Bible Conference Is Of Major Importance For Advancement Of County

With the announcement, last spring, that an inter-denominational Bible conference and missionary home would be established on a 300-acre tract of land at the eastern edge of the city limits of Longwood, central Florida awoke to the fact that a real effort had been put forth to make Seminoles County known in religious circles over the world.

The conference and the home were for years the dream of Dr. E. J. Pace, a nationally known Bible teacher and religious cartoonist. After Dr. Pace had successfully interested enough wealthy laymen in the project, he and his associates began at once to search for a suitable location. Competing with at least two other well known cities of the state in an effort to locate the project, Longwood, through the tireless efforts of a few of its most zealous citizens, finally succeeded in landing it and its addition to the social and religious life of central Florida is expected to be a boon to the entire state.

Work of clearing the huge tract for the erection of the first buildings has been under way for several weeks. Well known landscape architects have been employed to plan the entire tract. Contractors will soon have emen on

SQUAB RAISING BEAUTIFICATION IN LONGWOOD OF MANY LAKES HUGE INDUSTRY CALLED HELPFUL

Farm of J. A. Bistline Said to Be One Of Largest Of Kind In State Of Florida Today; Many Poultry Farms There

The largest squab farm in the state is located in the town of Longwood and the property of J. A. Bistline, one of the best known poultry fanciers in the United States, according to the Longwood Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Bistline, who has won blue ribbons with his poultry showing not only in this, but in northern and eastern states, is said to be one of the most prominent workers in the state in the effort to advance the poultry industry of Florida. His experience with the poultry, both for show and for commercial purposes, have been of material aid to hundreds of Florida poultrymen and he is considered an authority by many poultry associations.

That his squab raising for commercial purposes is a success is proven by the fact that each year his business is expanding. He has repeatedly increased his stock in an effort to keep abreast of the demand, and with the growth of central Florida cities, that demand is growing by leaps and bounds.

Practically every hotel in this part of the state uses a squab from the farm of Mr. Bistline.

Headquarters for the county poultry organizations have long been centered here. Various organizations, formed for the purpose of co-operating in the profitable production of high class table and show fowls, have been formed by Longwood citizens. Through their efforts, other towns in the county have been induced to take up the work.

Flowing Well District Of County East Of Longwood Called Good Truck Land

The flowing well district east of Longwood, in the vicinity of Lake Jessup and that section of land containing the Wells, is becoming better known each year as excellent ground on which to produce profitable crops. A number of enterprising farmers have added to their already productive other crops, such as lettuce and beans.

Numerous highlands in the south end of the county have been planted to citrus and orange groves. Many of these are also in the flowing well ground and receive that underground irrigation which has contributed so much to Sanford's successful citrus industry.

Town Advantages Service Electric Is Shown By Several Contractor For Wire Improved Highways Work At Pace Track

Longwood is the hub of a network of county and state highways which are expected to send thousands of motorists through this section each year. Located directly on the present State Highway, between Sanford and Orlando, its route is a main link which will connect the new state highway No. 1, which will be completed during 1927, with the highway No. 17, a project now in the building, early spring.

In addition to these main arteries, there is a road leading north to Eustis, a branch to Lake Wales and to San-land Springs, and the Longwood East Canal highway is on the program for completion within the next 12 months. A new 100-foot hard surfaced road is now being completed from the present State Highway to the Seminola Race Course, which has three outlets to the southeast of the town proper.

The Black Bear Trail, a road named of the state highway No. 3, will upon its completion, be the main route between Jacksonville and all cities to the south. Thousands of tourists who now travel south down the east coast will be turned to the Black Bear Trail upon leaving Jacksonville.

Curving around the shores of many beautiful lakes, the roads in the vicinity of the town are incomparable as pleasure drives. Many sections of the county, long known for their natural beauties to only a few, will be accessible to every motorist.

