**Traffic snarls behind water line break on Lake Mary Boulevard**

SANFORD - A major water line break Wednesday has been causing traffic problems on Lake Mary Boulevard. Lake Mary, Seminole County and Sanford are all involved in resolving the problem, as is a contractor who caused the break.

Authorities say the repairs are expected to be completed by 4:30 this afternoon.

The pipe was said to have been struck by private company construction equipment. According to Seminole County Assistant Road Superintendent Tom George, the company was doing landscaping in the median, under a county contract.

"It was a directional bore, under the roadway," he said. "The machine struck a 10-inch water main and the water caused the underside of the pavement to wash out."

The breakage was along the edge of the roadway, between U.S. Highway 17-92 and Country Club Road, in the vicinity of

**Shooting only the bad guys**

Sanford cops sharpen mental process for dangerous duty

SANFORD - The Sanford Police Department has gotten FATS. The Firearm Training System that is. This new training program hones the skills of officers in "shoot don't shoot" situations. "It helps in the mental process," said Sgt. Darrel Presley of the Sanford Police Department.

Through new technology, law enforcement agencies can now test their officers' reaction time to a given situation. The system uses a screen, a projector and laser disc tied in with a computer console. The officer fires a gun equipped with a laser.

On Wednesday, Presley manned the console as Commander Mitch Tindel stepped up to test his skills. After a scenario is played out, Presley informed Tindel what the commander did wrong or did right by replaying the scenario pointing out where the shots were fired and the rate of speed it took Tindel to react. "The system lets the officer reflect on what they are actually doing in a given situation," said Presley.

There are about 20 to 25 scenarios for a projector to choose from. For example, Tindel had a situation where he and his video partner approached a drunk laying on a plaza bench. As they try to wake him, the drunk brandishes a knife. Tindel is now faced with a "shoot don't shoot" dilemma. As the episode plays out, the drunk lunges at Tindel's video partner. This "shoot" decision tested the officer's thought process on when to fire his weapon. "It definitely makes

**Homeowners get relief from bankrupt builder**

LAKE MARY - U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Arthur B. Briskman may approve two proposed lending programs that could complete homes that were under construction when

an Altamonte Springs home builder closed its doors because of financial problems.

Olympia Homes Inc. was building 37 homes in several Central Florida communities, including Woodbridge Lakes in Lake Mary. The construction

company filed bankruptcy in January seeking reorganization of its finances.

Briskman approved an agreement Wednesday with SunTrust for \$792,000 to finance the completion of 16 homes. Another 21 and a spec

model could be completed if the judge can reach a deal with Regions Bank and People First Community Bank. The two banks will provide funds totaling \$795,000.

**Sanford shines the light on excessive glare in neighborhoods**

SANFORD - Let the light shine where it may, but let the people object. If they wish, when the light causes a glare. That's the essence of a new Sanford ordinance approved on first reading earlier this month.

According to City Manager Bill Simmons, the change in the city's ordinance regarding excessive light which may cause excessive or objectionable glare in a residence may not be constitutionally correct as presently worded.

The two main points of the new ordinance were stressed in the wording pertaining to lighting standards in residential areas. The first section says:

(a) All lighting is required to be installed in such a manner and be so shielded that the cone of light shall fall within the perimeter of the property upon which such lighting is located. Lighting shall be directed away from adjacent properties. No direct glare shall be directly visible from a public right-of-way or residential use adjacent to the property in question. All lighting

shall conform to applicable codes including, but not limited to building and electrical codes in effect within the City of Sanford.

The main change in the first part was the elimination of references to "unusual, unnecessary or excessive" light. People who have problems with glare however, will still be able to voice their objections to what they may perceive as excessive lighting.

The second section reads:

(b) Any resident of the City of Sanford shall have the right to object to lighting that causes direct glare or otherwise causes light to fall

upon said resident's residence in a manner that causes direct glare.

It continues by stating that the city will have the power and authority to utilize any and all lawful means to eliminate direct glare including code enforcement proceedings, civil citation and injunctive relief in circuit court.

