The Riot Act was acrapped seven years ago.

In all, 216 youths were arrested. Manchester police reported 150 in custody there, while Scotland Yard reported 66 arrests in six separate racially mixed areas of London - Woolwich, Fulham, Stoke Newington, Deptford, Balham and Notting Hill. As the rioting flared for a seventh straight day, Mrs. Thatcher was shouted down in the House of Commons when she said the weekend violence in Liverpool "had nothing to do with the city's problems of pay, housing and unemployment but ... was a spree of naked greed."

"You stupid woman," shouted Eric Heffer, a Labor Party member of Parliament from Liverpool, in the first of several

"I hope no one in this House ... either condones or excuses violence on the scale we have seen recently," Mrs. Thatcher said. "It is just totally inexcusable and totally unjustifiable. "We must try to find out more about the causes of this violence and try to bring home to each and every citizen of this

Battles Raging In Belfast; One Teenager Killed

LONDON (UPI) — Urban riots by black, white and Asian BELFAST, Northern Ireland (UPI) — British troops killed a teenage boy in a night of street battles with gunmen and youths harling gasoline bombs, and braced for more violence at today's funeral of IRA hunger striker Joseph McDonnell, who will be buried beside Bobby Sands.

With Britain and IRA hunger strikers both reported uncompromising in their demands, the Northern Ireland office said Pat McGeown refused breakfast today and replaced McDonnell as the eighth hunger striker.

McGeown, 25, serving a 15-year term for IRA membership, possessing explosives and bombing Belfast's Europa hotel in 1975, joined a hunser strike that has already taken five lives. A third person was shot to death Thursday night in a continuation of the violence that following McDonnell's death Wednesday in his sist day without food in Maze prison. The battles lasted till dawn today.

The worst violence came in the Ardoyne area of Belfast where the army shot and killed David Barret, 15, during an exchange with gunmen in which two policemen were injured by sniper fire, police said.

Troops came under attack with high velocity weapons and returned the fire, police said. Barret was found dead shortly afterward. A republican spokesman said Barret was standing in front of his door and was ahot in the neck by soldiers firing "indiscriminately."

A report in the London Times that Irish Prime Minister Garret FitzGerald would discuss the situation with Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher today was denied by a spokesman for the British leader. But Irish Foreign Minister James Dodge was meeting British Deputy Foreign Secretary Sir Ian

Communists Gather To Air Sins Of Former Officials

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) - Poland's Communist Party Central Committee meeting was called into session today for what is expected to be a bloodletting semion against past leaders, including deposed leader

The Central Committee meeting, the last party gathering before the special Communist Party Congress beginning Tuesday, came in the midst of renewed labor strife, including two strikes Thursday. In what could lead to further tension, Poland's

Supreme Court ordered the re-arrest of three anti-Communist dissidents, charging they violated a court order not to engage in political activity.

The three dissidents along with another activist not arrested, are on trial for anti-state charges and were released from months of pretrial detention in early June only after a widespread hunger strike, student demonstration and Solidarity campaign.

Author Meyer Levin Dies

JERUSALEM (UPI) - Author Meyer Levin, the Jewish-American author who wrote the widely known "Compulsion," died of a stroke at Hadassah Hospital in Jerusalem Thursday night, his family announced.

Levin, born of Russian Jewish immigrants in 1905, grew up in a poor Jewish neighborhood on Chicago's West Side and went on from an early career in journalism to write 23 books, the most famous of which was "Compulsion" in 1958,

Major Fire Reported In San Francisco

A 60-year-old convenience store clerk was found shot to death behind the counter of a Fern Park store late Thursday

John Odom Edwards Jr. of 2507 Chippawa Trail, Maitland, was found lying in a pool of blood about 11:30 p.m. by a customer who had come into the Shop & Go at U.S. Highway 17-92 and Spartan Drive in south Seminole County to buy a carton

Edwards had been shot once in the chest with an unknown type of weapon. An undetermined amount of cash was taken from the cash register, and there was no sign of a struggle, according to a sheriff's department spokesman.

GRAND THEFT CHARGE DROPPED

One of four men allegedly involved in last winter's theft of more than \$100,000 worth of electronics gear from an Orlando business has escaped prosecution . . . for now.