Several of the roads on the county's three year program cut the heart of a section of Seminola county that will delight the eye of tourists and visitors alike.

Was Member Of Lincoln's Guard

First Citizen Describes Scenes Of Early Days In The County

Miles upon miles of virgin timber land, sand trails, and threads through the forest lands showing that man has set his foot upon the country. Indians, occasionally a trader, wild life in abundance, privation that would kill the strongest of men in the and spirit—that was central Florida in November of 1875.

The early days of Mr. Henck's life after he finished school were spent as a civil engineer, during which time he laid out the town of Longwood, near Boston, which he named the town of Longwood, Florida, and in the Navy the United States. While in the navy Mr. Henck circled the globe, becoming infatuated with the idea, this having considerable bearing upon his decision to locate Florida. It was while he was in the navy that President Lincoln was assassinated and he is the last surviving member of the Federal Guard of Honor, placed over Lincoln's body as it lay in state in Independence Hall, Philadelphia.

It was shortly after this that Mr. Henck decided to come to Florida. Together with his wife, who bore her maiden name Mary A. Brewster, a daughter-in-law of William Brewster, Elder of the Pilgrims of Mayflower fame, he set out for the land he was choosing. Mr. Henck described Jacksonville as being a mere village and states that Sanford is only one shack and there were only two homes in Orlando besides an Indian trading post.

Not being able to afford the luxury of a horse or a mule, he was traveling on foot and pushed on through Sanford, Longwood where he homesteaded the present townsite and additional acres. At that time there was a railroad south of Jacksonville. Mr. Henck and his wife lived for months in a tent cooked over an open fire. There was an abundance of game food was to be had in plenty and venison, the finest of rabbit and all the delicacies of the forest and stream, but for three years without sugar or coffee. It was in 1883 that Mr. Henck built the house he occupies today. It was a fine long leaf pine and has never been altered since its construction. It stands at the bend of the highway just before you enter Longwood from the north.

Mr. Henck by this time had homesteaded many acres, had wealth from natural resources, he sought to find a source by which he could market this wealth to the world and to bring in other cities and towns in the state. Transportation was the key, so Mr. Henck went north and named a railroad and the charter was granted to the Florida Railroad, E. W. Henck, president, and in 1880 construction was started from Sanford, Florida. The plant system was through to Tampa.

It was in the early days of the lumber business that Mr. Henck's business and later on he extended to San Francisco, California, and other parts of the world.

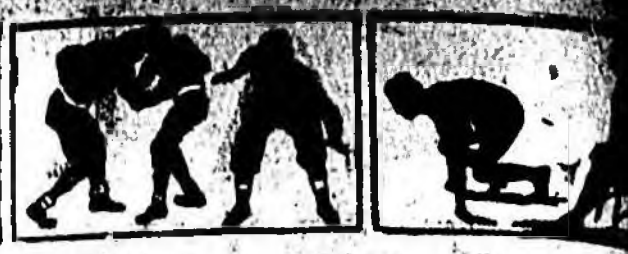

Three Undefeated Teams in Big Ten Conference Risk Their Titles Today

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Three undefeated teams in each of the two major conferences today risked their titles in the gridiron contest.

Purdue and Northwestern, both with flawless Big Ten records, met today in a battle of equivalent to elimination in the Western conference race. Cornell and the Oklahoma Sooners, Missouri Valley elevens.

Northwestern and Purdue were scheduled in the feature of the day today, before a Northwestern homecoming throng, swelled by a contingent of Boiler-makers supporters to tax the 41,000 capacity New Dyche Stadium.

The attraction of a game between two undefeated teams was added to a spectacular duel between the Purple and the Maroon, Purdue's Captain.

Michigan, on the other hand, expected only moderate difficulty in defeating Wisconsin but the Wolverines were spurred by Yost's insistence that only a sweeping triumph would put the team in contention to turn back Ohio a week.

