Storm Center Leaves State This Afternoon

No Major Losses In Huge Citrus Industry Indicated By Commission Report

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS)
The reportedly vicious tropical hurricane which alarmed the entire state of Florida yesterday apparently turned out to be something of a tempest in a teapot—and a relatively mild tempest at that.

The center of the greatly weakened storm has left the Sunshine state and this afternoon was blowing itself out over south-east Georgia. The latest advisory from the Federal Storm Warning Service said the diminishing disturbance will continue inland through Georgia and South Carolina, and that strong winds are indicated as far north as Atlantic City.

The storm apparently retained all its violence with winds close to 100 miles an hour almost up to the minute it struck across the Florida Gulf coast in the Tampa Bay area at midnight. The howling gales diminished rapidly, however. By the time the storm approached Jacksonville on the east coast, that city recorded gusts only up to 45 miles an hour.

Orlando, in the center of the state, reported 70-mile gusts. The hurricane advisory service reported this morning that the remnants of the hurricane were centered over southeastern Georgia about 40 miles southwest of Savannah. The advisory said the storm was weakened to the point where it no longer is a dangerous hurricane, but will be attended by strong winds up to 40 miles an hour over the coastal areas of Georgia and the Carolinas today.

The secretary-treasurer of the Florida Citrus Commission, R. C. Evans, today said damage to the fabulous citrus crop in the Lakeland area appeared minor. Lakeland is in the heart of the grapefruit and orange belt.

Evans said he had not yet checked with other points, but preliminary reports indicated there probably would not be any major loss for the record-making crop, valued at about \$150,000,000.

The state of Florida had prepared for this hurricane as never before. Beach residents were evacuated and thousands took refuge in storm shelters. Elaborate disaster precautions were taken by the Red Cross and other relief agencies.

As yet, however, there have been no reports of heavy damage anywhere in the state, and no reports of injuries to residents.

Apparently the highest winds on the mainland were felt at Fort Myers, on the southwest coast, which the storm missed by some 90 miles while it was still raging at full fury in the Gulf. Fort Myers reported gusts up to 80 miles an hour. As the storm veered inland near the entrance to Tampa Bay, Egmont Key reported winds up to 85 miles an hour. Tampa itself, St. Petersburg and other cities in the populous west coast area, reported only moderate gusts.

Army Trying To Get Meat From Britain

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The Army is trying to find enough meat to feed its overseas forces, is negotiating for a loan of beef from Britain. This was disclosed today by the War Department, which said the Army hopes to borrow from the British 20,000,000 pounds of Argentine beef. The idea is to repay the loan in kind, with American meat, pound for pound, before the end of next February.

Final Rites Held For Comptroller Lee

TALLAHASSEE, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Friends from throughout Florida are expected in Tallahassee today to join with state officials in paying final tribute to J. M. Lee, 65-year-old comptroller who died unexpectedly Sunday.

Funeral services for the cabinet member who started his political career as attorney for the city of Avon Park were scheduled to be held this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock.

U. S. CRACKS DOWN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The government is cracking down on the building of \$100,000 swimming pools and fancy stone walls costing up to \$50,000. The Civilian Production Administration today ruled that, in these days of a housing shortage, such projects cannot be started without special permits.

SNOW BLANKETS AREA

SIBIRIAN, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Parts of North Dakota are blanketed today under from four to seven inches of snow. Two women lost their lives in a traffic accident blamed on the snowstorm, which disrupted commercial airline schedules.

53 Handicapped Persons Placed In Jobs By Local Employment Office

Mrs. Betty Mosely, head of the local United States Employment Service office, declared today that 53 handicapped persons, the majority of them veterans of World War II, have been placed into positions by the Sanford office.

Mrs. Mosely made this statement in connection with the National Employment of the Physically Handicapped Week, which is held annually by an Act of Congress and Presidential proclamation.

Mrs. Mosely said that "statistically, the greatest need is for the attention of industry and business firms to the great untapped reservoir of skills and abilities possessed by handicapped workers."

