

## Longwood eyes 17-92 CRA participation

LONGWOOD - The city of Longwood has been absent from the Seminole County redevelopment district along U.S. Highway 17-92 for seven years, but one commissioner is looking to change that trend.

**Commissioner** Mike Holt requested a presentation from the redevelopment agency during the commission's meeting Monday. The group

### **Commissioner Holt suggests redevelopment** agency will help fill empty buildings on highway

includes Seminole County and the cities of Casselberry, Lake Mary, Sanford and Winter Springs.

Each city is represented on a board, which makes suggestions for improvements in the 13-mile district that runs from the lakefront in Sanford to Fern Park at the Orange County line. A portion of tax

dollars from the 1,700 acres of the district are earmarked for improvements along the state highway, and some of the recent projects the redevelopment agency has contributed to are the state farmers' market pavilion in Sanford and Fern Park roadway improvements.

The redevelopment agency

has had some success. Before it formed, taxable values of properties in the corridor grew at an average annual rate of .06 percent annually, which was about 50 times slower than other unincorporated areas of the county. Since 1997, taxable value of properties within the U.S. Highway 17-92 redevelop-

ment area have grown by more than 7 percent annually. Longwood commissioners

## Cities fighting state bill

Cities across Seminole County are passing resolutions to fight a state bill that could cost them the power of levying fines for violations of municipal ordinances.

Legislators passed House Bill 113A last summer as the first measure in overhauling the state's court system. Currently, counties fund local courts, but with the 1998 voterapproved constitutional amendment to Article 5 all courts are to become the financial responsibility of the state by July 1, 2004.

"All the county offices suddenly became a state responsibility so when it becomes a






They also arrested the victim's mother on a charge of child neglect and making a false report. The mother, Dawn Marie Pederson, 22, also lives in the Winter Park area of unincorporated Seminole County. She was arrested on Nov. 20, and has since bonded out of jail.

Investigators also received information that a man, who was staying with Pederson, may have also molested the girl. He was identified as Charles Hair, a convicted sex offender. A warrant was obtained, but before investigators could catch up with him, Hair withdrew a large sum of cash and fled the state along with Pederson. The warrant was turned over due to Hair's out-of-state flight. An investigator was able to track Hair to California, where Ventura police officers located him. Hair was awaiting repairs to his RV to be completed when police caught up with him.

Right now, California authorities have Hair in custody. California charges are also pending because Hair, a convicted felon, had two guns when he was arrested. The status of Dawn Pederson is unknown at this time.

14 Jan 2004 The other night we conducted a recon to scope out two target houses that we plan on doing a raid on in the near future.

riences.

In Baghdad a patrol of two humvees was hit by a roadside bomb near the Oil Ministry building and they opened fire on a passing car. The car had nothing to do with the bomb. It was an Iraqi family with their kids returning from a trip to the hospital. The driver of the car and a 10-year-old boy were killed and a 6-year-old and 8-year-old were wounded by the 30 caliber fire. These people were just innocently

when the IED went off. It was another story like many others where innocent people and kids nave been killed in this war. Another chopper was shot down west of the city and

landed in a lake but the crew was not killed. Now the Shiite Muslim Cleric Al-Sistani is speaking out against U.S. plans to

appoint a new Iraqi govern-ment without holding national elections. This is stirring up some protests. Today in Baquba a car bomber attacked a police station and killed three people and injured a bunch more. Police stations are still a main target of the insurgents, and I still get nervous whenever I have to conduct

#### inspections of them.

Last night, to wind-down the evening, SFC Goldberg and I watched a movie on his laptop computer and right after the movie we were informed the new lieutenant was ready to be picked up at BIAP (Baghdad Airport)

along with 5 new soldiers. SFC Goldberg and I led two trucks along with the commander and his truck out to BIAP to pickup the new personnel.

When we got to the airport we found the only road to get in was blocked off because of a night mission going on around the airport. So while we waited for the road to open, we went to midnight chow at a mess hall near the airport. We

#### IN BRIEF Sheriff's office continues aggressive driving campaign on Interstate 4

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office, Altamonte Springs Police Department and the Florida Highway Patrol (Seminole County Division) continue to enforce aggressive driving along Interstate 4 and the Central Florida Greeneway (State Road 417) in Seminole County.

The A.D.D. C.A.R.E. (Aggressive **Driving Deterrent** — Combined Aerial Road Enforcement) operation will continue along Interstate 4 during the months of January, February and March, monitoring both east and west bound traffic during peak times.

The sheriff's office recent staffing of two "Aggressive Driving Enforcement Deputies" have added extra patrol in these areas and other state roads in Seminole County.

These two positions are funded by the Florida Department of Transportation for a three-year period. Their emphasis has been nighttime aggressive driving.