A homecoming Chicago crowd of almost half the student body of the University of Illinois, gathered to watch the Illini and Maroon renew their ancient rivalry. The Illinois team favored to win by no great margin for all of Chicago's recent ill fortune.

The air was tense, but over the game outcome and not because of a groundlessly rumored break between the two schools over the number of Illini handsmen to be seated on the sidelines. The band in all its glory led the Illini delegation and officials waved the last of the vagrant reports away.

Another homecoming throng descended on Iowa's stadium for the game with Minnesota, in which the Northerners were favored to outdrive the Hawkeyes. Victory meant an outside conference chance for each eleven.

Gallant Indiana swarmed into Southend for a non-conference tilt with Notre Dame, with the Rockne men regarding the game of chief importance in polishing their offense for use next week against Ohio's varsity journeyed to Michigan to watch the Wolverines play.

In the valley, Missouri had much at stake against Oklahoma's Sooners, looming as a title possibility, but the 1925 conference champions were favored to win. Grinnell's strong squad was given an edge over Kansas and the Oklahoma Aggies, although regarded somewhat weak, were given a good chance against Washington, of St. Louis.

The Kansas Aggies were at Marquette while Iowa State, Drake and Nebraska varieties were idle.

In the nine games scheduled, the clashes between Alabama and Kentucky and the game between Sewanee and Tennessee were outstanding.

The Crimson with five conference victories and Tennessee with three, met in the stiffest opposition of the season in their endeavor to hold a winning pace to the season title.

Couch Wad sent his men against the Blue Grays, while Tennessee encountered Sewanee's strong aggregation.

Tulane and the Mississippi Aggies came to grips on Green Wave territory in New Orleans, and Vanderbilt's rapid scoring combination was in Atlanta for a clash with Georgia Tech's Golden Tornado.

Washington and Lee, after a week's rest was ready for what over Virginia might offer, and Georgia's Bulldog faced Auburn at Athens.

In other conference combats, Florida met Clemson, Virginia Polytechnic and South Carolina came to grips and North Carolina University took the field against Virginia Military Institute.

Maryland's buddies went into inter-sectional combat with Yale at New Haven in the outstanding cross-country encounter of the day.

In three non-conference games, North Carolina State met the strong Lenoir-Rhyne outfit, Mississippi took on Southeastern and U. S. U. was host to the University of Arkansas.

Handsomeness Will Be Given To Winners In Armistice Day Regatta

Donors of trophies in the Armistice Day regatta on Lake Monroe next Thursday were announced last night by Karl Schultz, commodore of the water carnival.

The Vele trophy will be competed for by entrants in the hydroplane 151 class. The trophy, a silver mounted cup, 20 inches in height, will be given to the winner. The cup was donated by H. C. Vele, jeweler in the Seminole County Bank Building. It is mounted on a ebony base, and gold lined.

In the handicap, out board motor class, a Teep having cup will be given to the winner by the Ball Hardware Company. The cup is 11 1/2 inches in height.

Speed boats have been entered by owners from all over Central Florida, according to Mr. Schultz. Mt. Dora, Easton, DeLand, Ocala and Sanford speed boats will compete for the cups.

Some Of Best Horses In United States Quartered For Meet At Longwood

LONGWOOD, Fla., Nov. 6.—The world's greatest horses are quartered on the grounds and are daily from virtually every part of the country, Seminole County, the newly reconstructed million dollar racing plant located near here on the Dixie Highway between Sanford and Orlando is destined to be the scene of the greatest winter harness meet ever staged in the history of the sport when its gates swing open to the public on Armistice Day, November 11th.

Naturally this community, as well as Sanford, Orlando and other cities in this section, is bubbling over with enthusiasm as the date for the 16 or more day meeting draws near. It promises to be an eventful day in the annals of Florida sportdom.

According to Edward A. Pohlman, Managing Director, every thing will be in ship-shape order at Seminola Park for the opening. A small army of carpenters and workmen is now engaged in applying the finishing touches to the plant which has already been acclaimed by experts as the finest appointed race course of America.