"We still have 53 handicapped persons in this area in need of jobs," Mrs. Mosely stated. She revealed that "the majority of them are veterans and are 1 to 30 percent disabled, some slightly more, but most of them from 10 to 20 percent."

"We have the facilities," she continued, "to conduct, select and refer disabled veterans and other handicapped workers to employers. We can assist both management and labor through referral of qualified workers for jobs and in some cases for accelerated apprenticeship programs."

The employment office head also remarked that "we ask that employers consider the physically handicapped workers in this area, and we urge you to make work possible for them, and to list vacancies in your organization with our office."

Restaurant Opened By Roy Johnson

Attorney Challenges Arrest Of Schacht

STUTTGART, Germany, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The German state attorney for Wurttemberg, Dr. Richard Schmidt today challenged the legality of the arrest of German financier Hjalmar Schacht.

Schmidt demanded that the acquitted defendant in the Nuremberg war crimes trial be released from a jail cell in Stuttgart, until he is convicted by a German denazification court. Schacht was arrested last night an hour after he arrived from Nuremberg.

His arrest was ordered on charges that he had been a leading Nazi.

SOVIETS CONDEMN PROPAGANDA

LONDON, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The Russian News Agency Tass is distributing today an official bulletin from Leningrad that condemns all anti-Soviet propaganda regarding Russia and the Arab countries of the Middle East. Tass was quoted in a Moscow report as stating the bulletin was issued by the Lebanese National Congress at Beirut.

R. A. F. CRAFT FOUND

SINGAPORE, Oct. 8.—(AP)—British officials at Singapore have announced the discovery of a Royal Air Force flying boat in the sea north of Prang. The plane was carrying 21 persons when it crashed.

Ohio Governor Orders Probe In Meat Situation

State Executive Also Asks Investigation By Federal Officials

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 8.—(AP)—An investigation of the meat shortage in Ohio has been requested by Governor Frank J. Lausche. The Governor announced that he is launching immediately an investigation of his own. In telegrams to government officials, however, he asked a separate, federal probe.

The messages were sent to Attorney General Tom Clark, FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover, and Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson. In the telegrams, the Governor stated that "it is essential that the available meat supply has been effectively kept from the market. Whether this is true or not I do not know. The people are entitled to know the facts." Then Governor Lausche added:

"I therefore urge that a speedy determination and investigation be made to ascertain the facts and a prompt disclosure be made to the public so that they will know the true situation."

Truman's Message Lauded By Labor Parley Delegates

CHICAGO, Oct. 8.—(AP)—A message from President Truman today received loud applause at the American Federation of Labor convention in Chicago.

Mr. Truman told the A. F. of L. delegates in his message that "America stands on the threshold of abundance for America's wage and salaried workers, as well as for farmers and business and professional people. To reach this goal, we must use all of our resources in materials, and men, and we shall need the full cooperation of industry, labor and government."

The President went on to say: "Today, no less than in wartime, our most compelling need is full, sustained production." And he added:

"Our demonstrated capacity holds out the promise of secure abundance for America's wage and salaried workers, as well as for farmers and business and professional people. To reach this goal, we must use all of our resources in materials, and men, and we shall need the full cooperation of industry, labor and government."

The President's message was read to the convention.

COMPENSATION PAID THREE

Unemployment compensation payments in Seminole County during the week ending Sept. 30 amounted to \$15,000 and were made to three persons, Carl B. Smith, chairman of the Florida Industrial Commission, reported today. Throughout the State payment dropped from \$104,451.50 for the previous week to \$77,821.50. The number of claimants compensated dropped from 5,673 to 4,751.

O.P.A. Changes Price Tag Rules To End Chiseling By Some Retailers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The office of price administration has changed some of its price tag rules to end what one official called chiseling by some retailers.

Many so-called brand name items are involved in the new ruling. These include items such as clothing, shoes, furniture, rug, and shower curtains.

These items are usually well advertised and sold on a uniform price basis with the retail price ceiling tag placed on the items by the manufacturer and producer.

Previously when this ceiling price advanced, the Office of Price Administration allowed the retailer to change the tags on his entire stock to the new, higher prices.

