## Longwood pulls together in time of sorrow

Mayor Butch Bundy says he is proud to be a citizen of the city of Longwood after the outpouring of support given to the Williams family.

Since the bodies of Iona, 9, Ian, 6, and Ivey, 5, were found stuffed between two mattresses at a Longwood home last week, citizens have joined to support their father Greg Williams.

A memorial to the three children that were fed prescription pills by their mother Andrea Williams on Mother's Day continually grows at the Georgia Avenue home. The three children were laid to rest Tuesday after a memorial service at First Baptist Church of Longwood.

Bundy said at the Monday evening meeting of the City Commission that the five commissioners were donating funds to pay for the cemetery plots for the three children.

Bundy is a family friend of the Williams and served on a board for the Choices in Learning School the children attended.

The Longwood Police Department was also pitching in for the family and neighborhood. Chief Tommy Jackson said grief counselors were called in last week to City Hall as neighbors and the family were helped to deal with the tragedy.

Bundy also said the Longwood Police Explorers were donating \$1,600 they had raised to stop a loan on the home from defaulting.

"At this time Mr. Williams will at least have one less thing to worry about," he said.

"The outpouring from this community makes me proud to be a citizen of this community," he added.

# Legislature funds local road projects

## Improvements to state roads 46 and 415 are two of the key state appropriations

SANFORD — While Seminole County and other Florida counties took several lumps with costly state legislative decisions, funding for three major transportation projects will be making their way to Sanford.

State leaders approved more than \$7 million in appropriations for Seminole County road projects by the end of the legislative session May 1, but also

passed several initiatives that could cost the county more than \$2.6 million annually.

"Overall, I would say given the climate in Tallahassee with this session — budgetary constraints and in-fighting — I was very happy we escaped

with what we got because there was a point in time where it didn't look like we were going to come out that well," said Bobby Brantley, state legislative lobbyist for Seminole County.

Despite the negative finan-

cial impacts, county commissioners were pleased with the overall outcome of the legislative session.

"As bad as things looked a month ago, they ended up not being that bad," said County Commissioner Randy Morris.

Road projects scheduled to receive state funding — if approved by the governor — include: widening State Road 46 to four lanes from U.S. Highway 17-92 to State Road 415; widening State Road 415 to four lanes from State Road 46 to the Volusia County line and constructing a new bridge over the St. Johns River; and a new Interstate 4 interchange at State Road 46.

"As far as the transportation

# Seeing is Believing

## Goggles donated to sheriff's office simulate alcohol, drug impairment

SANFORD — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office has new equipment that will have people taking a closer look at the dangers of drunken driving and promote safety in the community.

Fatal Vision Simulator Goggles are designed to simulate impairment caused by alcohol and other drugs. They look like your average chemistry lab goggles, but the lenses contain prisms which bend the light and distort what the eyes see.

The vision-distorting goggles, which come in six different strengths, simulate both daylight and nighttime conditions at levels ranging from low impairment, which is a blood alcohol content level of .06 or below, to high impairment, which is a blood alcohol content of .17 to .20.

The goggles were donated by Wayne Densch Inc., an Anheuser-Busch wholesaler based in Sanford. David Spindler, director of marketing, said two primary goals for the company are to prevent drunken driving and underage drinking.

"We're committing resources and efforts in that direction," Spindler said.

Wayne Densch is "very involved in the community," he said, adding that the company works with local businesses and organizations to promote alcohol awareness. During the holidays, the company locally sponsors the "Tow to Go" program, which offers adults who choose to drink a free ride home and also tows their car for free. Spindler said Wayne Densch also sponsors the We ID program, offering local retailers training in checking for valid identification.

# Reservist fights to bring back business

Kyle Repp, a reserve officer and Longwood resident, has returned from serving his country in Iraq and now is focusing his attention on serving his community.

Repp is trying to resurrect his franchise, 1-800-Got-Junk?, a Vancouver-based garbage and waste removal company, which he had to leave in the care of family and friends when his reserve unit was called in February of 2003 to serve in Iraq.

"I was pretty shocked because I wasn't expecting my unit to get called up," Repp said. "I was also really worried because I had just opened the business."

Repp did not have much time to make arrangements for his business after hearing that his unit was being called to Iraq, but he was able to find

help. "I was fortunate that about two weeks prior I had happened to meet a former military guy," Repp said. "I started using him part time in the business. He was kind enough to volunteer to help out while I was gone."

Alan Mowbray, a former Navy man, and Repp's wife kept the business afloat while Repp was overseas.

He had fairly consistent Internet access to communicate with his wife and Mowbray from Iraq, but without Repp the business was not bringing in enough money to cover a third of the bills to keep the business running, Repp said.