In addition to horses and harnessmen, horse lovers from near and far are beginning to arrive for the inaugural harness meeting which has become the center of nation-wide interest. Included in the assemblage are many persons of note who have been champions of the trotting and pacing sport for many years.

Numerous champions are included among the colony now quartered at Seminola, such as the great racing stallion The Senator (2:03 1/4) once owned by Senator Tom McTaggart and sold by the Indiana political leader to the present owners F. E. Schmidt of Chicago, Illinois and J. Gleason of Williamsport, Penn., for \$30,000. The Senator, handled by the noted horseman, Sep Palin, is scheduled to go in the Inaugural Stake (2:07 Trot) on opening day, which carries a purse of \$3,000 and added money.

Therefore Guy, world's champion three-year-old pacing gelding who smashed all records for his age and sex at Lexington in 1921 when he stepped a mile in (2:25 1/4) is also among those quartered at the local course. This star, owned by Claude Laddington, prominent contractor of Rochester, N. Y., has been nominated to start in the Forest Hotel Stake 2:07 carrying a prize of \$2,500 and added money.

Norman Grantan, with a record of 2:09 1/4 which won 12 races last season is another prominent member of the horse family which will display his wares during the coming 15 or more day session. He is owned by J. Gleason of Williamsport, Penn., and has been named to start in the Inaugural on opening day.

Billy, 2:03, champion three-year-old pacing gelding of the season is also among those present. This star owned by Fred Cline of Indianapolis, Ind., has been named in the Armistice Day Stake. This speedy mare is owned, trained and driven by A. T. "Hump" Morrison, of Sandusky, Ohio, who created somewhat of a sensation at the recent Grand Circuit meeting at Lexington when he scored double victories on two consecutive days of the meeting.

On the second occasion her daughter came into her room, she said she had heard the hounds. "Did you hear them?" "They must have been the hounds of Herne."

Mrs. Legge asserts that during many years she has lived at Windsor she had never heard hounds before.

tradition has it that Herne the hunter was a keeper in Windsor in the days of Queen Elizabeth. Having been disgraced he hid himself in an oak. Herne's oak is said to have been six hundred years old, was blown down August 1868, and a young oak was planted on the spot by Queen Victoria on September 12, 1863.

Herne not only played a fiddle he also was a player of the bagpipes, an instrument illustrating a very ancient use of compressed air, declared William Reavall in a presidential address to the Institution of mechanical engineers in which subject was "compressed air."

Mr. Reavall said, organs with piston valves were described by Vitruvius and Nero, while such instruments were also known to Archimedes and Plato.

City Planning System Avoids The 'Patch Work Quilt' Effects, Claimed

A public hearing will be held at the City Hall for the purpose of receiving suggestions from the citizens on the proposed zoning ordinance which has been drawn up by the City Planning Commission and a city engineer authorized and employed by the City Commissioners of Sanford. George W. Simons, chief sanitary engineer of the Florida State Board of Health, wrote an article on "City Planning and Zoning" two years ago and it is reproduced in part in the Herald because of its bearing on the zoning question of Sanford.

Long ago the average citizen conceived city planning work from the standpoint of city beautification, the fantastic ideas of some individual exhibited in the improvement of parks, the planning of street parks and the cleaning and painting of buildings. City planning was never associated with the orderly development of the city's physical structure. Today city planning is viewed in a much different light; it has assumed a more practical significant role and concerns principally the logical and sensible development of the city, it attempts to secure an orderliness by planning rather than by decoration, it aims to use suggestions for what they are best intended. As one expert said, "City planning is the attempt to exert a well-considered control on behalf of the people of a city over the development of their physical environment as a whole."

Stated simply, city planning rests primarily on the sound, orderly, healthy development of a city.