The only exemption from these standards is city street lights.

The proposed ordinance is expected to be brought up for second and final reading and adoption at the next commission meeting, scheduled for Monday, Feb. 23.

**Constitutionality of county's adult law goes to court**

SANFORD - Judge Alan A. Dickey was scrambling today to schedule sufficient time to hear the remainder of a controversial case that will help determine the constitutionality of Seminole County's new Adult Entertainment Ordinance.

Attorneys for the county and a nude dancing club known as Sassy Merlot's vied for the judge's attention in court for five hours Wednesday.

The county contends that Sassy Merlot's is an adult entertainment business operating without a license as required by the county code and that the club is operating at a location not within the M-2 zoning classification.

Sassy Merlot's opened last year during a period when the county was in the process of amending its adult entertainment code. Dickey ruled on two occasions that the county's old code was flawed - urging the county to strengthen it.

What caused a stir was that Judge Leonard V. Wood made a contrasting call when he heard the county's case against a new club known as VIP Gold. Wood told VIP Gold it could no longer have nude dancing. His decision is being challenged in the Fifth District Court of Appeals.

At one point in Wednesday's hearing, Dickey mused that he "read in the paper what a terrible person I am." He referred to the pending decision from the Court of Appeals. If Wood ruled correctly, Dickey said it

would indicate he was wrong. If Wood was overruled, Dickey said it would indicate he made the right call.

Wednesday's hearing was the important first challenge to the county's new adult code. Andy Brumby, from Shotts & Bowen who represent the county, said he was "pleased" with the way things went.

"They're (Sassy Merlot's) looking for loop holes in the county's new code," Brumby said. "We're confident of its constitutionality."

Brumby called three witnesses - Lt. Sammy Gibson from the CCIB Unit of the Sheriff's Office, Deputy Clerk of the Court Sandy Wall, and Seminole County Acting Director of Planning & Development Francis Chandler.

Gibson said there had been

no arrests at Sassy Merlot's other than picking up two people on active warrants.

He was asked to diagram the interior of the club by Brumby and later to diagram the interior of two other legally operated clubs (Circus Circus and House of Babes) by Hugh Trees, attorney for Sassy Merlot's.

Chandler, whose department processes licenses for adult businesses and whose staff helped identify sites for adult businesses, was cross-examined for three hours by Trees. This cross-examining will continue when the case is resumed.

Trees attempted to determine if the county failed at any time to identify sites for businesses

such as Sassy Merlot's. There were numerous changes made by the Board of County Commissioners. "We haven't even started a lot of the legal arguments," Trees said.

At 5 p.m., when Wednesday's hearing was closing, Trees asked Chandler if she had driven across State Road 46 overpass over CSX Railroad tracks.

He asked, also, if she had noticed the area near the tracks that the county has designated as possible sites for adult entertainment. She said she hadn't.

Trees, aware the county code restricted such sites to be visible from main arteries requested she look again.

"Judge Dickey might look on his way home, too," Trees said.

