Britain's Vietnam Role Described

By RICHARD SALTUS Associated Press Writer LOS ANGELES (AP) — A newly released section of the Pentagon papers describes Britain's attempts to mediate a Vietnam war settlement as "sometimes embarrassing" to the United States by spotlighting apparent contradictions in President Lyndon B. Johnson's peace-seeking efforts.

The study says the United States brought Britain into the negotiating process in 1966-1967 only to help British Prime Minister Harold Wilson politically and because of the importance of British support for U.S. Vietnam policies. Johnson's secret diplomatic efforts from 1965 to 1966 are described in four previously unissued volumes of the Pentagon

war study introduced as evidence in the trial of Daniel Ellsberg and Anthony Russo, charged with espionage, conspiracy and theft in connection with the leak of the study to news media. The Pentagon documents were released to the press Monday. "The eagerness of British leaders to participate with maximum visibility in bringing peace to Vietnam... was sometimes embarrassing to the United States, which greatly preferred confidential dealings with a minimum of participants," the study said.

Britain was a go-between for peace feelers which were known by the code name "Sunflower." That diplomatic effort ended in early 1967 when Johnson resumed bombing of North Vietnam following a suspension during the Tet lunar new year. The Pentagon study said that among sources of embarr

Vietnam Peace Welcomed As U.S. Mourns Johnson

Copley News Service An elated word that week welcomed even a fragile peace in Vietnam after a seemingly endless conflict across Indochina that had cost the lives of more than 45,000 Americans and more than 1 million Vietnamese. Even as the hour drew near for an uneasy Vietnam truce, there was a sadness across the land, too, as the nation paid tribute to Lyndon Baines Johnson, 36th president of the United States, who died of a heart attack in his native Texas at the age of 64. In Washington, thousands of

Americans filed by casket of the dead ex-president as he lay in state in the Capitol Rotunda. Later hundreds of dignitaries and friends led by President Nixon attended funeral services in which Mr. Johnson was eulogized as the "tall man with giant character." Then the American leader was taken home for burial in the Pedernales River country he had loved so well. The former president, who had launched the nation on a course of sweeping domestic reforms in the turbulent 1960s, died less than a week before peace came to Vietnam — a peace which had eluded him during his five years in the White House.

Confident with a return to peace, Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird suspended the draft of U.S. troops to Vietnam, including the assignment of about 2,000 men who had received their orders to go there. He also announced that he would negotiate it with the dead ex-president as he lay in state in the Capitol Rotunda.

Stennis Condition Is Listed 'Very Serious'

Stennis, a power in the Senate's Southern bloc and an ardent supporter of a strong U.S. military, was in "very serious" condition today after being shot twice during a hold-up in front of his home here. A spokesman at Walter Reed Army Medical Center said at 6 a.m., EST, today that chances

were "guarded" that the 71-year-old Mississippi Democrat would recover. Stennis is chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee. However, the spokesman said Stennis was "conscious and breathing comfortably." The next briefing on the senator's condition was scheduled for 4 p.m., EST. Stennis underwent 6 1/2 hours of surgery Tuesday night and

early today for bullet wounds in the lower rib cage—the most serious wound—and in the left thigh. Hospital spokesman Maj. Frank Garland said Stennis was "conscious and breathing comfortably" after the operation ended at 3:30 a.m., EST. The senator's vital signs—heart rate, pulse, blood pressure and respiration—were all described as "stable."

Asked about the length of the surgery, Maj. Garland said it was "consistent with the extent of the wounds." The hospital's "very serious" classification is the most serious classification it has. Stennis was shot at 7:40 p.m. Tuesday as he alighted from his car after returning to his home. Police were looking for two teenagers in connection with the shooting.

