GOP Leaders Seek To Restore Budget Cut

House-Senate Committee Suggests Compromise State Spending Bill

Main Fight In Senate

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—House Republican leaders agreed today to fight for restoration of about 300 million dollars of a \$2,947,000,000 cut in President Eisenhower's defense funds.

In so doing, they conceded they have no chance of restoring the \$1,200,000,000 Eisenhower has said he must have.

"We've got to face reality," said GOP Leader Joseph W. Martin Jr.

The decision was reached at a 90-minute closed session of the House Republican policy committee, a 50-man group comprising GOP leaders and key Republican members from all regions.

Fight In Senate
In effect, it meant the administration will have to make its main fight in the Senate to head off what the President believes to be crippling cuts in his \$6 billion dollar defense request.

The House Appropriation Committee recommended \$31,541,000,000 to run the Army, Navy and Air Force in the 12 months starting July 1. This was \$2,547,000,000 less than the President wanted.

More than half the reduction represented bookkeeping transactions which the President says he can live with. But he has said the rest must be restored to head off crippling cuts in Air Force procurement of airplanes and guided missiles.

Two Sanford Banks Reveal New Hours; Close On Saturdays

An announcement is being made today by the two Sanford banks of new banking hours which will be observed beginning with July 1.

Florida State Bank and the Sanford Atlantic National Bank jointly announced that they will observe a five-day week beginning July 1. The banks will be closed all day on Saturdays, according to the announcement.

The schedule of hours are: Monday through Friday, open from 9 a. m. until 1 p. m. and on Friday evening, from 5:30 to 8 p. m.

The Installment Loan Department, Walk-Up and Drive-In windows will be open Monday through Friday from 9 a. m. until 4 p. m. and on Friday evening from 5:30 until 8 p. m. They will also close all day on Saturdays.

The only holidays to be observed by the two banks will be New Year, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas.

In an effort to streamline banking services in Sanford and give take advantage of Sanford's banking services, the new hours were originated. The same number of hours will be observed in the banks open and working hours, the two banks pointed out.

Big Debate Expected On Removal Of Clock

Debate is expected to break out in earnest tonight over the question of whether or not the clock will be moved.

A public hearing has been set for tonight's meeting of the Board of Sanford City Commissioners on the removal of the clock from the intersection of First St. and Park Ave.

Bulk of the argument, so far over the removal of the obstruction at the intersection is seemingly sentimental in nature with the proponents on leaving the clock as it now stands located only by the fact that only one automobile has hit the huge base of concrete and steel.

Those in favor of moving the "direction-finder" say that the street will be safer and will open up the intersection to faster traffic and a more even flow of automobiles.

There is no indication, in advance of the public hearing, as to what may be the final outcome of the controversy.

In other matters to come before the "City Fathers", commissioners will discuss further the proposal to locate a docks and terminals project in Sanford along the lake. Geo and Jensen will be the engineers appearing before the commissioners.

Final plans for the Sanford Civic Center and the Goldens Recreational Area swimming pool will also be discussed at this evening's session, according to the agenda prepared for the meeting.

A request for the vacating of Third St. between Mellenville and San Marcos Avenue will come before the Board of Sanford City Commissioners for consideration tonight.

A request that land be sold from the city's well site; an application for a license to sell beer; the possibility for a public hearing on a rezoning recommendation; an authorization to buy a compressor for a fire station; the non-discriminated sign ordinance; aerial pictures of the city's fringe areas; and swimming pool admission fee are other items appearing on the agenda to be discussed at tonight's meeting.

Other items of business from the floor and from commissioners will also be considered.