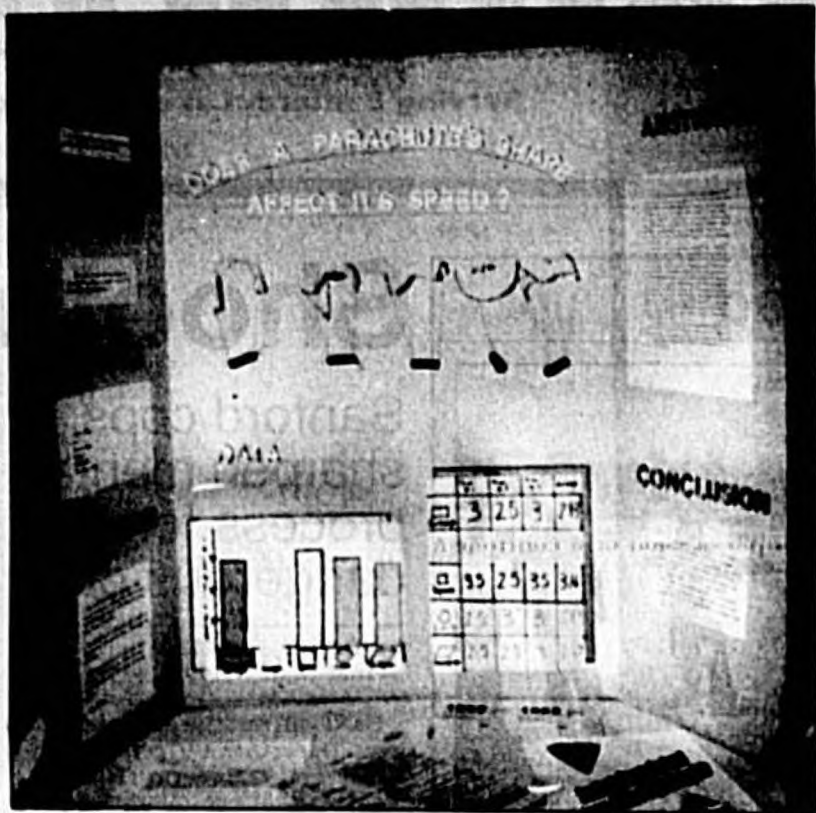
The Seminole County Regional Science, Math, and Engineering Fair presented the following awards on Saturday, Feb. 7, at the Seminole Towne Center mall.

Student winners were among over 200 sixth through twelfth graders who earned the right to participate by excelling in project work at their schools. The awards include 1st, 2nd and 3rd place and honorable mention ribbons in 16 categories and two sections.

The Junior section is middle school and the Senior section is high school. All middle school and high school students in public, private or home school in Seminole County are eligible to participate. In addition to place awards, area organizations and individuals have donated nearly 100 Special Awards to recognize projects in their areas of interest.

Projects were judged by science, math and engineering professionals from the area who volunteer their time. you think," said Tindel. Afterwards, the officer's reaction time is compared to the average reaction time for the particular scenario. The officer also knows how many hits were "lethal" to the suspect, how many were "non-lethal", and how many shots missed their target.

The Sanford Police Department is leasing FATS through Friday. They have had it since Saturday, Feb. 14. The money to bring FATS in came from the department's training budget. It would cost over \$100,000 to bring the system to the station

permanently.

FATS is a supplement to tactical training and live fire. The system has been used in other agencies and the police academy, according to Presley. "We would like to have it again if we have the budget for it," said Presley.

Guest "police officers" have been invited throughout the week to test the simulation. Sanford Mayor Larry Dale had a chance to try out FATS participating in "about a half dozen" scenarios. "I thought it was very life-like," said Dale. "It is a good training technique; I enjoyed it."

## EDITORIAL

### People complain, so what's new?

People complain that constant traffic jams on Interstate-4 and U.S. Highway 17-92 are causing severe hardship. They are late getting to and from work, to the airport, or anywhere else they wish to go.

In order to resolve the problem, officials decide to widen the road. That however, takes years of work, and during it, traffic jams are even worse. People complain that they have more road congestion than ever before.

So officials say another way to solve the problem is rail transportation. When they suggest the route be near Interstate-4, people complain. If they suggest moving the route to along the CSX rail tracks, people complain. If an alternate rail route is brought up, other people complain.

Yet they still complain that we have too much traffic, and to make things even worse, they complain that no one is doing anything to solve the problem.

If a route is suggested for rail, roadway, interchanges, or any other concept where land is required, people raise the prices so high it skyrockets the cost of right-of-way acquisition. If an entity attempts to offer a lower price than that asked for, people complain.

Here's another situation. If plans go forward to turn part of Fort Mellon Park into a hotel/conference center area, the city will have a new influx of tax money from what is presently land completely off the tax list. People have complained for years that the land is valuable and not being properly used by the city which owns it.

Yet suggest development, and other people will complain that they do not want the park developed.

If the downtown Sanford historic area buildings are not kept up to codes and restrictions, people complain. But the owners of these buildings will certainly complain if they are

found to be the ones in violation.