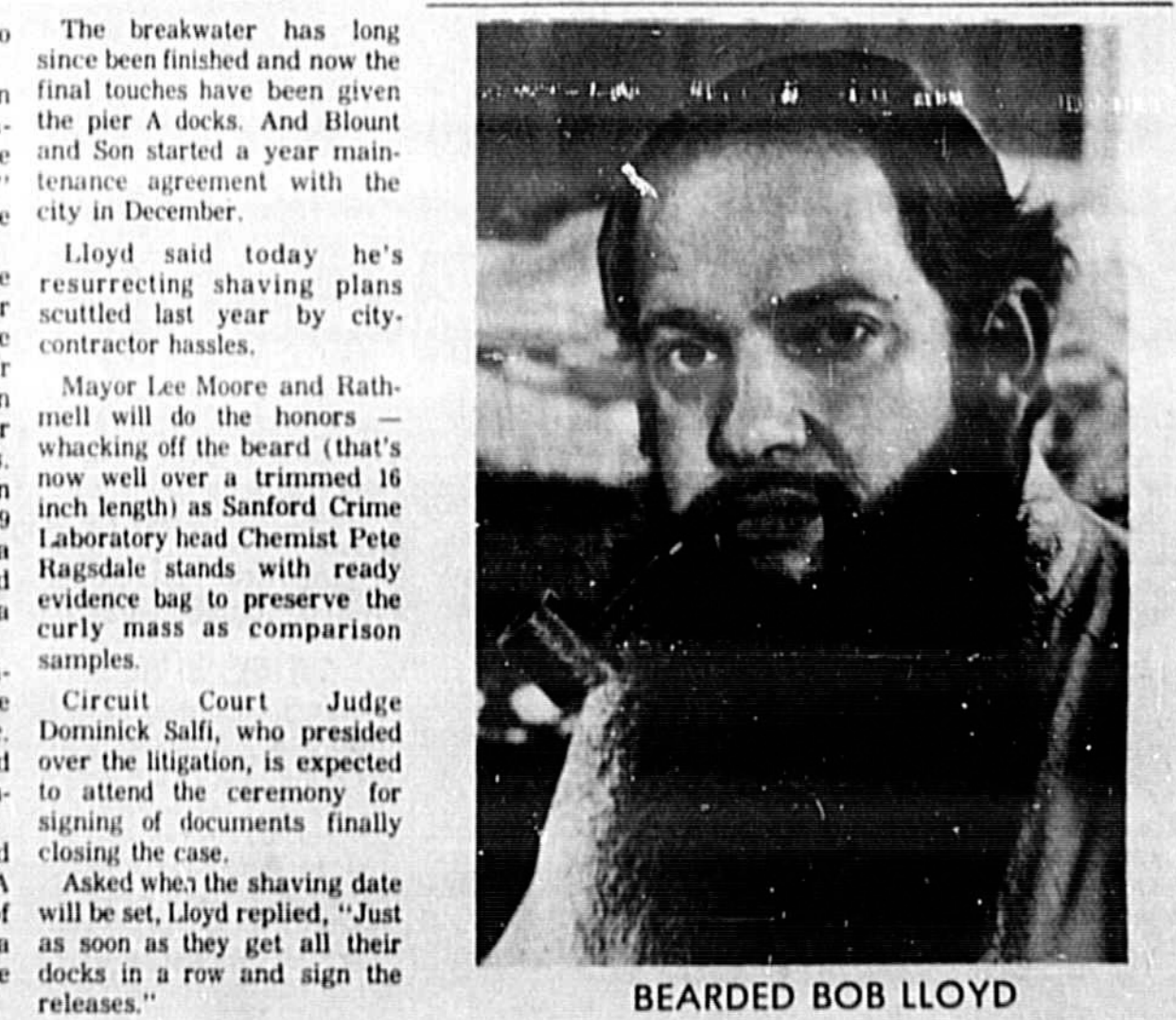

 City Attorney Thomas Freeman explained the city charter provides the council shall meet in regular session at least monthly. However, in deciding on holding business meetings each week, there was no formal motion on the matter, only a consensus of council.

 Freeman stated that all such letters should be referred to a study committee encompassing the individuals in charge of the area in question. These individuals, he said, should research the issues to be presented in order that council might have something tangible to pursue.
 Relative to the tree resolution, Freeman said developers removing trees will be required to replace two trees for one removed and a certain diameter size will be stipulated.