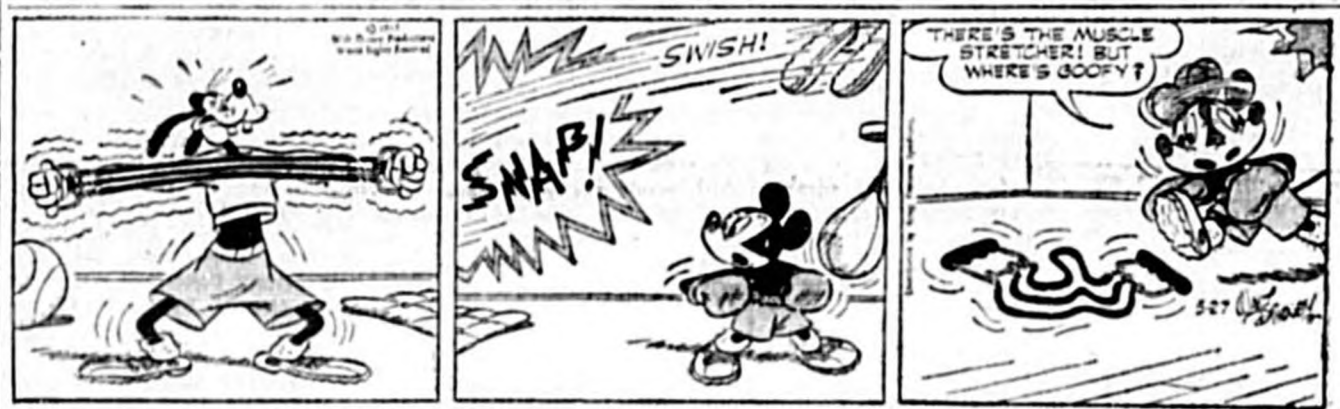

Now Is Time For More Progress, Aggressiveness In Our Country

There are some astounding figures released today in this month's issue of the Sem-O-Gram, a monthly rundown of happenings as seen by the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce manager.

Such figures are worthy of study by Sanford and Seminole County merchants and businessmen.

At the same time, other information came to this column through Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company surveys, that bears heavily on the necessity for Sanford merchants to "go after" more and more business from the growing population and the climbing economy.

The big thing pointed up in the Sem-O-Gram, which is in the mail today to Seminole County Chamber of Commerce members, is the fact that nearly \$15 million dollars will be released to payrolls, materials, contractors, and other sources in Seminole County for projects which will more than likely, be under way by July 1 or will be in the immediate planning stage to boost the economy of the area with the 12 months period beginning that date.

This estimate comes from an overall survey which merely touches the surface and takes into consideration only the big projects. For instance; it lists road contracts for the completion of 17-92 and work on Highway 46 which totals \$1 million; new interstate highway construction in Seminole County in the amount of \$4 million the City of Sanford capital improvement projects which come to a half million dollars; a new high school figured at \$800,000; commercial construction is figured at the very minimum to be \$1 million... home construction. The Sanford Naval Air Station at \$3,200,000.

Last year, in a similar report on retail trade increases, Sanford was shown as making the smallest percentage of gain of any county in Central Florida. The average increase in retail trade was 80 per cent, the increase in Sanford was 18 per cent. Other cities in Central Florida increased their retail trade from 80 to 167 per cent.

The projects now underway or soon to get underway presents an opportunity to local businessmen which should be met by a concentrated effort to keep Sanford and Seminole County's share of this money right here.

As the Sem-O-Gram points out "When business firms enjoy an increase in sales over former years it is easy to settle back completely and make no further effort for betterment."

Even though merchants and businessmen become static and make no effort to expand, bring more and better lines of merchandise in for the shopper to choose from, leave modernization to competitors—the shopper does not become stagnant.

The shopper begins to develop a new pattern for shopping. They go where there are thousands upon thousands of items to

Foreign News Commentary

Last week's good and bad news on the international balance sheet:

Cautiously, but with evidently increasing optimism, American and other officials spoke of the possibility that the first step toward a disarmament agreement with Soviet Russia may be taken soon.

The hope was based largely on the belief that the Soviet government is about ready at last to agree to a system of inspection that would guard the Western Allies against cheating.

For one thing, Russian economy is suffering from the cost of maintaining an enormous arms budget. For another, conviction is growing that Russian leaders realize the catastrophe which could hit the Soviet Union as

well as western countries in an atomic war.

President Eisenhower said at his press conference in Washington Thursday: "There has got to be progress in some kind of disarmament or there is going to be no reduction in world tensions."

But Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, voiced the pessimism of a strong group of officials in the armed forces and the State Department over the possibility of reaching any agreement which the Russians could not violate.

"We cannot trust the Russians on this or anything," Radford said. "The Communists have broken their word with every country with which they have made an agreement."