No doubt experts would tell us that complaining is only part of human nature. Some people aren't happy unless they have something about which to complain.

But when it comes to our transportation problems, the development of Fort Mellon park property or other government decisions, we suggest pausing, not just for a minute or two, but for some length of time, and put yourself in other people's shoes.

Complaining, perhaps, is healthy and often makes people change opinions. But complaining must be logical, backed with reasons and solutions, with both sides given equal consideration.



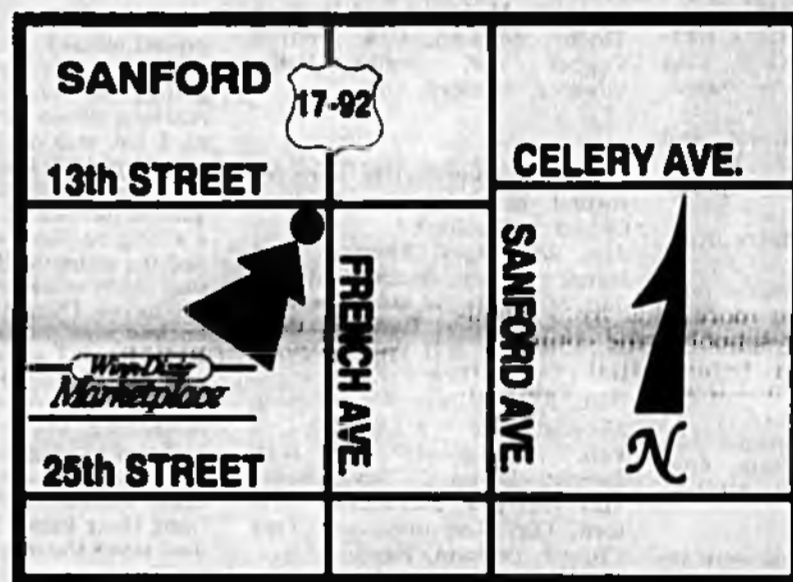

Lake Mary's girls' basketball team will face Fort Lauderdale Dillard in the last game of the evening and hopes to be playing again on Saturday in the finals.