Drummond Wants Reports On County Road Projects

 A comparison report on the five-year Semmons County Road program was requested by Commission-er Greg Drummond to allow the board members to be cognizant of what is still in the program from the original reports, what delays have been encountered, and the presently approved schedule.
 County Engineer Bill Bush said that the E. Johns (Osteen) bridge which was originally scheduled for the 1971-72 program with E.O.W. costs of \$30,000, Engineering, \$20,000, and construction at \$1,400,000 is now in a delayed construction status until 1975-76, with costs expected to be \$41 million dollars. He said that since the funds had not been used in the years they were available, this was one cause for further delay, plus the fact that no new funds were allocated to the bridge program by Congress.
 Work on 3419 from Osteen to 17-22 (It was originally scheduled to be done in 1971-72) has been delayed until 1974-75. Numbered highways. No construction is shown in the five-year plan.
 Secondary Road Program
 Right of Way on 419 has slipped a year and will probably slip another. S-434 (from 14 to S-427), though slipped, is about on schedule most recently discussed by D.O.T. The construction costs are up from \$300,000 to \$1,100,000 and right of way costs are up from \$100,000 to \$130,000, for a total increase of \$830,000.
 S-434 from 430 to 1-4 is strung out to completion in 1975-76 utilizing \$300,000 contribution of local funds. The right of way costs have gone up from \$100,000 to \$150,000 and construction costs soared from \$80,000 to \$1,500,000 for a total increase on this project of \$820,000.
 "There's not much point in reading the rest," Bush opined, "in view of the magnitude of the increases shown in the amount of \$1,800,000 on S-434 alone."
 Removed from the five-year secondary road program are plans to improve the intersection at SH 436 and Howell Branch Road; Jessup Causeway ecological study; Osteen bypass, Redbug Lake Rd. outer loop study, S-15 in Lake Monroe. Also removed were S-46 right of way east to Volusia county; 1-4 and S-461 interchange, south west 1-4 bypass and Lake Howell Road in Tangletown.
 An encouraging note was injected with the addition of a Maitland Boulevard-1-4 connector road at the Orange county line; Aloma Avenue intersection improvement, transition to two lanes and drainage at Goldenrod. These are cooperative projects largely in Orange County.
 Bush said that the cost of railroad signals is growing much higher than estimates and are still taking an exorbitantly long period of time to process to completion. "We need state and federal help on the program or legislative to rule it."
 "Increases in right of way costs and construction costs during the long processing period of all projects makes the best efforts at five-year planning suspect," Bush continued. "The system is not working. And these facts should be borne in mind when a bond issue is being considered. Neither of the former road bond issues were even close to sufficient for the final costs."

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1st Offense Convictions Are Sought For DWI

 TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Tougher law enforcement and more first offense convictions are needed to get the drinking driver off Florida highways, the Chairman of the House Criminal Justice Committee says.
 Rep. Jack Shreve, D-Merritt Island, said review of state's laws against driving while intoxicated will be a top priority of his panel during the 1973 legislative session.
 Shreve's Criminal Justice Committee is one of six House panels which held organizational meetings today to prepare members for the session beginning April 3.
 "We have to take a realistic approach to do whatever is necessary to get the drinking driver off the road," said Shreve, noting that 40 out of every 100 fatal accidents involve drinking drivers.
 "We will strive for more convictions under our DWI statutes, particularly first offense convictions. We also need tougher enforcement and at the same time we have to do something to cure the problem through rehabilitation," he added.
 Other priority projects this session are increasing the penalty for the sale of hard drugs and completion of a criminal code revision "to make it more workable and clearer for both law enforcement officers and the general public," Shreve said.
 Shreve scheduled 14 speakers to address his committee's opening session and asked each to recommend improvements to the state's criminal justice system. The speakers included judges, police chiefs, criminology and law professors and state officials.
 The House Health and Rehabilitative Services Committee, chaired by Ir. Richard Hodes, D-Tampa, also planned an orientation meeting today before its members plunge into the controversial abortion issue.
 "After the Supreme Court's decision and Atty. Gen. Shubin's ruling, abortion is bound to be the major issue again," said David Pingree, Shreve's legislative secretary.

'Hot' Name for '76 Is Rocky, by Golly!

Talks with the state Republican officials, who were tapped in a kind of mini-survey, disclose surprising 1976 presidential interest in Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York.

His own state leaders say there is a least a 50 per cent chance he will run for a fifth term next year, and they think he could win it.

Even in a reasonably conservative bastion like Illinois there is a lot of Rockefeller talk, though the state has its own moderate presidential prospect, Sen. Charles Percy.