"It was a difficult time for me psychologically, being over there worrying about day-to-day dangers and watching my business go down the tubes,"

### Progress Energy brings solar project to Lyman High

Progress Energy Florida will help local students learn about clean energy alternatives in a project unveiled at Lyman High School in Longwood.

The new photovoltaic (PV) project will educate students about solar and alternative energy, and also provide a portion of the school's daily use. Project Energy and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection provided resources and cooperated on the installment of the project.

The project is part of the SunSmart schools program, a statewide initiative to install 29 solar electric systems in schools throughout the state. Lyman High School is one of five schools in Progress Energy Florida's service territory chosen for participation in the project. The company will install 4-kilowatt photovoltaic systems, provide industry expertise, and contribute additional funding. Students will track energy production from a PV system mounted on the school's roof and conduct scientific experiments and mathematical computations based on the system's energy production.

"We are very excited about this unique opportunity," said Lyman High School Principal Sam Momary. "This helps put our school on the cutting edge of technology. We are grateful to Progress Energy Florida and the Department of Environmental Protection for their generosity in providing us with this wonderful tool."

### Sheriff's office requests vacationing residents use House Watch program

If you are making plans for that long awaited summer vacation, don't forget one important part of your plans, the House Watch Program, warns Rich Kay of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office Crime Prevention Bureau.

Kay suggests you ask a trusted neighbor to collect your mail and papers, but also take that extra step and set up a free house watch with the sheriff's office or your local law enforcement agency. Officers will make a daily check of your home while you are away.

Here is how to set up a House Watch: A few days before you leave, call the sheriff's office to set up a house watch. The operator will take important information from you, such as:

- When are you leaving?
- When are you expected back?
- Does anyone have a key in an emergency?
- Is anyone allowed on your property while you are gone?

They will get other information from you, and this information will be sent to the deputy patrolling your community.

The deputy will make a perimeter check of your home once per shift, once during daytime and once during the evening hours. If anything does go wrong, the sheriff's office will know whom to contact.

Put "Set up a House Watch" on your to-do list before leaving.

Furthermore, if you plan to drive during your vacation, take along a cell phone that is no longer in service (one that has been disconnected).

If you have a charger unit and it will maintain a charge, you can use it to call 911 only, anywhere you go, as long as there is a cell tower in the area. It will enhance your safety if you break down along the way.

priorities we had this year we did very well compared to a lot of other areas of the state, but it's about time," Brantley said. "We have suffered enough over the years on some of these transportation projects."

The State Road 46 widening project is critical in the Midway community, said Jerry McCollum, Seminole County engineer. The state funding level of \$750,000 will be earmarked for a project development and environment (PD&E) study for the stretch of State Road 46 east of Sanford.

"It's a terrible road," he said. "When I-4 stops it becomes horrendous because

State Road 415 is the back way into Deltona. So the county working closely with the airport have been pushing to get that road four laned."

The \$3.7 million the state legislature appropriated for State Road 415 improvements will go toward right-of-way acquisition as the project is already undergoing a PD&E study.

A state appropriation of \$3 million will be used for designing a new State Road 46 and Interstate 4 interchange. McCollum said the critical portion of the project is providing a new entry ramp for motorists traveling west on State Road

46. Instead of trying to turn left to go to Orlando on Interstate 4, McCollum said a loop will be constructed on the right-hand side of the road to avoid traffic back ups.

The initial funding from the state for these projects will get them moving in the right direction, McCollum said.

"These are such critical projects in Seminole County we

will be back every year to get more," he said. "Once one phase is done we will be back to try to get money for the other phases."

If state funding remains constant, State Road 415 construction is estimated to begin in three to four years, State Road 46 widening is expected in four to five years and the Interstate 4 interchange at State Road 46 is the furthest out.

As for the negative financial impacts from the legislative session, Seminole County officials are still determining the impacts from the implementation of the 1998 voter-approved referendum that shifts all county financed justice system costs to the state.

While the plan, known as Article V, will save Seminole County in some ways the overall impact will be a negative primarily because the \$1.6 million in fees collected by the clerk of the courts office will no longer find their way to the county's general fund.

Another negative impact is an unfunded mandate that

proposes to have counties fund the 25 juvenile detention centers in the state for a total cost of more than \$90 million. Seminole County would be expected to foot an annual bill of about \$1.6 million to fund the local juvenile facility.

The detention juvenile justice cost shift, however, is still up for debate as by a state constitutional amendment all unfunded mandates need two-thirds approval of state leaders to be enacted. According to Deputy County Attorney Steve Lee, the House did not pass the measure by the required vote and a legal challenge could be forthcoming.

major American oceanographic expedition to Cuba.

In his third book, Belleville takes readers through such Florida favorites as the Everglades, Suwannee River, Blue Spring and Big Pine Key, along with the exotic rivers, coral reefs and cenotes of the Amazon, Guyana, the Galapagos Islands, Cuba, the Dominican Republic, Nicaragua and more.