On Friday night, Jan. 2, 23 traffic stops were made between the hours of 7 p.m. and 12 a.m., all for aggressive driving. These patrols will continue on a regular basis and are committed to making a difference on the roadways of Seminole County.

Aggressive driving is defined as two or more of the following:


- · Following too closely
- Improper lane change
- Multiple lane changes
- Visible high rate of speed.

The A.D.D. C.A.R.E. operations have already proven to be highly effective. In the inaugural two-month period of A.D.D. C.A.R.E., traffic crashes on Interstate 4 declined 33 percent. The media attention proved highly successful in delivering the message.

and they want to know on a fairly consistent basis what those expenditures are and how they are going to be funded. That led to the creation of this bill, which in part removed the authority of public defenders and state attorneys to either prosecute or defend violation of city and county ordinances."

The bill shifted the financial burden of the courts to municipalities and counties as it prohibited state attorneys from appearing in court to prosecute municipal ordinances and proposed to charge a \$200 filing fee for each code or ordinance. violation. There were more than 120,000 ordinance violations dropped off in city and county courts last year, according to the Florida League of Cities. If nothing changed to House Bill 113A, the state could make about \$24 million from the filing fees.

"That is not going to happen," Conn said. "Either cities or counties would stop issuing citations because they couldn't afford the fees or the \$200 is going to have be adjusted to reflect reality."

Many of the fines received for ordinance citations are less than half of the proposed filing fee, which could make the citation process ineffective.

"Most of our code violations are well under \$200 so it's going to cost us more money to file the action and then we will have to pay attorneys on top of it. The most we would ever get back is \$50 or \$75 so it's not

worth it," said Lake Mary City Manager John Litton, as city commissioners approved a resolution refuting House Bill 113A earlier this month.

According Conn, he foresees changes being made to the bill with a "glitch bill" being passed during the legislative session that starts in March, but it is still determined to what degree of changes will be made.

"They knew going in they would have this session to address any concerns there were and there were a lot," he said.

Conn said the state legislature has been receptive to the league of cities proposed changes.

"They've (state senate) recognized most city ordinances, such as open container, being in the park after hours and things like that, the fines are \$100 or less so if you have a \$200 filing fee that doesn't make any sense," he said.

Conn said the additional filing charge citations will probably be reduced to \$10 or \$20, but it will still account as an upfront charge for cities and counties.

"I think the Florida League of Cities has got their attention," said Longwood City Manager John Drago, as city commissioners approved the resolution refuting House Bill 113A Monday night. "I think there will be some changes to it, but the more cities that adopt the better chance changes will be made."





areas of the corridor. As the agency has raised about \$3 million since its inception, the CRA cannot fund whole infrastructure improvements, but rather "piggy backs" on other projects to add the extra "bells and whistles." The CRA can fund small improvement projects to building facades and property landscaping through small business grants.

"Basically the way the agency works is we allow the cities to bring forward the projects of what they would like to do in their borders, and we reserve money for that," Fall said. "The ball would be in your court to immediately come forward with projects to access CRA funds."

Commissioner Butch Bundy said, "The concept of the CRA I like is the tax dollars that are derived from this area are spent in this area. I think it's just a good opportunity to get more bang for a buck."

Fall said Longwood's participation in the redevelopment agency could also help the CRA out with a project to develop uniformed design standards for the corridor. As the corridor was developed before many land development codes were in place, the stretch of highway is blighted with signs. Longwood recently revamped its land development codes, and has seen increased redevelopment as a result, Mayor Dan Anderson said.

"We put a lot of time and effort into coming up with our new land and development code, and our goal was to stimulate redevelopment," Anderson said. "Nobody will say it to my face, but most other people around the county laughed at our idea, but we have seen tremendous results from it."

Holt said he viewed one of the biggest benefits of joining the CRA is the city will have some word in what is developed in the corridor.

"We won't have someone come in and build what they want and zoom they're gone," he said.

In particular, the city of Longwood has a redevelopment issue at the intersection of State Road 434 and U.S. Highway 17-92 On each corner of the intersection is a gas station that is closed. Three of the empty service stations are within the city limits.

"I think that bothers a lot of us because they come in and

The win was a total team effort as all 11 varsity players played and contributed to the team's best defensive See Preps, Page 9







Authorities are trying to trace the origins of the photos, and will be in contact with other jurisdictions as the investigation continues. It is believed that there are no local victims in this case.

17 Jan. 2004 We went on patrol yesterday it was a muddy mess. We have had rainy weather and road conditions are muddy with large puddles and pot holes.

We were headed back into Camp Marlboro and I was in the last of three vehicles of my patrol, I was looking ahead just in time to see this Iraqi girl slip in the mud. She got up and then slipped up