What this man is talking about, of course, is Rockefeller's evident bent toward a more conservative stance.

The genuine interest in Rocky is bad news for Percy. Most leaders mention him but few do so favorably.

Asked about Percy, a Rockefeller man laughs and says: "He's in the position we used to be in."

With all this, I heard no forecasts of Rockefeller's nomination. The southern thing is still a handicap.

On paper, at least, the real edge today belongs to Vice President Spiro Agnew. Niggling stuff about him not knowing state party people doesn't count for much.

If Agnew gets his chances and builds status with the party, Mr. Nixon, chairman and chief executive officer of Extencard, Inc., one of the "big four" of the 40.

Tax-Pay Hospitals Holding Cost Down

The question is, who is going to do it? With contributions down and federal construction funds dwindling, the community groups and religious orders traditionally relied upon are finding the task economically impossible.

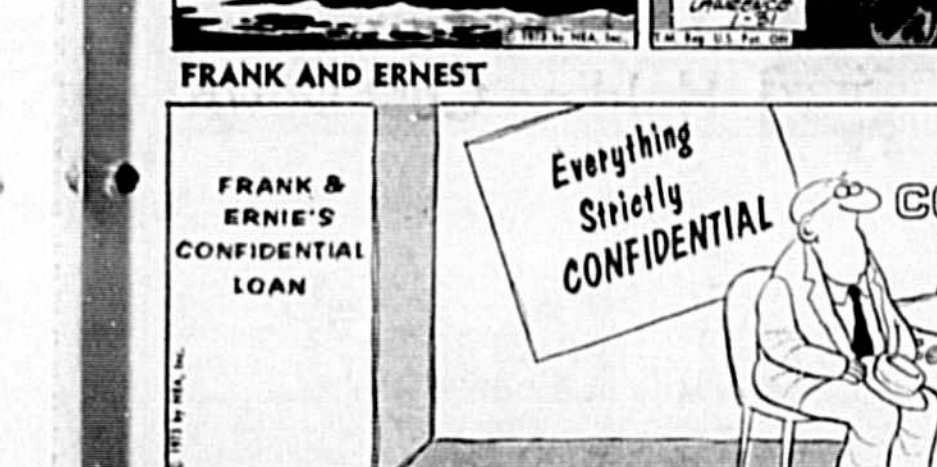
The answer may be investor-owned hospital companies, which are moving into the field in growing numbers. Today, 40 such companies own more than 500 hospitals in the United States.

Thanks to the application of modern management techniques to the construction and operation of hospitals, he says, investor-owned hospitals are proving they can arrest spiraling costs, expand service and keep pace with advancing medical technology—and make a profit.