Guy Mollet, France's 22nd post-war premier, resigned after being

defeated by a vote of 250-213 in the National Assembly, the dominating house of Algeria.

There appeared to be no prospect that any successor to Mollet could form a government which would hold a safe majority in Parliament.

Mollet, a Socialist, fell on the 24th vote of confidence he had been compelled to seek in his nearly 18 months in office as head of a coalition cabinet. His term had been longer than that of any French premier since the war had ended — if enjoyed is the right word.

They even have the pink and green sections folded in with competitors advertising to attract them away from Sanford and Seminole County—a competition which draws millions and millions of dollars into the channels of economy of neighboring and out-of-county communities.

The growth of Sanford and Seminole County is tremendous—the economy is being boosted by millions upon millions of dollars—yet our shopping center growth, expansion, and beautification (as well as modernization) remains static and unchanging.

Do Sanford people realize that there are, according to figures of Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company, 7,739 stations in their telephone system here?

And by January 1, 1962, Southern Bell Telephone Company predicts that there will be 15,440 stations here. And Southern Bell is doing something about it! They've built a huge new dial exchange building here to take care of the growth—they've spent more than a million dollars because of their faith in the growth and prosperity of Sanford.

Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company's survey shows that at present there are 8,800 families in Sanford now and by January 1, 1962 there will be a little over 12,000 families here!

According to these figures, there are nearly as many families in Sanford now as there were individuals in 1948!

What's more, Southern Bell, in its survey, sets the population of Sanford at a figure estimated between 28 and 29 thousand people!

And what is Sanford doing about this tremendous growth?

Only one plan for growth and expansion has been announced recently—and as a matter of fact—the expansion actually wasn't announced through formal channels but came out in a plan whereby more land could be purchased to build larger and more modern quarters for their business.

What happens to this plan?

Supposedly good businessmen, in a round-about way, put a stop to the purchase of this new "dead" area because—the excuse was given—Seminole County might, in the next ten, twenty, twenty five, or maybe thirty years, want to build a new court house in doing this — the businessmen stopped at least \$4,000 per year in taxes from going into the coffers of their county to help, maybe in paying teachers better salaries and increase the economy; they stopped additional tax moneys from going into the city's treasury; they stopped a minimum \$100,000 building being erected on this "dead" property; they stopped the possibility of another business house being erected on First St.; they stopped immediately \$40,000 from going into the county's treasury; they stopped a first spurt in transactions for downtown property; and not telling how many other "shot in the arms" that might have taken place here to the betterment of Sanford.

It's another way to say that the "old fogyishness" put a stop to the progress of Sanford and Seminole County—the very same thing that has been holding Sanford back by the reins for too long. Someone must pop the whip and pull loose from this type of community stalemate.

This is the time to sit up and take notice! It's the time for growth, progress, aggressiveness—and better business for everybody!

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Stassen Moving Toward New Post

WASHINGTON UP — The movement of Harold E. Stassen toward a new and important position within the Republican Party seems now to be an established fact. He has not reached it yet, but Stassen is moving.

The current issue of Newsweek relates that President Eisenhower's appointments secretary, Bernard M. Shanley, recently was discussing privately some of the Republican presidential possibilities for 1960. He mentioned several and added:

"You would make a big mistake to underestimate Stassen's ability as a campaigner."

Political writers who buried Stassen last year after his fluky

efforts to prevent re-nomination of Vice President Richard M. Nixon now start taking another look. Stassen still is a long way from a position which would enable him to make a substantial nomination. He has powerful political enemies including most conservative Republicans and, especially, the partisans of Vice President Nixon.

Present Job Helpful
Stassen's return from political obscurity, of course, must come via investigation of his job as about wholly from his job as United States disarmament negotiator. For some weeks now he has been receiving headline credit for some of the progress toward an armaments agreement with the Kremlin. There has not been much progress, but even a little has been enough to give Stassen much urgently needed good publicity.

Top News In Brief

LONDON — Moscow says the "glimmering of a constructive solution" to world disarmament problems today in the U.S. promise to meet Russia half-way in working out their differences. A broadcast by Moscow Radio said the Soviets will give "the most careful consideration" to practical proposals for a first step in reducing the world's arms and armies.