A grand theft charge against 37-year-old Apopka resident Reginal Marvin Sevy was dropped in Seminole Circuit Court Thursday without explanation. A six-member jury had been picked to hear testimony in the case when Assistant State Attorney Randy Kramer announced that the prosecution had decided not to proceed. He would not say why.

But that doesn't mean Sevy will go free. Kramer has until late next month to reflle the charges, and court sources indicated that is what will most likely happen.

Sevy and three other men were arrested Feb. 26 by Seminole County sheriff's deputies and Orlando police officers as they unloaded an estimated \$25,000 worth of televisions, stereos, home movie equipment, and various kitchen appliances into mini-warehouses on State Road 434 near Altamonte Springs. The merchandise was part of a \$128,358 heist made from Bill

Baer TV, 1033 N. Mills Ave., Orlando, a week before. Charges against Savy's co-defendants - Dennis Proux, 20, of South Ridge, Mass.; Dale W. DeNobile, 35, of Orlando; and Jimmy Chapman, 39, of Forest City - are still pending.

Court Ruling Brings Some Re-Sentencing

It was one of those small moments that have a big effect on the way

In a little-reported recent Florida Supreme Court opinion, the High Court effectively tied the hands of the state's judges in handing out what are known as split sentences a period of time in jail, and period out on probation. In addition, the justices said any person who had been given a split sentence could request re-sentencing.

'It could have opened the floodgates to thousands of resentencings," according to Chief Seminole Circuit Judge Kenneth Leffler, "But we've only had a couple here. If we had to redo them all, we would have had to have a bunch more help."

The decision sprang from a Dade

named Lula M. Villery pleaded guilty to knowingly issuing worthless checks and was given a fiveyear probationary sentence, half of which was to be spent behind bars.

Because her jail time was a condition of probation as opposed to a traditional sentence, Villery was not eligible for parole as other prisoners would have been. That, she said, is patently unfair. The Supreme Court agreed.

In writing the majority opinion, Chief Justice C.J. Sundberg distinguished between a sentence and probation. "A sentence and probation are distinct concepts which serve wholly different functions," he said. Imposed as a sentence, imprisonment serves as a

dant's 'debt to society.' Imposed as an incident of probation, imprisonment serves as a rehabilitative device to give the defendant 'a taste of prison' in order to graphically demonstrate what is likely to happen to him should he violate the terms of the probation."

However, "while a probationer's taute of prison is intended to be unpalatable, it must not be served as the main course," Sundberg said. 'Far from serving the ostensible goal of rehabilitation, an extended probation jail term will instead prove more punitive to the defendant than will a sentence of imprisonment where the express objective is to punish the defendant," For example, a defendant who is sentenced to prison for a term

Something Must Be Done

Nobody, it appears, likes the proposed MX missile system.

The disarmament lobby has mobilized against it. Environmentalists threaten to bury it under a blizzard of lawsuits. The governors of Nevada and Utah, where the missiles were supposed to be deployed, want the system located somewhere else. And the traditionally conservative and prodefense Mormon church has added its voice to the chorus of objectors

A defense-minded Congress, while continuing to fund MX development, has wondered aloud whether something cheaper couldn't be devised. Senators Paul Laxalt and Jake Garn, both hawks and both allies of President Reagan, have soured on the idea of spending \$40 billion or more to scatter 200 MX missiles along a system of specially built roadways linking 4,600 reinforced concrete launching shelters.

As for President Reagan, he is on record in favor of building the MX missiles while searching for a deployment scheme less costly than that proposed last year by the Carter administration.

What all this amounts to is a distinct likelihood that the MX system envisioned by the departed Carterites will never be built.

But that would still leave the nation facing the acute, and growing peril the MX was designed to

Every secretary of defense since 1970 has agreed on the growing vulnerability of this country's land-based nuclear deterrent - 1,052 intercontinental ballistic missiles housed in fixed underground silos — to a Soviet surprise attack. Despite two SALT treaties supposedly limiting offensive strategic arms, the Russians have now amassed enough missiles mounting warheads of sufficient size and accuracy to destroy virtually the entire U.S. land-based missile force.