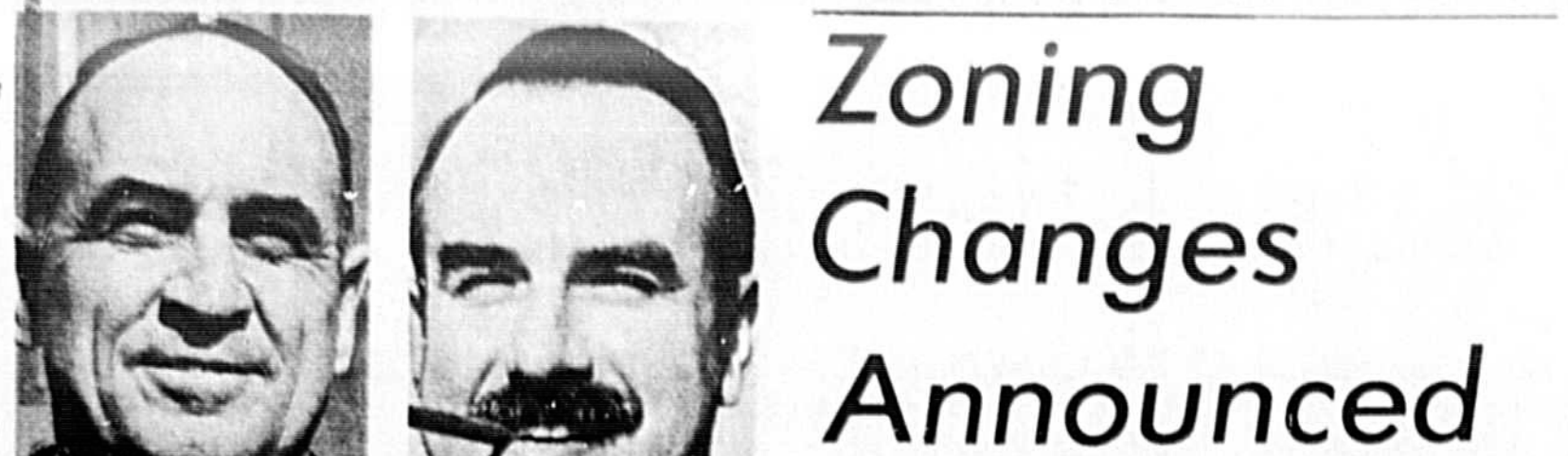

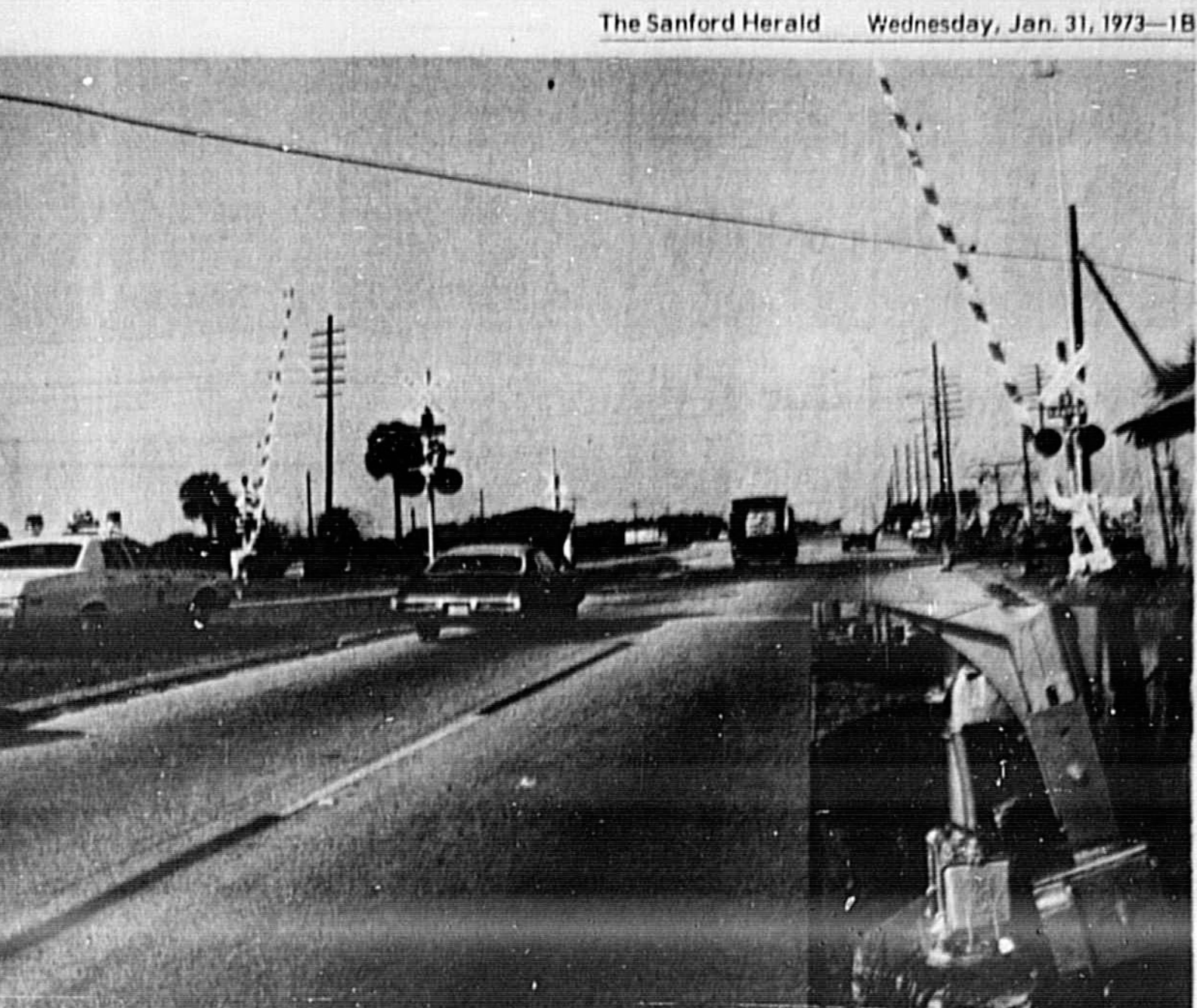

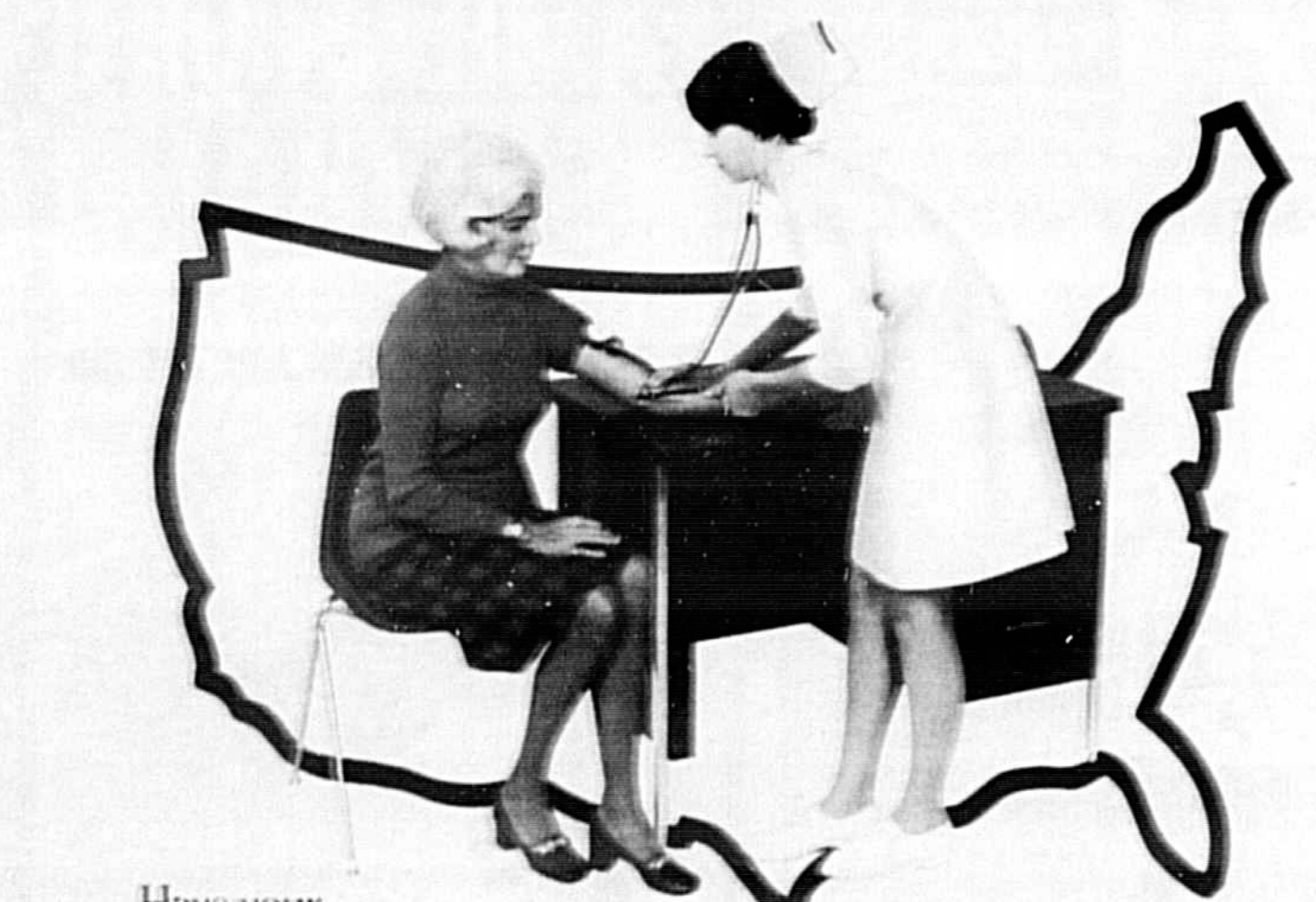

Mayonnaise Can Be Used On Low-Fat Diet

One question often asked... "Mayonnaise is used on a low-cholesterol, low-saturated diet?"