Belleville recalls one of his favorite adventures, diving with archaeologists in a cenote, a deep well, in the Dominican Republic, where the Taino peo-

ple made sacrifices 2,000 years ago. The explorers repelled down seven stories before descending into the total darkness of the ancient water.

"I'm really into the literary aspect of writing and the storytelling because I think that's a really interesting way to engage readers," Belleville said. "That's why all these pieces are written in the first person and the present tense. It puts readers there, in the cenote, in the deep water."

Belleville often shares local mythology in his essays.

"I find it really fascinating,

that the people in remote places like the Amazon still have stories of strong magic that are influenced by the presence of water and the critters that live in the water, such as the boto, the freshwater dolphin," Belleville explained.

His next book, which he is currently working on, is largely about Belleville's take on the development of Sanford.

"This [next] book is my own experiences about how growth affects not only the environment but the stability of neighborhoods and people," Belleville said. "I want to help folks

understand that new isn't always better."

Belleville is the co-founder of a non-profit documentary nature film company, Equinox Documentaries. The company has just finished its pilot about

Indian River Lagoon in Florida.

He and Wes Skiles, a cave diving cinematographer, are also currently working on a script for a new PBS film on the St. Johns River.

Meanwhile, Belleville is busy

promoting the new book, which has already received some positive national reviews.

Repp said. "It was more stressful than the combat environment."

Repp is a Chief Warrant Officer whose specialty is directing supply and service for a hospital, which helps not only soldiers, but also the locals.

"It was a good feeling to think that you're creating a better life for other people, besides Americans," Repp said.

Although his unit was only supposed to be in Iraq for six months, Repp is the only one in his unit who has made it back to the United States.

"I'm getting my feet back on the ground, re-learning the operating systems (of the busi-

ness)," Repp said. "I didn't even remember my own phone number when I got back."

Since returning, Repp has sent out about 800 postcards to local business people, previous customers, Seminole County Regional Chamber of Commerce members and his contacts in the media to help drum up business again.

Although he has only been home since May 6, business is increasing.

"Things are looking quite good," Repp said. "I had more business in the last week than I typically had in any month since I left."

He is also speaking to potential business contacts, such as real estate workers and

property managers.

The Chamber of Commerce will extend Repp's membership for another year because he was gone for so long.

The Chamber has also introduced Repp to people and supplied him with places he can go to spread the word about 1-800-Got-Junk?.

"A lot of people in the community have been very kind to me and my family since I was away and since I got back," Repp said. "I really appreciate the support I've gotten. It's very moving."



# Central Florida Zoo speaker opens world of knowledge

Good things can come out of bad situations. Consider the Sanford Zoo, now Central Florida Zoological Park:

About 83 years ago, a small traveling road show went bankrupt while in Sanford, and dropped off its stock of animals at the Sanford Fire Station downtown on Palmetto Avenue between First and Second streets. The firemen cared for the animals for several years, but with a growing city, couldn't juggle fighting fires and feeding a flock; so the city took responsibility of the critters and set up the Sanford Zoo, Central Florida's first zoological park near City Hall. By 1950, the Sanford Zoo placed the city on the entertainment map, as the state's largest zoo and one of its leading tourist attractions.

Today, the zoo is Seminole County's largest tourist attraction and a primary tool of education for young and old alike. It's modern, interesting, exciting, expanding, life-touching — and inexpensive.

Joe Montisano, chief executive officer for Central Florida Zoo, gave a wonderful view of the zoo past, present and future of the zoo as Sanford Kiwanis Club guest speaker May 12 at the Sanford/Seminole County Chamber of Commerce Community Room. Montisano said the city relinquished control of the zoo about 23 years ago when the Central Florida Zoological Society, Inc., was formed to manage the growing facility, which moved in the 1970s to 93 acres on U.S. Highway 17-92 at Interstate 4 near Lake Monroe.

Montisano said the zoo, with vintage train rides and exotic exhibits, is tripling its educational capacity through the new Wayne Densch Discovery Center, an auditorium/laboratory facility expected to open in December or January.

The zoo educates about 20,000 school children each year, and with the addition of

the Discovery Center, that number should rise to 60,000, Montisano said. One of the zoo's main non-animal attractions is the train, a replica of the Florida East Coast Line. About 60 percent of the zoo's visitors ride the train. Of the eight zoos in Florida, Central Florida Zoo has the lowest-priced membership, Montisano said. The membership allows admittance to any zoo in the state.

Montisano also made a pitch for the zoo's Docent (African word for "volunteer") program. Workers are needed at all levels, from filling to caring for the animals. Training is provided. If you're interested in becoming a volunteer, contact the zoo.

So, "Do Something Wild," as the zoo's brochure proclaims, "Join the Zoo!" Join the good things that continue to rise from the small flock rescued by the Sanford Fire Department nearly a century ago, and today stands as a beacon of tourism, education and preservation for Florida and the world.

