism have played a role in passing out the federal aid.

Rocky Flies To Latin America

NEW YORK (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller leaves today on the third leg of his trouble-plagued presidential mission to Latin America. Demonstrators have promised him a hot reception in Brazil and Uruguay.

The New York governor was to depart from Kennedy Airport at 7 a.m. on a nine-hour nonstop flight to Brasilia, Brazil's modern, backwoods capital.

His three-day visit to Brazil, Latin America's largest and most populous country, will be his longest stay in any one nation on this tour.

Since Rockefeller began his fact-finding mission for President Nixon in Mexico City May 11, his tour has aroused protest demonstrations and violence that left at least three dead and scores wounded.

Peru, Venezuela and Chile asked him to postpone or cancel his stop there. Because of threatened violence, his call on

strongman Gen. Alfredo Stroessner. The political opposition there has said it would not participate in the welcome ceremonies. But there have been no demonstrations by students and workers similar to those in Brazil.

Sen. Frank Church (D-Idaho) described the mission last week as a "farce" that should be ended.

But Rockefeller defends it as useful. He has said that to stop the mission now "would be a victory for the enemies of the people of Latin America."

Weekend Traffic Toll Counts 19

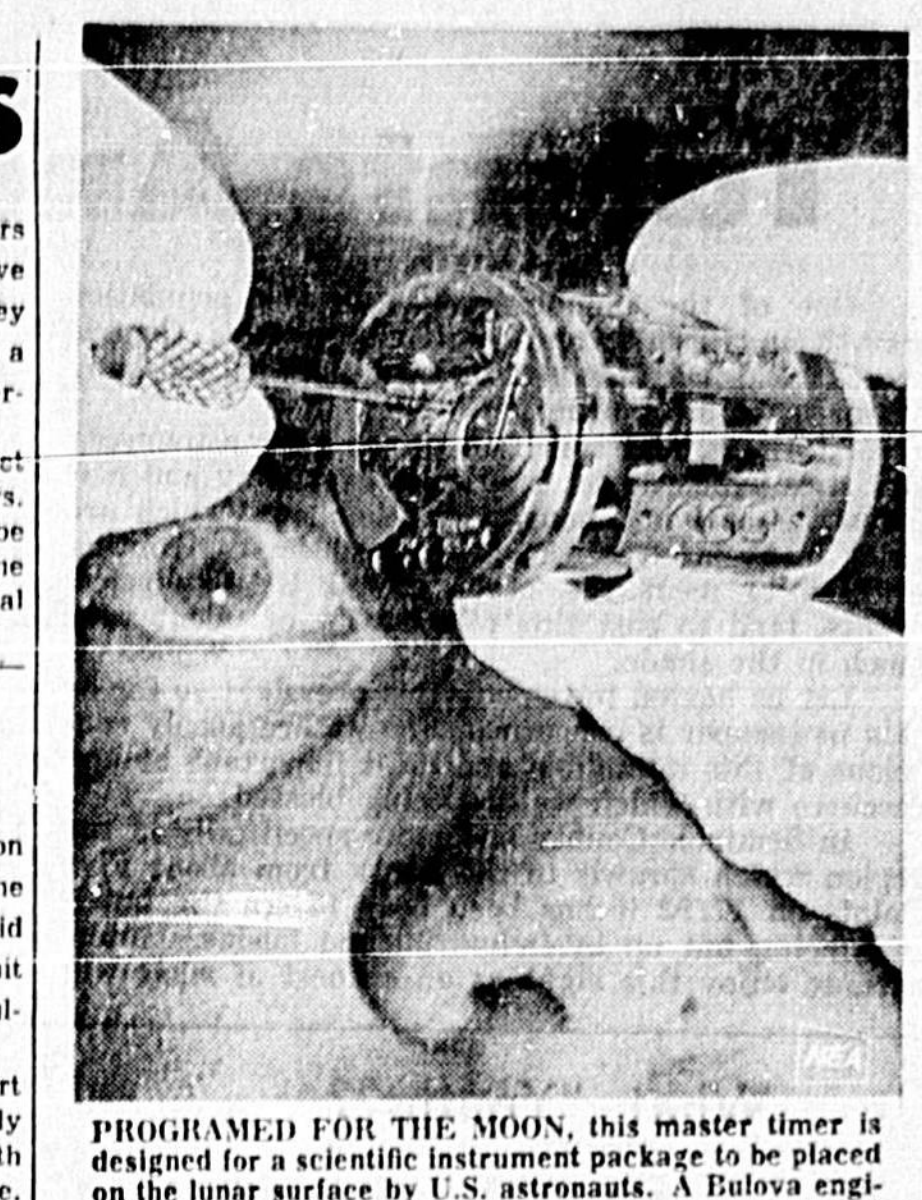
Multiple-fatality traffic accidents on Florida's streets and highways flushed the weekend toll to 19.