The answer is "Yes." Although mayonnaise appears to be a solid fat, it is a mixture of polyunsaturated oil with vinegar or lemon juice beaten with egg which is necessary to form the emulsion. The amount of cholesterol from the egg yolk is not enough to be prohibitive (only six milligrams in a tablespoon of mayonnaise). It is the combination of the low-cholesterol content with the high ratio of polyunsaturates to saturates that makes mayonnaise suitable for use in the fat-controlled diet.

The ingredients in mayonnaise in addition to the oil, egg, and vinegar are water, salt, sugar, lemon juice and spices.

HOT TUNA OPEN FACE SANDWICHES

Stuffed Mushrooms Delicious

 Leave it to the French to come up with a family dish that could substitute for some, for meatloaf. This is Stuffed Mushrooms à la Française. These are filled with a mixture of lean ground beef, pate de foie (liver pate) and biscotte crumbs (crisp, French, rust-like toast) and seasoned with herbs and spices. The sauce combines beef broth, chopped mushrooms, stems, a beautiful wine and gherkins. You can make your own bread crumbs if biscotte crumbs are no available in your special food store. These little mushrooms also may be served 15 hours d'ouverts. STUFFED MUSHROOMS À LA FRANÇAISE
 12 large mushrooms
 1 pound lean ground beef
 1 can (4-oz) pate de foie
 1/2 cup chopped shallots
 1/2 cup fine biscotte (toast) crumbs
 1 egg
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/4 cup chopped parsley
 SAUCE:
 1/4 cup butter
 Chopped mushrooms stems
 1/4 cup flour
 1 cup condensed beef broth
 1 cup French Beaujolais wine
 1/4 cup chopped cornichons
 Salt and pepper to taste
 Remove stems from mushrooms and reserve for sauce. Mix beef, pate, half the shallots, egg, salt, pepper, parsley and crumbs. Mix well and use mixture to stuff mushroom caps. Place in a single layer in a shallow pan and bake in a preheated 350 degree oven for 35 to 40 minutes. Serve with cornichon-wine sauce. Melt butter, chop mushroom stems and saute with remaining shallots until golden. Stir in flour. Gradually stir in beef broth and wine. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until sauce bubbles and thickens. Stir in cornichons, salt and pepper to taste. Makes about 6 servings.

Crooms High Is Partially Burned



46 YEAR OLD SCHOOL IN FLAMES

Controversial "hot potato" Crooms High School in Sanford ignited into a roaring inferno early this morning when fire of an undetermined origin destroyed the administration building and four classrooms. It was the first major school fire in Sanford in 31 years, and according to Fire Chief G. M. Harriett, "Arson hasn't been ruled out."

Replace Or Convert Crooms Considered

With the fire damage, Crooms is insured for \$152,800 on that portion which was burned. This is enough funding to build only 7,640 square feet as replacement, according to estimates by Walter Teague, school finance officer.

Also worthy of consideration is the promised \$143,550 from millage money for air-conditioning the old facility, which now must have part replaced before this can be completed.

Thus, it would be financially sound to utilize these moneys toward new room construction at Seminole High School to bring that facility up to 2,400 students, the maximum now for county high schools, Mrs. Bryant explained.

Report Is Denied On Fire Hydrants

But we turned them back on and on a few occasions stems were broken off inside by inexperienced firemen" and later repaired.

"But we have yet to find a National Standard hydrant that was not usable," he concluded.

Concern about the workability of fire hydrants came into focus after a building burned down in Orlando when firemen found the nearby fire hydrant dry.

Among those who will be present to speak are B. C. Gunkin, of Clark Dietz Associates, Engineers; Kenneth Dyer, Florida Power Corporation; Thomas G. Freeman, attorney; and Harold G. Hartsock, C.P.A.

Principal Edward Blackshire said portions of some records are on microfilm at the County School office but many are feared lost in the fire.