Such a disarming first strike might require as little as one-fifth of the Soviet Union's nuclear arsenal, leaving more than enough in reserve to deter a retaliatory attack by surviving U.S. bombs and missile-firing submarines.

Precluding even a theoretical possibility of this

nightmare is what the MX is all about.

Still, no one would want to spend \$40 billion for a missile system that couldn't be completed in any case until 1990 if something cheaper would do, and particularly if that alternative could be in place well before the end of this decade.

Secretary of Defense Casper Weinberger is now expected to offer his own recommendations on the MX, its basing mode, and possible alternatives later this month.

Whatever missile system he recommends to President Reagan must obviously be sufficiently mobile or concealable to frustrate any realistic prospect of a Soviet first strike. Its price tag must be affordable, and preferably less than that projected for the currently envisioned MX system.

And it must be sufficiently saleable politically to avoid the kind of interminable debate that has already made the MX program a 1990s solution to 1980s problem.

et it also be said that the threat of a Soviet first rike won't wait for the kinds of exotic technology space-based anti-ballistic missile systems, for ample - that might someday protect the ited States without evoking opposition even m the disarmament lobby.

the growing vulnerability of this country's clear deterrent and what should be done to rect it has been discussed for most of the last cade. It's long past time to decide once and for III on the best available remedy, and then get to work on making it a reality while there is still time to do so.

Cut And **Paste** Up Job

WASHINGTON - The White House-backed proposal for revisions in the federal budget that was recently submitted to the House of Representatives established a spending ceiling for Department of Energy field offices totaling:

- a) \$64,730,000 b) \$56,688,000
- c) \$58,738,000
- d) All of the above

The correct answer is "d" because House Republicans, in their haste to gain approval of a budget package tailored to President Reagan's specifications, apparently couldn't agree on a single amount so they offered several options.

In fact, the highly publicized bill that provided the vehicle for the president's most spectacular success in Congress to date was so ineptly drafted that it probably wouldn't pass muster in most city council chambers.

The product of a sloppy scissors-and-pastenot operation, the book-length bill was riddled with internal contradictions, redundant language and barely legible handwritten notations.

The proposed legislation wasn't even formally submitted to clerical officials in the House until 3 m.m. of the day it was to be voted upon. Because hundreds of pages then had to be printed and collated, the bill was distributed to members of the House less than an hour before debate began.

As a result, it's unlikely that any of the legislators knew exactly what they were voting on when they passed the omnibus bill that mandates more than \$36 billion worth of reductions and substantially revises the federal funding patterns for approximately 250 government programs.
Buried in the voluminous bill, for example,

was a brief reference that said only: "Section 2(e) of the Randolph-Sheppard Act is repealed."

That would have gutted the decades-old law that gives preference to blind people as operators of lobby newsstands and vendingmachine concessions in federal buildings and post offices throughout the country.

Other provisions of the bill, some of which were deleted or withdrawn, would have: - Summarily abolished the Consumer

Product Safety Commission as an independent federal agency and transformed it into a bureau within the Commerce Depart-

- Given the manufacturers of power lawn mowers an unchallengeable victory in their years-long dispute with the CPSC over safety features incorporated in their products.

Exempted entirely from CPSC jurisdiction all of the rides at the country's major amusement parks - even though accidents on some of those faulty rides have led to deaths and injuries.

Wiped out the entire budget of the National Science Foundation, as well as the research budgets of the Energy Department, Environmental Protection Agency and Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Some of the astounding proposals apparently were intentional while other presumably were accidental. In the latter category, for example, was a reference to an Energy Department project that moved California's Imperial Valley into the state of

In the former classification, however, was a section of the bill that gave the director of the Office of Management and Budget the unprecedented authority "to define poverty and to revise the definition of poverty each year." Finally, the bill was larded with in-

comprehensible technical references that unfortunately are typical of contemporary federal legislation.

Reagan's 'Day In Court

In a government of separated powers, separation from any part of the power for a prolonged period raises special problems.

Consider the Republicans, who are still suffering from a touch of the congressional bends after having been shut out of a meaningful role in the decision-making process on Capitol Hill for the greater part of the last half century. Never mind that they held the White House off and on for respectable stretches in that period. That contributed nothing to the party's legislative expertise and reserves of talent

It is the public popularity and personal politicking of the president himself, abetted by Democratic disarray, that is largely and impressive budget victories in Congress, not the uncertain skills of a Republican leadership long unused to leading.