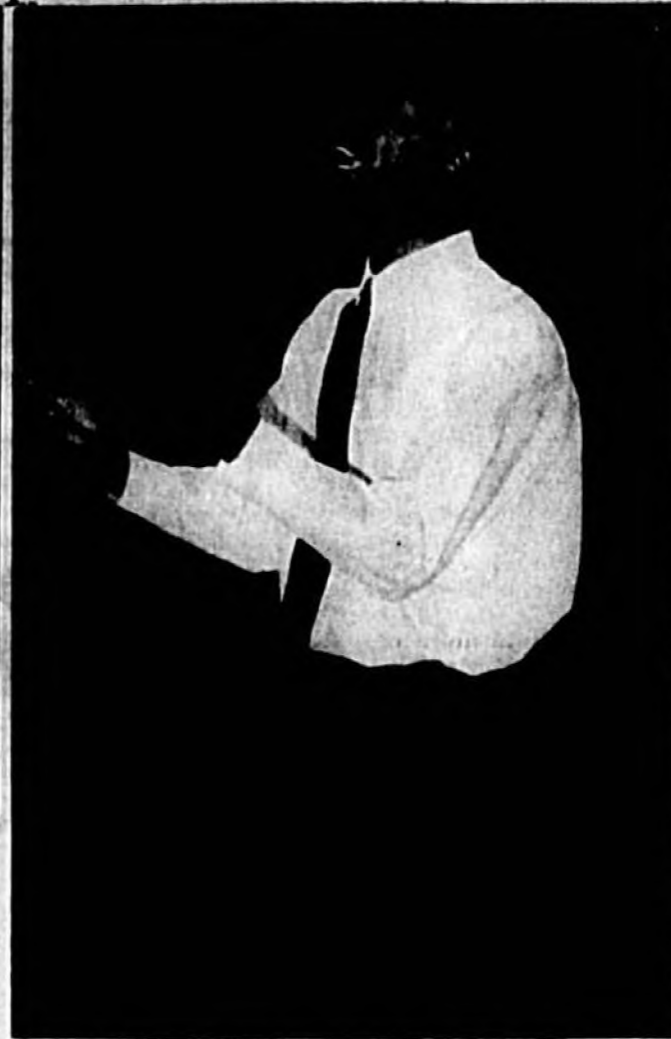

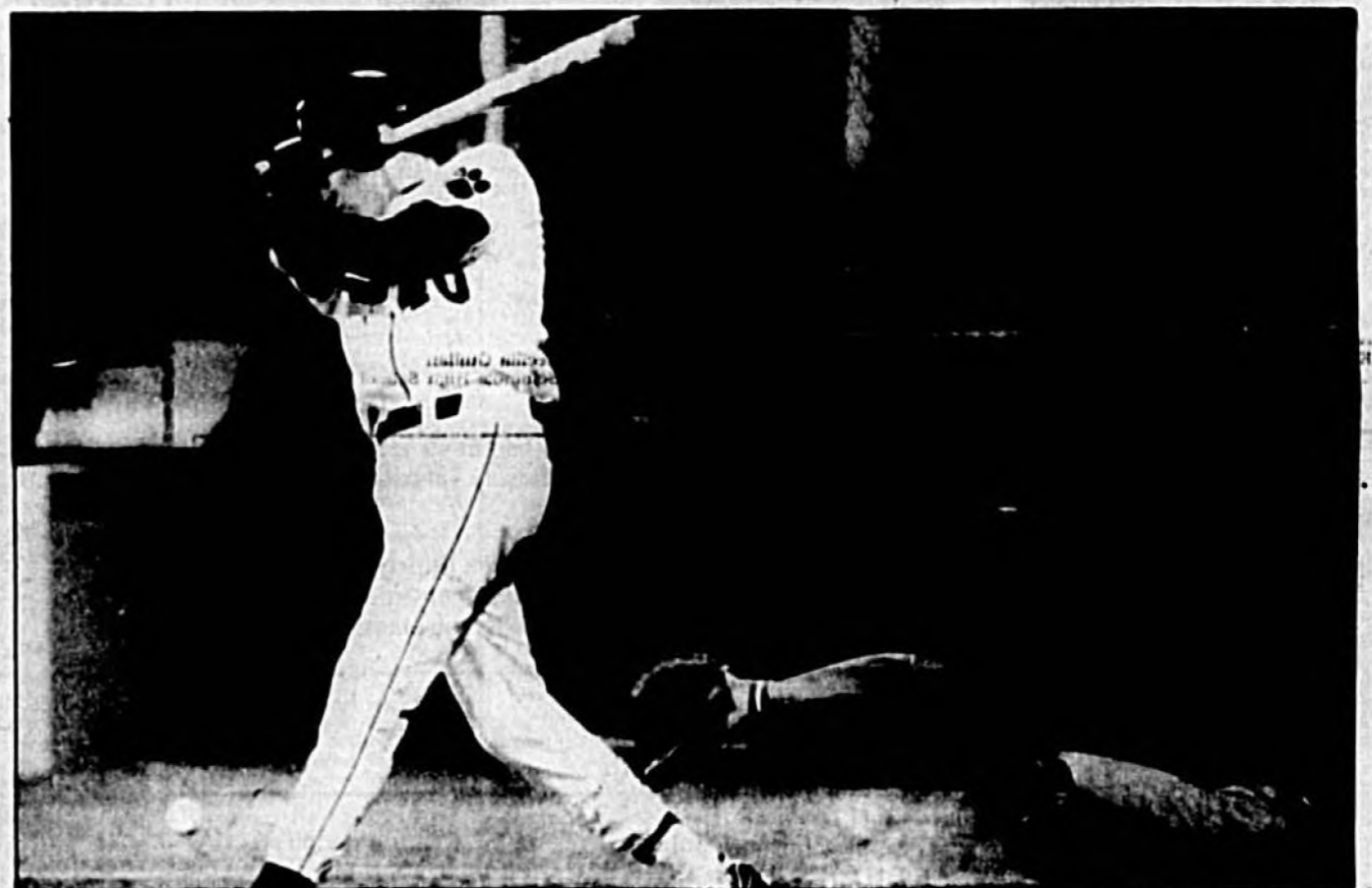

**Painkillers should be used wisely**

**DR. GOTT**

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a 33-year-old mother with chronic back pain from spinal stenosis. For three years, I have been able to function because I take two Percodan tablets a day. A few weeks ago, my health insurance company sent a letter to my neurosurgeon and family practitioner inquiring about the medicine. Now the doctors are leery about prescribing it. They believe that they may be investigated and get into legal difficulties, even though I am scheduled for back surgery sometime later this year. I don't believe that I can endure the pain without Percodan. I am not repeat NOT — addicted. Can I take a test to confirm this?

DEAR READER: Several medical studies have proved that patients in chronic pain seldom become addicted to narcotics such as Percodan when the medicine is used in reasonable quantities, as yours is. In fact, many experts bemoan the fact that, as a general rule, most patients in pain are substantially undertreated.

Although there is no test to confirm that you are not addicted, most prudent physicians use good judgment in prescribing narcotics. All your doctors have to do is indicate to the insurance company that you (1) need the drug, and (2) are not overusing it. Once you have had your surgery, the pain medication should no longer be needed. If your doctors agree that there is ample medical reason for the prescription, they should not have to worry about any legal ramifications.

The reason that anti-narcotic laws are so harsh is to prevent addicts who are not in pain from obtaining drugs through legal channels. This does not seem to be the case in your situation.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Some time ago, you published an article about people who couldn't wear watches because they stopped running. Please send me a copy. I have this problem and so does my father.

DEAR READER: You don't need a copy; my opinion hasn't changed. There is no such thing. Purely and simply, such a phenomenon is whimsy at its best.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My daughter gets a rash and her legs swell every time she showers. Can this affect her liver?