Capt. Mark Rehder of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office said the goggles will be used in demonstrations, as a resource for students and for training their own officers. Rehder said the department plans to use a mock example of drunken driving by having participants wear the goggles while attempting to operate a golf cart.

"We're trying to correct the

problem," Rehder said of underage drinking.

Rehder said the department will make the goggles available to local law enforcement agencies.

According to Innocorp Ltd., who manufactures the goggles, "research shows that those who learn from hands-on experience retain two to four times more than those who learn from just

listening or listening and seeing."

Fatal Vision goggles were introduced in Wisconsin in 1996. Since then, they have been used by law enforcement agencies around the country to provide a realistic experience to people of all ages, though most of the demonstrations are aimed at teenagers and college students.

year it's a good chance to get people thinking."

Four of the team's top speakers debated issues that are likely to dominate the 2004 presidential election, such as health care, the economy, education, national security and the environment. Four students represented the Democratic and Republican parties and were asked two questions written by the debate team about each issue.

Moderators for the debate were Boyd Karns, principal at Lake Mary High, Michael McLean, deputy mayor of Lake Mary, Chris Trenkmann, reporter for WKMG Local 6, Bob Poe, former chairman of the Florida Democratic party and Jim Stelling, chairman of the Seminole County Republican party.

"There's a lot going on in the world and I've seen a greater interest in this election than in the ones past," Karns said. "I think this is one way we can encourage students to vote. We're doing more of that in our schools and making a concerted effort."

When asked a question, the team of two students had two minutes to answer. The opposing party was given a one minute rebuttal, followed by a two minute response from the other side.

Karns said students in the school are becoming increasingly interested in this year's election.

"Students are talking a lot more about it and are more aware of what is going on," he said.

At the end of the night, the audience cast ballots to decide which side was more convinc-

ing in their speeches. The vote was close, but the students representing the Republican party edged out over the Democrats.

"They did a great job. Both sides were very well prepared and gave great answers," Karns said. "I think they all felt very positive about it."

Karns said many young people attended the event, most of them students from Lake Mary High.

"It was great to see our students get so involved," he said. "It really showed how important this election has become."

Lake Mary High is one of many schools throughout the nation that are holding mock presidential debates in hopes of generating student interest

in politics and increasing voter registration among youth.

Woods said getting young people interested in politics "is definitely something that is trying to be encouraged." In the presidential election years between 1972 and 2000, the turnout rate among 18 to 24-year-old voters declined by 13 percent, according to the Center for Information and Research on Civic Learning and Engagement.

Karns said the Political "Party" is an event that he hopes will be held during future election years.

"The feedback I received was excellent. It generated a lot of enthusiasm," he said of the event.

Earnhardt Jr.'s crew makes winning call at Richmond

Faced with a critical strategy decision with the laps winding down in the Chevy 400 at Richmond International Raceway, Dale Earnhardt Jr.'s crew made the winning call, leaving him on the track while his closest challenger, Tony Stewart, stopped for tires during the race's final caution period.

When the drivers lined up for the final 45-lap sprint to the finish, Earnhardt had the lead, but Stewart, in fourth place, had the newer tires.

It turned out, just as Earnhardt's crew predicted, that track position would be more important than fresh rubber, as Earnhardt motored away to a big lead and his third win of the 2004 season.

Jimmie Johnson, who used the same strategy as Earnhardt, took second place over Bobby Labonte, Stewart and Matt Kenseth.

Earnhardt said strategy turned out to be more important than speed when it counted. "I really don't know if we had the best car tonight, but being out in front at the end was where it needed to be, so that's what we did," he said. "I expected [Stewart] to come on up through there, but I saw [Friday's] Busch race that track position was tough. I knew Tony was going to have to work pretty hard to get up through there."

Stewart had the best car during the middle portion of the race, and appeared to be in position to challenge Earnhardt in the late-race shootout. But he and Jeff Gordon bumped while racing for third place just after the final restart and neither driver was a factor after that.

Earnhardt's 12th career win allowed him to boost his points lead from 25 to 40 over Johnson and earn an \$80,000 bonus paid to the points leader, if he wins a race.

Fears of single-file racing on the newly paved racing surface turned out to be unfounded. By Lap 130, Earnhardt used the second groove, which some didn't think would be raceable, to wrestle the lead from Johnson.

From then on, the outside lane seemed to be the better of the two grooves, at least for drivers like Earnhardt and Ryan Newman.

Johnson, like most other drivers in the field, had predicted that the bottom groove would be the only one utilized, as is often the case when tracks are paved.

"I really thought it was going to be a single-file race, but it wasn't," Johnson said.

'NASCAR Drivers: 360' documents drivers' lives

It's not that I don't like NASCAR. I'm just wound up with too many other sports. And all those logos make me dizzy.