Or consider the Democrats, who have good reason for concern that they may be well into a similar lengthy dry period in determining the membership and thus shaping the ideological inclination of the Supreme Court.

Unusually early in his administration, Ronald Reagan has been presented with the opportunity of naming a justice to the court, one of nine on what may conceivably be the most influential collegial organ of government in the world. Congress legislates, but it frequently falls to the Supreme Court to define precisely the impact of that legislation upon the nation.

All of Reagan's recent Republican predecessors have also been able to exercise their appointive powers in respect to the

It has been a significantly different story for Democrats occupying the White House, however. Jimmy Carter was shut out completely. The last justice named by a Democratic president joined the court 14 years ago. Only two of those now sitting are Democratic appointees.

And the situation, from the Democratic point of view, is likely to get worse before there is hope of partisan improvement.

Presidents rightly prize their power to name the members of the Supreme Court, It holds out the promise of institutionalizing their philosophies through the selection of

likeminded appointees and, theoretically, of extending their influence over national policies and programs long beyond their own presidencies

Franklin D. Roosevelt's struggle with and conquest of the court is always the object lesson. His initial effort to pack a con-servative court — expand membership to give him sufficient new appointments to shift the ideological balance - failed. But the court eventually shifted anyway, joining the political mainstream of the later Roosevelt

And in the natural course of events he got his appointments anyway - nine of them. Roosevelt appointees dominated the court until almost the end of the Eisenhower Douglas - did not leave the bench until 1975.

It is an axiom of the system of separation of powers as practiced in the United States, however, that no president can be certain how his appointees will vote once on the court and what the long-term impact upon the nation will be.

The object lesson here is Dwight Eisenhower, whose appointee as chief justice, Earl Warren, proceeded to the president's frequent distress to preside over the most liberally activist Supreme Court in history,

Richard Nixon, on the evidence to date, has fared considerably better. His four appointees, carefully selected for their "conatractionist" conservatism, have not been responsible for many surprises. And two -Chief Justice Warren Burger and Associate Justice William Rehnquist - have been the court's staunchest conservatives.

For all their interest to students of American government, the lessons of history have never stopped a president from trying to shape a Supreme Court precisely to his political and ideological specifications. And Ronald Reagan can expect op-

portunities to try harder than most.

The chief Justice and Justices Lawis Powell, Harry Blackmun, William Brennan and Thurgood Marshall - the last two comprising the present court's liberal wing are all older than the retiring Potter Stewart and good prospects to follow his lead by 1984. The Democrats' day in this court looks to be

a long time coming.

Demand Increasing

DETROIT (UPI) - The recreation vehicle industry, devastated over the past two years by high interest rates and gasoline prices, is beginning to see solld evidence of a sales recovery.

Firmly believing that the RV lifestyle is alive and well and just gone temporarily into hiding, industry executives have watched anxiously for an upturn for the past two

In April - the latest month for which statistics are available - shipments of recreational vehicles from manufacturers to dealers amounted to approximately 25,000 units, a 75 percent improvement over last year and the industry's highest monthly total since May of 1979. Sales of recreational vehicles - ranging

from small towable trailers to large selfcontained motor homes - declined more sharply during the past recession than sales of passenger cars. The industry contracted from \$25,000 units

delivered in 1978 to a meager 181,000 last year - a dropotf of 66 percent. Membership in the Recreation Vehicle Industry Association declined from around 500 to just under 300 manufacturers.

By contrast, domestic car sales declined 29 percent in the same period from 9.3 million in 1978 to 6.6 million in 1980.

Now, according to David J. Humphreys. president and general counsel of the association, it appears the rebound will be much stronger than the small gains automakers recently have seen in the passenger car market.

"We had been saying for more than a year that there was great pent up demand for our product and that eventually that demand would translate into sales," he said.

"We saw strong indications of the turnaround at retail RV shows last fall and this winter when many of those shows broke their all-time attendance records."