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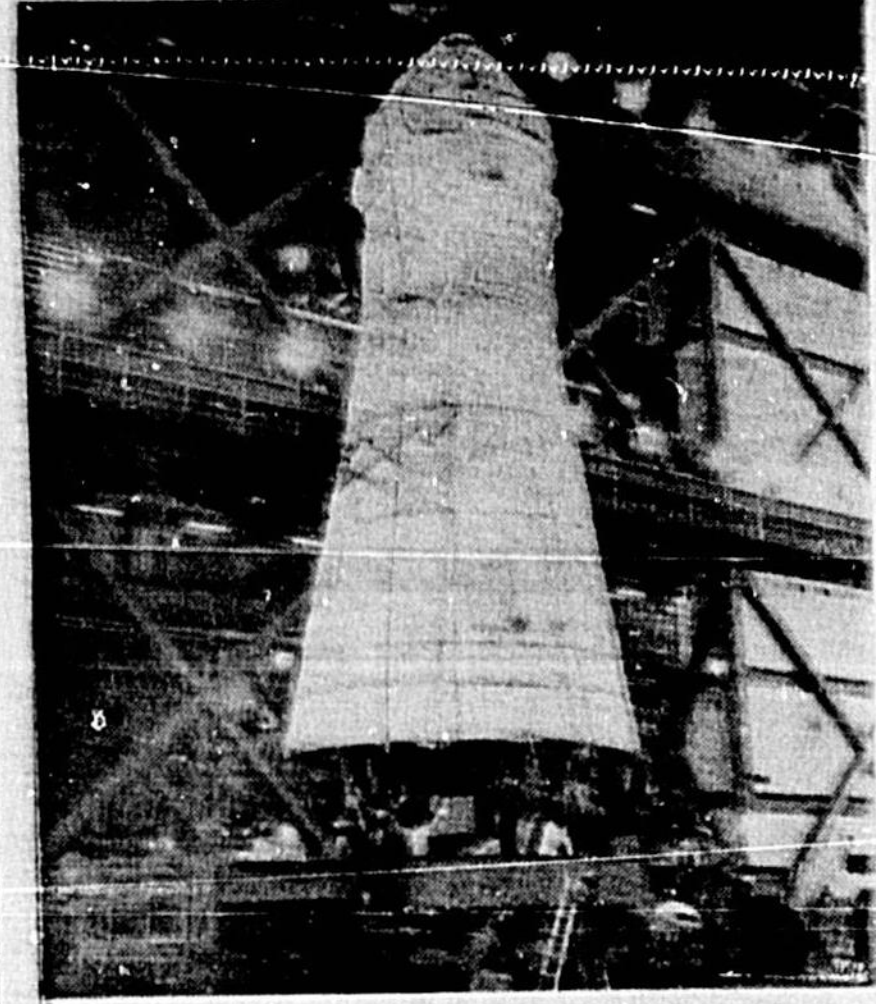

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Governor Will Sign Anti-Nepotism Bill

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Gov. Claude Kirk will sign the Legislature's anti-nepotism bill, his view that lawmakers shouldn't be paid to live with their wives in Tallahassee is a measure of his support for it.

The far-reaching measure passed on the last day of the 1969 session would outlaw local and state officials — including legislators — from putting relatives on public payrolls.

"I don't think any legislator should get \$14 a day for the privilege of sleeping with his wife," said the governor in remarks before a Palm Beach meeting of the State Association of Court Clerks.

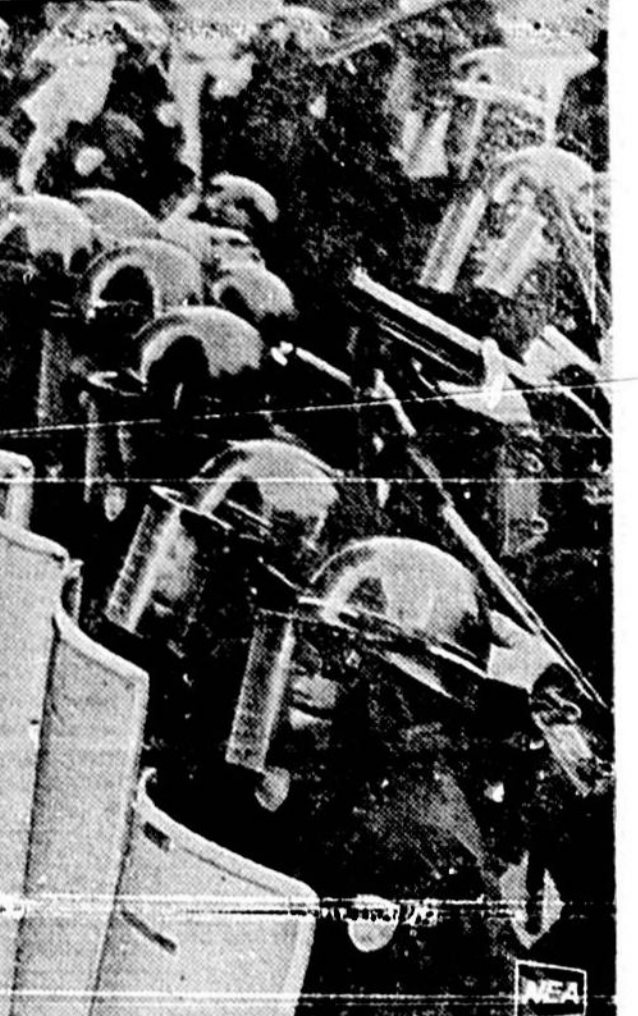