ATOMIC TEST SITE, Nev. — The United States today fired the first of a long series of atomic test blasts amidst a world atmosphere of disarmament talks and controversy over radiation effects on humans. The "battled" nuclear device was touched off in the pre-dawn darkness of the Nevada proving grounds this morning—the 45th detonation in the United States' program of nuclear and thermo-nuclear "peace-lies-in-strength" weapons testing.

Water Department To Get Automatic Control System

Another move to modernize the city's water system was approved by the Board of Sanford City Commissioners last night. An automatic system is to be authorized at an estimated cost of approximately \$400,000. The system, pointed out by City Manager Warren E. Knowles, "will be so arranged that buzzers, lights, and other mechanical devices will notify the man on duty (Continued On Page 10)

12-Year-Old Boy Receives Belated Acclaim As Hero

CHICAGO — A boy, 12, who saved a baby's life by breaking the infant's fall from a second story window, won belated recognition today as a hero.

Little Johnny Thomas had kept mum about his role in the incident last Saturday because he was ashamed that he hadn't caught the falling infant.

Doctors at Garfield Park Hospital said the baby would have been killed if Jimmy had not broken his fall. The infant suffered a skull fracture, they said, but will probably live. Jimmy tearfully owned up to his heroism Monday under questioning from his father. The boy said he felt guilty because the baby slipped through his arms and had to be taken to a hospital. A neighbor who had seen the baby fall later mentioned the incident and asked about the "little boy who saved the baby's life." The word spread around the district, but nobody knew who the little boy was. Jimmy's father, Leonard, also became curious and questioned his son closely about "this little boy." "It was me, Daddy," Jimmy said, and burst out crying. "I caught him but I couldn't hold him."

In the original proposal submitted to the city. Commissioners asked that the firm of engineers conduct a survey with a "person to person" contact with people expected to make Sanford Docks and Terminals shipments through the proposed facility to comply with what city Manager Warren E. "We will discuss in our report," Brady revealed, the proposed methods of financing, determine what part of the facility should be started at this time, and other pertinent facts to be considered such as the type of port authority to set up. Tax Money Search Begins

TALLAHASSEE — The Senate passed the compromise 616 million dollar general state spending bill today and immediately embarked on a search for tax money to help the 67 counties finance their share of the teacher pay program.

The bill, calling for expenditure of 64 million more than present revenue sources will support in the coming two years, except through following protests from several senators that it was being "railroaded."

Adopted by the House Monday, the measure now goes to the governor who has the power to veto individual items. It is the biggest spending bill ever passed by a Florida Legislature, providing an unprecedented construction program and big pay raises for nearly every official and employee.

Sens. Douglas Stenstrom, Sanford, and Charley Johns, Starke, forced a short delay but in the end the bill was approved. The Senate at first voted 18-16 to take it up immediately, but others jumped up and said they would vote against the whole bill if they were not given a chance to see what compromises it contained.

The Senate embarked on a wealth of House messages which also delayed its special order calendar, topped by a proposed increase in auto license tag fees to raise \$1 million in additional revenue.

An afternoon session was scheduled to make up for lost time.

Commissioner Earl Higginbotham, absent from the previous meeting when the question came up for discussion, said that "the State Road Department now uses the system of placing concrete blocks in the right-of-way to separate traffic lanes."

Morris Moses appeared before the Board of Commissioners to ask that the clock "put a smile on my father's as a landmark" be allowed to remain.

The Civil Defense staff for Seminole county was given a current survival plan by Dr. A. B. The instructions prepared by the director set up the problems, the territory involved and those responsible for the CD activities in various sections of the county.

The mission is set forth in Part Two, and the following section covers the execution of the plan. This latter breaks down phases of the mission and assigns staff members to the job of successfully performing the task.

Part Four handles the plan for Administration, Supply and Transportation while the next part of the instructions covers Control and Communications.

Maps and evacuation plans for surrounding counties make up the appendix of the plan. The procedure outlined is the result of a comprehensive review of general instructions and a condensation of notes of directives that have been issued. The tremendous task performed by the local director has drawn commendation from many sources.

From Orange county's director came the comment "I want to congratulate you on a job well done. We are proud of our northern neighbor."

Dr. Peterson, explaining the setup, said that the plan is to be completed by additions of the section chiefs on the staff.