Shipments of RVs in the first four months of 1981 are about 29 percent higher than last year. There have been predictions overall 1961 shipments will exceed last year by 30 percent.

Humphreys said consumers who have put off buying an RV until interest rates or gasoline prices decline "just can't wait any longer." In addition, they've learned to adjust their strained budgets for purchases they consider important, he said.

"And most of the 6 million RV families in this country consider RVing a very important part of their lifestyle," he said.

The industry also is optimistic that energy worries won't be as severe a drag on sales as in the past.

"Supplies are good, prices have stabilized and the attitide of our federal government about energy use for recreational purposes

has improved dramatically," Humphreys "Because of that and the fact that our industry is continuing to make solid improvements in the fuel efficiency of our vehicles, we feel very optimistic that energy

will not be a deterrent to RV sales in the

future." Humphreys said much faith is being placed in the Reagan administration's economic policies. Sales of recreational vehicles should improve further if the federal budget and tax cuts work to reduce inflation and interest rates, he said.

But budget-cutting is a twoedged sword for RV users, threatening the maintenance and availability of government-owned campaites and other recreational facilities.

High Interest Rates Took Away Business

WASHINGTON — Sky-high interest rates have made it difficult if not impossible for many American families to buy their own homes. For Don Bessler of New Carliale, Ind., though, the interest rates have made it impossible to earn a living.

Bessier had been a Chevrolet dealer for nine years but last August, he threw in the towel, becoming one of 1,650 auto dealers across the country to give up in 1960. It was windy fluctuating interest rates that knocked him out.

Like most small businessmen, Bessler's operation depended on short-term loans that provided the necessary capital for his inventury. In the case of auto dealers, the inventory is known as a "floor plan" — the number of vehicles they must have on display to give buyers the wide range of choices they have become accustomed to over the years.
Obviously, no car dealers can afford to purchase their stock of cars outright from the manufacturer. They have to borrow, generally at interest rates one or two percentage points above the prime rate that bankers offer their lowest-risk borrowers.

At the same time, most customers who wanted to buy Besaler's Chevies were no more able to pay cash for their cars than he was. They had to borrow from banks or other lending institutions - at even higher rates than Bessler was paying. High interest rates, added to the inflation-

caused higher prices of new cars — scared off many potential buyers. This left Bessler with a larger inventory of unsold cars, on which he was paying very-higher interest rates.

The figures are mind-blowing: Nine years ago, Bessler told my associate Tony Capaccio, he was paying from \$500 to \$700 a month in interest on the 40 to 50 vehicles in his

inventory. By last August, his interest charges had reached \$5,000 a month, at the very time his sales were being held down by customers' inability or unwillingness to finance their cars. For Bessler, "the bottom really fell out of

the bucket" in January of 1980. In the next few months, he laid off six of his 12 employees, including his stepfather. He still couldn't make ends meet, and finally had to call it

Another problem facing dealers was uncovered by investigators for Rep. Berkley Bedell, D-lowa. They found evidence that, in the Midwest region, representatives from at least one major automaker - Ford - were discouraging its dealers from participating in government-backed loans from the Small Business Administration. One possible motive behind this squeeze play was that SBA loans offered competition to financing that Ford itself provided for the dealers.

Upon learning that a dealer had applied for an SBA loan, congressional investigators found, Ford would raise the collateral requirements on its own loans to dealers. This meant they would not have enough collateral left to meet the SBA's requirements, and the government loan would fall through.

After Bedell complained to Ford, the company laund a memo to its field representatives stating that it is not company policy to require additional collateral for dealers who apply for SBA loans.

Footnote: The ripple effect of the demise of so many dealers can be telling. Although they comprise only 2 percent of retail establishments, auto dealers generate nearly 14 percent of retail sales, have a \$10 billion payroll and generate another \$1.2 billion in advertising expenses.

Gardening

Use Native Plants When Possible

Good gardening practices may be your best protection

against plant diseases.

One important step in preventing plant diseases is to start with disease-resistant varieties. Your nurseryman can recommend plant species which are known to have few, if any, disease problems. Use native plants whenever possible.

These plants are adapted to Florida's soils and climate, and will be much hardier than imported plants. Also, they'll require much less maintenance.