Besides, if I wanted to see two cars rub paint off each other's bumpers, I could just watch other members of my family back out of the garage in the morning. You know who you are.

On the other hand, I have just watched an episode of "NASCAR Drivers: 360," a delightful series of eight one-hour shows on FX. It takes the smell out of gasoline, the grease off the driveway and the cursing out of the air, except, possibly, for one little indiscretion.

When DeLana Harvick tries to wake up husband Kevin in one morning five days prior to a race, she says, "OK, turd, get up."

In case you can't hear it, the phrase

is repeated in caption. Then Kevin tells his wife he's hungry, to which she replies, "That's not my problem."

"What is your problem?" he answers. "Well, technically, you," she says, reminding him to clean up the dog "turd" in the garage.

"This is wrong," Kevin says as he takes a shovel to the mess in the garage, adding, "It's even more wrong to throw it in the neighbor's yard," which he does.

Except for the dog stuff, the conversation sounds familiar. Kevin Harvick is not like me, but he is. He is like all of us.

If other sports would take the time to personalize their athletes the way NASCAR does, fans would be a lot more friendly, too.

"NASCAR Drivers: 360" goes where most documentary films go, to cool places. It shows the drivers as normal people who live normal lives and have loving and sarcastic and friendly and funny times with their wives and children.

Nine families were chosen to be filmed doing everything from getting

up in the morning, eating dinner, driving to the next race, testing cars, trying to get a ride when a car falls and, yes, even throwing dog poop into the neighbor's yard.

Taking part in the series are Harvick, Dale Earnhardt Jr., Jeremy Mayfield, Jamie McMurray, Casey Mears, Scott Wimmer, Brian Vickers and Kenny and Rusty Wallace.

The show I watched featured Harvick and the Wallaces and their wives and children. If they were any friendlier, you'd swear they were lifelong pals instead of celebrity race-car drivers.

The program slows down their lives from the racetrack, showing the drivers from dawn to dusk, what they think about racing, what they do with the rest of their day and how important sponsorships are.

Oh, yes, there are wrecks to be shown. Just as you couldn't show a hockey game without a fight, showing a NASCAR race without a wreck would be exclusionary.

Even the casual or non-NASCAR fan will be able to enjoy this series. Just be careful leaving the garage.