Now the OPA says that practice must stop on Oct. 14 so that sales are made on a basis of actual cost at the time of shipment—plus the legal profit margin at the time.

The result may be that some retailers will be offering identical brand named goods at different ceiling prices.

An OPA official explained that too many retailers are getting wind of impending price increases. Then, the official said, the ve-

Record Mark For Tax Collections In Seminole Revealed By Jinkins

New Record Set

A high record mark for tax collections in Seminole County of more than 99.9 percent of the entire tax levy of \$131,576 for the fiscal year ending on Oct. 31, was today reported by J. D. Jinkins, county tax collector, who said that a new mark for the county was set at this meeting on Thursday morning.

Mr. Jinkins said he was highly pleased with this record collection which tops the former high mark reached last year when 99.84 percent of taxes was collected. "This is a fine demonstration on the part of the property owners of Seminole County, showing their willingness and ability to pay their taxes as ever before," Mr. Jinkins said.

He recalled that a report made by the Seminole County Taxpayers' Relief Association of the 100 percent delinquent period last November when the total amount of property taxes in the amount of \$139,757 were paid into his office.

The taxpayers saved \$14,219 in discounts allowed by law for payments made in November, December, January and February.

Supreme Court Rules In Wischart's Favor

FALL RIVER, Oct. 8.—(AP)—A four to three decision of the Florida Supreme Court today upheld the right of Marjorie Wischart of Miami to continue holding his position as judge of the Eleventh Judicial Circuit.

The court declined to sustain a suit brought by N. Vernon Hawthorne to oust Judge Wischart from the position, on the grounds that he was ineligible for the 1943 appointment to the bench because he was a member of the legislature which raised circuit judges' salaries.

Two Are Killed In Another DC-4 Crash

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 8.—(AP)—A big United Airlines plane, flying from San Francisco to Chicago with 42 passengers, cracked up this morning near Cheyenne, Wyo.

Three passengers were killed and three of them hurt badly enough so that their conditions may be serious. One of those killed has been identified as William Wang of San Francisco.

The United Airlines plane—a DC-4 of the type which was figured in the two recent Newfoundland crashes—was coming in for a regularly scheduled landing at Cheyenne when the accident occurred. Just what happened is not yet known, but the plane came down on the Fort Francis E. Warren military reservation, and according to the local sheriff, it broke in two. The ship was piloted by Capt. L. H. Smith, of San Francisco, who with three other crew members apparently escaped serious injury. All of the passengers have been taken to a hospital.

Little Damage To Fruit, Vegetable Crops Reported

Wind Gusts In This Area Estimated At 73 Miles Per Hour

Very little damage to Seminole fruit and vegetable crops resulted from the hurricane tonight, which was of minor intensity as compared with previous storms of this nature. In fact, only small bushes of trees and palm trees were blown down, and only a few crops were damaged by the storm.

Pole Says Treaty Provision For Trieste Will Be Cause Of Endless Arguments

PARIS, Oct. 8.—(AP)—British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin today told delegates at the Paris Peace Conference that unity was the foundation of the Allied victory and that it must be the foundation of the peace.

Bevin made the latest appeal for unity after Foreign Minister Paul-Henri Spaak of Belgium criticized the peace treaty drafted for Italy as being too harsh and too costly. He said that it was a "line no longer drawn by a victor over a vanquished enemy, but a line drawn by a victor over a vanquished enemy."

Sen. Taft Repeats Prior Criticism Of War Tribunal

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Sen. Charles McNary today repeated his criticism of the Nuremberg war tribunal. He said that the tribunal was "a farce" and that it was "a disgrace to the American people."

Communists Reject Marshall Proposal

The Communists are suggesting that the proposal constitutes a government effort to gain time for regrouping Nationalist armies for a final assault on the Communists' north-China stronghold of Shanhsi.

Senator Pepper May Abandon O.P.A. Support

Says Price Controls Are Useless Without Support Of Public Opinion, Congress

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9, (AP)—Senator Claude Pepper today said he is seriously considering abandoning his support of price controls because the program does not seem to be working out. Pepper was one of the staunchest supporters in last summer's fight in the Senate for the agency's life. He issued this statement: "If price control is getting back like prohibition in its last days so that public opinion is not going to support effective price control and the Congress is not going to support it, we might just as well try to have it."