Another thing to consider is where you put the plant in your landscape. Know which plants require sunlight, and which need shade, and plant them in suitable spots.

Keep away from extremes of very wet or dry soils, unless you have a plant that's particularly well-suited to either of these conditions.

If your annuals or perennials develop a disease, you might try moving the plants to a new spot. This practice is similar to crop rotation, commonly used by farmers.

It gives the plants a chance to grow in soil that's relatively free of the disease organisms. And, in the original bed, the disease organisms will probably die out.

Give your plants plenty of room to grow. If the beds appear crowded, thin them out some. Thinning the plants permits good air circulation and allows sunlight to reach the lower leaves. This will help prevent the growth of diseases such

a drought condition, Balanced water and fertilizer programs are a big help in preventing plant diseases. Don't over-fertilize or over-water, however, as these are just as bad.

If you notice a diseased plant, or part of a plant, remove and burn it right away. This is important because if you leave the diseased plant untreated, the disease organisms can carry over into the next growing season. Always collect and dispose of diseased branches, and shoots, and even entire plants, if necessary, before the disease has a chance to spread.

Another help in controlling plant diseases is planting them at the right time of year. Different plants have different planting requirements, so check with your garden center operator for information about the plants you want to grow. 



ENVELOPES Moffett Hands Out Secrets?

NEW YORK (UPI) - Hours before the owners pledged support for their bargaining unit, federal mediator Kenneth Moffett added a bit of mystery to the baseball strike Thursday by handing an envelope to both of the chief negotiators.

What the envelopes contained, and whether those contents can help end the 29 day-old dispute, could become clear at today's meeting, the first since a disastrous Fourth of July session.

The return to the table comes after a George Steinbrenner of the New York week of National Labor Relations Board practices by the owners. The hearings are scheduled to end today and American League President Lee MacPhail hopes the attention can return to the talks.

> "I'm glad the mediator called the bargaining session," said MacPhail. "And now that we've got the NLRB out of the way."

> Both the players and the owners met met on Tuesday and pledged support for Marvin Miller, the executive director of the Players Association.

> The owners, at a meeting requested by eight teams, also backed their negotiator, Ray Grebey.

"I thought it was a very healthy thing,"

"I'm very optimistic," said Lurie. "Friday will be a telling meeting. I would say most of the owners are only 50-50 about there being any baseball this season but I'll go one over that, I'll say that I'm \$1-49."



Famer Doesn't Mind 'Minor' Demotion

NEW YORK (UPI) - One of the backlashes of the baseball strike is that it sent a Hall of Famer back to the minors again and he didn't mind it a bit.

"It resets your standards, it really does," Ralph Kiner said. "It makes you appreciate what you earned. After all those years, you forget how tough it is down there."

Kiner, who either led or tied for the leadership in home runs during each of his first seven years in the National League with the Pittsburgh Pirates and was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1975, is one of the TV and radio volces for the New York Mets and with the strike, he and his three colleagues, Bob Murphy, Steve Albert and Art Shamsky, were assigned to Virginia to do the contests there involving the Mets' Tidewater club in the International League.

"It was a great experience going back again," offered Kiner, who last played in the minors 38 years ago with the Toronto Maple Leafs in the same circuit. "The players down there grind it out, giving it everything they have in the hope of making it up to the big

Kiner has a reason for remembering the last year he played in the minors in 1943. Two



"I went to Toronto from Albany in the Eastern League and what it meant was I graduated from riding buses to traveling in trains for the first time," he laughed. "Another reason for my remembering that season was because I went right from there into service with the Navy Air Corps."

Players in the International League travel by plane now, although the Tidewater Tides make the short jump to Richmond by bus just as their big brothers, the Mets, do when they go from New York to Philadelphia.

Kiner worked 14 of the Tidewater games with Murphy. Albert and Shamsky took overwhen they were given a couple of days off.

"It put me back to when I was in service," said the 58-year-old former home run king. "Like reporting to a new base, being there awhile, having a couple of days off and getting a two-day pass."

The strike has now lasted 28 days. If it goes much longer, not only could the major-league season be canceled entirely but the possibility also exists the remainder of the minor-league season could be curtailed as well. The minors depend primarily on the majors for their economic support. If the strike continues, the majors, with no money coming in, could decide to close down their costly minor league operations.