Almost a flawless outing for Stewart

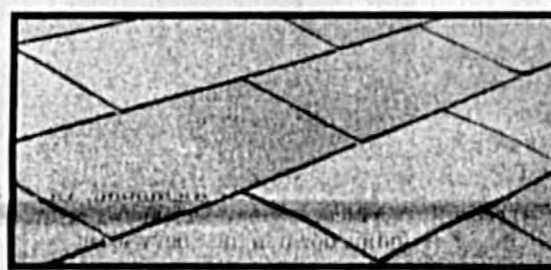

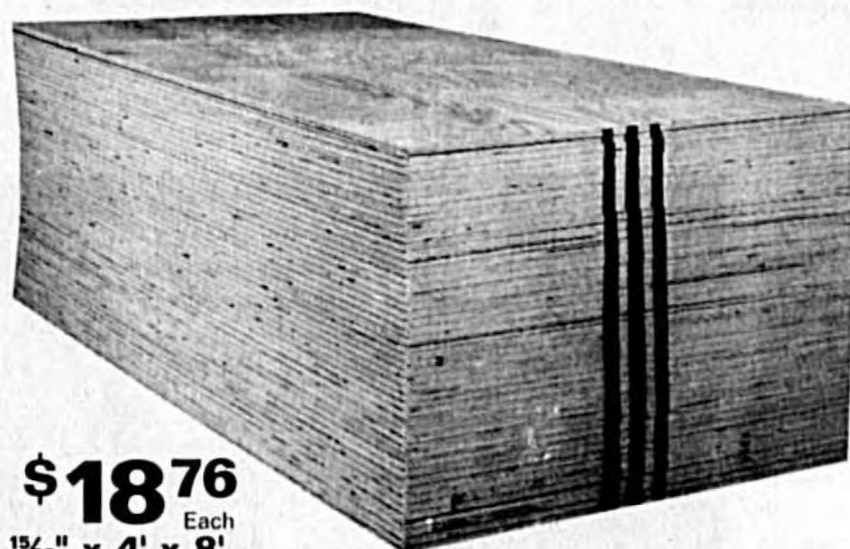

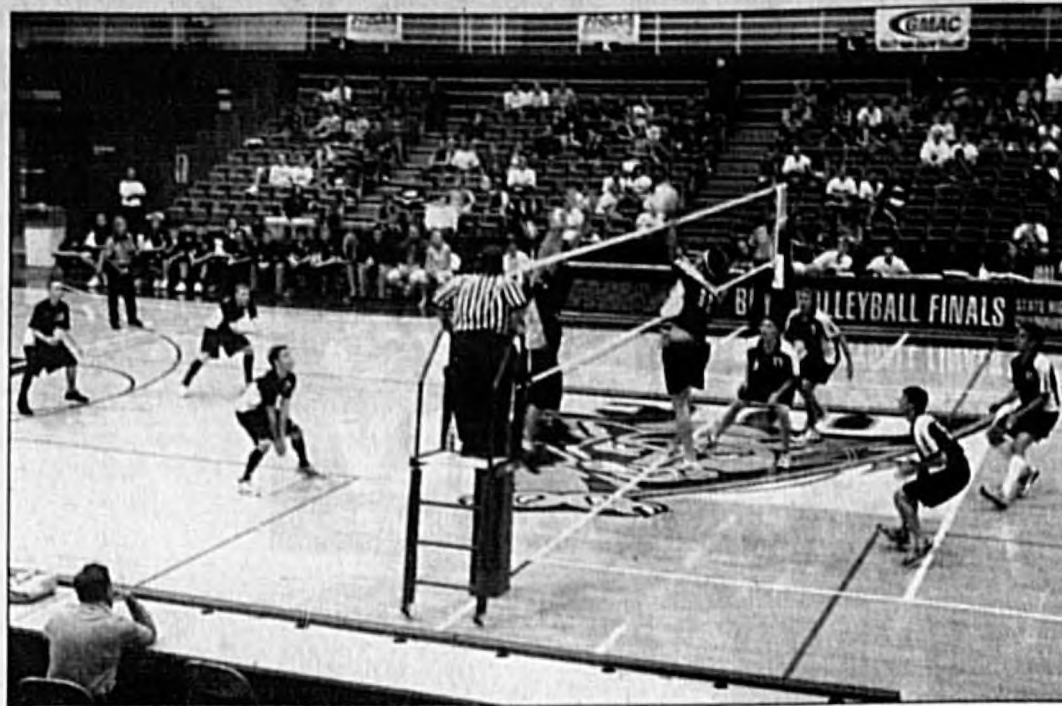
Golden Panther Arena in Miami by defeating Northeast (Oakland Park) in five games, 23-25, 25-22, 10-25, 28-26 and 15-5.

Junior Jemile Weeks had a big night and the visitors took great advantage of two Oviedo errors to edge the Lions, 6-5 in nine innings.

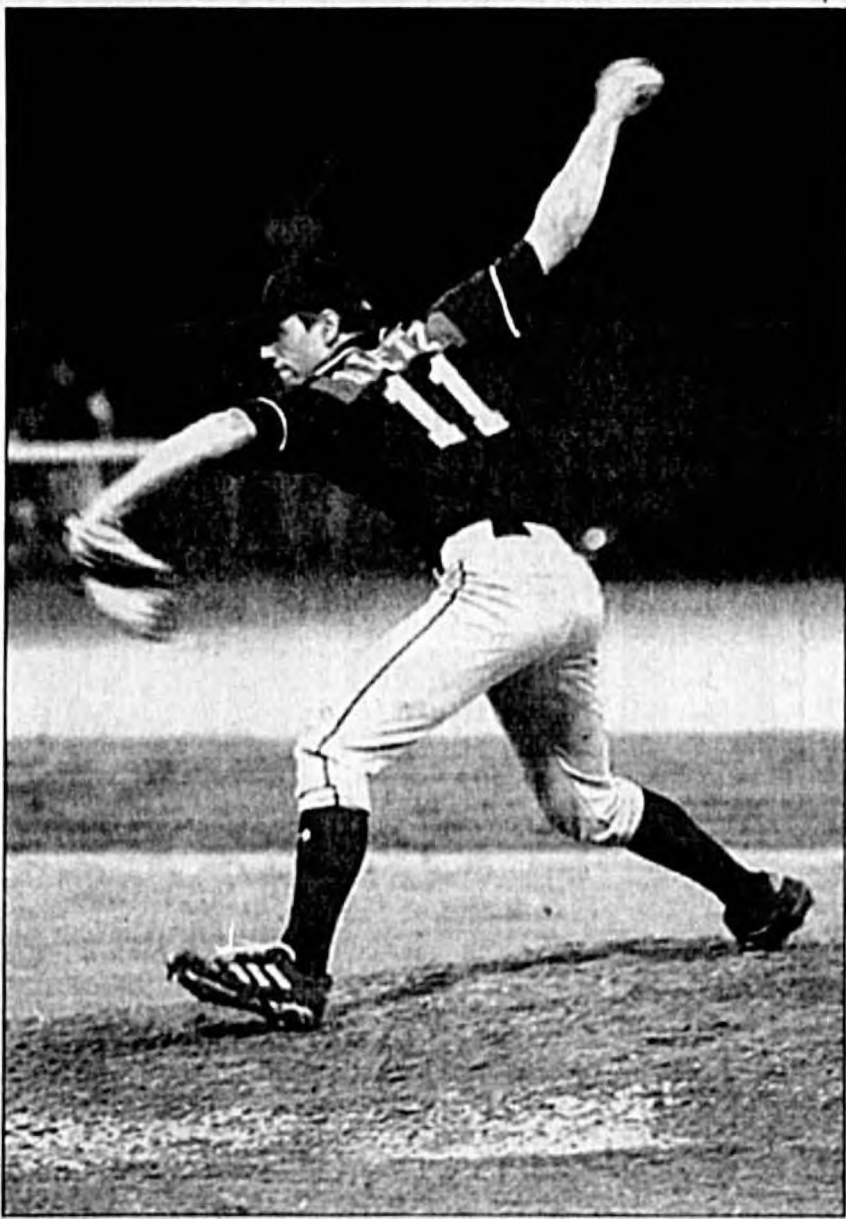
The Patriots (21-8) took a 2-0 lead in the third inning on a double by Jeff Dietz and a home run by Weeks.