Pepper's statement advocating the junking of all price control was made as President Truman pressed his personal survey of the meat shortage.

New York's Democratic Senator James H. Eastland, emerging from a conference with White House, CPA and Agriculture Department officials—said he is hopeful that an emergency decision will be forthcoming very shortly which will help to relieve the meat shortage.

Political Wangle On Meat Shortage Continues Today

The controversy over the meat situation continued bitter today with more political charges and counter charges. Meanwhile, the shops continue to offer little or no meat. Most authorities agree that there is plenty of meat, but that it is getting on the ranges instead of showing up at the packing plants.

UNRRA Director General La Guardia denied that meat is going overseas in UNRRA cartons. He says the only meat going abroad from his organization is some canned horsemeat.

Incidentally, 38 Texas steers arrived in Flushing, New York, to temporarily solve the meat problem for 150 New Yorkers.

The president of the General Steel Products Corporation bought the steers and will have them butchered for distribution among his lucky employees.

Naval Officer Says Fliers Found City "Pleasant Place"

That certain Navy fliers who trained at Sanford Naval Air Station and then returned to Japan for world conquest found Sanford "an extremely pleasant place" to which they would like sometime to return is indicated by a letter recently received by Robert L. Cox, local photographer from Ensign R. L. Peterson of Brexey Point Naval Air Station at Norfolk, Va., who ordered some pictures of Flight 273 which Mr. Cox had made while Peterson was here training with the group.

He wrote: "It may be of some interest to you to know that all the boys in Flight 273, with the exception of myself, are now glorified civilians and seem to like it pretty well. I have found the Navy to my liking and intend to stay until they no longer need me. I might also add that our stay in Sanford was an extremely pleasant one and we once voted it to be the place we would like most to go back to."

Payne Resigns Credit Office Position Here

John P. Payne has resigned his position as secretary-treasurer of the Central Florida Production Credit Association at Sanford to accept a position as manager of Perfection Dairies Cooperative of Orlando.

Mr. Payne, who had been connected with the Association for the past three years, was formerly with the Bradenton Production Credit Association.

Succeeding Mr. Payne will be Leonard R. Toy of Orlando, who for several years has been a field representative in Florida for the Production Credit Corporation of Columbia. Mr. Toy has been engaged in agricultural credit work principally in Florida, for a number of years.

Before police reinforcement arrived, scores of demonstrators had pushed by the regular guards into the government building. They broke furniture and smashed windows.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9, (AP)—A new demand started today in the Capitol Hill that Democratic Representative Andrew May of Kentucky answer Senate War Investigating Committee questions about the wartime Garason Munitions Combine prior to the November election.

The demand came from a member of the Senate committee, Republican Senator Owen Brewster of Maine. Brewster told newsmen he felt that "in justice to May," the Kentucky should be called before the committee at the earliest opportunity.

Declares Measure Is Undemocratic Way To Keep Adriatic Under Britain, U. S.

PARIS, Oct. 9, (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov today condemned the Italian Peace treaty draft plan to create the free state of Trieste.

Molotov declared, in his first appearance before a plenary session of the Paris Peace Conference since his return from a recent visit to Moscow, that the plan was what he termed an "undemocratic" means of keeping the strategic Adriatic area under the control of the United States and Britain.

Molotov appealed, however, for conciliation between the Slav and non-Slav nations. He coupled this with a warning that the western nations must respect the rights and position of the slave states.

Molotov said: "An accord is possible among all to the extent nations do not attempt to impose their will on other nations."

The Soviet minister said, before a full meeting of the peace parley, that the statute adopted by the Italian commission on the Trieste issue, lodged absolute power in a foreign governor. Under such a system, the Russian delegate added, the population of Trieste would be left disenfranchised under foreign troops.

Foreign Minister Molotov demanded that the conference transfer power in Trieste to a government elected by the popular assembly, similar to the pre-war government in Danzig.