Disney To Sell 965 Acres

Walt Disney Productions today announced plans to sell apartment sites to private developers for construction of housing to meet the needs of Walt Disney World employees and other in Central Florida who may wish to live near the Vacation Kingdom.

Don B. Tatum, Chairman of the Board of Walt Disney Productions, said the move represents a major advancement in the company's land development policies in response to the request of thousands of employees and potential residents.

The new developments will be administered by the Madeira Land Co., a subsidiary of Walt Disney Productions under the supervision of the newly created Real Estate Department.

Robert P. Foster has been named to head the new department with offices at Lake Buena Vista.

First sites offered for development will be in the City of Lake Buena Vista near the Motor Inn Plaza and the Buena Vista golf course which have already been developed by the Disney organization and its subsidiaries. The initial offering will involve about 65 acres on the east edge of the 27,000-acre Disney site.

With a few weeks an additional 900 acres north of U.S. 192 and west of Reedy Creek (in the southwest corner of the Disney property) will be offered for development under master plans now being finalized.

The early morning fire that partially destroyed Crooms High School, an all-Ninth Grade facility at Sanford, may have been the push needed to persuade the School Board to make room additions to the present Seminole High School to accommodate 800 Crooms students, thus leaving the delapidated building for a vocational school.

This move had been suggested on previous occasions by Jean Bryant, School Board member, but was never given serious consideration by the board due to a shortage of funds.

Now, with a school millage election coming on March 13, to raise funds for air-conditioning the older county schools, as well as build new facilities in South Seminole, and with the need to make repairs and renovations at Crooms, the opportunity may have arrived that the board will consider changes suggested earlier by Mrs. Bryant.

The board vice chairman commented, when consulted by The Herald today, on the question of replacing Crooms, that she had planned to bring up the matter of utilizing Crooms as a vocational school during the board's next session set for

State Fire Marshalls were to begin probing the smoking ashes and twisted wreckage of the 46-year-old Crooms High School administration building at Sanford today after it was destroyed in a pre-dawn fire.

Sanford Fire Chief G. M. Harriett said arson hasn't been ruled out at the school that recently has been a center of controversy because of its alleged poor condition.

"It's the first major school fire in Sanford in the 31 years I've been on the department," the chief said.

Harriett said the crew of a passing train reported the fire at 2:13 a. m. and within minutes

when the first two engine companies arrived the blaze had eaten through the auditorium roof and was licking the interior of the offices.

Firemen used bolt cutters to gain entry to the fenced and locked campus.

Firemen said they were hampered by lack of water pressure after running long hoses from three hydrants within a block radius of the sprawling school complex.

Police notified the operator at the city's main water plant and pressure to the eastern section of Sanford was cut to allow greater fire flow to the Gold-sboro fire.

Hugh Carlton, director of Auxiliary Service for the

District School Board, said the fire destroyed four classrooms, offices, the auditorium and school records room.

At 8 a. m. firemen were still pouring water on the school and housing remaining pockets of flame feeding on the rich beams and wooden floors in the 1926 building.

"I'm afraid the records have sustained considerable fire and water damage," Carlton said. "We haven't been able to get into the room yet."

He said some of the valuable records were stored in fire retardant filing cabinets.

Individual records follow students each year. Over 800 ninth graders are enrolled at Crooms this year. Also stored in

3 POW Releases Officially Denied

SAIGON (AP)—The U.S. Command and other official sources denied a report today that three American prisoners of the Viet Cong had been released and flown back to Saigon aboard a U.S. helicopter.

Command spokesmen said they checked with every available source within the system set up for prisoner recovery under the Paris peace agreement and found nothing to substantiate the report.

The report was based on an account given by a U.S. Army officer who claimed to have been on the recovery mission. He gave a detailed account, saying the prisoners were "fantastically happy" and "jumped all over" their rescuers.

He added that three prisoners had been given candy and cigarettes by the Viet Cong before they were released and were flown back to the Saigon Army hospital that will be the receiving point for American prisoners released and returned to U.S. control in the Saigon region.

The U.S. Command at first had no comment on the report when queried by The Associated Press. But there have often been delays of an hour or more in official disclosures of past prisoner releases.

The command and other official sources, including the hospital's executive officer, said later they had no information to substantiate the reported POW release.
