Waste Dumping Statement Readied By Army Corps Of Engineers

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The Army Corps of Engineers has prepared a statement on the proposed dumping of tons of waste into the Atlantic off Jacksonville, Fla. And the Army Corps Engineers announced Monday that mounting protests over the plan by ITT Rayonite Corp. to dump 30 million gallons of paper mill wastes a day into the ocean probably would force a public hearing early next year. Lyman head coach Bill Moore is expected to go with the same five starters for tonight as he did last night. They are Stafford, Crouse, Means, Smith and Nelson.

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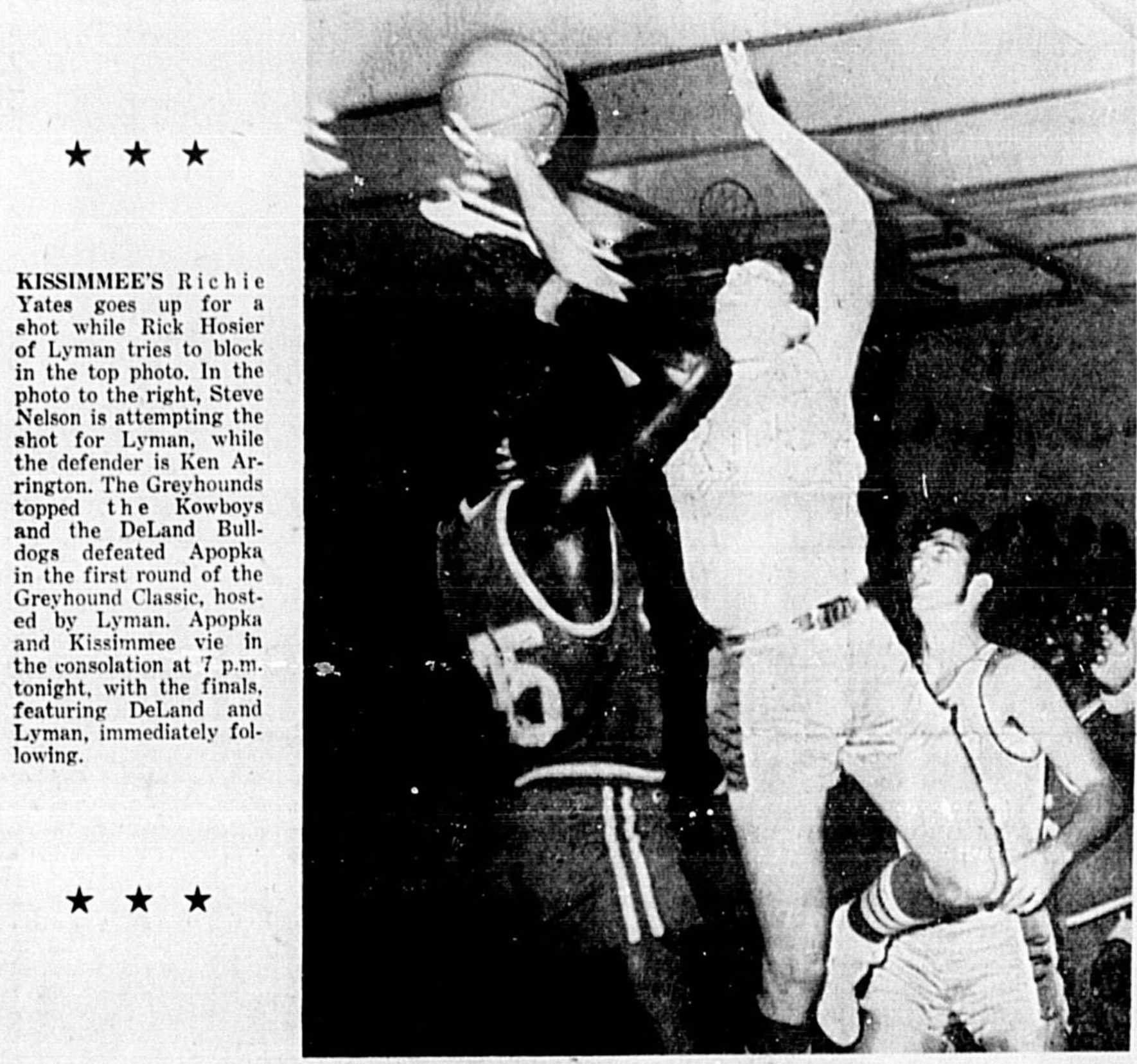