DEAR READER: I doubt it. Swelling and rash from hot water are

doctor says they're harmless and to leave them alone, but they are so unsightly!

DEAR READER: I suspect that you have age-related seborrheic keratoses, which are benign patches of skin overgrowth that resemble large, dark gray, stuck-on scabs. As your doctor stated, they are harmless, but may constitute a cosmetic problem.

Fortunately, they are easily removed. A dermatologist or surgeon can do this for you. Unfortunately, they often grow back, or others may form. Under these circumstances, surgical removal can easily turn into a lifelong project.

Most of my patients with keratoses take a middle ground: Those lesions on the face and neck (and keratoses that rapidly expand) are removed; ones on the trunk are simply ignored.

**The tasteless snobs**

Once, I attended a tutored wine tasting where the fellow running the show would look at the label on the bottle to decide whether the wine was good or bad. Everything else was irrelevant. This is absurd. If you like the taste of a particular wine, it doesn't matter what anyone else thinks. It is a personal thing, and anyone who says otherwise should be ignored. There is a similarity in bridge. If you and your partner are happy with a particular bidding convention, stick to it. Having a poor agreement is better than nothing. This deal features the Landy convention, in which a two-club overcall of an opposing one-no-trump opening

shows length in both majors. It enjoys widespread popularity, but I feel it's inefficient. After North had used Landy, South went berserk! It is rare one can make a game against a strong no-trump, let alone a grand slam. Still, South bought a great dummy and a 2-1 trump split. Declarer won the first trick with the club ace and drew trumps. This left three trumps in dummy for South's three club losers, but he had to establish dummy's heart suit to provide a parking spot for his diamond loser. Declarer led a heart to his ace (the honor from the short side first), played a heart to dummy's king, and ruffed a heart in hand. Back to dummy with a club ruff. South ruffed another heart. After a second club ruff, declarer threw a diamond on the established heart eight and claimed. Crazy bidding, but sane play.