## UCF clinches share of A-Sun baseball title

Clay Timpner tied a career-high with four RBI to lead No. 19 UCF to an 8-5 victory over Mercer to clinch a share of the 2004 Atlantic Sun Regular Season Championship. The Golden Knights won the A-Sun Regular Season for the fourth time in five years and can clinch the league title outright with just one win this weekend at Georgia State.

Mercer won the first game of Saturday's doubleheader 6-0 as the Golden Knights were shutout for just the second time this season.

With the split, UCF raised its record to 39-12 overall and 21-6 in the A-Sun

while Mercer dropped to 19-32 overall and 8-19 in the league.

Mercer starter Brian Jones tossed a complete-game four-hit shutout in game one to become the first pitcher in over a year to throw a complete-game shutout vs. UCF. Jones also dealt Kyle Bono (8-1) his first loss of the season. The sophomore right-hander lasted just 4.1 innings, his shortest career start.

Bono yielded five runs, three earned, with three strikeouts. The strikeouts, however, gives him 98 on the year, eighth in UCF single-season history.

In game two, UCF scored one run in the first inning after back-to-back doubles by Dee Brown and Ryan Bono,

who was 1-for-3 in the opener. Bono's double, his 13th of the season, scored Brown to give UCF a 1-0 advantage.

Brown led UCF with three hits and two runs scored while Timpner and Ryan Bono (2-for-4, double, run, RBI) each added two hits for the victors. Lake Mary's Drew Butera was 1-for-3 with a run scored and an RBI.

On Friday, Matt Ray was 2-for-2 with three runs scored and a career-high three stolen bases to lead UCF to a 12-1 victory.

The Golden Knights put the game out of reach early with 10 runs over the first three innings to take a commanding 10-0 lead.

The 10-run lead was more than enough for UCF starter Matt Fox. The junior right-hander improved to 11-2 on the season with five shutout innings. Fox allowed just one hit with two strikeouts and threw just 63 pitches on the night.

Ryan Bono was 1-for-3 with two RBI, both coming on sacrifice flies. Butera also added an RBI.

UCF closes out the 2004 regular season with a five-game road trip this week.