Kiner hopes it doesn't come to that. As the second ever National League Player Representative (Marty Marion was the first), he can recall how close the Pittsburgh Pirates came to striking as far back as 1946 when he was with the club.

Robert Murphy of Boston led a movement to unionize the bigleague players that year and Pittsburgh was picked as the logical place to start since it was one of the most industrialized cities in the country.

"We, and by that I mean the Pirates, took a strike vote one day before a game with the Giants," Kiner said. "We had a secret ballot and before we voted, everyone had his say. I remember Rip Sewell saying we had to be crazy to strike because it could never be effective. The late Bill Benswanger owned the Pirates then and he had nine guys standing by, awhile,"

And the Dixieland Cloggers are just one of the countless dance clubs springing up all over the South in a renewed craze for what used to be known as "buck dancing." "Clogging" is their claim to fame. Colorfully clad in fluffy petitionats and "jingle" tap shoes, the Cloggers dazzle Central Florida audiences with their lively square dance routines and cheerful hoots.

Clogging stems from an old form of country western dance "Hilbilly fiddle" or "buck," dancing. Dating back to the 1800's, clogging was done in wooden shoes that "clogged" on the floor when the dancers started to dance.

And so it got the name — clogging. But the modern form

is done in jurgle tap shoes. Unlike the regular tap shoe, a jingle tap makes a harder, more solid sound on the floor, because two taps are used instead of one.

And anyone who's seen the Dixieland Cloggers in action can tell they've been working on their stomps and doubletoes and Tennessee mountain steps.

Besides delightful appearances before hundreds in the area, the Cloggers dance every Thursday at their club headquarters, the Lake Mary Volunteer Fire Department.

Clogging Clubs from Seminole and surrounding counties invite each other over to share new routines, eat a few snacks, and just have some good, old-fashioned clogging fun.

All five members of the John Higgins family are cloggers. Judy Higgins, a Sanford Specialty Advertising Co. employee, and their three children Becky, 7, Amy, 19, and Chris, 13, all perform with the Dixieland Cloggers.

"We only just started, my husband and i, in March. Our two girls started back in January. And we just love it," Judy says.

John Higgins, a customer service supervisor for Florida Power and Light, thought clogging would be just the thing after relatives invited them to a New Year's Eve clogging party.

"It's a great activity the whole family can enjoy," said Judy. And that's important to us because there are so few things everyone in the family can take part in today." "Besides," she added, "it's great exercise."

According to members of the Dixieland clan, it's always amazing to see someone come in for the first time and look hopelessly at what seems to be impossible routines to learn. And then, 10 weeks and six workshops later, a polished clogger emerges.

Presently, there are 22 Dixisland Cloggers, Traci says. The continuous classes designed for all ages will start Thursday, July 9 for 18 Thursday night classes.



who used to be known as Leon the Lover. Not only has he got a wife named Jayne Kennedy - who just might be one of the most beautiful women in the world - but now he is going to be a big movie star.

And it's all going according to his plan.

The curious thing is that, as even Leon acknowledges, his name isn't particularly well-known in and around the Hollywood establishment. He's been seen with Jayne at many parties and big functions, but basically it is Jayne they look at. Though they may know Leon is her husband, that's about all.

But he made a movie called "Penitentiary," which he says was the most profitable independent film released in 1980. Kennedy's figures: "Penitentiary" cost less than \$500,000 to make and already has grossed more than \$15 million. Not too shabby a return.

"Despite that," he says, "the studios don't know who I am, the big moguls don't know who I am, the producers don't know who I am. But I'll tell you who knows me - the theater owners."

As an example of what Kennedy's picture did in theaters, he cites a Chicago experience. At one theater there, it grossed more than \$100,000 in a single week.

Kennedy likes to tell everybody that his hit film means "I have something that Suzanne Somers and Farrah Fawcett and Erik Estrada don't have, and want very badly - a succesaful movie."

And he thinks he has another one coming this summer. And this one will, he believes, make his name known to everybody. It is a remake of the old boxing classic, "Body and Soul." He stars in it, supported by his wife, by Peter Lawford and by a non-actor but pretty fair ex-fighter named

Muhammad Ali. For Kennedy, progress to this point - where he stands on the brink of fame and fortune - has been slow but steady. And, he insists, that progress has been according to plan.