In Florida these days of rapid growth and extensive community development. The need of better, more comprehensive, far reaching planning efforts are being en-

countered and realized by every progressive city or town. What was considered adequate and sufficient a few years ago is now inadequate and obsolete. City plans developed a decade ago and considered ample for many years are now seriously defective with their narrow thoroughfares, their lack of utility service, their insufficiency of parks and other utilitarian motives. The development of the modern Florida city has surpassed the wildest dreams of Aladdin's wonders.

Modern transportation methods and improved rural highway systems have brought the country to the city thereby abolishing the so-called city limits line. The city areas of Jacksonville, Tampa, Miami and St. Petersburg for instance, extend far beyond their respective legally defined limits. These cities have outgrown their original boundaries and today extend as far beyond their potential influences are felt or exerted. City limits today are mere imaginary lines for taxation purposes; frequently the most substantial, extensive and progressive developments are found in areas adjacent to and outside the city. (Witness Coral Gables near Miami).

Modern conditions such as these have taught the city planner the need of a broad vision, and further, that his vision cannot terminate at city limit lines but instead must extend far beyond. He must be a regional developer and planner, endeavoring to harmoniously coordinate all these things which make for the greater community plan. Research and study must consider the vast territories contiguous to the cities. In other words, regional planning is fast replacing mere city planning. Even now the electric utility of Jacksonville is available to the citizens of Orange Park and Pablo Beach.

Those of Tampa and Orlando serve numerous countryside places remotely located from the central station, making all these distant communities tangible parts of the larger city plans.

Some people ask, why should a city have a plan? The foregoing implies an answer to this question. No one would attempt the building of a home without a plan, yet today most of our cities grow amazingly without the semblance of a comprehensive plan, with the result that ultimately a plan must be developed and the many sad, unfortunate errors of the past be remedied at a tremendous outlay of public money. Without plans our cities have assumed patchwork quilt effects—as one expert has put it the kitchen range has been put in the parlor and the parlor in the kitchen. Witness the narrow streets, lack of parks and playgrounds, inadequate utilities, jogs in the streets and other physical evils and then conclude in your own mind the justification of a plan.

One has but to stand on such busy thoroughfares as Flagler street in Miami, Franklin Street in Tampa, Orange Avenue in Orlando, Forsyth or Main Street in Jacksonville to see the lack of vision in planning street widths. Twenty feet addition width on Orange Avenue, Orlando, would be worth millions.