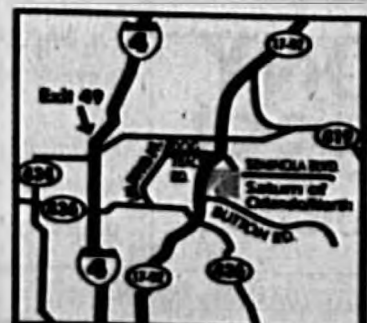

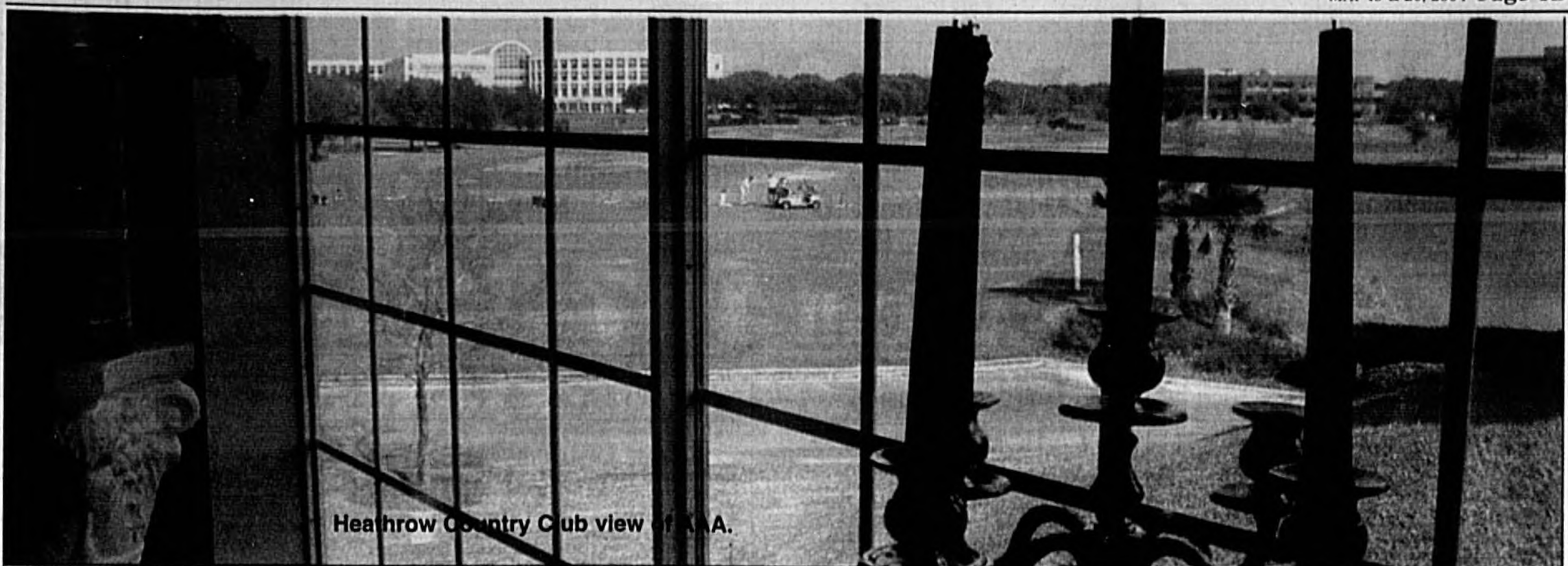

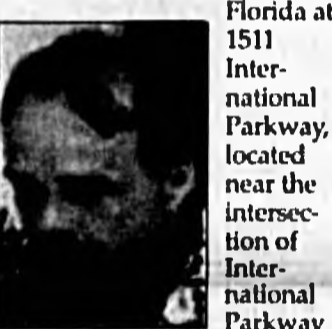

## City OKs first park smoking ban in Seminole

LONGWOOD — City commissioners successfully extinguished smoking in Longwood parks Tuesday by passing a measure with a 4-1 margin that outlaws tobacco use in public recreational areas.

Deputy Mayor Brian Sackett cast the lone dissenting vote. He has repeatedly debated the ordinance that bans smoking in city parks, but also creates designated smoking areas in the recreational areas.

"I think the designated areas are going to create more problems than they are worth," he said. "I have issues with designated areas that children will not be supervised."

Sackett also objected to how the ordinance does not outline stipulations for the creation of the designated smoking areas. The decision on where to place the designated areas is up to City Administrator John Drago, but will be submitted to the City Commission for approval.

Smaller parks will probably not have a designated smoking area, but two larger parks that will be Reiter and Candyland. Reiter Park is currently being redesigned so a smoking area will be incorporated in the process, Drago said.

"The biggest challenge is going to be Candyland because (of the proximity) of the ball fields and playground," he said.

The proposed fine for violating the Longwood ordinance

## Former Sanford resident turns 106 years old

SANFORD — Ruth Hamilton, a long time Sanford resident who now lives in Orlando, celebrated her 106 birthday on April 12. And she has not simply been alive for 106 years — she has lived for 106 years.

Hamilton, who used to live in Bram Towers, could write a book about all the things she has seen and done in her 106 years.

So she did. Hamilton grew up in Alta, Iowa, the daughter of Peter and Hulda Jensen, immigrants from Denmark and Sweden. She has always loved baseball, and, in 1921, she married a pitcher for the Cleveland Indians, Dr. Carter Hamilton.

Later, Ruth Hamilton moved to Florida. Her son, Peter, attended Lyman High School. Hamilton has been a teacher, lecturer, radio commentator and a member of the U.S. House of Representatives in

New Hampshire.

She was very involved in the community, often wrote editorials and had homes investigated to help children who were receiving inadequate care.

Some of her travels include Romania, Russia, the Balkans, Norway and Germany.

She even has had tea with Eleanor Roosevelt.

Some of her other experiences along her way include meeting Hitler in 1937, corresponding with former first lady Hillary Clinton, meeting former Nobel Peace Prize winner Oscar Arias and being invited to the inaugurations of Presidents Carter and Johnson. She received the Unsung Heroine Award from the New Hampshire Commission of the Status of Women in 1986.

Not surprisingly, Governor Jeb Bush has proclaimed a Ruth Hamilton Day.

Hamilton wrote a 52-chapter memoir book to share her experiences.

After all that, one might think Hamilton would be