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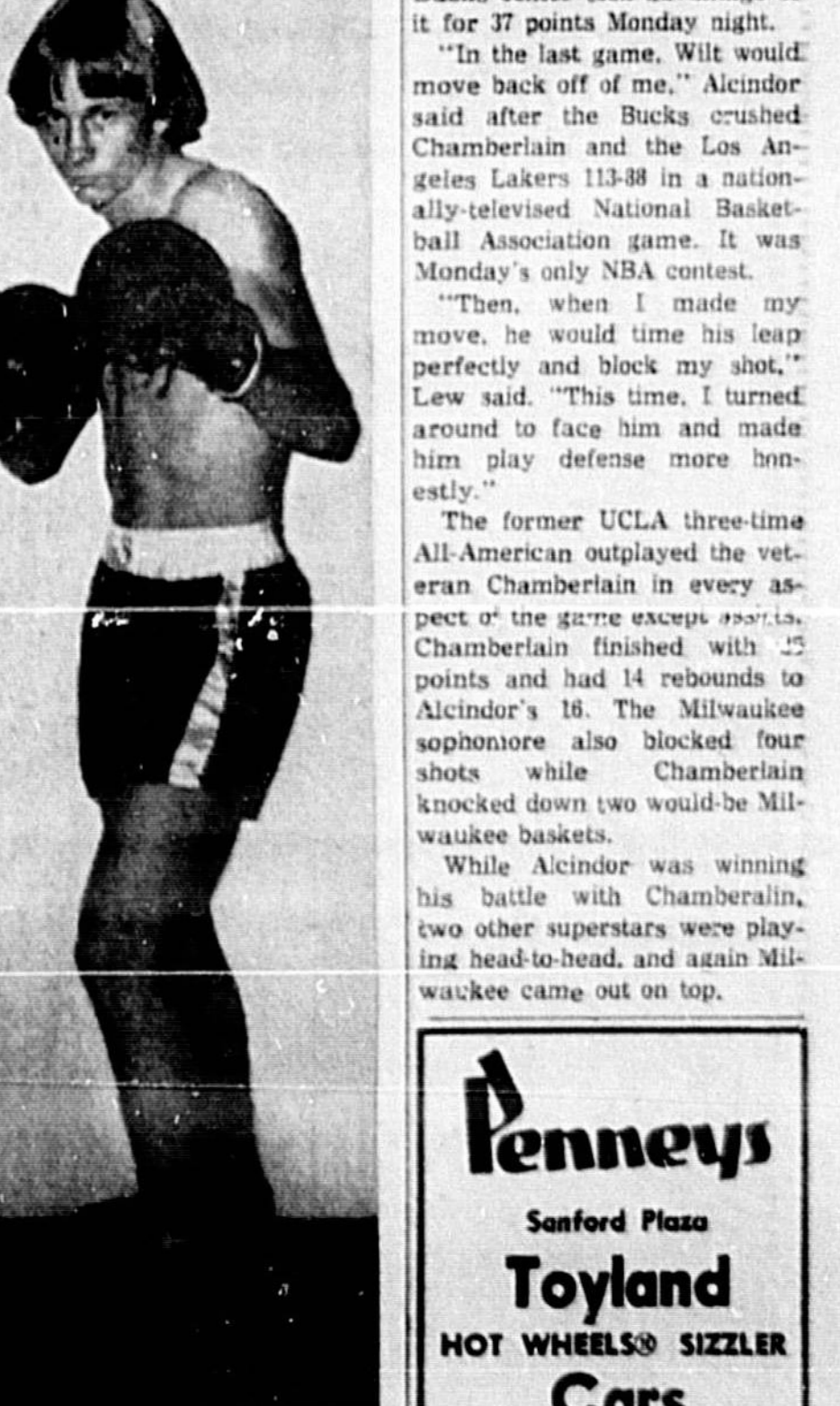
Santa Claus Is Coming To Present Color TV

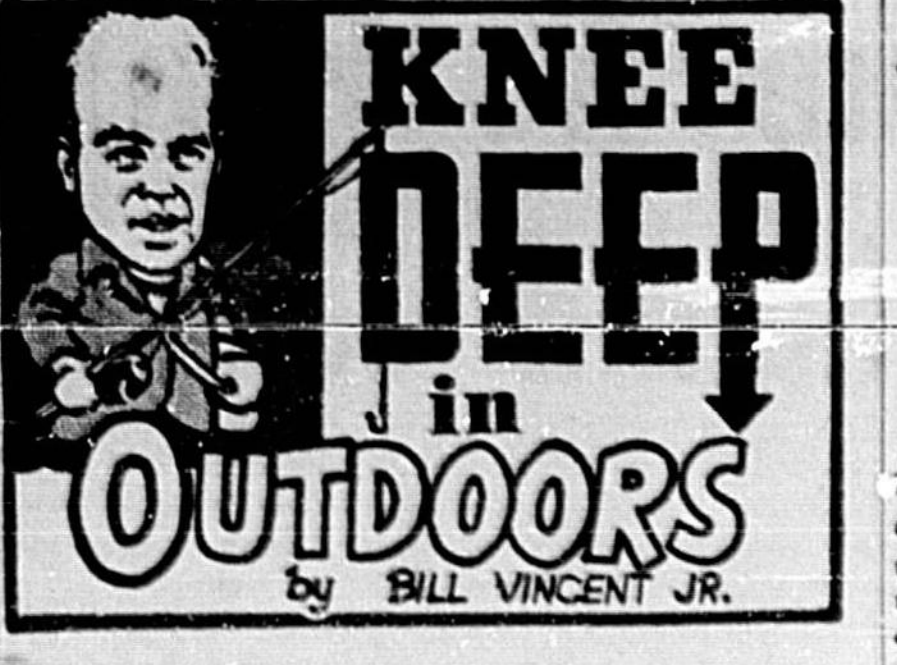