Go back 10 years. Leon Kennedy was a disc jockey in Cleveland, locally famous as Leon the Lover. He met and quickly married Jayne terrison, who was local

'Shooting Party' Packed With Whimsy, Satire

"It was an error of judgement which resulted in death. It took place in the autumn before the outbreak of what used to be known as the Great War." With this politely understated declaration, Isabel Colegate draws her readers into the world of "The Shooting Party" (Viking, \$11.95, 195 pages).

It is set in Edwardian England, a world in which understatement is the national language. While Colegate's fine-tuned eye for detail allows her to recreate this prewar age of landed gentry in all its finery, her book is something more than "Upstairs-Downstairs" nostalgia. Full of whimay, double-edged satire, quiet irony, and Jamesian subtleties of emotion, it is a period piece with a contemporary bite.

At Nettleby Park, the country estate of Sir Randolph Nettleby, the gentry have gathered for one of English society's autumn rituals: a weekend shooting party. Sir-Randolph's October shoot, however, is not just another party. The Nettleby, estate is renown for the abundance of its game and the quality of its sport. Royalty, including the king, are frequently in attendance. On this October weekend, the weather is perfect and two of England's best shots-Lord Hartlip and Lionel Stephens- are among the guests. And yet, Sir Randolph, his country gentleman's nose to the wind, smells discord.

It isn't just the outcome of his shooting party that troubles Sir Randolph; what is really on his mind is the demise of the English landed gentry. As pre-war England moves from a rural to an urban society, as the Liberal party restructures Parliament and assesses new taxes. making it more and more difficult for the country gen-

tleman to support his way of life, Sir Randolph foresees that "an age, even perhaps a civilization, is coming to an

Closer to home, he detects a decidedly unsporting rivalry developing between Hartlip and Stephens. In Sir Randolph's eyes, the decline of rural England and the display of bad form by sportsmen are anything but unrelated. "If you take away the proper functions of an aristocracy, what can it do but play games too seriously? It happened at the end of feudalism and it is happening

There are as many subplots in "The Shooting Party" as there are characters. When he is not shooting, the dashing Lionel Stephens is obsessed with his love for Olivia Lilburn, the sensitive wife of an aristocratic stuffed shirt. Lord Hartlip's wife Aline, an acknowledged master at decorous adultery, is growing weary of her current lover and is on the lookout for a replacement. Cicely, Sir Randolph's 19-year-old niece, is carrying on an innocent flirtation with a Turkish nobleman. John and Ellen, both servants at Nettleby Park, are valiantly trying to find

time for courting between their domestic responsibilities. On other fronts, Osbert, Sir Randolph's nephew, is concerned lest his pet duck become prey for the sportsmen. The head gamekeeper fears that his son will leave Nettleby and not succeed him. Tom Hartley, a local peasant, is plotting to peach some of Sir Randolph's game.

Cornelius Cardew, a socialist and pacifist, plans to use the

Nettleby shoot as a protest against cruelty to animals.

When "the error in Judgment which resulted in a death" finally occurs, it serves to pull together all of these disparate plot elements. As the various characters are jolted from their private concerns and forced to react to a man's death-a bloody, messy death, at that- they find themselves vulnerable, unprotected by the rules of good form. It is as if Colegate has put her cast to a test: suddenly confronted with reality in all its starkness, and without the help of convention, how does one behave?

The answers, of course, are infinitely variable. Some of the group, like Lord and Lady Hartlip, react with thinly veiled outrage, not so much at the fact of a man's dying, but at the impropriety of it all, as if they had been forced to receive guests in their pajamas. Others, like Sir Randolph, Lionel-Stephens, and Olivia, are immediately able to see the situation for what it is, and react sen-

If "The Shooting Party" is Colegate's last hurrah for the country gentleman, it is also a celebration of those virtues that make Lionel Stephens different from Lord Hartlip. Early in the book, Olivia expresses her admiration for Stephens' ability to remain "open to the possibilities of things." That was not an easy trick in 1913, and it isn't any