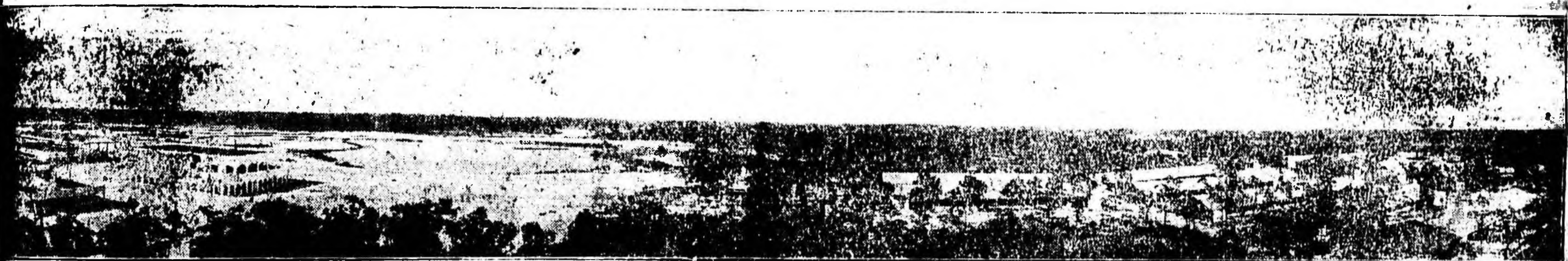

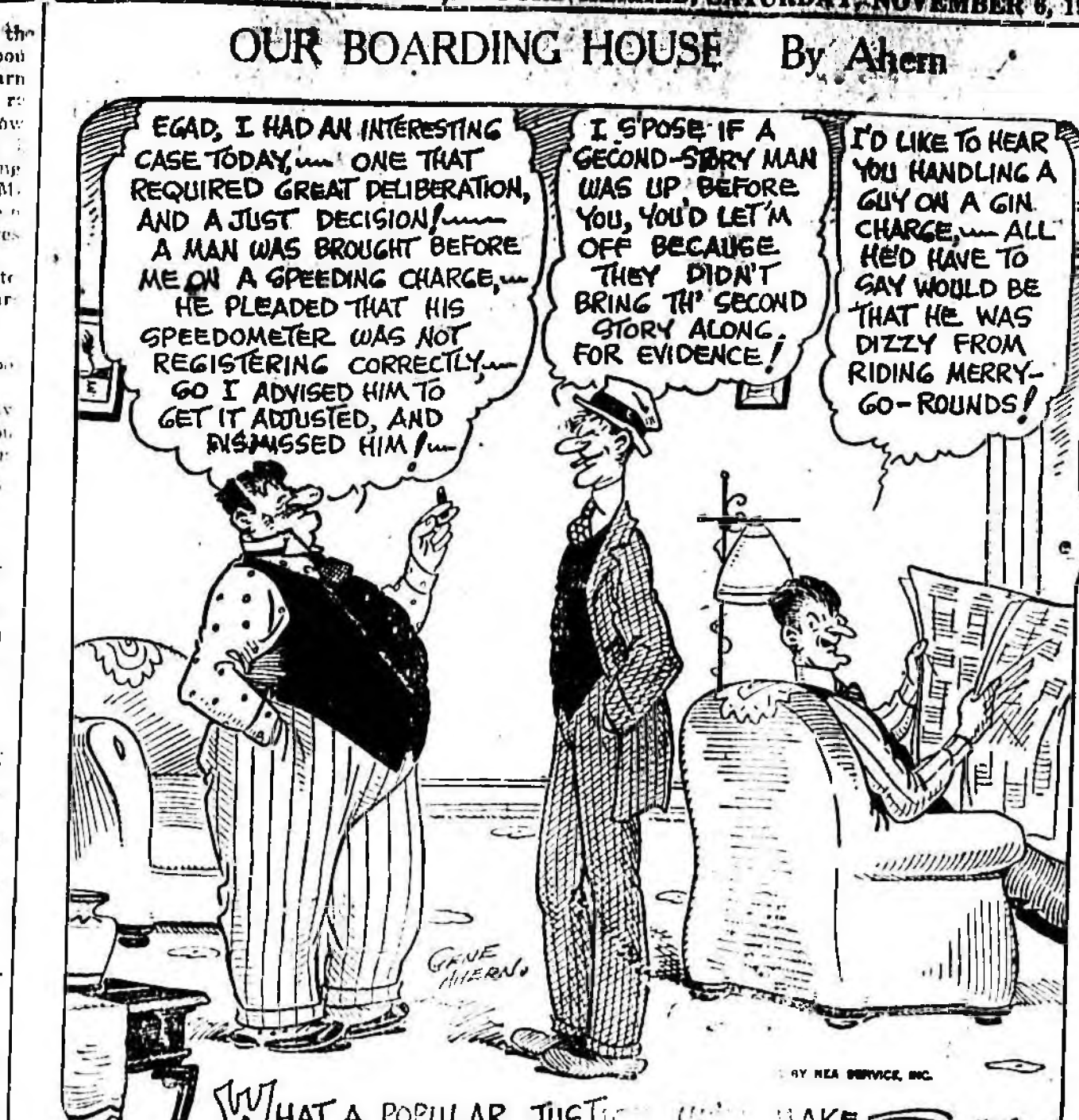
